### **CLEMSON, STANFORD SET FOR FIRST** MATCHUP AS ACC FOES

The Clemson Tigers will face the Stanford Cardinal for the second time in history and for the first time as ACC colleagues on Sept. 28 on Homecoming at Death Valley, Kickoff at Memorial Stadium in Clemson is scheduled for 7 p.m. ET.

Clemson Head Coach Dabo Swinney will be chasing ACC history on Saturday. He enters the contest with a career head coaching record of 172-44 and is one victory shy of Bobby Bowden's conference record for career total victories leading an ACC program. Of Bowden's 377 NCAA-recognized career head coaching victories, 173 of his wins came during Florida State's membership in the ACC.

Swinney will also be chasing his 100th career win at Memorial Stadium. The Tigers are 99-9 at home under his leadership, including a national-best-tying 67-3mark at home in the College Football Playoff era.

Clemson has ridden its suddenly red-hot starting offense to blowout victories in each of its last two games, running out to first quarter leads of 35-0 and 28-0 in victories against Appalachian State and NC State, respectively. Clemson quarterback Cade Klubnik has guided Clemson's offense on 17 drives over the last two games before giving way to his backups. Clemson has scored on 16 of Klubnik's 17 drives, including 15 touchdowns and one field goal.

Thanks to that production in Clemson's two most recent games, the Tigers' first three contests of the season have ranked among the most prolific first three games in program history despite Clemson being held to three points in its season opener. Clemson's record

#### WHAT TO WATCH FOR THIS WEEK

- Clemson (800-473-45) attempting to earn its 801st victory all-time and potentially tie Auburn (801) for the 13th-most in FBS history. (Note: Auburn can move to 802 with a win against Oklahoma at 3:30 p.m. ET Saturday).
- Head Coach Dabo Swinney (172) attempting to tie Bobby Bowden (173 during Florida State's tenure in the ACC) for the most career head coaching victories leading an ACC program.
- Swinney (172) attempting to earn his 173rd career win to pass the career win total of College Football Hall of Famer Dan Devine (172-57-9) and match the career win totals of College Football Hall of Famers Robert Neyland (173-31-12) and Frank Solich (173-101).
- Swinney (99-9) attempting to become the first coach in Clemson history to win 100 career home games. Frank Howard ranks second in school history with 81.
- Swinney (99) attempting to join Mack Brown (156), Kirk Ferentz (121) and Brian Kelly (103) as the only active FBS coaches to win 100 career home games, according to Stats Perform.
- Clemson attempting to improve to 68-3 at Death Valley in the College Football Playoff era. At 67-3, Clemson is tied with Alabama for the nation's best home record in that time frame.
- Clemson attempting to improve to 100-15 against ACC opponents, including postseason play, since 2011. Clemson (99) would become the third team in the country to win 100 games against conference opponents in that span (Alabama and Ohio State).
- Clemson facing Stanford for the second time in school history, joining Clemson's win in the 1986 Gator Bowl.
- Clemson attempting to improve to 2-0 all-time against Stanford.
- Clemson hosting Stanford for the first time in school history.
- Stanford becoming only the second team from California ever to play in Death Valley, joining Pro Football Hall of Famer George Allen's Long Beach State squad that lost to Clemson, 59-0, in the 1990 season opener.
- Stanford traveling roughly 2,200 miles as the crow flies, the farthest distance an opponent has traveled to face the Tigers in Clemson all-time, surpassing the roughly 2,000 miles traveled by Long Beach State in 1990.
- Clemson attempting to make Stanford the 25th different power conference program defeated by the Tigers at least once since 2013. Clemson has defeated 24 different power conference teams at least once while leading the nation with 110 wins against power conference opponents in that span.
- Clemson facing Stanford Head Coach Troy Taylor for the first time. Taylor is the second of six head coaches slated to face Clemson for the first time this season (App State's Shawn Clark, Taylor, Virginia's Tony Elliott, Louisville's Jeff Brohm, Virginia Tech's Brent Pry and The Citadel's Maurice Drayton).
- Clemson attempting to improve to 165-73-3 all-time (and 48-7 since 2011) when facing a coach for the first time.
- Clemson hosting its 100th Homecoming game on record since its first official Homecoming game in 1922.
- Clemson attempting to improve to 78-19-3 on Homecoming and 47-4-2 on Homecoming since 1971.
- Clemson attempting to win its 13th consecutive Homecoming game and take sole possession of the school record for its longest Homecoming winning streak (12 from 1977-88).
  - Clemson attempting to improve to 30-8 in night

games since the start of the 2018 season. A win would also move Clemson to 51-11 at night since 2015.

- Clemson attempting to win its 22nd consecutive night game in Death Valley, a streak that dates to the middle of the 2013 season. Clemson's active 21-game home winning streak in night games is the second-longest active streak in the country.
- Clemson attempting to improve to 25-3 under Dabo Swinney in night games in Death Valley.
- Clemson attempting to improve to 134-18 against AP-unranked teams under Dabo Swinney and improve to 111-8 in those games since the start of the 2012
- Clemson attempting to improve to 97-13 in regular season play since the start of the 2015 season.
- Clemson attempting to score 50 or more points in three consecutive games for the first time since a fourgame streak in 2019 against Boston College, Wofford, NC State and Wake Forest.
- Clemson attempting to reach 500 yards in three straight games for the first time since an eight-game streak in 2019.
- Clemson (9.8 vs. App State and 7.8 vs. NC State) attempting to average 7.5 or more yards per play in three straight games for the first time since a three-game streak against Louisville, Boston College and Wofford in 2019.
- Clemson attempting to reach both 200 passing yards and 200 rushing yards in three consecutive games for the first time since a five-game stretch in 2019.
- Clemson attempting to rush for 250 yards in three consecutive games for the first time since a four-game streak in 2019 against Florida State, Louisville, Boston College and Wofford.
- Clemson attempting to rush for four or more touchdowns in three straight games for the first time since 2000 against Duke, NC State and Maryland.
- Clemson, which had four different players rush for touchdowns last week, attempting to have at least four different players score a rushing touchdown in consecutive games for the first time since 2019 against Wofford and NC State.
- Clemson (7.4 vs. App State and 8.2 vs. NC State) attempting to average at least 7.0 yards per carry in three straight games for the first time since 1991 against Maryland, South Carolina and Duke.
- Clemson entering the game having scored at least one rushing touchdown in a national-best 80 of its 85 games since the start of the 2018 season. Clemson has also rushed for multiple touchdowns in a national-best 67 games in that span.
- Clemson entering the game having rushed for a touchdown in 55 consecutive home games, the nation's longest active streak. The last team to hold Clemson without a rushing touchdown in Death Valley was Troy in 2016.
- Clemson attempting to throw three or more touchdowns in three straight games for the first time since a four-game streak in 2020.
- Clemson attempting to score in a 284th consecutive game to pass the 1887-2019 Georgia Tech Yellow Jackets for sole possession of the 15th-longest streak of games without being shutout in FBS history.
- Clemson attempting to produce a touchdown of 50 or more yards in three straight games for the first time since a three-game streak against South Carolina, Virginia and Ohio State in 2019.
- Clemson attempting to surrender one sack or fewer in three straight games for the first time since a four-game streak to end the 2021 season.

in first quarter differential (+21.0 per game). In its two most recent games, Clemson became the first FBS team in 20 years of accessible ESPN data to record a 28-point first-quarter lead in consecutive games.

- Clemson (35-point first quarter vs. App State and 28-point first quarter vs. NC State) attempting to produce at least three individual quarters of 28 or more points in a single season for the third time in school history (three in 2020, four in 2012).
- Clemson (one) needing one more defensive touchdown to extend its streak of scoring multiple defensive touchdowns to 15 straight seasons. The last time Clemson had fewer than two defensive touchdowns in a season was 2009, Dabo Swinney's first full season as head coach, when the Tigers supplemented a single defensive touchdown with six special teams touchdowns.
- Clemson attempting to score a defensive touchdown in back-to-back games for the first time since recording pick-sixes against Notre Dame and Georgia Tech last November.

