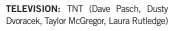

CLEMSON EMBARKS UPON SEVENTH CFP RUN SATURDAY AT TEXAS

After three years away, Clemson will officially return to the College Football Playoff on Saturday, Dec. 21, when the 12th-seeded Tigers face the fifth-seeded Texas Longhorns in the first meeting in history between the two powerhouses. Kickoff at Darrell K Royal-Texas Memorial Stadium in Austin, Texas is scheduled for 4 p.m. ET/3 p.m. CT.

This season, Clemson earned its seventh College Football Playoff berth since the format's inception in 2014. Clemson's seven berths trail only Alabama (eight) for the most in the nation. Clemson Head Coach Dabo Swinney's seven CFP berths are the most of any active coach and one shy of Nick Saban (eight) for the most of any coach all-time.

Clemson earned its berth after winning the 2024 ACC Championship Game and securing its 13th season with 10 or more wins in the last 14 years. The Tigers collected a dramatic 34-31 walk-off win in the ACC Championship Game to extend their FBS-record streak of consecutive years with a postseason win (conference championships and/or bowl/CFP games) to 14 seasons.

After the first decade of the College Football Playoff featured every game being played at a neutral site, this year marks the first time that games will be played on campus sites. During the regular season, Clemson recorded a perfect record in true road games for the 10th time in program history (1900, 1917, 1948, 1981, 1995, 2015, 2016, 2018 and 2019). The Tigers are one of eight FBS teams with a perfect record in true road games this season, alongside Oregon, Notre Dame, Army, Penn State, SMU, Louisiana and Texas.

Texas edge rusher Colin Simmons (12.5) and Clemson linebacker Sammy Brown (10.5) rank first and second in the nation, respectively, in tackles for loss by freshmen this season.

WHAT TO WATCH FOR THIS WEEK

- Clemson (seven) entering the game as one of only two teams ever to earn seven College Football Playoff berths since the institution of the postseason format in 2014 (Alabama. 8).
- Head Coach Dabo Swinney (6-4) attempting to join Nick Saban (9-5) as the only coaches ever to win at least seven College Football Playoff games.
- Clemson entering the game having won at least one postseason game (conference championship, bowl game and/or national championship game) in 14 consecutive seasons. Clemson's current 14-year streak is the longest streak on record in major college football history.
- Clemson attempting to win multiple postseason games (conference championship, bowl game and/or national championship game) in a single season for the fifth time in school history (two in 2015, three in 2016, three in 2018 and two in 2019).
- Clemson attempting to produce its 12th 11-win season in program history, joining the 1948, 1978, 1981, 2012, 2013, 2015, 2016, 2017, 2018, 2019 and 2022 seasons. It would be Clemson's ninth season of 11-plus wins under Head Coach Dabo Swinney.
- Clemson attempting to win an 11th game this season to tie for the seventh-most wins in a season in school history.
- Clemson attempting to improve to 28-23 all-time in bowl/CFP play.
- Clemson facing Texas for the first time in program history.
- Clemson playing consecutive games in a single season against opponents it had never previously faced for the first time since 1952, a year in which the Tigers made their series debuts against Villanova and Maryland in consecutive weeks.
- Clemson facing its 110th different opponent in program history. Clemson is 67-38-4 all-time in its first meeting with its 109 existing opponents, including an 18-1 mark in first meetings since 2003. Clemson has won 20 of its last 22 games when making its all-time debut against a new opponent.
- Texas becoming the 22nd opponent Clemson faced for the first time in postseason play, joining Boston College (1939), Missouri (1948), Colorado (1956), LSU (1958), TCU (1959), Pitt (1977), Ohio State (1978), Baylor (1979), Nebraska (1981), Minnesota (1985), Stanford (1986), Penn State (1987), West Virginia (1989), Illinois (1990), Cal (1991), Syracuse (1995), Louisiana Tech (2001), Texas Tech (2002), South Florida (2010), Iowa State (2021) and SMU (2024).
- Clemson playing multiple games against teams from Texas in a single season for the first time in school history.
- Clemson attempting to improve to 8-6 all-time in games played in Texas.
- Clemson attempting to improve to 4-0 all-time in postseason games in the state of Texas. Clemson previously won bowl games in Texas in the 1939 (Cotton Bowl vs. Boston College), 1959 (Bluebonnet Bowl vs. TCU) and 2018 (Cotton Bowl vs. Notre Dame) seasons.
- Clemson attempting to earn its highest-ranked road win in school history. To date, Clemson's 21 highest-ranked wins in school history have come in 15 neutral-site games and six home games. A win against AP No. 3 Texas would surpass Clemson's wins against eighth-ranked North Carolina in 1981 and eighth-ranked Miami (Fla.) in 2009 as the Tigers' highest-ranked road win according to AP Poll rankings.
- Clemson attempting to earn its 32nd all-time victory against an AP Top 10 opponent.
 - Clemson attempting to improve to 19-1 in December

