Clemson's NCAA Tournament History

The 2009 season marked Clemson's 34th trip to an NCAA Regional dating back to the 1947 season. Clemson has been to the NCAA Tournament every year since 1987 except one (2008). Therefore, the Tigers have been to the NCAA Tournament 22 of the last 23 years. Overall, Clemson has been to a regional in 34 seasons, sixth-most all-time. Clemson's all-time record in NCAA play is 101-73, a 58.0 winning percentage.

Clemson is 56-33 (.629) under Head Coach Jack Leggett in NCAA Tournament play, including a 36-6 record (.857) in home NCAA Tourney games. Leggett has taken Clemson to a regional 15 times in the 16 years he has been Clemson's head coach. Leggett has also taken Clemson to a super regional eight of the first 11 years that format has been in existence.

Tigers Earned 34th NCAA Tournament Bid

Clemson played in its 34th all-time NCAA Regional in 2009. The 34 appearances are sixth-most in NCAA history, trailing only Texas (53), Florida State (47), Miami (FL) (38), Oklahoma State (37),

and Southern California (36).

In the Clemson Regional from May 29 to June 1, the Tigers played Oklahoma State three times. The Cowboys have made 37 NCAA Tournament appearances, fourth-most in NCAA history. The Tigers then faced Arizona State in the Tempe Super Regional. The Sun Devils have made 33 NCAA Tournament appearances, seventh-most in NCAA history. Therefore, Clemson faced two of the top-seven teams in NCAA history in terms of NCAA Tourney appearances.

Clemson Played in Eighth Super Regional

The Tempe Super Regional was the Tigers' eighth super regional appearance in the 11 years of the format. Since 1999, Clemson has missed playing in a super regional just three times (2003,04,08). Clemson has been to the NCAA Tournament every year since 1987, with the exception of the 2008 season.

Clemson is tied for fifth in the nation in super regional appearances. Cal State Fullerton, Florida State, Miami (FL), and Rice have all been to nine super regionals, while Clemson is tied with Louisiana State for fifth.

The Tigers

Clemson (44-22) ended the season with a ranking as high as #14. Clemson was 19-11 during the ACC regular season, finishing in third place in the ACC standings. Clemson made its 22nd NCAA Tournament appearance in the last 23 years, its 34th overall, sixth-most in the nation, and eighth super regional appearance, tied for fifth-most in NCAA history.

The Tigers, who were 31-9 at home, 10-11 on opponents' home fields and 3-2 in neutral-site games, were led by 16th-year Head Coach Jack Leggett. The Tigers were also 8-11 against top-25 ranked teams in 2009, including 6-8 against top-five ranked teams.

The team hit .299 with a .451 slugging percentage and .387 on-base percentage on the season. Clemson, who had 312 walks against just 417 strikeouts, also stole 81 bases in 106 attempts.

Ben Paulsen hit a team-best .367 with 18 doubles, four triples, 13 homers, and 61 RBIs. Wilson Boyd batted .341 with 46 RBIs. Mike Freeman hit .328 with 44 RBIs, while First-Team All-ACC outfielder Jeff Schaus hit .320 with 13 home runs, 50 RBIs, and 42 walks against only 29 strikeouts. Kyle Parker added 12 homers and 52 RBIs.

The pitching staff had a 3.68 ERA and .253 opponents' batting average. The staff allowed 203 walks against 548 strikeouts, good for a 2.70-to-1 strikeout-to-walk ratio, the second-best mark in school history. Tomas Cruz and Matt Vaughn tied for the team-lead with four saves apiece, while freshman righthander Scott Weismann was 3-1 with a 1.23 ERA in 36.2 innings pitched over 17 appearances (three starts). The Tigers fielded at a .967 clip as well.

Worth Noting

- The 2009 season marked Clemson's 52nd straight non-losing season.
- Clemson did not lose more than two games in a row in 2009, the first time the Tigers accomplished that feat since 2000.
- Clemson was 21-3 in games decided by five runs or more.
- Clemson hit .304 in ACC regular-season games and .300 in non-conference regular-season games. The Tigers also batted .283 in 10 postseason games.
- Clemson scored 77 runs in the first inning, more than any other inning.
- Clemson was 35-7 when it outhit its opponent and 3-12 when it got outhit.
- Clemson was 36-10 when it hit a home run and 8-12 when it did not hit a home run.
- Clemson had a 312-203 advantage in walks over its opponents.
- Clemson held opponents to a .229 batting average with runners in scoring position and .213 batting average with runners in scoring position and two outs.
- Clemson won twice in one day on four different occasions in 2009, the most times that has happened since 1992. Prior to 2009, Clemson had a combined four days in the last seven years in which it won twice in one day.

Polls

The Tigers ended the 2009 season ranked in the top 16 of all three major polls, the fourth time that has happened in the last five years. Clemson's highest final ranking was #14 in the **Sports Weekly** coaches poll. The Tigers were also ranked #15 in the final **Collegiate Baseball** poll and #16 in the final **Baseball America** poll.

Clemson has had at least one final top-25 ranking in 13 of Head Coach Jack Leggett's 16 seasons in Tigertown. The Tigers have also been ranked #1 for 20 weeks by at least one of the three major polls under Leggett.

Tigers Third in Overall ACC Standings

Thanks to a regular-season-ending sweep at N.C. State from May 14-16, Clemson (19-11) finished in third place in the overall ACC standings behind Florida State (19-9) and North Carolina (19-10). The Tigers also tied Florida State and North Carolina for the most ACC regular-season wins in 2009.

Tigers Advanced Through Losers' Bracket

Clemson advanced to the Tempe Super Regional by going through the losers' bracket at the Clemson Regional. It marked just the second time that Clemson went through the losers' bracket at a home regional or super regional. Overall, Clemson has made it through the losers' bracket to win a regional or super regional six times, four away from home and two at home.

That's how many of Clemson's 66 games were against teams that played in the 2009 NCAA Tournament, which equates to 50 percent. Clemson had an 18-15 record against teams in the field. The Tigers played 13 different teams that participated in the NCAA Tournament.

Clemson played two top-eight national seeds (North Carolina, Arizona State). The Tigers were also 5-7 against #1 seeds, 7-6 against #2 seeds, 4-2 against #3 seeds, and 2-0 against #4 seeds.

Tigers #11 in Final Unofficial RPI

Clemson had a final unofficial RPI of #11 according to WarrenNolan.com. The Tigers also played the nation's #9-toughest schedule according to the same website. Of Clemson's 66 games, 55 were against teams in the top 109 of the RPI. There were 302 schools that played Division I baseball in 2009.

Playing a tough schedule was nothing new for Head Coach Jack Leggett's Tigers. According to the unofficial RPI at WarrenNolan.com, Clemson's strength of schedule figures since 2004 have all been among the nation's top 20. The 2004 (#5), 2005 (#4), 2006 (#1), 2007 (#17), and 2008 (#2) seasons all saw the Tigers play among the nation's toughest schedules.

2009 Clemson Baseball Notes

Clemson Win Total +13 Over 2008

Clemson had a 44-22 record in 2009. That was quite an improvement over 2008 when the Tigers had a 31-27-1 record. The 13-win improvement tied for the third-best mark in school history from one season to the next. The all-time record is a 17-win improvement from the 1990 to 1991 seasons. The Tigers made a 16-win improvement from 1957 to 1958 when Head Coach Bill Wilhelm took over and led the Tigers to the College World Series in his first year. Head Coach Jack Leggett took Clemson to a 12-win improvement in his first year in 1994 as well.

Tigers in Postseason in Three Major Sports

Clemson had a solid sports year, especially in the three major men's sports. Clemson was one of 13 Division I programs to play in a bowl game, the NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament, and the NCAA Baseball Tournament. Clemson was also one of just six to reach a super regional and play in the other two.

Joining Clemson on the list were three other ACC schools (Boston College, Florida State, North Carolina). The others on the list included Kansas, Louisiana State, Minnesota, Missouri, Ohio State, Oklahoma, Oklahoma State, Texas, and Utah.

This was just the eighth time in school history that Clemson played in a bowl game, the NCAA Basketball Tournament, and NCAA Baseball Tournament in the same year.

The baseball program was the third Clemson athletic team to reach a "Sweet 16" of an NCAA Tournament during the spring. The Clemson women's tennis and rowing teams also accomplished that feat.

Leggett Leading a Consistent Winner

Head Coach Jack Leggett has a 724-331-1 (.686) record at Clemson in 16 seasons. The legendary Bill Wilhelm has the most wins of any Tiger coach with 1,161 in 36 seasons (1958-93) at Clemson. Leggett's 724 wins are second-most in school history. No other Clemson coach has more than 70 wins while in Tigertown.

Leggett earned win #700 as the leader of the Tiger program in Clemson's 10-1 win over Duke on April 5, 2009. Then against Oklahoma State in the

Clemson Regional on May 31, he earned his 1,100th career win in a 15-1 victory.

Through Leggett's 16 seasons at Clemson, he has 724 wins. Only six other programs (Florida State, Wichita State, Rice, Miami (FL), Cal State Fullerton, Louisiana State) have more wins over that span from 1994-09.

Tigers Have 195 Top-25 Wins Under Leggett

Clemson defeated #2 North Carolina on March 6 by a score of 5-4 in 10 innings and beat #24 Florida State on March 21 by a score of 8-7 in 11 innings. Then in a three-game series against #5 Miami (FL) in April, the Tigers won two games. On April 21 at Doug Kingsmore Stadium, Jeff Schaus hit a walkoff grand slam to lift Clemson to a 5-3 win over #19 Coastal Carolina. Then in the series against #4 Georgia Tech, the Tigers won two games. In the ACC Tournament, Clemson beat #4 North Carolina 4-3 in 11 innings. That means Clemson had eight wins over top-25 teams and six victories over top-five teams in 2009.

In 16 seasons at Clemson, Head Coach Jack Leggett has 195 wins over teams ranked in the top 25. He also owns 101 wins over top-10 ranked teams, 50 wins over top-five ranked teams, and five victories over a top-ranked team.

Close Games the Norm

Clemson had a 44-22 overall record in 2009. Incredibly, 17 of its 22 losses were by three runs or less, as the Tigers lost seven one-run games, four two-run games, and six three-run games. Two of the other five losses were by four runs, meaning the Tigers lost by more than four runs just three times all season. In their 44 wins, the Tigers outscored their opponents 370-131, an average margin of 5.4 runs per win. In Clemson's 22 losses, it was outscored 148-83, an average margin of just 3.0 runs per loss.

Tiger Bats Hot in the Last 23 Games

The Tigers won 12 of their last 18 games, 16 of their last 23 games, and 19 of their last 27 games thanks in part to their bats coming alive. After Clemson's 5-4 loss to #4 Georgia Tech on April 24, the Tigers' team batting average stood at .291. But in the last 23 games, Clemson had a 16-7 record. Over that 23-game stretch, the Tigers hit .316 with a .465 slugging percentage and .396 on-base percentage. The Tigers also averaged 7.1 runs per game and

11.1 hits per game while totaling 29 stolen bases in the last 23 games as well.

Wilson Boyd was Clemson's hottest hitter during the last 23 games of the season. He was 37-for-85 (.435) with a .500 on-base percentage. Mike Freeman was 37-for-95 (.389) during that stretch as well.

Walking Up in 2009

The Tigers had an on-base percentage 88 points higher than their batting average in 2009 thanks to totaling 312 walks in 66 games (4.7 per game). Three Tigers, Brad Miller (53), Mike Freeman (42), and Jeff Schaus (42) all totaled at least 42 walks and were among the ACC leaders in that category. Miller, who set a school-freshman-record with 53 walks, had an on-base percentage 132 points higher than his batting average thanks to a plethora of walks.

Tigers' Two Double-Digit Home Run Streaks

In the 2009 season, Clemson had two home runs streaks of 10 games or more. The Tigers hit at least one home run in 11 straight games from April 8-22. It was the Tigers' longest streak since 2002, when Clemson hit a home run in 11 consecutive games from May 25 to June 19. The longest Tiger homer streak prior to the 11-game streak in 2002 was in 1996, when Clemson had a 13-game homer streak from March 31 to April 17. Earlier in 2009, the Tigers also had a 10-game streak of hitting at least one home run.

Spreading the Wealth

Due to a rash of injuries and a wealth of young talent, Clemson used many players in the field in 2009. Only six Tigers had enough plate appearances (minimum of 3.0 per game) to qualify for the ACC lead in batting average, but a total of 14 Tigers totaled at least 42 at-bats. Furthermore, 12 Tigers started at least 20 games in the field. Infielders Mike Freeman, Brad Miller, and Ben Paulsen were the only Tigers to start every game in 2009.

Tigers Fifth in the Nation in ERA

Clemson allowed just 4.2 runs per game in 2009, the fifth-best mark in the nation behind only Virginia, Arizona State, Texas, and Cal State Fullerton. Clemson had a 3.68 ERA, also fifth-best in the nation, and allowed just 36 unearned runs despite committing 84 errors on defense, proof of the pitchers' ability to overcome miscues behind them. A sign of the team concept of the Tiger pitching staff is the fact that Clemson did not have a single pitcher named First or Second-Team All-ACC despite having the nation's fifth-best ERA. That is Clemson's best national finish since 1996, when that team lead the nation in ERA (3.03).

Finding the Zone

The Tiger pitching staff had a solid 2.70-to-1 strikeout-to-walk ratio during the 2009 season, as it had 548 strikeouts against only 203 walks. That mark was second-best in Tiger history, trailing only the 3.16 mark by the 1996 team. Among the team leaders in strikeout-to-walk ratio were Casey Harman (5.56-to-1) and Graham Stoneburner (3.74-to-1).

Tigers Pitch First No-Hitter Since 1984

Five righthanders combined to pitch a no-hitter in Clemson's 14-0 win over South Carolina-Upstate at Doug Kingsmore Stadium on March 18. Justin Sarratt, Scott Weismann, Kyle Deese, Tomas Cruz, and Matt Vaughn combined to allow just two baserunners, one on an error in the outfield on a routine flyball in the first inning and one on a walk in the eighth inning. The Tigers turned a double play in the eighth inning, meaning the five pitchers combined to face just one batter over the minimum.

Sarratt pitched the first 5.0 innings, allowing no walks with two strikeouts to earn the victory. Weismann, Deese, Cruz, and Vaughn each pitched an inning to close out the no-hitter. The five pitchers combined to allow only one walk with seven strikeouts.

It was a special game for Deese, a red-shirt freshman from Inman, SC. After sitting out the entire 2008 season, Deese made his debut in a Tiger uniform against the Spartans. He pitched a perfect seventh inning with a strikeout.