- Clemson attempting to play consecutive giveawayfree games for the first time since 2022 against Wake Forest and NC State.
- Clemson attempting to force three or more takeaways in three consecutive games for the first time since last year's Notre Dame, Georgia Tech and North Carolina games.
- Clemson seeking to win the turnover margin for the third time this season and the 101st time in Dabo Swinney's tenure. Clemson is 94-6 in Swinney's tenure when it wins the turnover margin.
- Clemson attempting to win the turnover margin for the eighth time in a nine-game span, including a fivegame stretch to end the 2023 season.
- Clemson attempting to finish +2 or better in the turnover margin in a third straight game for the first time since a four-game streak in 2013.
- Tight end Jake Briningstool (90) needing four receptions to move past John McMakin (93 from 1969-71) and Dwayne Allen (93 from 2009-11) for the second-most career receptions by a Clemson tight end.
- Briningstool (90) needing 10 receptions to become the second tight end in Clemson history to reach 100 career receptions (Jordan Leggett, 112).
- Briningstool (1,005) chasing No. 4 Bennie Cunningham (1,044 from 1972-75) and No. 3 Dwayne Allen (1,079 from 2009-11) among the top five on Clemson's all-time career receiving yardage leaderboard for tight ends.
- Briningstool (12) needing one receiving touchdown to move past John McMakin (1969-71), Dwayne Allen (2009-11), Brandon Ford (2009-12) and Davis Allen (2019-22) for sole possession of the second-most career touchdown receptions by a tight end in school history.
- Briningstool (two touchdowns vs. App State) attempting to become the first Clemson tight end to catch multiple touchdown passes in multiple games in a single season since Brandon Ford in 2012 (two).
- Cornerback Ashton Hampton attempting to become the first Clemson freshman to record an interception in back-to-back games since Kylon Griffin accomplished the feat as a redshirt freshman a year ago.
- Hampton (one) attempting to join Arlington Nunn (three in 1990) and Dorian O'Daniel (two in 2017) as the only Clemson players since 1950 to record multiple interception returns for touchdowns in a season.
- Quarterback Cade Klubnik attempting to become the first Clemson quarterback to throw three or more touchdown passes in three straight games since Trevor Lawrence's four-game streak in 2020.
- Klubnik (nine) needing one more touchdown run to reach 10 career rushing touchdowns.
- Klubnik attempting to rush for a touchdown in three straight games for the first time in his career.
- Klubnik attempting to become the first Clemson quarterback to rush for a touchdown in three straight games since DJ Uiagalelei in November 2022.
- Klubnik (29) needing one more touchdown pass to become the 10th player in Clemson history to throw 30 career touchdown passes.
- Klubnik (29) needing three touchdown passes to tie or four touchdown passes to pass Kyle Parker (32) for the ninth-most career passing touchdowns in Clemson history.
- Klubnik (4,270) needing 377 passing yards to catch Rodney Williams (4,647) and enter the Top 10 in career passing yards in Clemson history.
- Klubnik (633) needing 17 pass attempts to become the 12th player in Clemson history to attempt 650 career passes.
- Klubnik (four) attempting to pass his former offensive coordinator Brandon Streeter (four) for sole possession of

the fifth-most career 300-yard passing games in Clemson history.

- Klubnik (4,649) needing 351 combined passing and rushing yards to become the 11th player in school history to record 5,000 career yards of total offense.
- Running back Phil Mafah attempting to rush for 100 yards in three consecutive games for the first time in his career.
- Mafah attempting to become the first Clemson player to post three consecutive 100-yard rushing games since Travis Etienne's school-record six-game streak in 2019.
- Mafah attempting to rush for a touchdown in three straight games for the first time in his career.
- Wide receiver Antonio Williams attempting to catch a touchdown in three straight games for the first time in his career
- Williams attempting to become the first Clemson player to catch a touchdown in three straight games since Beaux Collins' four-game streak to open 2022.
- Williams attempting to become the first Clemson player to catch multiple touchdown passes in back-to-back games since Tee Higgins caught multiple touchdowns in three straight games against Wake Forest, South Carolina and Virginia in 2019.

### **WELCOME TO HOMECOMING**

Saturday will be Clemson's 100th Homecoming game on record since the first celebration in 1922. Clemson has an overall record of 77-19-3 in its previous 99 Homecoming games. That includes a 46-4-2 record (.904) in Homecoming games since the 1971 season.

Though the university tradition began in 1914, the first dedicated homecoming football game at Clemson was in 1922, a 21-0 loss to Centre that kicked off an 0-4-1 stretch through Clemson's first five homecoming games. Clemson defeated Auburn in 1927 by a 3-0 score for its first homecoming victory.

There is no record of a homecoming game in 1930 or 1938, but the event was held in conjunction with a football game in 81 straight seasons from 1939-2019, even through the war years. That streak concluded in 2020, when the COVID-19 pandemic precluded Clemson from formally hosting the annual event.

Clemson has just four losses on Homecoming since 1971. Georgia Tech upset 14th-ranked Clemson, 30-14, in Danny Ford's final year as Clemson head coach in 1989. That was the last loss for Ford as Clemson's head coach and the only time he lost a Homecoming game in 11 years as the head coach. Georgia Tech went on to a 7-4 season in 1989, then won a share of the national championship the following year.

Clemson's other three losses on Homecoming since 1971 took place in 1997 to Virginia, in 2001 to North Carolina and in 2010 to Miami. Clemson enters this year on a 12-game Homecoming winning streak.

Dabo Swinney is 14-1 on Homecoming in his head coaching career. That includes the 2008 season when Clemson defeated Duke on Homecoming during his interim head coaching stint.

### **LAST MEETING**

Clemson 27, Stanford 21

(Dec, 27, 1986, Jacksonville, Fla.)

Clemson held off a second-half Stanford rally to defeat the 17th-ranked Cardinal, 27-21, in the 1986 Gator Bowl and earn the Tigers their first bowl win since the Orange Bowl to end Clemson's 1981 national championship season.

The Tigers scored 27 unanswered points in the first half and appeared to be on the way to a rout. But the second half was a different story, as Stanford scored 21 unanswered points of its own.

Gator Bowl MVP Rodney Williams completed 8-of-11 passes in the first half, but it was his execution of the option that helped Clemson gain a 27-0 halftime lead. After punting on their first possession, the Tigers scored on their next five. With the score 17-0 in the second quarter, Reggie Harris knocked the ball loose on a Stanford kickoff return and the Tigers recovered on Stanford's 16-yard line. Two plays later, Ray Williams took a reverse in or a 14-yard touchdown, his first of the season. David Treadwell added his longest field goal of the year (46 yards) on Clemson's next possession, putting the Tigers up 27-0 at the intermission.

In the second half, All-American tailback Brad Muster rushed for a touchdown and caught two scoring passes for Stanford while the Clemson offense came to a standstill. With 1:43 left to play in the game Clemson was forced to punt to the Cardinal with only a six-point lead. But the Tiger defense rose to the occasion, as Stanford gained only six yards on the next four downs and turned the ball back to Clemson

Tailbacks Terrence Flagler and Kenny Flowers combined for 149 yards. Sophomore Ricardo Hooper led the receiving corps with two catches for 44 yards. Terrance Roulhac and Flagler each had three catches with 22 and 23 yards, respectively. Rodney Williams rushed 16 times for 18 yards and one touchdown.

Defensively, the Tigers were led by linebacker Henry Carter, who recorded a career-high 13 tackles. Gene Beasley added seven tackles and broke up two passes. The game also marked Michael Dean Perry's offensive debut, as he was put in as a blocking back on a goal-line situation in the first half.

### SCORING CHANGES

- On Clemson's first drive of the third quarter, officials assessed NC State's offside penalty at six yards. NC State is now credited with four penalties for 29 yards in the game.
- On NC State's scoring drive that started with 9:07 remaining in the third quarter, the result of a pass interference penalty on Clemson's Ashton Hampton was initially credited to the Clemson 10-yard line. That penalty has been updated to correctly credit the ensuing ball spot as the six-yard line. NC State's touchdown by Kendrick Raphael on the ensuing snap is now correctly credited as a six-yard touchdown run, and NC State's stats for the contest have been updated to reflect the change.
- On a third quarter tackle for loss by Clemson with 3:52 remaining in the third quarter, a full tackle for loss credited to Sammy Brown has now been split between Sammy Brown and Ashton Hampton.

### **GAME NOTES**

- Clemson has now scored 59 or more points in back-to-back games for the third time in school history (59 vs. both Boston College and Wofford in 2019; 59 vs. Florida State and 77 vs. Louisville in 2018).
- Clemson has now scored 50 points in back-to-back games for the first time since a four-game streak late in the 2019 season.
- Clemson totaled 523 yards and has now reached 500 yards of offense in back-to-back games for the first time since 2022 against Louisiana Tech and Wake Forest.
- Clemson rushed for 269 yards and has now rushed for 250 yards in back-to-back games for the first time since the 2021 season against Wake Forest and South Carolina.
- After averaging 9.8 yards per play last game against Appalachian State, Clemson averaged 7.8 yards per play against NC State. It marked Clemson's first time averaging 7.5 yards or more per play in consecutive games since averaging more than 8.0 yards against both Virginia Tech and Notre Dame in 2020.
- Clemson exceeded both 200 rushing yards and 200 passing yards for the second consecutive game. Clemson is now 63-1 when both passing and rushing for 200+yards under Dabo Swinney and 113-1-1 in program history when reaching those marks.
- With 408 first-half yards and 42 first-half points on Saturday, Clemson has now combined for 957 yards and 101 points in the first half of its last two games.
   Clemson scored points of 15 of its 16 drives — including touchdowns on 14 of those drives — in those first halves.
- Clemson has now recorded 400 yards in consecutive first halves for the first time since 2019 against NC State (403) and Wofford (438).
  - Clemson has now scored 45 or more points in the

first half of back-to-back games for the first time in the Dabo Swinney era.