games since 2011. Among teams that have been at the FBS level in that entire time span, Clemson's current .947 December winning percentage is the second-highest in the nation behind Alabama (15-0, 1.000).

- Clemson attempting to improve to 31-14 all-time in games played in the month of December.
- Head Coach Dabo Swinney (180-46) entering the game as one of seven coaches in FBS history to win 180 games within the first 20 seasons of a head coaching career. In only his 17th season (and 16th full season), Swinney (180) trails only Tom Osborne (195), Nick Saban (191), Bob Stoops (191), Joe Paterno (187), Urban Meyer (187) and LaVell Edwards (183) in that category. (Note: Stoops and Meyer are not credited on the NCAA's official list of most wins through 20 seasons since they did not coach 20 years.)
- Swinney adding to his ACC record for most bowl/CFP games coached (21, including Saturday's game). A win would push him to 13-8 in bowl/CFP play and add to his current record for the most bowl victories by an ACC head coach.
 - Clemson attempting to improve to 41-27 under Swin-

ney against AP Top 25 teams.

- Clemson attempting to improve to 35-19 under Swinney in games in which both teams rank in the AP Top 25.
- Swinney attempting to improve to 20-13 against AP Top 10 teams.
- Clemson attempting to improve to 170-74-3 all-time (and 53-8 since 2011) when facing a coach for the first time
- Clemson (462) needing 38 points to record the eighth 500-point season in school history. It would be Clemson's first 500-point season since 2020 (522).
- Clemson entering the game ranked in the Top 20 nationally in both total offense (12th, 454.9 yards per game) and scoring offense (tied for 16th, 35.5 points per game).
- Clemson entering the game alongside Louisville as one of only two teams in the nation to average both 270 passing yards per game (274.1) and 180 rushing yards per game (180.9).
- Clemson (5,914) needing 86 yards of offense to produce the 10th 6,000-yard season in school history. It would be Clemson's first 6,000-yard season since

2020 (6,028).