It was not the first time the Tigers flirted with a no-hitter in 2009. Against Furman 15 days earlier at Doug Kingsmore Stadium, Clemson led 2-0 with no one on base, two outs, and one strike away from a no-hitter in the ninth inning. However, an infield single ended Clemson's no-hit bid. On the next pitch, Brian Harrison hit a two-run homer to tie the score. Furman was later victorious by a score of 4-2 in 14 innings.

The Tigers last no-hitter prior to 2009 came in the second game of a doubleheader on March 6, 1984, when Scott Parrish no-hit The Citadel in a seven-inning game at Doug Kingsmore Stadium. Clemson's no-hitter against the Spartans was only its second involving multiple pitchers.

Those eight pitchers had a combined six saves in 234.1 innings pitched. They also allowed 95 earned runs (3.65 ERA), 205 hits in 870 at-bats (.236 opponents' batting average), and 82 walks with 210 strikeouts (2.56-to-1 strikeout-to-walk ratio).

Four Tigers Signaled Success on Two Fields

Clemson might have had the best group of quarterbacks of any baseball team in the country in 2009. Four Tigers (Chris Dwyer, Richard Mounce, Kyle Parker, Matt Vaughn) were standout signal-callers in high school. And one (Parker) actually plays on the Tiger football team and will compete for the starting quarterback job in 2009.

Dwyer, a freshman lefthander from Swampscott, MA, led his high school teams to a 38-2 record in four years as the starting quarterback and earned all-conference honors all four seasons. He was also a first-team All-New England pick and **Boston Globe** Player-of-the-Year at Salisbury (CT) School who passed for over 5,100 yards and 58 touchdowns along with 21 rushing touchdowns in his career.

Mounce, a freshman first-baseman and righthander from Columbia, SC, was named Mr. Football in South Carolina as a senior at Blythewood High School. He was his team's offensive MVP in the Shrine Bowl after being named AAA Offensive Player-of-the-Year. As a senior, he completed 152-223 passes (68.2 percent) for 2,416 yards and 34 touchdowns against just two interceptions and rushed for 667 yards in 10 games. Mounce led his team to a 33-1 record in his high school career and teamed with current Tiger wide receiver Marquan Jones to set numerous school records.

Parker, a sophomore outfielder from Jacksonville, FL, red-shirted on the gridiron in 2008 and will compete for the starting job in 2009. Like 2008, he went through spring practice with the football team in 2009. In the 2009 Spring Game, he completed 13-21 passes for 171 yards and one touchdown pass against no interceptions, and he also added a rushing touchdown. The First-Team All-ACC player was successful in juggling the two sports in 2008 and did the same in 2009 during the spring football season. Parker, who graduated from Bartram Trail High School a semester early in order to play baseball at Clemson in 2008, was the #34 football prospect in the nation and #4 quarterback in the nation out of high school according to ESPN.com. He had over 2,500 passing yards and 15 touchdowns along with over 1,000 rushing yards as a senior.

Vaughn, a senior righthander and co-captain from Summerville, SC, starred as a quarterback at Summerville High School under the legendary John McKissick, the nation's all-time winningest high school coach. Vaughn was one of the top-50 quarterbacks in the nation according to PrepStar. As a senior at Summerville High School, he quarterbacked alongside then-freshman A.J. Green, a current Georgia star who is one of the nation's top wide receivers.

The fact that Clemson had so many quality football players on its roster was fitting due to the fact that Head Coach Jack Leggett was also a standout football player at Maine. He starred as a defensive back and placekicker for the Black Bears from 1974-76. Leggett still holds the school record for longest field goal with a 52-yarder.

Boyd, Harman Named All-ACC Tournament

Junior outfielder Wilson Boyd and sophomore lefthander Casey Harman were both named to the All-ACC Tournament team for their performance at Durham (NC) Bulls Athletic Park from May 21-23. They were two of the 11 players selected for the all-tourney squad.

Boyd went 6-for-13 (.462) with five RBIs, one walk, and one stolen base in three games, and he had two hits in each game. His tournament highlight came against #4 North Carolina on May 23. With the bases loaded and two outs in the 11th inning, he belted a walkoff single off the wall in left field to give Clemson a 4-3 victory.

Harman set career-highs for innings pitched (7.1) and strikeouts (10) in a starting role against the Tar Heels. He did not factor in the decision, but he was a big reason the Tigers were able to pull out a 4-3 win in 11 innings. Harman, who was one of only two pitchers selected to the all-tourney team, also allowed just seven hits and one walk while throwing 107 pitches, including 74 strikes.

Five Tigers on Regional All-Tourney Team

Five Tigers were named to the Clemson Regional All-Tournament team, as the Tigers captured the title by going 4-1 at Doug Kingsmore Stadium from May 29 to June 1. Infielders Ben Paulsen (1B) and Mike Freeman (2B) along with outfielder Wilson Boyd and designated hitter Chris Epps all made the team among position players. Lefthander Chris Dwyer was one of only two pitchers named to the team. Epps was named Clemson Regional MVP after going 10-for-19 (.526) with one double, two homers, six RBIs, seven runs, and a stolen base in five games.

Attendance Strong Again in 2009

Clemson averaged 4,727 fans in its 36 home dates in 2009, the third-best average in school history, as the Tigers drew 170,156 fans at Doug Kingsmore Stadium. Clemson's top-six average attendance figures have all been established since 2004.

Clemson finished in the top 25 in the nation in five different categories in 2009. Clemson was fifth in the nation in ERA (3.68), its highest finish in that category since 1996. The Tiger pitching staff was also 11th in the nation in hits per nine innings pitched (8.62) and 25th in strikeouts per nine innings pitched (8.30). The Tiger offense was ninth in the nation in walks (312), while the defense was tied for seventh in the nation in double plays (69).

Among individual finishes, infielder Brad Miller was tied for 11th in the nation in walks (53). He also led the nation among freshmen. No other freshman in the country finished in the top 88 or had more than 40 walks in that category. First-baseman Ben

Several other Tigers finished in the top 10 in the ACC in statistical categories. Ben Paulsen was tied for third in hits (95), third in total bases (160), tied for third in triples (4), eighth in batting average (.367), and ninth in slugging percentage (.618). All four of Paulsen's four triples came in ACC regular-season games, best in the league.

Mike Freeman was tied for second in triples (5), tied for eighth in hits (88), and tied for 10th in walks (42). Brad Miller was second in walks (53) and tied for eighth in steals (16). Jeff Schaus was tied for 10th in walks (42).

Casey Harman was tied for eighth in wins (7) and ninth in strikeouts (89). Chris Dwyer was first in starts (17), tied for fourth in complete games (1), fifth in strikeouts (95), and ninth in opponents' batting average (.236)

Nine Tigers Picked in MLB Draft

Nine Tigers were taken in the Major League Draft from June 9-11, 2009. The nine draft picks tied for fourth-most in the nation, behind only Georgia (11), Mississippi (11), and Florida (10). It also tied for the third-most draft picks in Clemson history.

Junior first-baseman Ben Paulsen was Clemson's highest draft pick in 2009, as he was a third-round pick of the Colorado Rockies. Freshman lefthander Chris Dwyer was taken in the fourth round by the Kansas City Royals. He became the first-ever first-year freshman from a four-year college selected in the draft, which dates back to 1965.

Three other veteran hurlers were selected on day-two of the draft. Senior lefthander Ryan Hinson was drafted in the 10th round by the San Diego Padres, sophomore righty Graham Stoneburner was taken in the 14th round by the New York Yankees, and senior righthander Trey Delk was drafted in the 29th round by the Chicago White Sox.

On day-three of the draft, four more Tigers were drafted, including infielders Mike Freeman and Matt Sanders. Freeman, a junior, was drafted in the 36th round by the Arizona Diamondbacks and Sanders, a senior, was chosen in the 41st round by the Colorado Rockies.

The Rockies drafted a third Tiger when they took senior righthander Clinton McKinney in the 48th round, then sophomore outfielder Addison Johnson rounded out the draft class with his selection in the 48th round by the Oakland Athletics.

With the nine selections in the 2009 draft, Jack Leggett has had a total of 79 players drafted in his 16 seasons as head coach at Clemson. Fourteen of those 79 players were drafted twice, meaning a Tiger has been drafted 93 times in his tenure. Thirteen more Tigers have signed free-agent contracts as well.

Delk, Vaughn Received Degrees

Righthander Trey Delk and Matt Vaughn both received their undergraduate degrees in commencement ceremonies in Littlejohn Coliseum on May 8, 2009. Delk, a fifth-year senior from Elgin, SC, received his degree in psychology. Vaughn, a senior from Summerville, SC, received his management degree. Vaughn was also a three-time member of the ACC Academic Honor Roll.

Boyd Raised His Average Late in Season

Junior outfielder Wilson Boyd (Hickory, NC) saw his team-season-long 11-game hitting streak come to an end in late May, but he was still one of Clemson's hottest hitters late in the season. In the last 17 games, he was 30-for-66 (.455) with eight doubles, two triples, 18 RBIs, nine runs, six walks, a .500 on-base percentage, and two stolen bases. During that stretch, he was also named to the All-ACC Tournament team and Clemson Regional All-Tournament team, the only Tiger that could make that claim in 2009.

After the Georgia Tech game on April 25, his season batting average stood at .250. But thanks to his hot bat, he raised his season batting average to .341 with a .418 on-base percentage. He also had 15 doubles, three triples, three homers, 46 RBIs, and 24 walks against only 22 strikeouts in 182 at-bats in 2009.

Boyd had a streak of seven consecutive hits over a two-game span on May 10,11. He went 3-for-3 against North Carolina-Wilmington on May 10, then he had a hit in each of his first four at-bats against Furman a day later before he grounded out in his fifth at-bat of the game. He also went 2-for-3 against the Seahawks on May 9.

Boyd Clutch

Wilson Boyd had two of Clemson's four walkoff hits in 2009. With two outs and the bases loaded in the 10th inning against Charlotte on February 22, he lined a walkoff single to right-center to give Clemson a 6-5 win. Then in the ACC Tournament against #4 North Carolina on May 23, he duplicated that feat. With two outs and the bases loaded in the 11th inning against the Tar Heels, he belted a 3-2 pitch off the wall in left field for a walkoff single to give the Tigers a 4-3 victory.

Boyd also easily led the team in hitting with runners in scoring position. He was 26-for-54 (.481) in that situation and hit 96 points higher than the next closest Tiger.

Cruzing on the Mound

Junior righthander Tomas Cruz (Amarillo, TX) used his ability to change speeds to allow him to be extremely effective out of the bullpen in his first

season at Clemson in 2009. In 46.0 innings pitched over 24 relief appearances, the junior college transfer had four saves, a 3.33 ERA, and .195 opponents' batting average. He also allowed just 32 hits and 16 walks with 39 strikeouts.

Delk Delivered on Two Fronts

Senior righthander Trey Delk (Elgin, SC) had a day to remember on May 8. That morning, he received his psychology degree in commencement ceremonies in Littlejohn Coliseum. Later that night, he started on the mound for the Tigers and earned the win against North Carolina-Wilmington. In 5.0 innings pitched, he allowed just five hits, one run, and one walk with two strikeouts.

Delk, Clemson's Friday starter when healthy in 2009, missed the latter stages of March and most of April due to a back injury, but he was still effective. In 49.2 innings pitched over 11 starts, he was 4-1 with a 3.44 ERA and .272 opponents' batting average. He also allowed 22 walks with 41 strikeouts.

Dwyer's Masterful Outing #1

Freshman lefthander Chris Dwyer (Swampscott, MA) had a masterful performance against one of the nation's best teams in #5 Miami (FL) in the second game of a doubleheader on April 11 at Doug Kingsmore Stadium. He pitched a complete game two-hitter to lead Clemson to a 9-1 win. He earned ACC Pitcher-of-the-Week honors. He also was named to the Brooks Wallace Award National All-Star Lineup and was the Southeast Region Player-of-the-Week by CollegeBaseballInsider.com thanks to his outing.

In 9.0 innings pitched, Dwyer allowed just two hits, one run, and four walks with 10 strikeouts. He became the first Tiger to pitch a complete game in 2009. He allowed just two runners past first base, including only one runner past second base, during the entire game.

On the season, Dwyer had a 5-6 record and 4.92 ERA in 86.0 innings pitched over a team-high 17 starts. He only allowed 76 hits (.236 opponents' batting average) and 33 walks with 95 strikeouts. Dwyer led the team in strikeouts in 2009. No freshman had led Clemson in that category since 1997, when righthander Ryan Mottl led the Tigers in strikeouts.

Dwyer's Masterful Outing #2

After his complete game against #5 Miami (FL) in the second game of a doubleheader on April 11, he went over a month without a victory. But that all changed against Oklahoma State in the Clemson Regional on May 31. Facing elimination, the Tigers received a superb effort from the freshman lefthander.

In 8.2 innings pitched in a starting role, he allowed just six hits, one run, and one walk with 13 strikeouts to earn the win. It was the most strikeouts by a Tiger in a game since March 20, 1998, when Ryan Mottl struck out 13 in a win over Maryland. It was also the most strikeouts by a Tiger in an NCAA Tournament game since May 31, 1996, when Kris Benson struck out 15 against Miami (FL) in the College World Series. For his efforts, Dwyer was named to the Clemson Regional All-Tournament team as one of only two pitchers.

Epps Moved Into Leadoff Spot

Sophomore outfielder Chris Epps (Stone Mountain, GA) was relegated to a backup role for most of the regular season. But he was inserted, not only into the starting lineup, but into the leadoff spot in the batting order in the April 25 game against #4 Georgia Tech. He helped the Tigers to two wins in the final two games of that series and batted in the leadoff spot for the rest of the year, a total of 23 games.

In those 23 games, all as the designated hitter, he was 30-for-90 (.333) with four doubles, one triple, three home runs, 20 RBIs, 24 runs, 12 walks, and six stolen bases to lead Clemson to a 16-7 record. He also reached base via a hit or walk in 22 of those 23 games and hit safely in 12 of the last 13 games, including all seven of Clemson's NCAA Tournament contests.

The highlight of his season came in the Clemson Regional when he earned tournament MVP honors. In five games, he went 10-for-19 (.526) with one double, two homers, six RBIs, seven runs, and a stolen base to lead the Tigers to the regional title. His two-out, two-run homer on an 0-2 pitch with the Tigers trailing 5-1 in the seventh inning against Oklahoma State in the regional championship game started Clemson's comeback to an eventual 6-5 win.