- Clemson's 59 points in the game were the Tigers' second-most in its 92-game series history with NC State, trailing only its 62 points in a win in 2012. Clemson's 31-point margin of victory was its fourth-largest in series history.
- According to ESPN, this game marked the fourth time that a team had scored 40 or more points in a half against an NC State team coached by Dave Doeren, joining 2013 Florida State (quarterbacked by Jameis Winston), 2016 Louisville (quarterbacked by Lamar Jackson), 2019 Clemson (quarterbacked by Trevor Lawrence).
- One game after recording 349 yards and 35 points in the first quarter against Appalachian State, Clemson posted 222 yards and 28 points in the first quarter against NC State. Clemson holds a 63-0 combined edge in first quarters through three games this season.
- According to ESPN, Clemson became the first FBS team in the last 20 seasons to lead by 28 or more points after the first quarter of consecutive games.
- Despite playing only two-and-a-half quarters, quarterback Cade Klubnik completed 16-of-24 passes for 209 yards with three passing touchdowns and added four carries for a career-high 70 rushing yards and one rushing touchdown.
- Klubnik opened the scoring on the game's opening drive, culminating a four-play, 75-yard drive with a career-long 55-yard touchdown run.
- The 55-yard run by Klubnik was the longest by a Clemson quarterback since Trevor Lawrence's 67-yard touchdown run against Ohio State in the 2019 Fiesta Bowl.
- The rushing touchdown was the third of the season for Klubnik and the ninth of his career.
- Klubnik has now rushed for a touchdown in back-toback games for the second time in his career (2023 vs. Florida Atlantic and Florida State).
- On his seventh completion, Klubnik (409) became the 10th player in Clemson history to complete 400 career passes. On his ninth completion, he passed Kyle Parker (401 from 2009-10) for the ninth-most career pass completions in Clemson history.
- With 279 combined passing and rushing yards in the contest, Klubnik (4,649) became the 14th player in school history to record 4,500 career yards of total offense.
- On his third touchdown pass of the game, Klubnik (29) passed Mike Eppley (28 from 1980-84) to enter the Top 10 in school history in career touchdown passes.
- Wide receiver Antonio Williams caught three passes for 39 yards with two touchdowns.

- The game was the second multi-touchdown performance of Williams' career, joining his two-touchdown game against Charleston Southern last season.
- Williams has now caught a touchdown in back-toback games for the first time in his career.
- Clemson scored its second touchdown of the game on its second drive of the game on a 31-yard touchdown pass from Klubnik to Williams. The scoring drive covered 91 yards in only 1:34 in elapsed game time.
- Williams added his second touchdown of the first quarter on a two-yard pass from Klubnik.
- Running back Phil Mafah rushed seven times for 107 yards with a touchdown.
- Mafah has now rushed for 100 yards in consecutive games for the first time in his career.
- Mafah became the first Clemson player to record back-to-back 100-yard rushing games since Will Shipley accomplished the feat against Florida State and Syracuse in 2022
- Mafah's seven carries were the fewest by a Clemson player amid a 100-yard rushing performance since both Lyn-J Dixon (four) and Tavien Feaster (six) recorded fewer carries during 100-yard rushing games against Louisville in 2018
- Mafah scored Clemson's fourth touchdown of the day on its fourth offensive drive, scoring on a 38-yard touchdown run
- On the touchdown run, Mafah (2,056) became the 22nd player in school history to reach 2,000 career rushing yards.
- Clemson's fifth drive of the game its opening drive of the second quarter resulted in an Aidan Swanson punt. Including eight consecutive touchdowns drives against Appalachian State and four touchdown drives to open the game against NC State, the punt ended a streak of 12 consecutive drives engineered by Klubnik and Clemson's first-team offense in which Clemson scored touchdowns.
- Wide receiver Cole Turner scored his first career touchdown of any kind on an 18-yard run in the second quarter
- The touchdown run by Turner was the first by a Clemson receiver since Will Swinney scored on a fake field goal against UConn in 2021. It was the first touchdown run by a Clemson receiver on an offensive play since Tee Higgins' 36-yard touchdown run against LSU in the College Football Playoff National Championship Game to end the 2019 season.
- Running back Jay Haynes scored his first touchdown of the season the second of his career on a 19-yard run in the second quarter.
  - The touchdown run was Haynes' first since scoring

- Clemson scored four rushing touchdowns and has now recorded four or more rushing touchdowns in consecutive games for the first time since 2020 against Pitt and Virginia Tech.
- Wide receiver Adam Randall recorded a team-high and career-high 69 yards on a career-high-tying five receptions with one touchdown.
- Randall recorded his first career touchdown reception on a four-yard pass from Klubnik in the third quarter.
- With 29 yards in the contest, tight end Jake Briningstool (1,005) joined Jordan Leggett (1,598 from 2013-16), John McMakin (1,255 from 1969-71), Dwayne Allen (1,079 from 2009-11) and Bennie Cunningham (1,044 from 1972-75) as the fifth tight end in school history to reach 1,000 career receiving yards.
- Defensive end T.J. Parker recorded 2.0 sacks among his five tackles. He matched his career high in sacks of 2.0, set at Syracuse last season.
- Parker recorded his first sack and forced his first fumble of the season on a strip-sack in the first quarter.
  - The forced fumble was the first of Parker's career.
- The fumble was recovered by defensive end Cade Denhoff, who recorded his first career fumble recovery in his first career start.
- Parker added his second sack of the game in the second quarter.
- Cornerback Avieon Terrell recorded the game's second takeaway in the first quarter, forcing and recovering a Kevin Concepcion fumble.
- The forced fumble and the fumble recovery were both the first of Terrell's career.
- Cornerback Ashton Hampton recorded a 53-yard interception return for touchdown in the third quarter on the first interception of his career.
- The pick-six by Hampton was Clemson's first of the season and its first since Shelton Lewis' 46-yard interception return against Georgia Tech last November.

  - Clemson won the turnover margin for the second time

this season and the 100th time in Dabo Swinney's tenure. Clemson is now 94-6 in Swinney's tenure when it wins the turnover margin.

- Clemson won the turnover margin, 3-0. It was Clemson's third time finishing plus-three in the turnover margin in its last seven games, dating to last season.
- The game was Clemson's first without a giveaway since the 2022 ACC Championship Game against North Carolina
  - Safety R.J. Mickens played his 50th career game.
- Kicker Nolan Hauser converted a 20-yard field goal on the final play of the first half to move to 3-for-3 on field goal attempts in his career.
- Clemson scored in a 283rd consecutive game to tie the 1887-2019 Georgia Tech Yellow Jackets for the 15thlongest streak of games without being shut out in FBS history.
- Clemson has now scored at least one rushing touchdown in a national-best 80 of its 85 games since the start of the 2018 season. Clemson has also rushed for multiple touchdowns in a national-best 67 games since the start of the 2018 season.
- Clemson has now rushed for a touchdown in 55 consecutive home games, the nation's longest active streak. The last team to hold Clemson without a rushing touchdown in Death Valley was Troy in 2016.
- Clemson opened conference play at home for only the third time in the last 13 years. Clemson has now won nine of its last 10 conference openers since 2015.
- Clemson opened conference play against NC State for the 11th time in school and conference history. The win improved Clemson to 7-4 in those contests and represented Clemson's fourth straight win against the Wolfpack in conference openers (1997, 2008 and 2013).
- Captains for the contest were defensive tackle DeMonte Capehart, offensive lineman Tristan Leigh, safety R.J. Mickens and wide receiver Antonio Williams.

- Clemson earned its 800th all-time win, becoming the 14th FBS program (and first ACC program) ever to win 800 games
  - Clemson went from 700 all-time wins to 800 all-time

- Head Coach Dabo Swinney moved to 12-3 all-time against NC State.
- Swinney improved to 9-2 all-time against NC State Head Coach Dave Doeren. Doeren became the second coach ever to be defeated by Swinney nine times, joining Dave Clawson (10).
- Swinney moved to 17-4 all-time in games immediately following regular season open dates.
- Clemson pushed its record at Death Valley against NC State to 25-11 since the facility opened in 1942. Clemson's 25 wins against the Wolfpack at Death Valley are its second-most against any opponent, trailing only Clemson's 36 wins against Wake Forest in Memorial Stadium.
- Clemson improved to 99-15 against ACC opponents, including postseason play, since 2011. Clemson is one win shy of becoming the third team in the country to win 100 games against conference opponents in that span (Alabama and Ohio State).

- Clemson improved to 45-26-1 in conference openers since joining the ACC.
- Clemson improved to 67-3 at Death Valley in the College Football Playoff era and is tied with Alabama for the nation's best home record in that time frame.

- Swinney (172) pulled within one victory of Bobby Bowden (173) for the most career head coaching victories leading an ACC program.
- Swinney (99-9) earned his 99th career home win and pulled within one victory of becoming the first Clemson coach to win 100 career home games.
- Swinney improved to 39-5 all-time against teams from the state of North Carolina.
- Clemson is now 83-3 when rushing for 200+ yards under Dabo Swinney.
- Clemson is now 70-2 since 2015 when outscoring opponents in the "Middle Eight," defined as the final four minutes of the first half and the first four minutes of the second half.
- Clemson improved to 65-4 when having a 100-yard rusher since 2011.
  - Clemson is now 82-6 when scoring first since 2015.
- Clemson has now won  $116\ \text{of}\ \text{its}$  last  $121\ \text{games}$  when leading at halftime.
- Clemson improved to 137-4 since 2011 when leading after three quarters.