- Clemson (3,563) sitting 437 passing yards shy of recording the eighth 4,000-yard passing season in team history.
- Clemson (939) needing 61 offensive plays to reach 1,000 in a season for the 10th time in school history.
- Clemson attempting to record a fourth 50-point performance in a season for the sixth time in school history (seven in 2019, five in 2013, four in 2016, four in 2006 and four in 2018).
- Clemson attempting to produce a seventh 40-point game in a season for the eighth time in school history (10 in 2019, nine in 2018, eight in 2020, eight in 2013, eight in 2012, seven in 2015 and seven in 2016).
- Clemson attempting to score 28 or more points in a quarter for the fourth time this season to match the school record set in 2012 (four). So far this season, Clemson has recorded a 35-point first quarter against Appalachian State, a 28-point first quarter against NC State and a 28-point second quarter against Wake Forest.
- Clemson attempting to record a seventh 500-yard game in a single season for the first time since 2019 (10).
- Clemson attempting to reach both 200 passing yards and 200 rushing yards in a game for the seventh time this season. Clemson (six) is tied with Penn State and Tennessee for the national lead in this category in 2024
- Clemson attempting to record its first season with at least seven games with both 200 rushing yards and 200 passing yards since 2019. It would be Clemson's fourth such season in school history (10 in 2019, eight in 2015, seven in 2018).
- Clemson (six) attempting to post seven 200-yard rushing games in a single season for the first time since 2019 (10)
- Clemson (two) attempting to produce a 300-yard passer, 100-yard rusher and 100-yard receiver in three games in a single season for the first time in school history.
- Clemson entering the game having scored at least one rushing touchdown in a national-best 87 of its 95 games since the start of the 2018 season. Clemson has also rushed for multiple touchdowns in a national-best 72 games in that span.
- Clemson entering the game +16 in turnover margin, the eighth-best margin in school history. Clemson is tied for second nationally and one off the national lead (+17, James Madison).
- Clemson attempting to win the turnover margin for a sixth straight game. It would be Clemson's first time winning the turnover margin in six straight contests since a nine-game streak in 2019.
- Clemson attempting to finish even or better in the turnover margin in a 13th straight game for the first time since a 17-game streak across the 1989-90 seasons. Dating to last season, Clemson has lost the turnover margin only once in its last 18 games.
- Clemson attempting to record multiple takeaways in six straight games for the first time since the first six games of the 2013 season.
- Clemson (nine) entering the game as one of only 14 teams with single-digit giveaways this season.
- Clemson attempting to play back-to-back games without a giveaway for the second time this season (at Florida State and at Wake Forest).
- Clemson attempting to play a sixth game without a giveaway in a single season for the first time since 2019 (six).
- Clemson attempting to play back-to-back penalty-free games for the first time on record.
 - Safety Khalil Barnes attempting to record an

interception in three straight games for the first time in his career. The last time a Clemson player recorded a pick in three straight contests was 2009, when both DeAndre McDaniel (first three games of the season) and Rashard Hall (four straight contests across games 5-8) accomplished the feat.

- Barnes (four) attempting to add to his single-season career high in interceptions.
- Barnes (four) attempting to produce the first fiveinterception season by a Clemson player since Jadar Johnson picked off five passes in 2016.
- Barnes (seven from 2023-24) attempting to become the first Clemson player with eight or more interceptions across freshman and sophomore seasons since Rashard Hall recorded eight in his first two years across the 2009-10 seasons.
- Tight end Jake Briningstool (123) entering the game as the Clemson record holder for career receptions by a tight end.
- Briningstool (123) needing two more receptions to become the ninth tight end in ACC history to record 125 career receptions.
- Briningstool (45) needing five receptions to match his single-season career high set last year (50). His 50 receptions a year ago tied Dwayne Allen's 50 catches in 2011 for the Clemson record for receptions by a tight end in a single season.
- Briningstool (461) needing 38 receiving yards to break his single-season career high of 498, set in 2023.
- Briningstool (461) needing 39 receiving yards to post the sixth 500-yard receiving season by a tight end in Clemson history.
- Briningstool (17) needing one touchdown catch to tie or two touchdown catches to break Jordan Leggett's school record for career receiving touchdowns by a tight end (18 from 2013-16).
- Briningstool (17) needing one touchdown catch to tie or two touchdown catches to pass Clemson's Jordan Leggett (18 from 2013-16) and Louisville's Marshon Ford (2018-22) for the fourth-most career receiving touchdowns by a tight end in ACC history.
- Briningstool (seven) needing one touchdown to tie or two touchdowns to break the Clemson single-season record for touchdown receptions by a tight end. The record of eight is shared presently by Jordan Leggett (2015), Brandon Ford (2012) and Dwayne Allen (2011).
- Briningstool seeking to add to his school records for 100-yard receiving games by a tight end in a season (two) and career (three).
- Briningstool (two touchdowns vs. both Appalachian State and SMU) attempting to become the first Clemson tight end to catch multiple touchdowns in three games in a single season.
- Linebacker Sammy Brown (10.5) entering bowl season ranked second nationally in tackles for loss among freshmen
- Brown (10.5) chasing the school record for tackles for loss by a true freshman. He presently trails T.J. Parker (12.5 in 2023), Myles Murphy (12.0 in 2020) and Anthony Simmons (11.0 in 1995).
- Brown (5.0) chasing Dexter Lawrence (7.0 in 2016), Tyler Davis (6.5 in 2019) and T.J. Parker (5.5 in 2023) on Clemson's all-time leaderboard for sacks by a true freshman.
- Cornerback Ashton Hampton (one) and defensive tackle Payton Page (one) each attempting to join Arlington Nunn (three in 1990) and Dorian O'Daniel (two in 2017) as the only Clemson players since 1950 to record multiple interception returns for touchdowns in a season.
- Kicker Nolan Hauser (17-of-23) needing two more field goals to tie or three more field goals to break Chris Gardocki's school record for field goals made by a true