Epps' forté is finding any way on base. He walked 25 times in 128 at-bats in 2009, good for one walk every 5.12 at-bats, and had a .415 on-base percentage. He also raised his batting average to .297 and had six doubles, two triples, four homers, 27 RBIs, 32 runs, and nine steals in 2009.

In his career, Epps has walked 55 times in 229 at-bats, meaning he has walked once every 4.16 at-bats during his career. That is the third-best mark in Clemson history.

Freeman Finished the Season on a Roll

Junior second-baseman and co-captain Mike Freeman (Orlando, FL) was on a tear late in the year. In the last 24 games, he was 38-for-97 (.392) with 25 runs, nine doubles, one triple, two homers, and 21 RBIs. Freeman earned Clemson Regional All-Tournament honors by going 11-for-22 (.500) with three doubles, a triple, homer, seven RBIs, and six runs in five games. He also had a 10-game hitting streak that ended against College of Charleston on May 12.

On the season, Freeman hit .328 with 16 doubles, a team-high five triples, four homers, 44 RBIs, 42 walks, a .414 on-base percentage, and 11 stolen bases. He also had a stellar .979 fielding percentage, as he has committed only seven errors in the field.

Harman Continued to Throw Strikes

Sophomore lefthander Casey Harman (South Burlington, VT) had a 4.4-to-1 strikeout-to-walk ratio when he struck out 44 against only 10 walks in 44.0 innings pitched as a freshman in 2008. That strikeout-to-walk ratio is the seventh-best mark in Clemson history for a season.

In 2009, he continued his outstanding ratio, as he had 89 strikeouts against only 16 walks (5.56-to-1 strikeout-to-walk ratio). Two of those 16 walks were intentional as well. Despite that fact, he bested his strikeout-to-walk ratio in 2008, as his 5.56-to-1 mark in 2009 is second-best in a season in school history. Harman also totaled 46 strikeouts against only seven walks in 54.0 innings pitched in ACC regular-season games.

Harman has 133 strikeouts against only 26 walks in 130.2 innings pitched in his career. His 5.12-to-1 strikeout-to-walk ratio is the best mark in Clemson history, while his 1.79 walks-per-nine-innings-pitched mark is the third-best mark in school history. He has allowed 22 career home runs, but 18 have been solo long balls.

Harman started the season as a long reliever, but he made his first start of the season against Wake Forest in the second game of a doubleheader on March 13. He allowed just one run in 6.1 innings pitched to earn the win. He also struck out 10 against only one walk in 7.1 innings pitched in the Tigers' 4-3 win over #4 North Carolina in 11 innings on May 23.

In 2009, he had a 7-3 record and 3.95 ERA in a team-high 86.2 innings pitched over 22 appearances (13 starts). He finished second on the team to fellow lefty Chris Dwyer in strikeouts, while his seven wins (along with Graham Stoneburner's) were the most by a Tiger since 2006.

Ryan Hinson's Appearances

Senior lefthander Ryan Hinson (Rock Hill, SC) was Clemson's only 2009 player who traveled with the team during its last trip to the College World Series in the 2006 season. In his four years as both a starter and reliever, he made 85 appearances (27

starts). The 85 appearances are fifth-most in Tiger history.

In 2009, he was a valuable member of the Tiger bullpen. In 28 appearances (two starts), he had a 2-1 record and 3.76 ERA in 38.1 innings pitched. He also allowed just 33 hits (.228 opponents' batting average) and 18 walks with 47 strikeouts, good for an 11.03 strikeouts-per-nine-innings-pitched mark. The 28 appearances also tied for eighth-most in a season in school history.

Lamb a Dual Threat

Freshman Will Lamb (Seaford, VA) came to Clemson as a dual threat in that he was an outstanding outfielder and pitcher at York High School a season ago. He continued his dual roles as a Tiger in 2009.

In his first significant action on the mound, the lefthander pitched 4.2 innings in relief at #2 North Carolina on March 7. He allowed just one hit (a single) and no runs to keep the Tigers in the game against one of the nation's best hitting teams. Then in his first career start in the field against Michigan State on March 10, he went 3-for-4 with a walk, two RBIs, and two stolen bases. He also earned his first career save in Clemson's 4-1 win over Wake Forest in the first game of a doubleheader on March 13.

On the season, Lamb was 15-for-56 (.268) at the plate with eight runs, six RBIs, and four steals in 27 games (11 starts). On the mound, he allowed 22 hits, six runs (2.45 ERA), and eight walks with 15 strikeouts in 22.0 innings pitched over 15 appearances (one start). His versatility was crucial on the road due to the fact that ACC teams are only allowed to have 25 active players on conference road trips and in postseason tournaments.

McKinney's Sidearm Delivery Effective

Senior righthander Clinton McKinney (Greenville, SC) struggled in his first season at Clemson in 2008 when he had a 9.00 ERA in 15 relief appearances. But 2009 was a different story for the sidearm reliever.

In 2009, he provided the Tigers with solid work out of the bullpen. In 23.0 innings pitched over 13 relief appearances, he had a 4.30 ERA and 22 strikeouts against only eight walks. He also owned a 4-0 record, victories against Elon in the first game of a doubleheader on March 24, Duke on April 3, #19 Coastal Carolina on April 21, and N.C. State on May 16. Prior to his outing against Elon, he had only made two relief appearances for a total of 2.0 innings pitched in Clemson's first 20 games of the season.

Against the Phoenix, he pitched 3.0 scoreless innings of two-hit ball with three strikeouts in Clem-

son's 5-3 win. Against the Blue Devils, he allowed just four hits, one unearned run, and no walks with three strikeouts in the final 4.1 innings in the Tigers' 7-3 win. Against the Chanticleers, he pitched a hitless and scoreless ninth inning with three strikeouts in Clemson's 5-3 comeback win. Then at N.C. State, he pitched 1.2 perfect innings in relief with a strikeout in the Tigers' 5-4 victory.

Miller Walked Up the Charts

Freshman shortstop Brad Miller (Windermere, FL) had an on-base percentage 132 points higher than his batting average due to tallying a team-high 53 walks, also second-most in the ACC and the most by a Tiger freshman in history.

Overall, Miller batted .273 with three homers and 36 RBIs. He walked 53 times against 35 strikeouts and had a .405 on-base percentage along with a team-high 16 stolen bases.

Nester Solid At & Behind the Plate

Like many Tigers that batted near the bottom of the batting order, sophomore catcher John Nester (Greer, SC) was a big reason Clemson was 19-8 in the last 27 games of 2009. He raised his season batting average to .304 with 11 doubles, five homers, and 33 RBIs in 57 games (46 starts). He shared time behind the plate during the first half of the season, but he cemented his role as the everyday catcher late in the year. In Nester's last 40 games, he was 44-for-128 (.344) after going 7-for-40 (.175) in his first 17 games of 2009.

Parker Showed His Power Against the ACC

Sophomore outfielder Kyle Parker (Jacksonville, FL) batted .255 with 12 homers, 52 RBIs, and a .442 slugging percentage in 63 games (60 starts) in 2009. But in his 27 ACC regular-season games, he hit .295 with seven home runs, 23 RBIs, and a .533 slugging percentage.

That trend was similar to his numbers as a freshman in 2008, when he hit .303 with 14 homers, 50 RBIs, and a .559 slugging percentage overall. But in ACC regular-season games, he hit .336 with 10 homers, 34 RBIs, and a .673 slugging percentage. Therefore, 17 of his 26 career home runs have come in ACC regular-season games even though only 56 of his 120 career games have come in ACC regular-season games.

Parker also nearly tied a school record that has stood for 26 years. In a three-game span against #5 Miami (FL) and Western Carolina from April 12-15, he had a hit in eight consecutive official at-bats. He was one hit away from tying the school record for consecutive hits against the Catamounts on April 15, already having registered a 4-for-4 night. In his fifth official at-bat of the game, he lined a ball to the left side of the infield, but it was right at the third baseman for an out. He fell just one hit shy of the Tiger record held by Bob Paulling, who had nine straight hits in 1983. Paulling, like Parker, played both football and baseball at Clemson.

But perhaps his best moment of the 2009 season came in the Clemson Regional against Oklahoma State on June 1. After coming off the bench for just the third time all season, he lined a two-out, two-run single in the eighth inning to give Clemson a 6-5 lead. The Tigers hung on to win

by that score and advanced to the Tempe Super Regional.

Parker Quickest to 25 Home Runs

Sophomore Kyle Parker established a school record when he hit his 11th home run of the season and 25th of his two-year career in the Tigers' 11-3 win over North Carolina-Wilmington on May 9, 2009. His home run, which went over the "batters' eye" in centerfield at Doug Kingsmore Stadium, gave him 25 career home runs in just 103 contests.

That long ball established a school record for fewest games to reach 25 career home runs. The previous record was held by Matthew LeCroy, who hit his 25th career long ball in his 105th career game. LeCroy went on to an eight-year career in the Major Leagues in which he hit 60 home runs from 2000-07. LeCroy finished his Tiger career with 53 career home runs, fourth-most in school history.

Parker's Two-Sport Day

April 11, 2009 is a day Kyle Parker will never forget. At 1:00 PM, he suited up to start for the White squad in Clemson's Spring Football Game. All he did was complete 13-21 passes for 171 yards and one touchdown against no interceptions along with a rushing touchdown to lead his team to a 30-13 victory in the game that ended at approximately 3:10 PM. But his day was far from over.

Since Clemson's series-opener scheduled for the previous night was rained out, Clemson and #5 Miami (FL) played a doubleheader beginning at 3:34 PM on Saturday. Parker rushed to change out of his football uniform at Memorial Stadium, had to run across the street, then change into his baseball uniform at Doug Kingsmore Stadium.

He did not make it in time to be penciled in the starting lineup for the first game of the day, but he came off the bench in the third inning to hit a pinch-hit single to score a run. For that game, he was 2-for-4 with a home run and three RBIs. Then in the second game of the doubleheader, he was 1-for-3 with a homer, two RBIs, and a walk. Therefore in the doubleheader, he was 3-for-7 with two home runs and five RBIs. All in a day's work for Parker.

Parker also received ACC Player-of-the-Week honors on April 13 for his efforts in five games from April 7-12. He went 8-for-18 (.444) with two doubles, two homers, 11 RBIs, four runs, and three walks in the five games, two against arch-rival South Carolina and three against the #5 Hurricanes. He had at least one hit and one RBI in all five games (and at least two RBIs in four of the five games) during the week.

Parker Received Bob Bradley Award

Kyle Parker added the Bob Bradley Award to his list of honors on April 22. The award, named after Clemson's longtime sports information director, is given annually to Clemson's MVP of the season series against South Carolina. In four games against the Gamecocks, Parker was 6-for-15 (.400) with two doubles, one homer, seven RBIs, four runs, and three walks. In the last of the four meetings in Columbia on April 22, he went 2-for-4 with a three-run homer and three runs to lead the Tigers to a 12-2 victory.

Paulsen Led Tigers in Hitting

Junior first-baseman Ben Paulsen (Acworth, GA) hit a team-best .367 in 66 games in 2009. The .367 batting average was the best mark by a Tiger since 2004. He also had 18 doubles, four triples, 13 homers, 61 RBIs, a .618 slugging percentage, and a team-high .435 on-base percentage. He had a team-high 28 multi-hit games, including two four-hit games, 10 three-hit games, and 16 two-hit games, and a team-high 18 multi-RBI games.

He had one of his best ACC series at Boston College on March 27,28. In three games, he was 6-for-10 with four runs, two triples, one homer, five RBIs, and three walks to lead the Tigers to two wins in three games against the Eagles. The following weekend in the series against Duke, he was 7-for-12 with four runs, two doubles, two homers, and eight RBIs.

He also came up big in the Clemson Regional. He was 7-for-18 (.389) with two doubles, two homers, five RBIs, five runs, and four walks in five games. For his efforts, he was named to the Clemson Regional All-Tournament team.

Sarratt Pitched Gem Against #1 Georgia

Junior righthander Justin Sarratt (Gaffney, SC) toed the rubber against the nation's top-ranked team in Georgia on April 1 at Doug Kingsmore Stadium and did what few teams did in 2009...shut down the Bulldog bats. Despite the Tigers losing a ninth-inning lead and eventually falling 4-2, Sarratt pitched a gem against the Bulldogs. For his effort, he was named ACC Pitcher-of-the-Week.

In a career-long 8.0 innings pitched, he allowed just three hits, one run, and one walk with 12 strikeouts. The 12 strikeouts were the most by a Tiger since April 14, 2001, when Steve Reba struck out 12 against Duke in Clemson's 10-1 win. In fact, in Sarratt's previous 47 career appearances, he had never struck out more than four batters in a game. He pitched admirably against a team that entered the week 10th in the nation in scoring and was averaging nearly 10 runs per game. After yielding a double to lead off the game, he retired 17 batters in a row as well.

It was not the first time in 2009 that he put on a dominating performance at Doug Kingsmore Stadium. As a starter against South Carolina-Upstate on March 18, he pitched 5.0 innings and earned the win in Clemson's 14-0 no-hit victory. He was a part of the Tigers' first no-hitter since 1984.

On the season, Sarratt was 3-2 with a 5.10 ERA and .256 opponents' batting average in 42.1 innings pitched over 16 appearances (seven starts). He also allowed just nine walks with 26 strikeouts, a solid

2.89-to-1 strikeout-to-walk ratio. That number was consistent with his career strikeout-to-walk ratio.

In 101.0 innings pitched over 56 career appearances (nine starts), he has allowed just 20 walks with 65 strikeouts. That equates to a 3.25-to-1 strikeout-to-walk ratio and 1.78 walks-per-nine-innings-pitched mark. His strikeout-to-walk ratio is sixth-best in Clemson history, while his walks-per-nine-innings-pitched mark is second-best in Tiger history.

Schaus Showing His Power & Patience

Sophomore outfielder Jeff Schaus (Naples, FL) had 13 home runs and 50 RBIs in 2009. His power numbers were somewhat of a surprise considering that he only hit three long balls as a freshman in 2008. But all three of those homers came within the last seven games of the season.

Schaus proved his value against ACC competition in 2009. In 30 ACC regular-season games, he hit a team-best .367 with five homers, 19 RBIs, and a team-high .445 on-base percentage while striking out just 10 times in 120 at-bats.

Schaus also displayed a keen eye at the plate, as he had a .424 on-base percentage thanks to 42 walks and five hit-by-pitches against only 29 strikeouts in 247 at-bats in 2009.

Schaus Named First-Team All-ACC

Sophomore outfielder Jeff Schaus was named First-Team All-ACC in 2008. The team was compiled by a vote of the 12 ACC head coaches. Schaus was one of five first-team outfielders and was the lone Tiger to earn First or Second-Team All-ACC honors.