Even in the three-year time horizon since Clemson last qualified for the College Football Playoff, Clemson is one of only 10 schools (and one of only seven power conference schools) with nine or more wins in each of the last three seasons from 2021-23 (Air Force, Alabama, Fresno State, Georgia, Michigan, Notre Dame, Ohio State, Oregon and UTSA).

### SENIOR SUCCESS

Every January, Head Coach Dabo Swinney conducts his first official meeting with his new team. The first order of business in the meeting is to "reset the room,"

reorganizing the seating arrangement with seniors in front and all succeeding classes in order behind them in the team auditorium.

Several of Swinney's senior classes placed themselves among select company in college football history. The 2017, 2018, 2019 and 2020 Clemson seniors account for four of only 14 four-year classes in FBS history to reach 50 career wins. That includes the 2018 and 2019 groups that are tied with the 2018 Alabama seniors for the most wins in FBS history (55 wins in four years).

### HISTORIC CONFERENCE REIGN

In 2020, Clemson became the first program ever to win 20 ACC Championships. That year, Clemson became the first program in the conference championship game era to win six straight conference championship games. Clemson also became the first ACC program to win six consecutive outright titles, as Florida State had a streak of nine straight ACC titles, but that streak included two co-championships that prevented Bobby Bowden's Seminoles from ever winning more than three straight titles outright.

Clemson's 2022 ACC title was the program's seventh in eight years, as the Tigers became the first team in an active power conference to win seven outright conference titles in an eight-year span since Alabama won eight SEC titles in nine seasons from 1971-79.

Including titles from its days as a member of the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association and Southern Conference, Clemson has 27 conference championships overall, also the most of any current ACC school. Duke ranks second among the ACC's current membership with 18 overall conference titles, including 11 Southern Conference titles and seven ACC titles.

The Tigers won the 1900, 1902 and 1903 SIAA Conference championships under John Heisman, then the 1906 SIAA title under Bob Williams. Clemson also won the 1940 and 1948 Southern Conference titles

under Frank Howard. Howard won eight total conference titles, including two in the Southern Conference and six in the ACC. Swinney matched Howard with his eighth conference title in 2022.

For the last quarter-century, Clemson's ACC success has not been a roller-coaster ride of lofty heights and deep lows. The last time Clemson finished a season below .500 in regular season conference play was in 1998, when Tommy West's 3-8 squad went 1-7 in ACC play. Clemson's 25-year streak of being .500 or better in conference play is tied for the longest active streak in the country and tied for the fourth-longest of any streak since 1966.

### **POWER OVER POWER CONFERENCE FOES**

Early in his head coaching tenure, Dabo Swinney laid out his belief to then-Clemson athletic director Terry Don Phillips that the Tigers needed to add tough non-conference challenges on top of their tests in ACC play to serve as a foundation for the program's growth.

"I had a conversation with Terry Don and said, 'Terry Don, I know we are not very good right now, but we need to play people because that is going to help me teach and help me develop the culture and the mindset that you have to have to win at the highest level," recounted Swinney. "I didn't think we had that, and that's what we committed to. That's what we've done."

That scheduling philosophy and culture change has resonated in the Clemson program, and since 2013, no team can claim more wins against power conference opponents than the Tigers. On Nov. 12, 2022, Clemson became the first program to reach 100 victories against power conference opponents since 2013.

Clemson's national-best 110 power conference wins since 2013 include victories against Wake Forest (11), Boston College (10), Syracuse (10), Georgia Tech (10), NC State (9), Louisville (8), South Carolina (8), Florida State (7), North Carolina (5), Miami (4), Notre Dame (4), Ohio State (3), Virginia (3), Virginia Tech (3), Alabama (2), Pitt (2), Auburn (2), Oklahoma (2), Texas A&M (2), Georgia (1), Duke (1), Maryland (1), lowa State (1) and Kentucky (1).

On a year-by-year basis, Clemson has finished the season atop the country in wins against power conference opponents four times since the institution of the College Football Playoff in 2014, including four of the last seven years. That includes 13 wins against power conference opponents in 2018, the first team ever to reach that figure.

### SIGN AND DEVELOP

While proud of his incoming classes, Head Coach Dabo Swinney has long stated that a true ranking of a recruiting class cannot and should not be published until four years later when the group can be evaluated on performance rather than potential.

Much to Swinney's delight, The Athletic has annually assumed that role in recent years, re-ranking every recruiting class four years later to account for on-field performance.

For its re-rankings, The Athletic uses the following grading scale: 5 points: All-American, award winner, top-50 NFL Draft pick; 4: Multi-year starter, all-conference honors; 3: One-year starter or key reserve; 2: Career backup; 0: Minor or no contribution, left the program. The outlet also adds a bonus to each program's class average, derived from its total number of wins from 2017 through 2020 (e.g.: For re-ranking the Class of 2017, Clemson won 51 games, so its class average received a bonus of 0.51).

Even in its current stretch of recruiting success, Swinney has pointed out that Clemson often falls in rankings as its commitment to not oversigning leads to smaller recruiting classes, as well as noting that much of Clemson's on-field success is a function of the program's development, citing All-Americans like former three-star Isaiah Simmons or former two-star Nolan Turner. The re-rankings illustrate Clemson's impressive track record of talent identification, culture fit, resource allocation and player development.

On average, Clemson ranked 10.2 in the 247 Composite team rankings across the 2014-20 recruiting cycles. Upon re-ranking those groups, despite having little room for improvement while recruiting at a Top 15 clip in that span, Clemson ranked 4.0 on average in the re-rankings, a ratings bump of roughly six spots. Each of those Clemson classes averaged at least 10 wins a season during their careers.

#### **TEAM TALENT**

Despite the program often fielding questions about its roster-building philosophy and means of talent acquisition, Clemson ranks as having the nation's fifth-most-talented roster in 247Sports' Team Talent Composite.

Clemson has ranked in the top five in this metric every year since 2020 and in the top 10 in every year since 2016.

College Football Hall of Famer Frank Howard, known as "The Bashful Baron of Barlow Bend," compiled a 165–118–12 record in 30 seasons at Clemson from 1940-69.

With a 31-23 upset of No. 12 Notre Dame in 2023, Dabo Swinney earned his 166th career victory as Clemson's head coach, surpassing Howard to become Clemson's all-time winningest coach. Swinney accomplished the feat in his 209th career game.

### **HEAD COACH CONTINUITY**

Over the last decade-and-a-half, Clemson became a beacon of stability in the increasingly unstable

environment of college football. Clemson Head Coach Dabo Swinney is in his 22nd overall season at Clemson in 2024, including his 16th full season as head coach (and his 17th including an interim stint in 2008).

From the start of Swinney's first season as full-time head coach in 2009 through 2023, there were 465 head coaching tenures in the FBS (excluding those by interims) but only one such tenure at Clemson.

Clemson is the only school in the ACC with only one head coach since the start of the 2009 season, and among the 15 schools ever to qualify for the College Football Playoff, only Clemson has had only one head coach since 2009.

#### SIX "FINAL FOURS" FOR SWINNEY

While the term "Final Four" may still be the linguistic property of college basketball, since the advent of the four-team College Football Playoff in 2014, Head Coach Dabo Swinney had Clemson among the sport's final four teams six times from 2015-20, becoming the first coach to lead a team to six consecutive College Football Playoffs since the format's institution in 2014.

The NCAA men's college basketball tournament dates to 1939. In the history of that tournament, only John Wooden of UCLA (nine from 1967-75) and Mike Krzyzewski of Duke (five from 1988-92) coached teams to at least five consecutive Final Fours. With his sixth "Final Four" appearance in 2020, Swinney joined basketball's Wooden as the only college football or men's basketball coaches to take teams to six consecutive Final Fours in their respective sports.

Swinney is among only nine coaches in football and men's basketball to record six career Final Four berths. He is one of only six with a winning record in Final Four games

Swinney's ability to place his team among the nation's elite quartet has also been illustrated by the polls. Clemson finished first in the AP Poll in 2016 and 2018, second in 2015 and 2019, third in 2020 and fourth in 2017. Swinney became just the fourth coach to record at least six consecutive top four finishes since the AP Poll began in 1936, an exclusive list that also includes Florida State's Bobby Bowden (13), USC's Pete Carroll (seven) and Oklahoma's Bud Wilkinson (six).

Clemson's streak represented the fifth time a program has had a run of at least six top four finishes in the AP Poll. Miami (Fla.) had a seven-year run from 1986-92 with two different head coaches leading the program.

Swinney ranks second among coaches in both College Football Playoff appearances and College

Football Playoff wins. Through the College Football Playoff's first 10 years, only 10 head coaches ever won a CFP game, and only six (four of whom are no longer active) have won a CFP national championship.

#### **THROUGH 200 GAMES**

The 2022 Orange Bowl was the 200th game in Dabo Swinney's head coaching career. Among coaches who qualify for the NCAA FBS record book by virtue of five years or 50 wins as a major college head coach, 17 coaches had earned at least 150 victories in their first 200 career games as head coach as of the conclusion of the 2022 season.

At 161-39 through 200 games, Swinney tied Bob Stoops and Robert Neyland (162 each) for the fifthmost wins through 200 career games in major college football history.