- Hauser (107) entering the game ranked tied for 10th in school history in kicking points scored in a single season. He needs eight points to become the fourth player in school history to reach 115 points via kick in a single season, joining Greg Huegel (137 in 2015), Chandler Catanzaro (118 in 2011) and B.T. Potter (118 in 2019 and 115 in 2020).
- Quarterback Cade Klubnik (19-8) attempting to become the 11th Clemson player to win 20 games as a starting quarterback since World War II, joining Trevor Lawrence (34-2), Deshaun Watson (32-3), Tajh Boyd (32-8), Rodney Williams (32-10-2), Charlie Whitehurst (25-15), Nealon Greene (24-16), Homer Jordan (22-6-1), DJ Uiagalelei (22-6), Mike Eppley (21-5-1) and Steve Fuller (21-11-3).
- Klubnik attempting to become the first Clemson quarterback to throw four touchdown passes in consecutive games since Deshaun Watson accomplished the feat against Louisville and Boston College in 2016.
- Klubnik (three) attempting to tie Tajh Boyd's team record for most four-touchdown passing games in a season (four in 2013).
- Klubnik (33) entering the game third in the nation in passing touchdowns.
- Klubnik (33) entering the game tied for sixth in team history in passing touchdowns in a single season. He is within three touchdowns of second place, trailing a 34-touchdown season by Tajh Boyd (2014) for fifth, a 35-touchdown season by Deshaun Watson (2015) for fourth, and 36-touchdown seasons by Boyd (2012) and Trevor Lawrence (2019) for second.
- Klubnik entering the game ranked third in the nation in touchdowns responsible for (40 33 passing, seven rushing).
- Klubnik (67) needing two combined rushing or passing touchdowns to pass Woodrow Dantzler (68 from 1998-2001) for fifth on Clemson's all-time leaderboard for career touchdown responsibility.
- Klubnik (40) chasing No. 6 Tajh Boyd (44 in 2011) and No. 4 Trevor Lawrence (45 in 2019) on Clemson's all-time leaderboard for touchdown responsibility in a single season.

- Defensive end T.J. Parker (career-high 11.0) needing one sack to become the first Clemson player to record at least 12 sacks in a season since Shaq Lawson (12.5) and Kevin Dodd (12.0) in 2015.
- Parker (11.0) entering the game ranked ninth in sacks in a single season in Clemson history. He needs 1.5 sacks to enter the Top 5 in school history, as Gaines Adams (12.5 in 2006) and Shaq Lawson (12.5 in 2015) are presently tied for fourth.
- Parker (19.0) needing one tackle for loss to become the first Clemson player to reach 20.0 tackles for loss in a season since both Shaq Lawson and Kevin Dodd accomplished the feat in 2015.
- Parker (six) entering the game holding the Clemson record for forced fumbles in a single season. He is tied for the national lead in that category in 2024.