Schaus, a graduate of Barron Collier High School in Naples, FL, hit .320 with 14 doubles, one triple, 13 homers, 50 RBIs, nine stolen bases and a .424 on-base percentage thanks to tallying 42 walks against only 29 strikeouts in 247 at-bats.

Another important reason for his first-team selection was the fact that he hit a team-high .367 with a .445 on-base percentage thanks to 14 walks against only 10 strikeouts in ACC regular-season games.

Schaus was the lone All-ACC honoree for the Tigers in 2009. It was the first time since 1957 that Clemson had less than two All-ACC players. Considering the fact that Clemson had a top-15 ranking in the final polls, advanced to the Tempe Super Regional, and finished third in the overall ACC standings, that proved the "team concept" of the 2009 Tigers.

Schaus Hit Walkoff Grand Slam

Jeff Schaus stepped to the plate against #19 Coastal Carolina on April 21 with the Tiger hopes in his hands. With two outs, the bases loaded, and Clemson trailing 3-1, he blasted the first pitch he saw deep over the fence in right field to send the Tigers to a dramatic 5-3 victory on his first career grand slam. It was Clemson's first win in 2009 when trailing at the end of eight innings. The walkoff homer was also the Tigers' first since 2007 and the second walkoff grand slam in school history.

That was just the beginning of a big week for the Tiger sophomore. In five games that week, four of which were against top-25 teams, he went

10-for-22 (.455) with seven runs, one double, two homers, nine RBIs, and two stolen bases to earn ACC Co-Player-of-the-Week honors. He was also named to the Brooks Wallace Award National All-Star Lineup.

Then against Tennessee Tech in the Tigers' first game of the Clemson Regional on May 29, he hit a two-run double in the ninth inning to give Clemson a 5-4 walkoff win. Therefore, he had two of the Tigers' four walkoff hits in 2009.

Stolz Provided Punch as a Freshman

Freshman Jason Stolz (Marietta, GA) shared time at third base most of the regular season. But late in the year, he solidified himself as the everyday starter at the "hot corner." He also had a 10-game hitting streak to end the regular season.

In his last 18 games, he was 19-for-49 (.388) with four doubles, 10 RBIs, 12 runs, seven walks, a .474 on-base percentage, and six stolen bases.

Prior to his 10-game hitting streak, he was hitting .277. But he raised his batting average to .315 in 2009. In 55 games (42 starts), he totaled seven doubles, one homer, 21 RBIs, 29 runs, a team-high six sacrifice bunts, and seven stolen bases along with a solid .960 fielding percentage. Stolz also showed his great speed and strong arm.

Stoneburner Mowed Them Down

Sophomore righthander Graham Stoneburner (Richmond, VA) was both a starter and reliever in 2009, and he did well in both roles. Late in 2009, he served mostly as a long reliever. On the season, he had a 7-4 record, one save, and a 3.52 ERA in 20 appearances (seven starts). In 64.0 innings pitched, he allowed just two home runs and 19 walks with 71 strikeouts, good for a 3.74-to-1 strikeout-to-walk ratio, thanks to his hard fastball. He also had a 2.67 walks-per-nine-innings-pitched mark.

In his career, Stoneburner has 123 strikeouts against only 40 walks in 135.1 innings pitched, good for a 3.08 strikeout-to-walk ratio.

Captain Vaughn

Senior righthander Matt Vaughn was one the Tigers' two team captains in 2009. Like 2008, he was a co-captain as one of the team's best leaders, as he served like a fifth coach on the team. He was also one of 40 players on the NCBWA Stopper-of-the-Year Award Watch List in the preseason and was on the same list on its midseason watch list.

"Matt brought to the table a competitive, loyal spirit every single day he came to the field," said Head Coach Jack Leggett. "He worked extremely hard. He battled through a couple of injuries that sidelined him for the early part of the season. He was a tough, hard-nosed competitor that loved Clemson and was loyal to our program. He was a good leader and everyone looked up to him, so he was the right guy for that role."

Vaughn won the Tiger Baseball Award as a junior in 2008. The award is given to the team's best leader every year. So it was only fitting that Vaughn be named team co-captain again in 2009.

The Summerville, SC native made his 2009 debut on the mound on March 10 against Michigan State when he pitched a perfect ninth inning with two strikeouts. He had shoulder surgery during the

offseason and did not make an appearance during the first 10 games of the season.

Vaughn was one of Clemson's best pitchers late in 2009, as he made 22 relief appearances for a total of 35.1 innings pitched. The 2009 Clemson graduate was 4-1 with a team-tying-high four saves and 24 strikeouts and only allowed seven extra-base hits. He also earned a win in both of Clemson's victories over South Carolina in 2009. Vaughn had 16 career saves, tied for fourth-most in Clemson history.

On March 18, he capped off one of Clemson's most memorable games in recent years. Against South Carolina-Upstate at Doug Kingsmore Stadium, he pitched a perfect ninth inning with two strikeouts to close out Clemson's no-hitter, its first since 1984. The Tigers defeated the Spartans 14-0, and he was on the mound when he struck out Eric Guillen for the game's final out.

But perhaps his best moment of 2009 came in the championship game of the Clemson Regional against Oklahoma State on June 1. He pitched the final 3.2 innings without allowing an earned run. He also pitched a scoreless ninth inning and struck out Mark Ginter with two outs and two runners on base to end the game and send Clemson to the Tempe Super Regional.

Weismann Back in the Fold

Freshman righthander Scott Weismann (Boxborough, MA) was hampered by arm injuries early in 2009. But he came on strong late in the year, as he made 17 appearances (three starts) for a total of 36.2 innings pitched and had one save along with a 3-1 record. All he did was allow 26 hits (.206 opponents' batting average), five earned runs (1.23 ERA), and 15 walks with 28 strikeouts.

Weismann made his first career start at South Carolina on April 22. He was on a pitch count, meaning he only pitched 4.0 innings. He allowed just two hits, no runs, and one walk with three strikeouts. The Tigers defeated the Gamecocks 12-2. Then on April 26, he pitched 2.0 scoreless innings of one-hit ball to record his first career save against #4 Georgia Tech. In a start against College of Charleston on May 12, he pitched 5.0 scoreless innings of three-hit ball to earn the victory against one of the nation's best offensive teams. He also had a 17-scoreless-innings-pitched streak from early March to early May.

But perhaps his best outing of the season came against Tennessee Tech in the Clemson Regional on May 31. He pitched 8.0 innings in a starting role, allowing just four hits, no runs, and three walks with two strikeouts to earn the win in Clemson's 10-0 victory. He allowed just one runner past first base and none past second base.

Future ACC Tournament Sites

The 2010 ACC Tournament will be held in Greensboro, NC at NewBridge Bank Park. Then from the 2011 to 2013 seasons, the tournament will be held at BB&T Coastal Field in Myrtle Beach, SC. It will be the first time the tourney is held in the state of South Carolina since 2001. Locations for the tournament after the 2013 season have yet to be determined.

Six Former Tigers on Major League Rosters

Six former Clemson baseball players have been on Major League rosters this year. The list includes Clemson's two National Player-of-the-Year selections in history, Kris Benson and Khalil Greene, former All-American Jeff Baker, and rookie pitchers Jason Berken, Steven Jackson, and Tony Sipp.

Benson is in his first year with the Texas Rangers after playing previously with the Pittsburgh Pirates, New York Mets, and Baltimore Orioles. He is a veteran of seven seasons but did not play the last two years due to arm problems. He gained a victory for Texas against Baltimore on April 15, his first win since he pitched for Baltimore in September of 2006. Benson won the National Player-of-the-Year award in 1996 when he led Clemson to the College World Series. He finished his Tiger career with 29 wins and 356 strikeouts, as both are in the top five in Clemson history.

Greene is an infielder with the Saint Louis Cardinals. He spent six seasons with the San Diego Padres before signing a free-agent contract with the Cardinals prior to this season. Greene was the National Player-of-the-Year during his senior year at Clemson (2002) and is still first in school history in career RBIs (276), third in batting average (.377), and fifth in home runs (52).

Baker is in his fifth season with the Colorado Rockies. Baker, who is tied for the all-time Tiger record with 59 career homers, played for the Rockies in the 2007 World Series.

Berken, who played at Clemson in 2003, 2004, and 2006, had an 18-6 record and 3.04 ERA in 47 appearances (36 starts). He made his Major League debut with the Baltimore Orioles in a start against the Toronto Blue Jays on May 26.

Jackson, who played for Clemson from the 2001-04 seasons and had a 19-8 record, was called up to the New York Yankees on April 19 and was later picked up by the Pittsburgh Pirates' organization. He made his Major League debut on June 1.

Sipp was called up to the Cleveland Indians on April 21 and made his Major League debut against Kansas City on April 22. He pitched a perfect inning in relief and had a strikeout. Sipp batted .280 and had a 2-2 pitching record for the Tigers in 2004.

Clemson Swept Charlotte to Open Season

Clemson, ranked #13 in the country, swept Charlotte in a three-game series at Doug Kingsmore Stadium from February 20-22. The Tigers outscored the 49ers 18-8 and outthit them .265 to .225. Clemson also had 12 stolen bases and committed just one error. Brad Miller went 5-for-12 with a homer and four RBIs in the series, while Ben Paulsen was 4-for-10. Ten Tiger pitchers combined for a 2.57 ERA and 29 strikeouts against only four walks. Charlotte was just 2-for-17 with runners in scoring position.

In game-one on February 20, Clemson stole nine bases and capitalized on six errors to defeat Charlotte 8-3. It was the most steals in a game by the Tigers since 1989. Addison Johnson, who missed all of 2008 due to injury, was 3-for-4 with three runs and three steals, while Kyle Parker was 2-for-4 with a double and three RBIs. Mike Freeman, Jeff Schaus, and Miller added two steals apiece. Clemson broke the game open with three runs in the fifth inning thanks to six steals and three 49er errors. Trey Delk pitched 5.1 innings in a starting role to earn the win. He allowed just four hits, one run, and one walk with five strikeouts, while four Tiger hurlers combined for 10 strikeouts against one walk.

In game-two on February 21, Chris Dwyer pitched 6.2 scoreless innings with nine strikeouts to lead Clemson to a 4-0 win over Charlotte. In the freshman lefthander's first career outing, Dwyer allowed just two hits and one walk in earning the victory, while Kevin Brady and Ryan Hinson combined to pitch the final 2.1 innings to close out the four-hit shutout. The three Tiger hurlers combined for 10 strikeouts against one walk and only one 49er advanced past second base. Clemson scored all four of its runs after the fifth inning, highlighted by Miller's two-run single in the eighth inning. Miller went 3-for-4 with two RBIs and Richard Mounce added a pinch-hit, run-scoring double.

In game-three on February 22, Wilson Boyd hit a walkoff single in the 10th inning to give Clemson a 6-5 win over Charlotte. The Tigers trailed 5-0 before they scored three runs in the seventh inning on home runs by Paulsen and Miller. Clemson then scored two runs in the eighth inning without the benefit of a hit to tie the score. With two outs and no one on base in the 10th inning, the Tigers loaded the bases before Boyd lined a single to right-center for Clemson's first walkoff hit since 2007. Paulsen went 3-for-4 to lead Clemson. Tomas Cruz and Hinson combined to pitch 4.0 hitless and scoreless innings in relief to close out the game, while Hinson recorded the victory.

Tigers Homered Past Wofford 8-2

Clemson, ranked #19 in the nation, scored seven runs in its final three at-bats to down Wofford 8-2 at Doug Kingsmore Stadium on February 25. Jeff Schaus' two-run double in the sixth inning gave the Tigers the lead for good. Clemson added three insurance runs in the eighth inning on home runs by John Nester and Matt Sanders on consecutive pitches. Neither player started the game as well. Ben Paulsen went 3-for-4 with two runs and two RBIs, while Mike Freeman had four of Clemson's eight walks. Casey Harman picked up the win by pitching 1.1 hitless and scoreless innings in relief, while six Tiger pitchers combined for 13 strikeouts against only two walks.

Gamecocks Scored Late to Down Tigers 3-1

DeAngelo Mack's solo homer in the ninth inning gave South Carolina the lead and the Gamecocks held on for a 3-1 win over #19 Clemson at Doug Kingsmore Stadium on February 28. Matt Sanders' solo homer in the sixth inning tied the score. Then with one out in the ninth inning, Mack's opposite-field long ball and a Gamecock insurance run later in the frame proved to be the difference. Three Gamecock hurlers limited the Tigers to just two hits and did not allow a Clemson leadoff batter to reach base. Alex Farotto pitched 2.2 hitless and scoreless innings in relief to earn the win. Tiger reliever Casey Harman pitched 3.1 innings, allowing just one hit, no runs, and no walks with six strikeouts. Four Tiger pitchers combined for 11 strikeouts as well.

Furman Rallied Past Tigers 4-2 in 14 Innings

Furman scored two runs in the 14th inning to defeat #19 Clemson 4-2 at Doug Kingsmore Stadium on March 3. In the ninth inning, the Tigers were one strike away from pitching a no-hitter, but an infield single broke up the no-hit bid. On the next pitch, Brian Harrison blasted a two-run homer to tie the score. After Clemson squandered several opportunities in extra innings, Reese Wade's RBI fielder's choice in the 14th inning gave Furman the lead, then the Paladins added an insurance run. Both teams managed just six hits, while neither team committed an error. Chris Dwyer, Scott Weismann, Will Lamb, and Ryan Hinson combined to no-hit Furman through 8.2 innings. Ben Paulsen had a game-high three hits for the Tigers, who left 10 runners on base.

Tigers Topped North Carolina-Asheville 17-2

Behind 15 hits, #19 Clemson slugged North Carolina-Asheville 17-2 at Doug Kingsmore Stadium on March 4. The Tigers scored seven runs, all with two outs, in the first two innings and five more runs in the third inning. Clemson walked 14 times and struck out just once. Ben Paulsen, one of 10 Tigers with a hit, went 3-for-4 with three RBIs, while Kyle Parker added three RBIs. Brad Miller also scored three runs and walked four times. Eleven different Tigers scored a run as well. Seven Tiger pitchers combined to allow just four hits, while the Bulldogs sent out nine different pitchers to the mound. Justin Sarratt pitched an inning in relief to earn the win.