Four previous Clemson head coaches earned 150+FBS wins in their careers: John Heisman (186), Jess Neely (207), Frank Howard (165) and Ken Hatfield (168). Howard, a College Football Hall of Famer, recorded his 150th victory in his 273rd career game, in a 14-10 victory against Maryland in 1966 that clinched a piece of what later became an outright ACC title. Heisman earned win No. 150 in game No. 203, Neely earned it in game No. 268, and Hatfield did it in game 259, though none of those three won more than 43 games in their Clemson tenures.

### **FIRST 15 SEASONS**

### **DEATH VALLEY ROARS**

Frank Howard Field at Memorial Stadium garnered its famous nickname in the 1940s when Presbyterian College Head Coach Lonnie McMillian, after many years of bringing his teams in for drubbings, dubbed the venue

as "Death Valley."

The name stuck, and its patrons have done their part to make it live up to its name and its reputation. In the first 10 years of the College Football Playoff era from 2014-23, Clemson's home atmosphere helped draw 148 false starts by opponents, the second-most of any home venue in the country and the most by a power conference program.

### HISTORIC NIGHT VS. APP STATE

Klubnik put together one of the greatest single-game performances in Clemson and ACC history in Clemson's 66-20 win against Appalachian State on Sept. 7. Klubnik only played the first half but finished the contest having completed 24-of-26 passes for a careerhigh 378 yards and five passing touchdowns in addition to scoring two rushing touchdowns while leading the Tigers to touchdowns on all eight drives he engineered.

For the performance, Klubnik collected Walter Camp National Offensive Player of the Week, Davey O'Brien National Quarterback of the Week and PFF Offensive Player of the Week honors while splitting ACC Quarterback of the Week accolades. Included below are some of the statistical superlatives from No. 2's offensive clinic in game No. 2:

- Klubnik finished with a pass efficiency rating of 277.9, breaking Tajh Boyd's school record for a single game with a minimum of 20 attempts (261.9 vs. Syracuse in 2013).
  - According to ESPN Stats & Info, Klubnik became

the first FBS quarterback in the last 25 years with five or more passing touchdowns, multiple rushing touchdowns and a completion percentage of 90.0 percent or better.

- Klubnik's 378 passing yards were the most by a Clemson quarterback in a half since Trevor Lawrence's 391-yard first half at Georgia Tech in 2020.
- Despite playing only one half, Klubnik's 378 passing yards tied for the 19th-most in a game in school history. It was the most by a Clemson quarterback since Trevor Lawrence's 400 passing yards against Ohio State to end the 2020 season.
- Klubnik's five passing touchdowns set a career high, passing his previous high of four set twice last season. It was the first five-touchdown passing game by a Clemson quarterback since DJ Uiagalelei's five passing touchdowns at Wake Forest in 2022.
- Klubnik's five passing touchdowns in the first half tied a school record, matching Tajh Boyd (vs. Wake Forest in 2012 and The Citadel in 2013) and Trevor Lawrence (vs. Georgia Tech in 2020).
- Klubnik became the first Clemson quarterback to be responsible for seven combined passing and rushing touchdowns since Tajh Boyd's ACC-record eight-touchdown performance against NC State in 2011. (Note: Lamar Jackson later tied Boyd's ACC record against in 2016).
- Klubnik became the first ACC quarterback to record at least four passing touchdowns and multiple rushing touchdowns in a single half since Louisville's Lamar Jackson in 2016, according to ESPN Stats & Info. Klubnik finished with five passing touchdowns and two rushing touchdowns in the first half.
- Klubnik recorded multiple passing touchdowns and multiple rushing touchdowns in a single game for the first time in his career. He became the first Clemson quarterback to accomplish the feat since Deshaun Watson against Virginia Tech in the 2016 ACC Championship Game.
- Klubnik completed his first 13 passes of the game, the longest streak of consecutive completions in his career

### **KLUBNIK AFTER WEEK 1**

Head Coach Dabo Swinney graded Klubnik with a "B" in Clemson's disappointing season opener against Georgia, but Swinney called Klubnik's play "elite" in the two games that followed.

The statistics for Klubnik individually and for Clemson's offense as a whole on drives he led in those contests corroborate Swinney's assessment.

### SPREADING THE BALL AROUND

Offensive Coordinator Garrett Riley's scheme places importance on spreading the ball to various playmakers, and coaches have praised Klubnik's natural penchant for distributing the ball to his various weapons.

In Week 2 of 2023, Klubnik and his fellow quarterbacks completed passes to 16 different receivers, Clemson's second-most in a single game in Dabo Swinney's tenure.

Clemson's highwater mark in that category in 2024 came in its second game of the season when it completed passes to 13 different receivers against App State.

### FROM THE SIDELINE TO THE STAGE

Klubnik's national breakout came in the 2022 ACC Championship Game against North Carolina. He entered the game on Clemson's third possession and completed 20-of-24 passes for 279 yards and a passing touchdown and added seven carries for 30 yards and a rushing touchdown. His 83.3 completion percentage set an ACC Championship Game record and led to his selection as the game's Most Valuable Player in Clemson's 39-10 victory. He became the third

freshman (and second true freshman) in the game's history to earn the honor.

### 300+ IN FIRST CAREER START

In the 2022 Orange Bowl, Cade Klubnik completed 30-of-54 passes for 320 yards and also rushed 20 times for 51 yards with a touchdown. His 74 plays of total offense (combined rush attempts and pass attempts) were the fifth-most by an individual in Clemson history.

Klubnik's 320 yards were the fourth-most by a Clemson quarterback making his first career start since 1953, as he became only the fourth Clemson quarterback to exceed 300 passing yards in their first start.

Klubnik became the first Clemson freshman quarterback on record to make his starting debut in postseason play. He also became the first Clemson quarterback to make his first career start against an AP Top 6 opponent since Brandon Streeter did so against No. 5 Florida State in 1997.

Klubnik became only the eighth true freshman to start at quarterback for Clemson since the NCAA instituted permanent freshman eligibility in 1972, joining Steve Fuller (1975), Willie Jordan (1975), Patrick Sapp (1992), Nealon Greene (1994), Deshaun Watson (2014), Trevor Lawrence (2018) and DJ Uiagalelei (2020).

### **INSTANT IMPACT**

Tyler Brown's hometown of Greenville, S.C., is roughly 30 miles from Clemson, so perhaps it should have come as no surprise that he seemed to feel right at home in Clemson's offense as a true freshman in 2023.

Brown led Clemson in receptions and receiving yards that year, marking the second straight year a freshman led the team in both categories.

Brown earned ACC Rookie of the Week honors against Florida Atlantic in 2023 after recording three receptions for 49 yards and two touchdowns against the Owls, becoming the first Clemson freshman wide receiver with two receiving touchdowns in a single game since Justyn Ross against Notre Dame in the 2018 Cotton Bowl. Brown also added a 44-yard punt return in that contest. A week later, he recorded team highs and then-single-game career highs in receiving yards (84) and receptions (five) vs. No. 4 Florida State despite missing a portion of the game with a shoulder injury.

Against Syracuse the following week, he again recorded career highs in receptions (nine) and receiving yards (153). Brown's 153 receiving yards against the Orange in 2023 were the most by a Clemson true freshman since Justyn Ross' 153 yards against Alabama in the College Football Playoff National Championship Game to conclude the 2018 season.

### -- NO. 7 RB PHIL MAFAH --

### MAFAH MAN'S CAREER DAY I

Mild-mannered but hard-running, Phil Mafah was long referenced as part of a one-two punch at running back alongside his then-roommate Will Shipley for most of his career. But with Shipley out with a concussion against No. 12 Notre Dame in early November in 2023, Mafah moved from a co-starring role to featured status and ran with the opportunity.

Technically, he ran with the opportunity a school-record-tying  $36\ \text{times}.$ 

Mafah recorded a career-high 186 rushing yards on those 36 carries with two rushing touchdowns in the 31-23 win against the Irish. His 36 carries tied the school record shared by Jim Shirley (36 against NC State in 1951), Ray Yauger (36 against Wake Forest in 1969) and Raymond Priester (36 against Maryland in 1997).

Mafah's 186 yards were the most by a Clemson player

since Kobe Pace's 191-yard rushing performance against Wake Forest in 2021. It was the first 150-yard rushing game by a Clemson player since Shipley's 172-yard rushing performance against Syracuse in 2022.

"I knew going into the game that I would probably have to take a bigger load so I just came in with a mindset that whatever carries I get, I'm going to try to make the most out of each and every one," Mafah said following the defeat of Notre Dame. "I'm just glad that included a win for us."

Mafah, dubbed "Mafah Man" by Running Backs Coach C.J. Spiller, recorded career highs in rushing attempts (179), rushing yards (965), rushing touchdowns (13), receptions (21) and receiving yards (108) in 506 snaps over 13 games (five starts) in 2023.

#### MAFAH MAN'S CAREER DAY II

Mafah earned Most Valuable Player honors for the 2023 Gator Bowl after scoring a career-high four rushing touchdowns on 11 carries against Kentucky. His four rushing touchdowns in the game broke the Clemson bowl record (three by Tracy Johnson vs. Penn State in the 1988 Citrus Bowl) and the Gator Bowl record (three set by many players), as he became the first Clemson player to rush for four touchdowns in a game since C.J. Spiller against Georgia Tech in the 2009 ACC Championship Game.