CFP STAPLES

From 2014-23, Clemson cemented itself as one of the College Football Playoff's powerhouses of the tournament's inaugural decade. In the 10-year history of the four-team format prior to 2024, only 15 programs earned at least one College Football Playoff berth, and Clemson ranked second in CFP berths, CFP title game appearances, total CFP wins and CFP titles.

Clemson returned to the College Football Playoff in 2024 in the format's first year of expansion to 12 teams and is now one berth shy of Alabama (eight) for the most in history.

With a No. 16 ranking in the final College Football Playoff rankings in 2024, Clemson remained one of three programs (alongside Alabama and Ohio State) to finish in the CFP Top 25 in every year since the tournament's inception.

Among the 15 programs ever to qualify for the College Football Playoff in its inaugural decade from 2014-23, Clemson was one of only five to hold a positive point differential in CFP play. Clemson also entered this year's CFP owning three of the eight largest wins by point differential in CFP history and is the only program to win three CFP games by at least 25 points.

BOWL/CFP SUCCESS UNDER SWINNEY

Clemson has posted an 12-8 bowl/CFP record under Head Coach Dabo Swinney, including an 11-5 mark in its last 16 bowl games dating back to the 2012 season. Swinney is the ACC record holder for both career bowl games coached (20) and bowl games won (12).

Many of Clemson's 11 bowl wins since 2012 have

not come against run-of-the-mill opponents. Eight of Swinney's 11 bowl victories in that span have come against head coaches with national championship victories to their credit at various levels of NCAA play, including two wins each against Nick Saban, Urban Meyer and Bob Stoops, as well as single victories against Les Miles and Brian Kelly. Four of those coaches won FBS titles, while Kelly was a two-time champion at the Division II level

CLEMSON-TEXAS CONNECTIONS

- Chris Rumph: Clemson's defensive ends coach served as Texas' assistant head coach and defensive line coach in 2014, helping defensive tackle Malcom Brown earn consensus All-America honors.
- Andrew Mukuba: The current Texas safety spent the first three seasons of his college career at Clemson before returning to his hometown of Austin. He was credited with 149 tackles (4.5 for loss), a sack, 20 pass breakups, two fumble recoveries and an interception in 1,734 snaps over 35 games (31 starts) at Clemson from 2021-23, earning 2021 ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year and helping the Tigers to the 2022 ACC title.

HIGH SCHOOL REMATCH

Though Saturday's game will be the first matchup all-time between Clemson and Texas, it will not be the first meeting of the game's two high-profile Lone Star State quarterbacks.

In consecutive years in 2021 and 2022, Texas' Quinn Ewers (Southlake Carroll High School) and Clemson's Cade Klubnik (Austin Westlake High School) were ranked by Rivals as the nation's No. 1 pro-style quarterbacks in their respective recruiting classes. Before Ewers departed for Ohio State and eventually Texas and before Klubnik left for Clemson, the two met in the Texas Class 6A Division I state championship at

AT&T Stadium on Jan. 16, 2021.

Klubnik's Austin Westlake squad won its second of three consecutive state titles in his prep career in that contest, defeating Ewers' Southlake Carroll squad by a final score of 52-34. Ewers recorded 351 passing yards and three touchdowns. Klubnik accounted for 317 yards of total offense and was responsible for three touchdowns in the win. Klubnik completed 18-of-20 passes for 220 yards and a touchdown and added 97 yards on 17 carries with two rushing touchdowns to earn Offensive Most Valuable Player honors.

Ewers had three turnovers (two interceptions and a fumble) in the game. Ironically, both interceptions were recorded by current Texas teammate Michael Taaffe.