Tar Heels Won Series 2-1 in Close Games

Clemson, ranked #19 in the nation, went 1-2 in a three-game series against #2 North Carolina at Boshamer Stadium from March 6-8. North Carolina outscored the Tigers 18-15 and outthit them .250 to .206. All three games were decided by three runs or less, including two one-run games. Jeff Schaus led the Tigers by going 4-for-9 (.444) with two homers and five RBIs. Matt Sanders added four hits, including two doubles, and three RBIs. The Tiger pitching staff had a 4.78 ERA and 21 strikeouts. Clemson pitchers allowed just three extra-base hits in the series as well.

In game-one on March 6, Sanders' sacrifice fly in the 10th inning lifted Clemson to a 5-4 win over North Carolina. The Tigers used five consecutive hits in the top of the second inning to score four runs, two of which came on Schaus' homer,

then North Carolina responded with three runs in the bottom of the second inning. Levi Michael tied the score in the seventh inning with a solo homer, but Tiger relievers Casey Harman and Tomas Cruz kept the Tar Heels at bay by allowing just one run on two hits in the final 7.1 innings. Clemson out-hit North Carolina 9-7, including two hits apiece by Kyle Parker and Sanders.

In game-two on March 7, North Carolina scored four runs, all on bases-loaded walks, in the third inning and cruised to a 5-2 win over Clemson. Both teams scored one run in the first inning, then North Carolina took a four-run lead with four runs in the third inning. The Tigers added a run in the sixth on a balk and Wilson Boyd hit a deep flyball to right-center in the ninth inning, but Garrett Gore robbed Boyd of a potential two-run homer by making a leaping catch. Starter Adam Warren earned the win by pitching 7.0 innings, allowing three hits and two unearned runs with eight strikeouts. Tiger freshman relievers Will Lamb and Scott Weismann combined to allow just two hits and no runs in the final 5.2 innings.

In game-three on March 8, Clemson rallied from a 7-1 deficit to score five runs in the top of the ninth inning and take an 8-7 lead, but North Carolina capitalized on a costly Tiger error and scored two runs in the bottom of the ninth to defeat the Tigers 9-8. Clemson scored two runs in the eighth inning and trailed 7-5 with two outs in the ninth before Schaus hit a towering three-run homer to right field to give the Tigers the lead. But a bloop single by Kyle Seager, who was 4-for-4 with four runs, and a throwing error on a sacrifice bunt put runners at second and third with no outs. Two of the next three Tar Heels singled past a drawn-in infield, capped by pinch-hitter Greg Holt's walkoff single up the middle in Jack Leggett's 1,000th game as Clemson's head coach.

Tigers Went 2-0 Against Michigan State

Clemson, ranked #22 in the nation, defeated Michigan State twice in two games by a combined score of 21-3 on March 10,11. The Tigers outhit the Spartans .379 to .143 and had a .488 on-base percentage. Mike Freeman went 6-for-9 with two doubles, while Ben Paulsen was 4-for-8 with two doubles in the series. Wilson Boyd added three hits and six RBIs as well. The Tiger pitching staff had a 1.50 ERA and 20 strikeouts against five walks.

Eleven Tigers had a hit and 10 scored a run in Clemson's 15-2 win over Michigan State at Doug Kingsmore Stadium on March 10. Clemson scored four runs in the first inning, capped by Boyd's three-run homer. The Tigers added eight combined runs in the seventh and eighth innings. Clemson walked 10 times and struck out just three times, while four Tiger pitchers combined for six strikeouts against no walks. Will Lamb had a game-high three hits in his first career start, while Freeman and Paulsen both totaled two hits and two RBIs. Starter Justin Sarratt retired the first 13 batters and earned the win by pitching 6.0 innings of three-hit ball.

Freeman went 4-for-4 to lead Clemson to a 6-1 win over Michigan State at Fluor Field in Greenville, SC on March 11. Boyd's two-run double in the first inning gave the Tigers the lead for good. Paulsen and Boyd had two hits apiece, while Boyd totaled a

game-high three RBIs. Jeff Schaus added a solo homer as well. Graham Stoneburner pitched 3.1 scoreless innings in relief with six strikeouts to earn the win. Six Tiger pitchers combined for 14 strikeouts and limited Michigan State to only four hits, including 0-for-13 with runners on base. The Spartans put 10 batters on base but could only score one run while leaving nine runners on base.

Clemson Swept Wake Forest

Clemson, ranked #22 in the nation, swept Wake Forest in three games at Doug Kingsmore Stadium from March 13-15. Clemson outscored the Demon Deacons 17-5 and outhit them .350 to .238, including .276 to .118 with runners in scoring position. Kyle Parker went 7-for-12 (.583) with two homers and seven RBIs, while Mike Freeman went 6-for-13 (.462) with five runs, two doubles, and one triple. The Tiger pitching staff had a 1.67 ERA and totaled 22 strikeouts against six walks. The staff also stranded 29 Demon Deacons on base.

In game-one on March 13, which was the first game of a doubleheader, Parker hit a two-run homer in the sixth inning to give Clemson the lead for good in its 4-1 win over Wake Forest. The Demon Deacons had taken a 1-0 lead in the top of the sixth inning. Parker, who was 3-for-4 with a homer and three RBIs, added a run-scoring single in the seventh inning. The Tigers outhit Wake Forest 14-8 and had five players with at least two hits. Tomas Cruz pitched 3.0 scoreless innings in relief of two-hit ball to earn the win, while Will Lamb retired the only batter he faced to record his first career save. Starter Trey Delk also struck out eight batters in 5.2 innings pitched.

In game-two on March 13, which was the second game of a doubleheader, Parker went 3-for-5 with a homer, two runs, and three RBIs in Clemson's 6-1 victory over Wake Forest. After Wake Forest stranded the potential tying run on third base with no outs in the top of the seventh inning, Parker gave the Tigers a 4-1 lead with a two-run homer in the bottom of the seventh inning. The Tigers, who outhit the Demon Deacons 13-10, added another run in the seventh and one run in the eighth inning on Parker's third hit of the game. Freeman, Parker, and Richard Mounce all had three hits apiece. Starter Casey Harman earned the win, as he allowed just one run and no walks in 6.1 innings pitched.

In game-three on March 15, Chris Dwyer pitched 7.0 strong innings to lead Clemson to a 7-3 win over Wake Forest. Dwyer allowed six hits and two runs with five strikeouts to earn the victory. The Tigers had nine baserunners but stranded only one, while the Demon Deacons stranded seven runners on base. Clemson had three sacrifice flies, one sacrifice bunt, and three stolen bases. The Tigers scored two runs in the first inning and held the lead for the entire game. Ben Paulsen hit a two-run homer in the fifth inning, as he totaled two hits and three RBIs in the game. Freeman added a double, triple, and three runs.

Tigers Blanked Presbyterian 8-0

Graham Stoneburner, Will Lamb, and Craig Gullickson combined for a five-hit shutout in #18 Clemson's 8-0 win over Presbyterian at Doug Kingsmore Stadium on March 17. The trio also

allowed just one walk and struck out nine batters. Stoneburner pitched 6.0 innings, allowing two hits and one walk with seven strikeouts to earn the win. The Tigers scored three runs in the first inning and never looked back. Ben Paulsen went 3-for-5 with a homer, double, and two runs, while John Nester and Richard Mounce added two RBIs apiece. Mounce drove in his two runs on a pinch-hit single in the eighth inning.

Clemson No-Hit South Carolina-Upstate

Five Tiger righthanders combined to pitch a no-hitter in #18 Clemson's 14-0 victory over South Carolina-Upstate at Doug Kingsmore Stadium on March 18. Starter Justin Sarratt pitched 5.0 innings and allowed no walks with two strikeouts to earn the win. Scott Weismann, Kyle Deese, Tomas Cruz, and Matt Vaughn each pitched an inning to close out Clemson's first no-hitter since 1984. The five pitchers allowed just two baserunners, one in the first inning on an error and one on a walk in the eighth inning. They also combined to face only one batter over the minimum. Mike Freeman went 4-for-5 with a homer, triple, three runs, seven RBIs, a walk, and stolen base to lead Clemson's 11-hit attack.

Seminoles Took Series 2-1 in Close Games

Florida State, ranked #24 in the nation, won two of three games over #18 Clemson at Dick Howser Stadium from March 20-22. All three games were decided by three runs or less, as Florida State outscored the Tigers 19-14. The Seminoles outhit Clemson .299 to .248 and had eight steals. The Tigers went just 3-for-33 (.091) with runners in scoring position in the series. Addison Johnson, Kyle Parker, and Jeff Schaus each had four hits apiece. The Tiger pitching staff also totaled 28 strikeouts.

In game-one on March 20, starter Sean Gil-martin struck out eight in 6.1 innings pitched to lead Florida State to a 5-2 win over Clemson. Stuart Tapley's two-out single in the fifth inning scored the go-ahead run and the Seminoles held the lead for the rest of the game. Only two of the five Florida State runs were earned, as three Tiger errors proved costly. Johnson and Ben Paulsen both hit home runs, but Clemson was 0-for-14 with runners in scoring position and 1-for-19 with runners on base. Schaus had a game-high two hits for the Tigers, who saw their seven-game winning streak end.

In game-two on March 21, Clemson scored three runs in the 11th inning and held on for an 8-7 win over Florida State. The back-and-forth game saw the Tigers hold a 5-3 lead before Tyler Holt hit his second homer of the game to tie the score in the eighth inning. Paulsen's sacrifice fly and Parker's two-run homer in the top of the 11th inning gave the Tigers an 8-5 lead. The Seminoles rallied for two runs in the bottom of the 11th inning and had runners at second and third with two outs. But Casey Harman earned his first career save by forcing Rafael Lopez to ground out to second base to end the game.

In game-three on March 22, Florida State scored four runs in the ninth inning, capped by Mike McGee's walkoff three-run homer, to down Clemson 7-4. Clemson took a 4-3 lead in the eighth inning on Johnson's suicide squeeze bunt with two strikes

that scored Jason Stolz. But pinch-hitter Tommy Oravetz's leadoff single in the ninth started the Seminole rally. Jason Stidham's sacrifice fly in foul territory tied the score, then McGee hit an opposite-field homer, his second long ball of the game, with two outs. McGee also pitched 6.0 quality innings in a starting role. Stolz had a team-high two hits and Clemson had 16 baserunners thanks in part to eight walks.

Tigers Swept Elon in Doubleheader

Clemson, ranked #20 in the nation, defeated Elon twice by a combined score of 13-10 in a doubleheader at Doug Kingsmore Stadium on March 24. Clemson outhit Elon .388 to .333, led by five hits by Mike Freeman and Brad Miller. The Tiger pitching staff had a 4.00 ERA and totaled 15 strikeouts against only three walks.

In the first game of a doubleheader on March 24, Miller and Freeman totaled three hits apiece to lead Clemson to a 5-3 win over Elon. The Tigers totaled 13 hits, while the Phoenix tallied 14 hits. John Nester's two-run, opposite-field homer in the eighth inning gave the Tigers a three-run lead. Clemson was aided by three sacrifice bunts as well. Clinton McKinney pitched 3.0 scoreless innings in relief of two-hit ball with three strikeouts to earn the win. Matt Vaughn recorded the final three outs to earn the save.

In the second game of a doubleheader on March 24, Clemson outlasted Elon 8-7. Chris Epps' three-run homer in the second inning tied the score, then Clemson scored two runs in the fifth inning to take a 7-6 lead. The Tigers surrendered a run in the ninth inning, but they hung on for the one-run win with the potential tying run on second base when the game ended. Four Tigers had multi-hit games, while Epps totaled a team-high four RBIs for Clemson, who had 13 hits in the game. Pat Irvine and Mike Melillo hit two home runs apiece for Elon, who totaled 11 hits. Craig Gullickson pitched 3.0 solid innings in relief with three strikeouts to earn the win, while Tomas Cruz recorded the save.

Tigers Nipped Eagles Twice on the Road

Clemson, ranked #20 in the nation, won two of three games against Boston College at Eddie Pellagrini Diamond on March 27, 28. The Tigers hit .284 with four doubles, two triples, and four homers. Ben Paulsen went 6-for-10 with four runs, two triples, one homer, five RBIs, and three walks. Brad Miller added five hits and four RBIs. The Tiger pitching staff had a 7.62 ERA, but they had saves in both of their wins. Clemson committed just one error, while the Eagles were errorless in the series.

In game-one on March 27, Mike Belfiore hit two homers with seven RBIs to lead Boston College to a 13-1 win over Clemson. Belfiore hit a grand slam in the first inning and three-run homer in the second inning, as the Eagles scored four runs apiece in the first, second, and sixth innings. Tony Sanchez added a three-run homer in the sixth inning. Eleven of Boston College's 13 runs came on its four home runs. J.B. MacDonald pitched 8.0 strong innings of five-hit ball to earn the win. Clemson totaled seven hits by seven different players and left 10 runners on base against only two by the Eagles.

In game-two on March 28, which was the first game of a doubleheader, Clemson hit four home runs and held on for a 7-6 win over Boston College. All seven Tiger runs came on long balls, the first three of which were all two-out, two-run homers. Paulsen, Miller, Jeff Schaus, and Phil Pohl all hit home runs to lead Clemson's 11-hit attack. Clemson starter Casey Harman pitched 7.0 innings, allowing seven hits, five runs, and one walk with nine strikeouts to earn the victory, while Tomas Cruz pitched the final 2.0 innings to record the save. Belfiore hit two of the Eagles' three home runs as well.

In game-three on March 28, which was the second game of a doubleheader, Paulsen went 4-for-4 with three RBIs to lead Clemson to a 5-3 victory over Boston College. Paulsen also hit a triple, scored a run, and had a walk, while his two-run single in the ninth inning proved to be the difference in the game. Will Lamb added two hits and two runs, while Miller had two hits and two RBIs for Clemson, who had 13 hits in the game. Starter Graham Stoneburner pitched 8.1 effective innings, allowing three runs on nine hits to earn the win. Matt Vaughn retired the only two batters he faced with the potential tying run on first base to record the save.

Top-Ranked Georgia Edged Tigers Twice

Top-ranked Georgia edged #17 Clemson twice in a home-and-home, midweek series by a combined score of 10-7 on March 31 and April 1. The Tigers outhit Georgia .260 to .238, but they left 17 runners on base to the Bulldogs' eight. Mike Freeman had four hits, while Jeff Schaus added three hits and three runs in the series. The Tiger pitching staff had a 4.76 ERA and 24 strikeouts against only four walks as well.