Three of Mafah's Gator Bowl touchdowns came in the fourth quarter, making him the first Clemson player to score three touchdowns in any single quarter since DeAndre Hopkins against Duke in 2012. He became the first Clemson player with three touchdowns in a fourth quarter since at least 1996.

### 10+ RUSHING TDs SINCE 2015

Mafah's 13 rushing touchdowns in 2023 gave Clemson at least one player with double-digit rushing touchdowns in a ninth consecutive season. Clemson's nine consecutive seasons with at least one player with double-digit rushing touchdowns enter 2024 as the longest active streak in the country.

#### -- NO. 9 TE JAKE BRININGSTOOL --

#### **BRINNY'S BIG BREAKOUT IN 2023**

The departure of long-time trusted tight end Davis Allen after Allen's selection by the Los Angeles Rams in the 2023 NFL Draft created an opportunity for Jake Briningstool in his junior season in 2023. The Nashville-area native who was the top-ranked tight end in the 2021 recruiting class that also included Brock Bowers took advantage with a career year that included a number of record-setting performances.

Briningstool recorded career highs in receptions (50), receiving yards (498) and receiving touchdowns (five) in 2023 en route to All-ACC honors.

Briningstool turned in his first signature performance of his career to date on Oct. 21 last season, catching five passes for a school-tight-end-record 126 yards with two touchdowns against Miami (Fla.). Briningstool's 126 yards were the most in a game by an ACC tight end this season and the most by an ACC tight end (per PFF designations) since Oct. 5, 2019, when Miami's Brevin Jordan had 136 yards on two more catches against Virginia Tech.

### **CLEMSON TIGHT END HISTORY**

By scoring his 10th career touchdown in a win against North Carolina in 2023, Briningstool became the seventh tight end in school history to reach double-digit career touchdown receptions.

With two touchdowns in Clemson's win against App State on Sept. 7, Briningstool shot past Bennie Cunningham and into a tie for second in school history in that category.

In Clemson's dramatic bowl win to close 2023, Briningstool gained 91 yards on nine receptions, tying the Clemson single-game school record for receptions by a tight end, matching John McMakin (vs. Florida State in 1970) and Brandon Ford (vs. LSU in 2012). His ninth reception of the game was his 50th of the season, tying the single-season school record for receptions by a tight end set by Dwayne Allen in 2011 (50).

Clemson's tight ends combined for nine catches for 130 yards and two touchdowns in its Sept. 7 win against Appalachian State, the most receiving yards by a tight end group in a game under Dabo Swinney.

### LET'S GO, MR. WESCO

True freshman Bryant Wesco Jr. recorded one catch in 12 snaps in Clemson's season opener, as missed opportunities and inefficiency by Clemson — combined with a condensed contest that featured the fewest combined snaps (112) in a Clemson game since 2006 — limited his involvement in his collegiate debut. Afterward, Clemson's coaches vowed to involve him more the following week.

Consider that vow fulfilled.

In his second career game, Wesco caught three passes for 130 yards and a touchdown against Appalachian State, tying the Clemson record for the fewest games needed to record a 100-yard receiving game.

The group is under new leadership in 2024, as Clemson's added more than 20 years of coaching experience at the position in hiring new offensive line coach Matt Luke.

"He brings an incredible résumé and a wealth of experience and has worked with a bunch of great coaches and players over his career," Dabo Swinney said of Luke's hire. "I have no doubt he will be a great addition."

### TRENCH WARFARE

Clemson's success in its 71-14 run since 2018 has been powered in part at the line of scrimmage, where Clemson holds a 269-135 edge over opponents in sacks in that time frame. Clemson's +134 margin in sacks since 2018 is the highest differential in the country.

#### BARRETT CARTER

Though Clemson lost two-time All-America linebacker Jeremiah Trotter Jr. to the 2024 NFL Draft, Clemson's linebacking corps received a boost when 2023 All-ACC selection Barrett Carter opted to return for his senior season.

"He's one of the best football players in my 20 years at Clemson," Swinney said. "He's a pure football player. I mean, the guy can play anywhere. He could go play tailback, he could play corner, he can play safety, he can play Nickel/Sam, he can play Mike, he can play Will. He's special... He's so smart and he's got unbelievable instincts for the game."

Close observers of Clemson in 2022 quickly recognized Carter's impact in his first year as a starter, and Carter served notice of his arrival to the country with a signature performance against Louisville that year. Carter recorded eight tackles (3.5 for loss), two sacks, an interception and a pass breakup, becoming the first player to record 3.5 or more tackles for loss, 2.0 or more sacks and an interception in a game between two Power Five teams since South Carolina's Melvin Ingram against Auburn in

Carter finished 2022 credited by the coaching staff with 77 tackles (10.5 for loss), tied for third-most on the team, with 5.5 sacks, eight pass breakups, two interceptions and two forced fumbles in a unit-high 832 snaps over 13 games (all starts). His 832 snaps were the sixth-most by a Clemson linebacker on record.

Carter was one of only three players in the Power Five with at least 10 tackles for loss, 5.0 sacks, multiple interceptions and multiple forced fumbles in 2022. Before Carter and two others reached the marks in 2022, the last two Power Five players to reach Carter's numbers in all four categories were both Butkus Award winners: Georgia's Nakobe Dean (2021) and Clemson's Isaiah Simmons (2019).

No. O has also been a hero in the community. He has volunteered his time for the Our Friend Christopher organization in the memory of his late former teammate Christopher Miles, who died of a brain tumor. He also routinely reads to local elementary schools and serves as a mentor to local youth and has aspirations of one day opening a training facility for young athletes.

"I remember I was that young kid that looked up to football players," Carter said. "Now that I have the opportunity to give back, I have no choice but to do so. I just put myself in those shoes and remember when I was that kid."

### CARTER'S GATOR BOWL PERFORMANCE

Carter was a star of Clemson's thrilling 38-35 Gator Bowl win against Kentucky to close the 2023 season. Clemson's ability to outscore Kentucky 28-14 in the final frame to earn the comeback win was buoyed by Clemson's four takeaways in the fourth quarter.

Trailing by five, Carter batted a Devin Leary pass into the air, spun around and dove to secure an interception that led to a Clemson field goal. On Kentucky's very next offensive play, Carter recovered a Barion Brown fumble that led to a Phil Mafah go-ahead touchdown on the following play.

Carter's performance marked the second straight game in which a Clemson defender recorded a takeaway on consecutive plays, joining Khalil Barnes' performance at South Carolina in Clemson's regular season finale. Prior to Barnes and Carter accomplishing the feat, the last time it had been accomplished was in 1995, when future Pro Football Hall of Famer Brian Dawkins accomplished the feat against Duke.

Against Kentucky, Carter was credited with five tackles, three pass breakups, an interception, a fumble recovery and a half-sack in the game, earning selection to the AP's All-Bowl Team.

### **OPENING A CAN OF WOODAZ**

As conference and national acclaim began to accrue for Clemson's linebacking duo of Barrett Carter and Jeremiah Trotter Jr. in recent years, Dabo Swinney was quick to advise observers not to sleep on Wade Woodaz.

"He's a baller," Swinney said. "The kid is tough, physical, he can really run. He really understands the game at a high level. He played most of his [prep] career as a quarterback and as a safety, so he has a great understanding of the game. He plays really, really hard; he's a great effort guy, he's a great preparer and he loves it. He's a fun guy to coach and a fun guy to watch play because he plays the way you want everybody to play."

The first career start for versatile hybrid linebacker from Tampa actually came at safety in the 2022 ACC Championship Game. He then served as Clemson's primary Sam linebacker in the 2022 Orange Bowl.

Woodaz opened the 2023 season with a takeaway in three straight games. He recovered a muffed punt in the season opener at Duke, his second straight season opener with an impact special teams play after blocking a punt in his collegiate debut a year earlier. In Clemson's second game against Charleston Southern, he recorded his first career interception and returned it 35 yards for a touchdown to help Clemson blow the game open.

A week later against Florida Atlantic, he returned another interception 59 yards. In doing so, he became the first Clemson linebacker with an interception in consecutive games since Isaiah Simmons accomplished the feat in the ACC Championship Game and Fiesta Bowl of his Butkus Award-winning 2019 campaign.

The only Clemson player since 1996 other than Woodaz to have a takeaway in each of the team's first three games of a season was DeAndre McDaniel, Clemson's current senior defensive assistant and nickelbacks coach, who posted a takeaway in each of Clemson's first three games in 2009 en route to All-America honors that season.

### WE SEE YOU, T.J. PARKER ••

While preseason praise and accolades for Clemson's 2023 true freshmen defensive linemen were aimed primarily at defensive lineman Peter Woods, Woods' best friend, defensive end T.J. Parker, emphatically announced his arrival last season.

Parker's production behind the line of scrimmage in 2023 was the best by a first-year freshman in school history.

In his fifth career game, Parker recorded 2.0 sacks against Syracuse, factoring into three different sacks with one full sack and two split sacks. He became only the fourth Clemson freshman under Dabo Swinney to record 2.0 sacks in a game. Two of the other three — Myles Murphy and Dexter Lawrence — were eventual first round picks in the NFL Draft.