CLEMSON VS. NEW OPPONENTS

Texas will be the 110th different opponent faced by Clemson all-time. Clemson holds a 67-38-4 all-time record when facing an opponent for the first time, including a 1-0 mark this season in its series debut vs. SMU.

Clemson has won 18 of its last 19 games when making its all-time debut against a new opponent, dating back to 2003. The team's lone debut loss in that time frame came against South Florida in the 2010 Meineke Car Care Bowl in Charlotte, N.C., the last game before Clemson embarked upon its active streak of 14 consecutive nine-win seasons.

Clemson is 21-15 against SEC foes under the guidance of Head Coach Dabo Swinney, and the Tigers are 15-9 against the conference in the College Football Playoff era.

Clemson's 21 wins against SEC opponents under Swinney include wins against South Carolina (9), Auburn (4), Alabama (2), Kentucky (2), Texas A&M (2), Georgia (1) and LSU (1). Clemson also has two wins against Oklahoma under Swinney prior to Oklahoma's move to the SEC.

A RETURN TO AUSTIN

With 180 career victories, Dabo Swinney enters Saturday's game as the winningest coach in ACC history, but in the spring of 2009, the interim head coach turned full-time head coach was sitting on four career wins and looking to glean insight on how he wanted to structure his program.

Upon that transition from interim head coach to fulltime head coach, Swinney sought counsel from some of the sport's top leaders at the time: Texas' Mack Brown. Swinney once expounded upon a cold call to Brown in early 2009 that helped launch an era at Clemson:

"I reached out to several coaches to try to go visit just, really, prominent head coaches that I didn't know but I felt like they did things the right way and I just wanted to go and pick their brain. And Mack was the only one that said OK.

"I didn't really know Mack, but I just remember calling him up and left a message. He called me back. And he was just very congratulatory. He said, 'Man, I'm really happy for you. I actually kept up with you,' which I thought was kind of cool that Mack Brown was paying attention to what the interim guy was doing at Clemson. He said, 'Heck, yeah, come on out.' And so I did, brought the whole staff.

"And it was awesome. It was great. Their staff was very gracious. And I was just hoping to get a little bit of time with him, and he spent several hours with me. I'll always be so grateful for that. I mean, here's a guy that has 'been there, done that' numerous times. And I just had a lot of specific things that I wanted to pick his brain on and took pages of notes and just had great conversation and came away with some confirmation and came away with maybe some different thoughts as well. So it was just an incredibly meaningful meeting for me as we came back and really kind of kicked our new program off going into that first spring.

"The biggest takeaway? Probably just be who I am. And just time management, that had been a real challenge. Going from the interim, as you can imagine, and just trying to figure out where I needed to put my time, because there's a lot of plates spinning. So he was just... he was great in all aspects. That was probably two of the biggest things right there, was just kind of managing my time a little better, being able to say no, just kind of talking to him about how he managed some certain things and requests. It can be a little overwhelming. And then just being who I am."

TIGERS IN TEXAS

Saturday's contest will mark Clemson's 14th game in the state of Texas in program history. Clemson is 7-6 all-time in games played in the Lone Star State.

Clemson won its first game in the state of Texas on Jan. 1, 1940 in the Cotton Bowl. The Tigers defeated Boston College, 6-3, in Clemson's first win over a ranked team when the Eagles were ranked 11th in the nation with a 9-1 record entering the game.

Clemson's most recent visit to Texas also came in College Football Playoff play. In 2018, Clemson routed Notre Dame, 30-3, in the College Football Playoff National Semifinal at the Cotton Bowl Classic as part of the Tigers' 15-0 national championship campaign.

The Tigers are 3-0 all-time in postseason games in Texas, including wins in the Cotton Bowl to during the 1939 and 2018 seasons and in the Bluebonnet Bowl to end 1959.