Georgia scored four runs in the third inning and held on to defeat Clemson 6-5 at Foley Field on March 31. The Bulldogs scored four runs on six hits, four of which were infield singles, in the fourth inning and held on for the win. Schaus gave Clemson the lead in the first inning on his solo homer. The Tigers narrowed the margin to one run in the fifth inning on Kyle Parker's two-run homer and pinch-hitter Chris Epps' run-scoring double. Parker, who had three RBIs, hit a two-out, run-scoring single in the ninth inning, but it was not enough. Three Tiger relievers combined to allow just two hits, one run, and one walk with eight strikeouts in 5.0 innings pitched.

Georgia scored three runs in the ninth inning to rally for a 4-2 win over #17 Clemson at Doug Kingsmore Stadium on April 1. Starter Justin Sarratt limited the Bulldogs to just one run on three hits in the first eight innings, but Georgia used two hits and an error to score three runs in the ninth inning and come away with the victory. Sarratt pitched 8.0 masterful innings, allowing just three hits, one run, and one walk with 12 strikeouts, the most by a Tiger since 2001, but he did not factor in the decision. He also retired 17 batters in a row after giving up a double to start the game. Freeman and Brad Miller had two hits apiece for the Tigers, who outhit Georgia 8-5. But Clemson left seven runners on base to the Bulldogs' two.

Clemson Outlasted Duke to Claim Series

Clemson, ranked #17 in the nation, won two of three games against Duke at Doug Kingsmore Stadium from April 3-5. The Tigers outscored Duke 24-14 and outhit the Blue Devils .349 to .314 along with totaling 14 extra-base hits. Ben Paulsen went 7-for-12 (.583) with four runs, two doubles, two homers, and eight RBIs, while Addison Johnson went 5-for-9 (.556) with two doubles and three walks. The Tiger pitching staff had a 4.00 ERA and 19 strikeouts against six walks.

In game-one on April 3, Clinton McKinney pitched 4.1 strong innings in relief to lead Clemson to a 7-3 win over Duke. McKinney allowed just four hits, one unearned run, and no walks with three strikeouts to earn the win. Clemson hit three homers, including Paulsen's two-run long ball in the fifth inning that gave the Tigers the lead for good. Jason Stolz and Kyle Parker added solo home runs later in the game for the Tigers, who had 11 hits. Johnson went 2-for-2 with two walks, while Parker and Brad Miller added two hits apiece. Duke totaled 11 hits and had 14 batters reach base, but it left eight runners on base and Clemson turned three double plays.

In game-two on April 4, Duke scored six runs in the fourth inning and hung on for a 10-7 win over Clemson. The Blue Devils scored six runs in the fourth inning and two runs in the sixth inning to build a 9-1 lead. The Tigers chipped away with two runs apiece in the sixth, seventh, and eighth innings, then the Tigers had the potential tying run at the plate in the ninth inning. In game-three on April 5, Jack Leggett earned his 700th win as Tiger head coach in Clemson's 10-1 win over Duke. The Tigers outhit Duke 11-8 and scored four runs in the third inning to take a 5-1 lead. Paulsen went 3-for-3 with a double and three RBIs to lead the Tigers. Clemson, ranked #20 in the nation, split a home-and-home midweek series against South Carolina on April 7, 8. Clemson outscored the Gamecocks by a combined score of 13-12 and outhit them .242 to .239. Kyle Parker went 4-for-8 with two doubles and four RBIs, while Ben Paulsen added two doubles and two RBIs.

DeAngelo Mack's two-run single in the ninth inning lifted South Carolina to a 7-6 come-from-behind win over Clemson at Carolina Stadium on April 7. The Tigers took a 6-5 lead with two outs in the seventh inning on John Nester's run-scoring, infield single. But the Gamecocks put their first two batters on base in the ninth and later loaded the bases before Mack's sharp single through the right

side gave South Carolina the walkoff win. Parker had a team-high three RBIs, while Paulsen drove in two runs. Tomas Cruz pitched 4.0 stellar innings in relief, allowing just one hit, one run, and no walks with five strikeouts.

Clemson, ranked #20 in the nation, won two of three games against #5 Miami (FL) at Doug Kingsmore Stadium on April 11, 12. Clemson outscored the Hurricanes 26-19 and outthit them .352 to .255. The Tigers also hit .405 with runners in scoring position and .452 with two outs. Matt Sanders went 6-for-9 with a homer and seven RBIs, Jeff Schaus went 7-for-14 with four runs, Wilson Boyd totaled six hits and five runs, and Kyle Parker went 4-for-10 with two homers and seven RBIs in the series.

In game-one on April 11, which was the first game of a doubleheader, Miami hit three home runs in the first three innings and defeated Clemson 12-8. The Tigers outthit Miami 17-13, but Hurricane batters walked seven times while the Tigers did not draw a walk. Thirteen of Clemson's 17 hits came with two outs, but the Hurricanes put six lead-off batters on base and scored in five of the first six innings. Miami scored two runs in the second inning and never trailed again. Dave DiNatale went 2-for-5 with a homer and four RBIs to pace the Hurricanes. Kyle Parker went 7-for-8 with a homer, six RBIs, and five runs, Ben Paulsen added four hits, and Wilson Boyd totaled three hits and six RBIs. The Tiger pitching staff had a 1.50 ERA and 25 strikeouts against only three walks in the series as well.

Jeff Schaus, Paulsen, and Parker all totaled three hits apiece to lead #18 Clemson to an 11-1 win over Western Carolina at Hennon Stadium on April 14. The Tigers' 3-4-5 hitters combined to go 9-for-12 with seven runs, as Clemson accumulated 13 hits in all. Mike Freeman and Boyd added three RBIs apiece. Clemson broke the game open with three runs in the sixth inning and five runs in the seventh inning. Starter Graham Stoneburner pitched 7.0 innings, allowing five hits, one run, and two walks with 11 strikeouts to earn the win. Stoneburner, Kyle Deese, and Will Lamb also combined to strike out 16 batters.

Parker went 4-for-5 with a grand slam to lead Clemson to a 13-2 victory over Western Carolina at Doug Kingsmore Stadium on April 15. The Tigers totaled 15 hits, including four doubles and two homers. Clemson scored six runs in the first inning before the Catamounts recorded an out. Paulsen added a home run, Jason Stolz went 3-for-4 with two RBIs, and Boyd went 2-for-3 with three RBIs. Five Tiger pitchers combined for nine strikeouts against only one walk, while seven Catamount hurlers combined to issue nine walks in the game. Alex Frederick earned his first win as a Tiger by pitching 2.0 scoreless innings with three strikeouts in relief.

Hokies Outthit Tigers to Take Series 2-1

Virginia Tech won two of three games over #18 Clemson at English Field from April 17-19. It was the Hokies' first series win over Clemson since they joined the league in 2005. The two teams both scored 13 runs, while Virginia Tech outthit the Tigers .350 to .255. Ben Paulsen went 4-for-9, while Mike Freeman added five hits. The Clemson pitching staff had a 4.32 ERA and 23 strikeouts against 12 walks as well.

In game-one on April 17, Rhett Ballard pitched 7.0 strong innings to lead Virginia Tech to a 5-2 win over Clemson. The Hokies' win snapped Clemson's 11-game winning streak in the series. Ballard earned the win by allowing just five hits, two runs, and four walks with seven strikeouts. Sean McDermott pitched 2.0 scoreless innings of one-hit ball to record the save. The Hokies took a 3-1 lead with two runs in the sixth inning and never trailed again. Virginia Tech outthit the Tigers 12-6. Mike Kaminski went 2-for-4 with a game-high two RBIs. Jeff Schaus had a team-high two hits, while Wilson Boyd hit a solo home run.

In game-two on April 18, Justin Wright pitched 8.0 solid innings to lead Virginia Tech to a 7-3 win over Clemson. Wright allowed just six hits, two runs (one earned), and two walks with five strikeouts to earn the win. He also retired the first 12 batters of the game. The Hokies scored two runs in the first inning and three runs in the third. The Tigers scored two runs in the ninth inning and had the potential tying run on deck, but they fell short. Anthony Sosnoskie and Steve Domecus each had three hits apiece for the Hokies, who outthit the Tigers 13-8. John Nester went 2-for-3 with a homer and two RBIs for Clemson.

In game-three on April 19, Casey Harman pitched 6.0 scoreless innings to lead Clemson over Virginia Tech 8-1. Harman allowed just six hits, no runs, and no walks with five strikeouts to earn the win. Scott Weismann pitched 2.0 scoreless innings in relief with two strikeouts. The Tigers scored their first six runs with two outs, including three in the third inning and three in the fourth. Kyle Parker's three-run homer in the third inning put the Tigers on the board. Freeman later added a two-run home run in the sixth inning. Freeman went 3-for-4 with two runs and three RBIs for the Tigers, who outthit Virginia Tech 12-11.

Tigers Rallyed to Top Coastal Carolina 5-3

Jeff Schaus' walkoff grand slam with two outs in the ninth inning lifted #20 Clemson to a 5-3 win over #19 Coastal Carolina at Doug Kingsmore Stadium on April 21. Schaus blasted the first pitch he saw deep over the fence in right field to send Clemson to its second walkoff win on a grand slam in school history. The Chanticleers had taken a 3-1 lead in the eighth inning on Tyler Bortnick's two-run homer. Ben Paulsen had a game-high three hits, while each team totaled seven hits in the game. Clinton McKinney earned the win in relief, while starter Graham Stoneburner allowed just five hits and one unearned run in 6.0 innings pitched.

Tigers Erupted to Blast South Carolina 12-2

Clemson, ranked #20 in the nation, scored all 12 of its runs and tallied all 11 of its hits in the final four innings to defeat South Carolina 12-2 at Carolina Stadium on April 22. It was Clemson's largest margin of victory over the Gamecocks in Columbia since 1997. Adam Westmoreland retired the first 15 batters of the game, but Clemson broke through thanks to a Gamecock error to score five runs in the sixth inning. The Tigers added three runs in the eighth inning and four runs in the ninth. Ben Paulsen and Kyle Parker both hit a home run and scored three runs, while John Nester went 3-for-5 with three RBIs. Matt Vaughn earned the win in relief by pitching 3.0 scoreless innings.

Tigers Won Series Over #4 Georgia Tech 2-1

Clemson, ranked #20 in the nation, won two of three games against #4 Georgia Tech at Doug Kingsmore Stadium from April 24-26. Clemson outscored the Yellow Jackets 18-13 and outthit them .302 to .286. The Tigers also had 19 walks, while Georgia Tech batters walked just eight times and struck out 23 times. Mike Freeman went 5-for-8 (.625) with five walks, while Jeff Schaus went 8-for-13 (.615) with a double, homer, and four RBIs. The

Tiger pitching staff had a solid 4.00 ERA against one of the nation's top hitting teams as well.

In game-one on April 24, Georgia Tech scored all five of its runs in the third inning and outlasted Clemson 5-4. The Tigers jumped out to a 3-0 lead in the first inning on Brad Miller's two-out, three-run double. But the Yellow Jackets scored five runs in the third, capped by Luke Murton's two-run homer. The Tigers scored a run in the eighth inning, but they could get no closer. Clemson had just one run-scoring hit in 12 at-bats with runners in scoring position and stranded 11 baserunners, including six in scoring position. The Tigers also walked eight times and had eight hits. Schaus went 3-for-4 with one of the Tigers' four doubles. The Clemson bullpen also pitched 6.2 scoreless innings.

In game-two on April 25, Schaus went 4-for-5 with a homer and four RBIs to lead Clemson to an 8-5 win over Georgia Tech. Schaus' three-run homer in the third inning gave the Tigers the lead for good. Georgia Tech scored a run in the eighth inning and two runs in the ninth inning before Clemson shut the door. Clemson outhit the Yellow Jackets 12-10 and was 5-for-8 with runners in scoring position. Leadoff batter Chris Epps scored three runs and Freeman went 2-for-3 with a double, two runs, and two walks. Starter Casey Harman pitched 6.2 strong inning, allowing two runs with four strikeouts to earn the win.

In game-three on April 26, four Tiger pitchers limited the Yellow Jackets to three runs in Clemson's 6-3 win over Georgia Tech. The Yellow Jackets scored two runs in the top of the first inning, but Clemson responded with three runs in the bottom of the first and never relinquished its lead. Trey Delk earned the victory in a starting role after missing over a month due to injury, then Graham Stoneburner, Ryan Hinson, and Scott Weismann, who recorded his first career save, closed out the game for the Tigers. Wilson Boyd went 3-for-3 with two RBIs, while Freeman added two hits. Both teams had nine hits in the game. The victory was Jack Leggett's 300th against an ACC team as Clemson's head coach.

Tigers Took Two From Maryland

Clemson, ranked #17 in the nation, won two of three games against Maryland at Doug Kingsmore Stadium on May 2,3. Clemson outscored the Terrapins 24-14 and outhit them .348 to .221, including a .395 to .133 advantage with runners in scoring position. Mike Freeman went 6-for-12 (.500) with two doubles and three walks, John Nester went 5-for-8 (.625), and Jason Stolz went 5-for-12 (.417) with two doubles and three RBIs in the series. The Tiger pitching staff had a 3.00 ERA as well.

In game-one on May 2, Clemson totaled 15 hits, including eight extra-base hits, on its way to an 11-2 victory over Maryland. The Tigers broke the game open with four runs in the fifth inning and never looked back. Brad Miller had a game-high three hits, while Chris Epps added two hits and two RBIs. Wilson Boyd and Richard Mounce added solo home runs as well. Ryan Hinson pitched 2.2 scoreless innings in relief of one-hit ball with four strikeouts to earn the win. Four Tiger pitchers combined to allow just five hits and two unearned runs. The four hurlers also limited Maryland to just 1-for-

18 with runners on base, as the Terrapins stranded 12 runners on base in the game.

In game-two on May 3, which was the first game of a doubleheader, Clemson scored three runs in the sixth inning and beat Maryland 7-4. Jeff Schaus gave Clemson an early lead with a two-run homer in the first inning. The Terrapins took a 3-2 lead with two runs in the top of the sixth inning, but Ben Paulsen led off the bottom of the sixth with a homer to tie the score. The Tigers later scored two more runs in the frame to take the lead for good. The Tigers outhit Maryland 9-7 and totaled four extra-base hits. Reliever Scott Weismann earned his first career win by allowing no hits and one run in 2.2 innings pitched, while Matt Vaughn recorded the save with a scoreless ninth inning.

In game-three on May 3, which was the second game of a doubleheader, Tyler Bennett's two-run single in the ninth inning broke a 6-6 tie and lifted Maryland to an 8-6 win over Clemson. The Tigers had a 6-4 lead before two costly errors set up Matthew Murakami's two-out, two-run triple in the sixth inning to tie the score. Clemson also left the bases loaded in both the sixth and seventh innings without scoring a run. Clemson, who outhit the Terrapins 15-11, put 23 batters on base, but it scored just six runs and stranded 13 runners on base. The win was Maryland's first at Clemson since 1992, snapping the Tigers' 23-game home winning streak over the Terrapins.