Parker is a product of Central High School in Phenix City, Ala., a school that has become a Clemson hotbed in recent years. Parker became Clemson's fourth signee (and fifth overall player including walk-on safety Caleb Nix) from Central since 2018, a pipeline that started with Justyn Ross in Clemson's 2018 recruiting class.

Parker initially committed to Penn State but coveted a Clemson offer. He decommitted from the Nittany Lions in hopes of soliciting Clemson, and Clemson's 2023 recruiting class immediately went to work.

"CV [Christopher Vizzina], Peter and a few other guys on the team, they hit me up with the eyes emoji on Instagram," Parker said. "It was like, 'You know what time it is.' I texted Coach Ski [Then-Clemson Defensive Ends Coach Lemanski Hall] the eyes emoji, the same thing they sent me, and from there we got in contact and a few days later they offered and I committed."

### THE CFP ERA'S DOMINANT DEFENSE

Since the advent of the College Football Playoff in 2014, Clemson has routinely produced one of the nation's elite defenses.

Clemson has ranked in the Top 30 in the country in total defense in all 10 seasons of the CFP era and has ranked among the Top 30 in scoring defense in each of those campaigns (including five Top 5 finishes in the category).

### **SWANSON'S SURGE**

Punter Aidan Swanson returned for his sixth year at Clemson in 2024 following a breakout campaign in his second year as Clemson's starting punter in 2023.

Last year, he improved his punting average from 2022 by roughly a yard-and-a-half and nearly doubled the rate at which he was pinning opponents inside the 20.

Swanson's 28 punts downed inside the 20 in 2023 tied Bradley Pinion's school record for punts inside the 20 in a single season (28 in 2014).

Swanson's 2023 punting average of 43.67 yards ranked fifth in a season in Clemson history and was only the second average of 43+ yards by a Clemson punter since the turn of the century. He also recorded a 41.98-yard net punting average according to the NCAA formula for the metric, the second-best mark in school history behind Dale Hatcher's 42.4 in 1984.

### **SEMINAL SWANSON SHOWINGS**

**Vs. Florida State (2023):** Swanson had a career day against Florida State on Sept. 23. His 53.2-yard average was a single-game high for his career, surpassing his 52.5-yard average against Syracuse in 2022. It was the best average by a Clemson punter with a minimum of three punts since Will Spiers' 53.6-yard average against Syracuse in 2020.

Swanson's four punts in that game included a 60-yarder in the first quarter and a 62-yarder in the third quarter. He joined Pittsburgh's Daniel Sparks (2022), Wake Forest's Dom Maggio (2019) and Miami's Pat O'Donnell (2013) as the only ACC players since 2008 with multiple 60-yard punts in a single game, according to Stats Perform.

Vs. Notre Dame (2023): Swanson placed a careerhigh five of his six punts inside the 20 against the Irish. It was the most punts placed inside the 20 by a Clemson punter since Will Spiers in the National Championship Game to end the 2019 season (five vs. LSU), earning Swanson ACC Specialist of the Week honors.

At South Carolina (2023): Swanson immediately tied his mark for punts inside the 20 in the regular season finale, dropping five punts inside the 20 in a nine-point win against South Carolina.

### THE OTHER SWINNEY DYNASTY

Like the Colquitt family punting at Tennessee, the Swinney family holding for placekicks at Clemson has become a dynasty of its own.

Head Coach Dabo Swinney's oldest son, Will, arrived

at Clemson in 2017 and immediately earned Clemson's starting holder position on placekicks. He played five seasons and a record-tying 69 games at Clemson through 2021. In those five seasons, Clemson scored 565 points on placekicks, including field goals and PATs, and he held for 555 of those 565 points. The only 10 Clemson kicking points not held by Will in his career were instead held by his brother, Drew, who was Clemson's starter at the position in 2022.

Will and Drew were succeeded by the youngest of the three Swinney boys, Clay, a redshirt sophomore who entered his second season as Clemson's starting holder in 2024. Clay's presence creates a plausible scenario in which every Clemson placekick in a full 10-year span from 2017-26 could be held by a Swinney.

Clemson's last hold by any player outside the Swinney family was on the final point of Clemson's 2016 national championship, as Seth Ryan, coincidentally also the son of a famous long-time coach (Rex Ryan), held the PAT following Hunter Renfrow's game-winning touchdown with one second remaining.

### FIRST QUARTER COMPLETE

Head Coach Dabo Swinney often likes to break the 12-game regular season into three-game "quarters" for his team. Clemson finished the first quarter of its 2024 regular season 2-1, but Clemson responded resoundingly to a disappointing loss to Georgia in the season opener.

The response was powered largely by two of Clemson's most explosive offensive performances in recent memory. Clemson scored 66 points on 712 yards against App State (9.8 yards per play) and scored 59 points on 523 yards against NC State (7.8 yards per play) in blowout victories. In doing so, Clemson scored 59 or more points in back-to-back games for only the third time in school history (59 vs. both Boston College and Wofford in 2019; 59 vs. Florida State and 77 vs. Louisville in 2018) and was one point away from scoring 60 in back-to-back games for the first time in program annals.

Despite being held to three points in its season opener, Clemson's first three games of the season have ranked among the most prolific first three games in program history. Clemson's record for points through three games is 157, set by John Heisman's 1901 team

that scored 122 points in its season opener against Guilford

Clemson's first quarter performance was powered by its performance in *literal* first quarters. Clemson drew Georgia to a 0-0 stalemate after one quarter in the opener and then proceeded to run out to first quarter leads of 35-0 and 28-0 against App State and NC State, respectively. According to ESPN, Clemson became the first FBS team in the last 20 seasons to lead by 28 or more points after the first quarter of consecutive games.

Clemson's first quarter scoring differential of +21.0 points through three games leads the nation.

### **DEFEATS IN REVIEW**

Clemson has lost 18 games since 2015. Eight of Clemson's 18 losses since 2015 — nearly 45 percent — have come against AP Top 5 teams.

The opponents to whom Clemson has lost since 2015 have a combined final record of 172-52, a winning percentage of .768. Clemson has not lost to a team that finished with a losing record since 2017 and has not lost to a team with a losing record at the time of the game since losing to 2-5 Boston College in 2010, Dabo Swinney's second full season as head coach.

Under Swinney, Clemson is also 35-6 in games in which it enters ranked lower in the AP Poll than it did in its previous contest. This includes the 2014, 2016, 2017, 2018 and 2021 season openers in which Clemson opened the season lower than its ranking from the final game of the previous campaign.

Losses to Top 5 opponents Ohio State and Georgia across the 2020 and 2021 seasons ended a streak of 127 games since losing back-to-back contests, which had been the longest active streak in the nation and the longest in ACC history.

Clemson had not lost back-to-back games in a single season since November 2011, a streak that was snapped with losses to Miami and NC State in October 2023. It snapped a streak of 161 consecutive games played in which Clemson hadn't lost back-to-back games in a single season, a Clemson record, and, at the time, the nation's longest active streak.

### RETURNING EXPERIENCE

#### OFFENSIVE BALANCE

Clemson has fielded one of the nation's most balanced offenses since 2018, averaging 261 passing yards per game and 193 rushing yards per game from 2018-23. Clemson was one of only seven power conference teams to average at least 250 passing yards and at least 190 rushing yards on a per-game basis in that span.

Clemson was perfect when exceeding both 200 rushing yards and 200 passing yards — 58-0 under Swinney and 108-0-1 all-time — until a defeat at Duke to open the 2023 season in which the Tigers reached the double-century mark in both categories. The defeat was also a statistical anomaly nationally, as from 2014 through the 2023 season opener, there had been 1,789 instances in which an FBS team had passed for 200-plus yards, rushed for 200-plus yards and given up 28 or fewer points in a single game. Teams who accomplished all three metrics were a combined 1748-41 (97.7 percent).

Clemson's 30 games reaching both 200 passing yards and 200 rushing yards since the start of the 2018 season are among the most in the country.

The approach to creating functional depth and rewarding players ready to play has been a key philosophy for Head Coach Dabo Swinney, whose own collegiate playing career was hatched as a walk-on fighting for playing time in Alabama's receiving corps.

"We're fully committed to playing guys who deserve to play," Swinney said. "You commit to a guy early in the season, and even if a guy has only played 10 percent of the snaps, when you get to game eight or nine, they've got some good experience."

Clemson has played 100+ players in a game five times under Dabo Swinney, including a 106-player effort against App State on Sept. 7. Two weeks later, Clemson set its Swinney-era record for most players played against a power conference opponent when 96 players appeared against NC State.

#### **FINISH**

In 2018, Clemson debuted a new version of its "This is Why We Work" fourth quarter video at Death Valley, a hype video imploring the team to finish and featuring Director of Strength and Conditioning Joey Batson bellowing:

"Let me tell you something right now: they don't put championship rings on smooth hands! You gotta go earn it! You gotta go earn it six seconds at a time! You win championships when the stadium is empty, when the band ain't playing, when the cheerleaders ain't cheering, when it's just you and your brothers right beside you. That's when you win championships! In the fourth quarter, that is when we shine!"