Clemson Won Two of Three Over Seahawks

Clemson, ranked #19 in the nation, won two of three games against North Carolina-Wilmington at Doug Kingsmore Stadium from May 8-10. Clemson outscored the Seahawks 27-9 and outhit them .350 to .243. Wilson Boyd went 5-for-8 (.625) with four runs and three walks, while Chris Epps went 5-for-11 (.455) with two doubles and three RBIs in the series. Jeff Schaus added five hits, including two doubles and a homer, along with seven RBIs. The Tiger pitching staff had a 2.67 ERA and 21 strikeouts against only five walks as well.

In game-one on May 8, Clemson totaled 12 hits and 12 walks en route to a 13-2 victory over North Carolina-Wilmington. The Tigers scored three runs in the second inning and five runs in the fifth inning to break the game open. Epps went 3-for-3 with two doubles, three RBIs, and a walk, while John Nester went 2-for-3 with a double, two runs, and two RBIs. Starter Trey Delk, who received his psychology degree earlier in the day, earned the win, as he allowed one run on five hits in 5.0 innings pitched. The Seahawks put 14 batters on base, but they scored only two runs and left 10 runners on base.

In game-two on May 9, Clemson scored eight runs on eight consecutive hits in the third inning on its way to an 11-3 win over North Carolina-Wilmington. Already ahead 3-0, Clemson used two homers, three doubles, and three singles to score eight runs in the third inning. Kyle Parker started the scoring in the third with a long solo homer, then Schaus capped the scoring with a three-run home run. Every Tiger starter had at least one hit before the third inning ended. Schaus went 2-for-5 with a double, homer, four RBIs, and two runs to lead Clemson's 14-hit attack. Casey Harman allowed

six hits, one earned run, and one walk with nine strikeouts in 6.0 innings pitched to earn the victory.

In game-three on May 10, North Carolina-Wilmington took the lead with a run in the sixth inning and held on for a 4-3 win over Clemson. Schaus' two-run double in the fifth inning tied the score, but Michael Rooney's sacrifice fly in the sixth gave the Seahawks the lead. The Tigers put their leadoff batter on base in the sixth, seventh, and eighth innings but failed to score each time. Relievers Stephen Harrold, Ryan Walker, and Bryan Booth limited Clemson to two hits and no runs in the final 4.2 innings. They were big reasons the Tigers were 1-for-11 with runners in scoring position and left 10 runners on base. Boyd went 3-for-3 for Clemson, who outhit the Seahawks 10-8.

Tigers Outlasted Furman 8-5 at Fluor Field

Wilson Boyd and Ben Paulsen both tallied four hits to lead #14 Clemson to an 8-5 victory over Furman at Fluor Field in Greenville, SC on May 11. The Tigers jumped out to a 5-0 lead thanks to Boyd's three-run double in the first inning and Paulsen's two-run homer in the third. The Paladins scored four runs in the eighth but got no closer. Boyd went 4-for-5 with a double, triple, three RBIs, and two runs. Jason Stolz also went 2-for-3 with three RBIs and two walks. Starter David Haselden pitched 5.0 strong innings, allowing five hits, one run, and one walk with six strikeouts to earn his first career win. Justin Saratt retired all four batters he faced to record his first career save.

Tigers Stopped College of Charleston 5-2

Four Tiger pitchers limited College of Charleston to two unearned runs on six hits in #14 Clemson's 5-2 win at Doug Kingsmore Stadium on May 12. Clemson held the Cougars in check after they entered the game hitting .358 and on a 10-game winning streak, the nation's longest streak at the time. The Tigers also improved to 21-0 all-time against the Cougars. Starter Scott Weismann pitched 5.0 scoreless innings to earn the victory, while Matt Vaughn pitched a scoreless ninth inning to record the save. John Nester went 3-for-4 with a double, home run, and three runs, while Jason Stolz went 2-for-3 with a double and RBI. Jeff Schaus added a home run and two RBIs as well.

Clemson Swept N.C. State on the Road

Clemson, ranked #14 in the nation, swept N.C. State in a three-game series at Doak Field from May 14-16. It was Clemson's first sweep at N.C. State since 1995. The Tigers outscored N.C. State 29-17 and outhit the Wolfpack .342 to .283. Clemson also totaled 15 runs in the first inning, totaled eight stolen bases, and committed just two errors in the series. Wilson Boyd went 6-for-12 (.500) with three doubles, five RBIs, and three walks. Jason Stolz went 5-for-10 (.500), while Chris Epps went 5-for-11 (.455) with a homer, three RBIs, and three walks.

In game-one on May 14, Clemson totaled 15 hits and nine walks en route to a 13-8 victory over N.C. State. The Tigers scored six runs in the first inning and never looked back. Clemson later built a 13-2 lead with four runs in the seventh inning before the Wolfpack scored five runs in the ninth inning. Epps, Mike Freeman, and Brad Miller all to-

taled three hits and at least two RBIs apiece to lead Clemson. Epps went 3-for-4 with two RBIs, Freeman went 3-for-5 with two RBIs and two runs, and Miller went 3-for-4 with a homer, three RBIs, and two runs. Starter Trey Delk pitched 6.0 innings, allowing five hits and two runs to earn the win.

In game-two on May 15, Clemson scored five runs in the first inning and five runs in the third inning on its way to an 11-5 win over N.C. State. The Tigers tallied 14 hits and stole seven bases without committing an error on defense. Stolz went 3-for-3 with an RBI, two runs, and two stolen bases. Jeff Schaus, Boyd, and John Nester added two hits apiece. Starter Casey Harman pitched 5.0 innings and struck out eight against no walks to earn the victory, while Justin Sarratt, Ryan Hinson, and Matt Vaughn combined to pitch 4.0 scoreless innings to close out the game. The four Tiger hurlers combined for 12 strikeouts against no walks as well.

In game-three on May 16, Clemson scored four runs in the first inning and held on for a 5-4 win over N.C. State. Epps hit the first pitch of the game over the fence for a homer, then Boyd hit a two-out, two-run double later in the frame before Nester's run-scoring single. The Wolfpack got within 4-3 and 5-4, but the Tigers worked out of several jams to maintain the lead. Six Tiger pitchers combined to allow just six hits. Clinton McKinney pitched 1.2 perfect innings in relief to earn the victory, while Tomas Cruz struck out the only batter he faced to record the save. Ben Paulsen, Boyd, and Nester led Clemson's nine-hit attack with two hits apiece, while Boyd added two doubles and two RBIs.

Clemson Went 1-2 in the ACC Tournament

Clemson, ranked as high as #13 in the nation, went 1-2 in the ACC Tournament at Durham (NC) Bulls Athletic Park from May 21-23. Clemson was outscored 19-13 and outthit .291 to .274. Mike Freeman went 7-for-15 (.467) with a homer, two RBIs, and four runs, while Wilson Boyd went 6-for-13 (.462) with five RBIs in the tournament. In two relief appearances, Matt Vaughn pitched 5.1 scoreless innings, allowing just four hits and one walk with two strikeouts.

In the Tigers' first game of the ACC Tournament on May 21, relievers Andrew Carraway and Kevin Arico combined to limit the Tigers to one hit and no runs in the final 5.1 innings pitched to lead #15 Virginia to a 6-5 victory over Clemson. The Tigers took a 4-0 lead with three runs in the third inning, but the Cavaliers chipped away with two runs in the fourth inning and four runs in the fifth inning to take a 6-5 lead. The Tiger bats were quiet the rest of the game thanks to the Cavalier bullpen. Virginia outthit the Tigers 10-7, as Boyd led Clemson by going 2-for-4 with two RBIs. Vaughn pitched 4.0 scoreless innings of two-hit ball in relief to keep the Tigers in the game.

In the Tigers' second game of the ACC Tournament on May 22, Duke broke a close game open with six runs in the sixth inning on its way to a 10-4 victory over Clemson. Ahead 2-1, the Blue Devils used five hits and two walks to score six runs in the sixth and break the game open. Jake Lemmerman and Nate Freeman both went 3-for-4 with a home run to lead the Blue Devils' 11-hit attack. The Tigers also tallied 11 hits, but they were 1-for-

12 with runners in scoring position and left 10 runners on base while Duke only left four runners on base. Starter Andrew Wolcott pitched 7.1 effective innings to earn the victory. Boyd went 2-for-3 with an RBI to pace Clemson.

In the Tigers' third game of the ACC Tournament on May 23, Boyd's walkoff single with two outs in the 11th inning lifted Clemson to a 4-3 win over #4 North Carolina. The Tar Heels tied the score in the ninth with a run and had scoring chances in the 10th and 11th innings, but each time Clemson worked out of trouble. Freeman, who earlier homered and had four hits, hit a one-out single in the 11th and moved to third on the play on an error. After two intentional walks and a strikeout, Boyd belted a 3-2 pitch off the wall in left for the walkoff win. Starter Casey Harman pitched 7.1 innings, allowing just two runs and one walk with 10 strikeouts, while Graham Stoneburner earned the win.

Tigers Rallied to Claim Clemson Regional

The #14 Clemson Tigers won four of five games in the Clemson Regional to win the title at Doug Kingsmore Stadium from May 29 to June 1. Three of the four wins came while facing elimination. The Tigers outscored their opponents 38-13 and outthit them .324 to .209. Chris Epps, who earned Clemson Regional MVP honors, was 10-for-19 (.526) with seven runs, one double, two homers, and six RBIs, while Mike Freeman was 11-for-22 (.500) with six runs, three doubles, one triple, one homer, and seven RBIs. Ben Paulsen also added two doubles, two homers, and five RBIs. The Tiger pitching staff had a 2.25 ERA as well.

In the Tigers' first game of the Clemson Regional on May 29, Jeff Schaus' two-run double in the ninth inning lifted Clemson to a 5-4 walkoff victory over Tennessee Tech. The Golden Eagles built a 4-1 lead in the top of the fifth before Schaus' solo homer in the bottom of the fifth cut their lead to 4-3. The Tigers, who put their leadoff batter on base in each of the last seven innings, missed opportunities to tie the score in the sixth, seventh, and eighth. Addison Johnson led off the ninth with a single before Epps reached on a bunt single. Schaus later ripped a one-out double over the first-base bag to score Johnson from second and Epps from first for the winning run. Graham Stoneburner pitched 4.2 scoreless innings in relief of two-hit ball with five strikeouts to earn the win.

In the Tigers' second game of the Clemson Regional on May 30, Neil Medchill's two-out, run-scoring single in the eighth inning propelled Oklahoma State to a 3-2 win over Clemson. Tom Belza and Mark Ginther hit back-to-back homers in the seventh inning to give the Cowboys a 2-0 lead, then the Tigers responded with two runs thanks to four hits in a row in the top of the eighth. But Clemson left the bases loaded and Medchill's single off Paulsen's glove proved to be the difference. Clemson outthit the Cowboys 8-5, including two hits by Freeman and Paulsen. Tiger starter Casey Harman allowed just three hits, two runs, and two walks with eight strikeouts in 6.1 innings pitched.

In the Tigers' third game of the Clemson Regional on May 31, Scott Weismann pitched 8.0 scoreless innings and Clemson pounded out 14 hits en route to a 10-0 win over Tennessee Tech.

The Tigers jumped out to a 5-0 lead with four runs in the third inning, highlighted by Paulsen's two-run homer. Clemson added three more runs in the fourth inning and cruised the rest of the way. Epps went 3-for-3 with a homer, two RBIs, and two runs, while Paulsen went 2-for-4 with a homer and three RBIs. Weismann and David Haselden combined to limit the Golden Eagles to just four hits. Only one Golden Eagle advanced past first base and none advanced past second base as well.

In the Tigers' fourth game of the Clemson Regional on May 31, Chris Dwyer struck out 13 batters and Clemson totaled 16 hits in its 15-1 victory over Oklahoma State. The victory, which kept the Tigers' season alive, was the 1,100th of Head Coach Jack Leggett's career. It was also the 100th NCAA Tournament win for the Tigers. Dwyer struck out the most batters in a game by a Tiger since 1998 and allowed just six hits, one run, and one walk to earn the win. Clemson scored 11 runs in the first three innings and never looked back. Freeman went 4-for-6 with a homer, four RBIs, and two runs, while Wilson Boyd went 4-for-6 with two doubles and four RBIs.

In the Tigers' fifth game of the Clemson Regional, Clemson rallied from a 5-1 deficit to score five combined runs in the seventh and eighth innings and defeat Oklahoma State 6-5 and claim the Clemson Regional title. The Cowboys took a four-run lead in the top of the seventh thanks to three Tiger errors, but Epps' two-run homer in the bottom of the seventh inning started the comeback. Then in the eighth inning, Kyle Parker lined a two-out, two-run single to give Clemson the lead for good. Matt Vaughn struck out Mark Ginther with two runners on base in the ninth inning to end the game. Vaughn pitched 3.2 solid innings without allowing an earned run to earn the win. All six Tiger runs and all 10 hits came with two outs as well.

Arizona State Won Tempe Super Regional

Arizona State, ranked as high as #2 in the nation, won twice in two games against #13 Clemson in the Tempe Super Regional at Packard Stadium on June 6, 7. Arizona State, who advanced to the College World Series, outscored the Tigers 15-6 and outthit them .347 to .194. Chris Epps led the Tigers with three hits, three RBIs, and a run.

In game-one on June 6, Arizona State totaled six two-out RBIs in its 7-4 win over Clemson. Epps' two-run single in the top of the seventh inning tied the score 4-4. But Matt Newman's two-out, run-scoring double in the bottom of the seventh inning gave the Sun Devils the lead for good. Arizona State outthit the Tigers 14-9, while the Tigers were paced by Epps' two hits and three RBIs. Brad Miller added two hits and two runs, while John Nester and Matt Sanders also had two hits apiece for Clemson. Mike Leake earned his 16th win of the season by tossing 8.0 solid innings with seven strikeouts. Every Sun Devil starter had at least one hit as well.

In game-two on June 7, Josh Spence pitched a complete game four-hitter to lead Arizona State to an 8-2 victory over Clemson. Spence tossed the first and only complete game against the Tigers in 2009 to earn the win. He yielded just four hits, two runs, and one walk with 10 strikeouts. After

Jeff Schaus gave the Tigers a 1-0 lead with a solo home run down the right-field line in the fourth inning, the Sun Devils plated five runs in the fifth inning to take the lead for good. Arizona State added three insurance runs in the ninth inning to seal its 21st trip to the College World Series. Schaus and Ben Paulsen each had a hit and RBI to lead Clemson.

2009 Season Review Story

The 2009 season saw Clemson return to the national baseball scene, as the Tigers totaled 44 wins and advanced to a super regional. Clemson also earned its 22nd NCAA Tournament appearance in the last 23 years, its 34th overall (sixth-most in the nation), and eighth super-regional appearance (tied for fifth-most in the nation).

The Tigers finished third in the overall ACC standings and tied for the most ACC regular-season wins (19). Clemson also had a 13-win improvement from 2008 that tied for the third-best mark in school history.

Clemson did not lose more than two games in a row all year. Of its 22 losses, 19 were by four runs or less. During the season, the Tigers won twice in one day four times, their most since 1992.

The pitching had a 3.68 ERA, fifth-best in the nation. Clemson's 2.70 strikeout-to-walk ratio was the second-best mark in school history. It was a team effort, as 11 different Tigers pitched at least 22.0 innings and 10 different pitchers started at least one game on the mound.

Lefthander Casey Harman, who went from the bullpen to the team's most reliable starter, finished with a 7-3 record, one save, and a 3.95 ERA in a team-high 86.2 innings pitched. In 22 appearances (13 starts), he had a 5.56 strikeout-to-walk ratio, the second-best figure in school history.

Lefty Chris Dwyer pitched 86.0 innings over an ACC-high 17 starts. He had a team-high 95 strikeouts, becoming the first Tiger freshman to lead the team in strikeouts since 1997. Righty Trey Delk, who missed several weeks with an injury, was 4-1 with a 3.44 ERA in 49.2 innings pitched over 11 starts.

Righthanders Graham Stoneburner and Justin Sarratt both started seven games. Stoneburner struck out 71 batters against 19 walks in 64.0 innings pitched and had a 7-4 record and 3.52 ERA in 20 appearances. Sarratt walked only nine batters in 42.1 innings pitched.

Lefty Ryan Hinson led the team in appearances (28) and totaled 85, fifth-most in Tiger history, in his four-year career. In 38.1 innings pitched in 2009, he had a 3.76 ERA, 47 strikeouts, and a .228 opponents' batting average. Fellow senior and righty Matt Vaughn, also in the top 10 in career appearances (81), bounced back from preseason surgery and had a 4-1 record, four saves, and a 2.80 ERA in 35.1 innings pitched.

Three newcomers played major roles out of the bullpen. Righthander Tomas Cruz had a team-best .195 opponents' batting average, a team-tying-high four saves, and a 3.33 ERA in 46.0 innings pitched. Freshman righthander Scott Weismann had a team-best 1.23 ERA in 36.2 innings pitched. Two-way freshman lefty Will Lamb had a 2.45 ERA in 22.0 innings pitched on the mound, while he hit .268 in 27 games (11 starts) in the field.

First-baseman Ben Paulsen led Clemson at the plate with a .367 batting average while starting all 66 games. He also led the squad in hits (95), doubles (18), RBIs (61), slugging percentage (.618), on-base percentage (.435), and tied for the team-lead in homers (13). The .367 batting average was the highest by a Tiger since 2004.

First-Team All-ACC outfielder Jeff Schaus, Clemson's lone All-ACC honoree, played all 66

games for the Tigers and hit .320 with a .424 on-base percentage. Schaus tied for the team-lead in homers (13), was second in slugging percentage (.543), third in RBIs (50), and had two of the Tigers four walkoff hits in 2009.

Second-baseman Mike Freeman was a solid #2 hitter for the Tigers. He hit .328 with 16 doubles, five triples, four homers, and 11 steals. Freeman also had an outstanding .979 fielding percentage, as he committed just seven errors.

Outfielder Wilson Boyd, who missed 14 games due to injury, was second on the team in batting average (.341). He easily led the team in hitting with runners in scoring position (.481) and had two of the Tigers' four walkoff hits. He was the only Tiger named to both the All-ACC Tournament and Clemson Regional All-Tournament teams.

Outfielder Chris Epps, who batted in the leadoff spot as the designated hitter during the latter stages of the season, had a .297 batting average and .415 on-base percentage. His late-season heroics were instrumental in Clemson's run in the postseason.

Outfielder Kyle Parker finished second on the team in homers (12) and RBIs (52). Parker, who went through spring football drills, won the Bob Bradley Award as Clemson's MVP of the South Carolina series.

John Nester, who cemented his role as the starting catcher after splitting time during the first half of 2009, had a solid year. He batted .304 with 11 doubles, five homers, and 33 RBIs in 57 games (46 starts).

Brad Miller became the first Tiger freshman since 2005 to start every game. The shortstop hit .273, but he had a .405 on-base percentage thanks to 53 walks, second-most in the ACC. Miller also led the team with 16 steals.

Jason Stolz and Matt Sanders split time at third base. In 55 games (42 starts), Stolz hit .315 with seven doubles and seven steals. Sanders batted .295 in 49 games (31 starts) with three homers.

The Tigers opened the year with a three-game sweep of Charlotte. In game-one, Clemson stole nine bases en route to an 8-3 victory. After a 4-0 win in game-two, the Tigers completed the sweep with a 6-5 win on Boyd's walkoff single in the 10th inning.

After an 8-2 win over Wofford, South Carolina came to town and edged the Tigers 3-1. After a 4-2 loss to Furman, in which the Tigers lost a no-hitter with two strikes and two outs in the ninth inning, Clemson responded with a 17-2 win over UNC Asheville.

Clemson traveled to Chapel Hill for the first time since 2004 to open ACC play. In game-one, the Tigers defeated the #2 Tar Heels 6-5 when Sanders hit a sacrifice fly in the top of the 10th inning. North Carolina responded with close wins in the final two games.

The Tigers returned home for a game with Michigan State, the Spartans first visit to Clemson since 1958. The Tigers won 11-2, as 11 different players recorded a hit and 10 scored a run. The following night, Clemson took on the Spartans at Fluor Field in Greenville. Freeman went 4-for-4 and led the Tigers to a 6-1 win.

The Tigers returned to ACC action, as Wake Forest traveled to Tigertown. The Tigers swept a doubleheader by scores of 4-1 and 6-1 to open the series behind Parker, who went 6-for-9 with two homers and six RBIs in the two games. Clemson completed the sweep behind 7.0 strong innings pitched from Dwyer in a 7-3 win.

After an 8-0 win over Presbyterian, the Tigers faced USC Upstate. Five pitchers combined to throw Clemson's first no-hitter since 1984 in its 14-0 win. It was the 14th no-hitter in school history and only the second involving multiple pitchers.

Clemson then traveled to Tallahassee to take on the #24 Seminoles. After losing game-one 5-2, Clemson won game-two 8-7 in 11 innings thanks in part to Parker's two-run homer in the 11th. The following day, Florida State won the series with a 7-4 walkoff win.

After Clemson won both games of a midweek doubleheader against Elon by scores of 5-3 and 8-7, the Tigers traveled to Boston College. After dropping game-one 13-1, the Tigers came back to win the series with a doubleheader sweep the following day by scores of 7-6 and 5-3. In the two games, Paulsen went 5-for-7 with a triple, homer, and five RBIs.

Clemson then took on top-ranked Georgia in the annual midweek, home-and-home series. In Athens, the Bulldogs held on to defeat the Tigers 6-5. The following night at Doug Kingsmore Stadium, the Bulldogs scored three runs in the ninth inning to win 4-2, spoiling a masterful performance by Sarratt. In 8.0 innings, he allowed just three hits, one run, and one walk with 12 strikeouts while retiring 17 straight batters at one point. Sarratt earned ACC Pitcher-of-the-Week honors.

Duke came to town to the following weekend, as the Tigers won their second straight ACC series. After splitting the first two games, Clemson won game-three 10-1 and gave Jack Leggett his 700th win as the Tigers' head coach.

Clemson then traveled to Columbia for its first-ever game at Carolina Stadium. The Gamecocks won 7-6 on a walkoff single after Clemson had battled back from an early deficit. The following night in Tigertown, Clemson topped the Gamecocks when Epps' pinch-hit, run-scoring single in the fifth inning gave Clemson a lead it would not relinquish in a 7-5 win.

Miami (FL), ranked #5 in the nation, came to town the following weekend. After losing game-one 12-8, Dwyer pitched a complete-game two-hitter and allowed just one runner past second base to lead Clemson to a 9-1 win in game-two, as he earned ACC Pitcher-of-the-Week honors. The Tigers won game-three 9-6 to take its third straight ACC series.

Clemson made its annual trek to Cullowhee, NC and defeated Western Carolina 11-1, as Schaus, Paulsen, and Parker all totaled three hits apiece. The following night at Clemson, Parker went 4-for-5 with a homer, three runs, and four RBIs to lead the Tigers to a 13-2 win over the Catamounts. In his last at-bat, Parker's streak of eight hits in a row came to an end.

The Tigers then traveled to Blacksburg to take on Virginia Tech. After dropping the first two games, Harman pitched 6.0 scoreless innings and

the Tigers scored six two-out runs to defeat the Hokies 8-1.

The #19 Coastal Carolina Chanticleers traveled to Clemson during the midweek and the Tigers won in dramatic fashion, as Schaus hit a two-out, walkoff grand slam to propel Clemson to a 5-3 win. The following night in Columbia, Clemson defeated South Carolina 12-2, as Nester went 3-for-5 with three RBIs and Parker went 2-for-4 with three RBIs to help the Tigers to a split of the four-game series.

Georgia Tech came to town the following weekend for a top-20 battle. In game-one, the #4 Yellow Jackets scored all five runs in the third inning and held on for a 5-4 win. In game-two, Schaus went 4-for-5 with a homer and four RBIs to lead the Tigers to an 8-5 win. Clemson took the series with a 6-3 win in game-three.

Following five days off for final exams, Maryland came to town. In an 11-2 game-one win, the Tigers totaled 16 hits, including eight extra-base hits. The following day, the teams split a doubleheader, but Clemson still won its second consecutive ACC series.

UNC Wilmington traveled to Clemson the next weekend for a non-conference series. Clemson won game-one 13-2 and followed with an 11-3 win the next day. The Seahawks won the series-finale 4-3.

In a rare Monday game, Clemson took on Furman at Fluor Field. Boyd and Paulsen each had four hits to lead the Tigers to an 8-6 victory. College of Charleston then made its annual appearance at Clemson and the Tigers improved to 21-0 all-time against the Cougars with a 5-2 win.

Clemson traveled to N.C. State for its final ACC series. In game-one, the Tigers totaled 15 hits and nine walks en route to a 13-8 win. In game-two, Clemson scored five runs apiece in the first and third innings and won 11-5. Clemson completed the sweep with a 5-4 win behind four first-inning runs. With the victory, the Tigers finished in second place in the ACC Atlantic Division standings and earned the #3 seed for the ACC Tournament at Durham Bulls Athletic Park.

In game-one, Clemson dropped a tough 6-5 decision to eventual tournament champion Virginia. Game-two matched Clemson against hometown Duke. The Blue Devils broke open a close game with a six-run sixth inning to defeat Clemson 10-4.

Game-three against #4 North Carolina was a classic back-and-forth, 11-inning battle that saw the Tigers defeat the Tar Heels when Boyd hit a walkoff single with two outs in the ninth inning to give Clemson a 4-3 win. Boyd had two hits and was named to the All-ACC Tournament team, joining Harman, who pitched 7.1 strong innings with one walk and 10 strikeouts against the Tar Heels, on the squad.

Clemson was one of 16 regional host sites, as the Tigers hosted a regional for the first time since 2006. The Tigers took on Tennessee Tech in their first game of the regional.

After a slow start and trailing 4-1 in the fifth inning, Clemson cut into the lead on Freeman's RBI groundout and Schaus' homer. The Tigers, who put their leadoff batter on base in each of the last seven innings, missed opportunities to tie the score

in the sixth, seventh, and eighth innings. Johnson, inserted as a pinch-hitter, led off with a single and Epps followed with a bunt single to set up Schaus for his second walkoff hit of 2009 with a double over first base to score both runners and give Clemson a dramatic 5-4 victory.

The Tigers fell 3-2 in a tough game to Oklahoma State in their second game after the Cowboys scored the go-ahead run in the eighth inning.

But Clemson recorded back-to-back double-digit wins over Tennessee Tech and Oklahoma State to set up a winner-take-all game with the Cowboys. In the two wins, Weismann and Dwyer each pitched at least 8.0 innings, with Dwyer striking out 13, while the Tiger offense totaled 30 hits.

In the Tigers' fifth game of the regional, Clemson rallied from a 5-1 deficit to score five combined runs in the seventh and eighth innings to defeat Oklahoma State 6-5. Epps started the comeback with a two-run homer in the seventh. Parker then gave Clemson the lead for good with a two-out, two-run single in the eighth inning. Vaughn, who pitched 3.2 solid innings in his last appearance at home, struck out the last Cowboy with two runners on to earn the win. All six Tiger runs and all 10 hits came with two outs.

Epps was named Clemson Regional MVP after going 10-for-19 (.526) with two homers, six RBIs, and seven runs in five games. Joining Epps on the all-tournament team were Boyd, Dwyer, Freeman, and Paulsen.

With the win, the Tigers advanced to the Tempe Super Regional to face #2 Arizona State. They were the Tigers' first-ever games in the state of Arizona and the first time Clemson had ever played a Pac-10 team on its home field.

In the opener, Clemson fell 7-4 behind 8.0 effective innings pitched from Mike Leake, the national leader in wins. Epps led Clemson with two hits and three RBIs. The following day, the Sun Devils advanced to the College World Series with an 8-2 win behind a complete game from Josh Spence, the first and only one against the Tigers in 2009.

Clemson finished the season with a 44-22 record and was ranked #14 by **Sports Weekly**, #15 by **Collegiate Baseball**, and #16 by **Baseball America** in the final polls.

Clemson fans continued to support the Tigers, as 170,156 fans attended the 36 home dates. The 4,726 fans per date was the third-highest average in school history.

After the season, nine Tigers were chosen in the Major League draft, tied for fourth-most in the nation and tied for third-most in school history. Paulsen was a third-round pick of the Rockies, Dwyer was a fourth-round selection of the Royals, Stone and Hinson was a 10th-round pick of the Padres. Stoneburner, Delk, Freeman, Sanders, Clinton McKinney, and Johnson were also selected later in the draft.

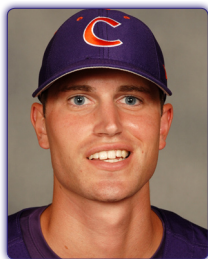