The video and the speech became a part of Clemson lore, buoyed by its playing during Clemson's comeback win against Syracuse that year en route to a 15-0 national championship season. Over the years, the video has changed but the speech remains the same, with many Clemson fans yelling it in unison as it plays.

Clemson holds a 137-4 record since 2011 when leading after three quarters. And though Head Coach Dabo Swinney frequently reiterates the phrase, "There is nothing less important than the score at halftime," Clemson has the second-best winning percentage in the nation among power conference teams since 2017 in games in which it leads at halftime. Clemson has recorded a halftime lead in 78 games in that span, the most in the nation.

### ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

- Entering the 2024 fall semester, of the 381 eligible players who completed their athletic eligibility at Clemson and/or graduated early in Dabo Swinney's 15+ full years as head coach, 375 (98.4 percent) have earned a degree during their time at Clemson.
- Clemson broke program multi-year APR records in three straight years from 2017-19 (987 in 2016-17, 992 in 2017-18 and 993 in 2018-19) before the NCAA suspended APR reporting during the COVID-19 pandemic. Upon reinstatement of APR reporting in June 2022, Clemson shattered its multi-year APR record with a 999 covering the 2017-18 through 2020-21 academic years.
- Most recently, Clemson posted a 995 multi-year APR covering 2019-20 through 2022-23, fifth-best in the FBS. Clemson's lofty academic success in that period coincided with on-field excellence that included three ACC titles, two College Football Playoff berths and a national championship game berth.

- Clemson, Air Force and Northwestern are the only FBS programs to produce a 990+ multi-year APR in each of the last five reported cycles.
- Clemson was the only program in the country to finish among the Top 25 in APR rate among FBS schools and the AP Top 25 in all 12 years covering the 2011-22 seasons. Clemson finished in the AP Top 25 in 2023 as well and is awaiting APR reporting for that academic year.
- Prior to the suspension of APR Public Recognition Awards following the COVID-19 pandemic, the NCAA recognized Clemson with its annual honor, which is bestowed upon programs ranking in the Top 10 percent of their respective sports, for nine of the award's last 10 reported academic cycles. Only 37 of the 130 FBS programs earned at least one APR recognition across the 2009-10 through 2018-19 academic years. Only 30 programs earned it multiple times. Clemson, Duke and Northwestern were the only ones to earn the award 9+ times in that 10-year span.
- With its award for the 2018-19 academic year, Clemson became the only FBS program since the NCAA created the APR metric in 2003 to win a national championship and an APR Public Recognition Award in the same year multiple times. Alabama is the only other school to accomplish the title/APR double in a single year once (2011-12 academic year).

Clemson earned a team 3.03 GPA during the 2023 season, the second-highest fall GPA in program history and its fourth semester in a row with a team GPA of 3.0 or better. A total of 87 individuals earned a 3.0 GPA or better, the second-highest number of 3.0+ GPAs in program history. That included 18 perfect 4.0s.

- Clemson has had 80+ individuals earn a 3.0 or better GPA in five consecutive semesters.

### HISTORIC GRADUATION SUCCESS RATE

Aided in part by a historically elite academic performance by Clemson Football, Clemson Athletics topped the nation among public power conference institutions in Graduation Success Rate (GSR) with a 97 percent mark for the 2013-16 cohort in data released by the NCAA in December 2023. Clemson Football set a new program record of 99 percent, which led all of Division I.

Football's 99 percent mark was the highest GSR score for any power conference football program since the 2018-19 release, and the highest ever recorded among public power conference football programs in the 19 years the NCAA has tracked the metric. The previous GSR record for a public power conference program was 96 by multiple schools.

- Clemson has produced at least five selections five times in the last six NFL Drafts, including six selections in 2019, seven selections in 2020, five selections in 2021, six in 2023 and six in 2024. Clemson has produced at least five picks nine times in the last  $11 \, \mathrm{drafts}$ ; only Alabama (11) and Ohio State (10) have done so more times in that span.
- Clemson has now had at least one first-round draft choice in 10 of the last 12 years, standing alongside Alabama, Florida, Georgia and Ohio State as the only programs to produce a first-round pick in at least 10 of the last 12 years.
- Clemson has produced at least one Top 50 pick in 17 of the last 19 NFL Drafts, dating to 2006. The only drafts in that span in which Clemson did not produce a Top 50 pick were in 2009 and 2018. Florida (18), Clemson (17), Alabama (17), Ohio State (17) and USC (17) are the only schools to enter the 2024 NFL Draft having produced at least one Top 50 pick in at least 17 of the last 19 NFL Drafts.
- Since 2013, Clemson has produced first-round picks from the QB, RB, WR, DE, DT, LB and DB position groups. The only other school with at least one firstrounder at all those positions in that span is Alabama.
- Clemson has had at least one player chosen by 30 of the 32 NFL franchises since 2003. Head Coach Dabo Swinney has produced a draft pick for 28 of the 32 NFL teams in his head coaching tenure.
- Clemson has had at least one player selected in 22 consecutive drafts since 2003, representing the second-longest streak in school history behind a 24year streak across the 1951-74 NFL Drafts.
- Clemson is one of only six schools to have produced multiple draft picks in each of the last 22 NFL Drafts (LSU, Michigan, Oklahoma, Ohio State and USC).

# **2024 GAME RECAPS**

**CLEMSON** 3 GAME 34 **GEORGIA** AUG. 31, 2024 MERCEDES-BENZ STADIUM • ATLANTA, GA

ATLANTA - No. 1 Georgia used a 28-3 second half run to pull away No. 14 Clemson, 34-3, in the Aflac Kickoff Game at Mercedes-Benz Stadium in Atlanta.

Linebacker Wade Woodaz led Clemson with a career-high eight tackles (seven solo, one for loss), while sophomore defensive lineman Peter Woods added a career-high 2.5 tackles for loss. Antonio Williams led Clemson's offense with six receptions for 76 yards.

The game was scoreless after the first quarter, as the teams traded punts on each of the game's first five possessions. Second-quarter field goals of 30 and 55 yards by Peyton Woodring gave Georgia a 6-0 halftime edge. The tightly contested first half featured only 50 combined plays from scrimmage, 10 combined first downs and eight combined punts.

Georgia extended its lead to 13-0 on the opening possession of the second half when Carson Beck found Colbie Young for a seven-yard touchdown. Clemson scored on its first possession of the second half when freshman Nolan Hauser made a 26-yard field goal, the first of his collegiate career, to cut the lead to 13-3. However, Georgia extended its advantage to 20-3 with 3:15 remaining in the third quarter on a one-yard touchdown run by Nate Frazier.

Georgia's London Humphreys added a 40-yard touchdown reception on a pass from Beck with 9:57 to play in the fourth quarter to make the score 27-3 in favor of the Bulldogs. An interception by Georgia's Malaki Starks — the game's lone takeaway — set up Cash Jones to cap the ensuing Georgia drive with a 15-yard rushing touchdown, pushing the final score to 34-3.

CLEMSON — Clemson scored a touchdown on each of its first eight possessions of the first half to ride a 35-0 first quarter lead and 56-13 halftime edge to a 66-20 win against Appalachian State in Death Valley.

Cade Klubnik earned Walter Camp National Offensive Player of the Week and Davey O'Brien National Quarterback of the Week for his performance in which he completed 24-of-26 passes for 378 yards and five passing touchdowns and rushed for two additional touchdowns in only one half of play. According to ESPN, he became the only FBS player win the last 25 years to record five passing touchdowns, two rushing touchdowns and a completion rate of 90 percent or better in a game.

Clemson's 712 yards of offense were the sixth-most in school history. That total included a school-record 525 yards in the first half. Clemson's 35 first-quarter points were the most in a first quarter in school history, and its 56 first-half points were a modern record for the program.

Clemson recorded its first game with a 300-yard passer (Klubnik), a 100-yard rusher (Phil Mafah) and two 100-yard receivers (Bryant Wesco Jr. & Jake Briningstool) since 2012 against NC State when Clemson had a 300-yard passer (Tajh Boyd), two 100-yard rushers (Andre Ellington and Tajh Boyd) and two 100-yard receivers (Sammy Watkins and Brandon Ford).

CLEMSON — Clemson earned its 800th victory in program history with a 59-35 victory against NC State at Memorial Stadium. Clemson became the 14th FBS program and first ACC team ever to reach 800 wins.

Quarterback Cade Klubnik completed 16-of-24 passes for 209 yards with three passing touchdowns and added four carries for a career-high 70 rushing yards and one rushing touchdown. Running back Phil Mafah rushed seven times for 107 yards with a touchdown. Clemson's first-team offense scored points on eight of its nine drives, including seven touchdowns and one field.

Clemson raced out to a 28-0 first-quarter lead, becoming the first FBS team in 20 years of accessible ESPN data to hold a lead of 28 or more points after the first quarter of consecutive games. After NC State got on the board early in the second quarter, Clemson scored an additional 17 points to give the Tigers a 45-7 halftime advantage.

Adam Randall caught his first career touchdown on Clemson's first drive of the third quarter and defensive back Ashton Hampton scored on a 53-yard pick-six to push the score to 59-14 after three guarters. NC State would add 21 points against Clemson's backups in the fourth quarter to pull the final score to 59-35.