NOTES FROM LAST GAME

- The victory was the first walk-off win in ACC Championship Game history.
- Kicker Nolan Hauser gave the Tigers the win with a career-long 56-yard field goal as time expired. The snap and hold on the kick were provided by Holden Caspersen and Clay Swinney, respectively.
- Hauser became the first Clemson player to kick a game-winning walk-off field goal since Chandler Catanzaro hit a 37-yard field goal to beat LSU to end the 2012 Chick-Fil-A Bowl.
- Hauser's 56-yard field goal was the longest gamewinning field goal as time expired in Clemson history.
- Hauser's 56-yard field goal was the fourth-longest field goal in Clemson history but its longest away from Death Valley. It was also the longest field goal in postseason play in Clemson history.
- Hauser became the first FBS player ever to win a conference championship game by kicking a field goal of 50 or more yards as time expired.
- Hauser's 56-yard field goal was the longest in ACC Championship Game history, surpassing a 52-yarder by B.T. Potter in 2022 against North Carolina.
- Hauser hit the game-winning field goal in his home metro area. His hometown of Cornelius, N.C. is roughly 20 miles north of Bank of America Stadium in Charlotte.
- With 10 points in the game, Hauser (107), who already owned the Clemson record for points by a true

freshman, became the first Clemson player to score 100 points in a true freshman season. He reached the century mark for the season on his third PAT of the first quarter.

- Quarterback Cade Klubnik completed 24-of-41 passes for 262 yards and four passing touchdowns, earning Most Valuable Player honors.
- Klubnik became only the third player ever to win multiple ACC Championship Game MVP honors (Deshaun Watson and Tyrod Taylor, two each). Despite a 9-1 record in ACC Championship Games, Clemson has produced the ACC Championship Game MVP in all 10 of its title game appearances, including C.J. Spiller earning the honor in a Clemson loss in 2009.
- Klubnik engineered his fourth career game-winning drive, including his third as a starter and the second of his career in postseason play.
- Klubnik's four passing touchdowns tied the ACC Championship Game record set by Trevor Lawrence in the 2019 ACC Championship Game against Virginia.
- With a three-touchdown first quarter, Klubnik became the first player to throw three touchdown passes in any single quarter in ACC Championship Game history.
- In two career ACC Championship Games, Klubnik has completed 44-of-65 passes for 541 yards with five passing touchdowns and six total touchdowns responsible for.
- Klubnik (33) has now recorded the eighth 30-touchdown passing season by a Clemson quarterback all-time and the first since Trevor Lawrence in 2019 (36).
- Klubnik (33) tied Tajh Boyd (33 in 2011) for sixth on Clemson's all-time leaderboard for touchdown passes in a single season.
- Klubnik (40) also passed Boyd (38 in 2011) for sixth on Clemson's all-time leaderboard for touchdown responsibility in a single season.
- Klubnik (3,303) now stands eighth on Clemson's alltime leaderboard for passing yards in a single season.
- Klubnik (3,761) has now posted the ninth individual season with 3,500 yards of total offense in school history.
- During the game, Klubnik (7,623) became the sixth player in Clemson history to reach 7,500 career yards of total offense
- With the win, Klubnik (19-8) tied DeChane Cameron (19-4-1 from 1988-91) and Woodrow Dantzler (19-11 from 1998-2001) for the 11th-most wins by a starting quarterback since World War II.
- Wide receiver Bryant Wesco Jr. recorded career highs in receptions (eight), receiving yards (143) and receiving touchdowns (two).
- Wesco recorded his third 100-yard receiving game of his debut campaign to join Sammy Watkins (five in 2011), Artavis Scott (four in 2014), DeAndre Hopkins (three in 2010) and Justyn Ross (three in 2018) to become the fifth Clemson true freshman with three or more 100-yard receiving games since the NCAA instituted permanent freshman eligibility in 1972.
- Wesco's third 100-yard receiving game of the season tied Tulsa's Joseph Williams and Ohio State's Jeremiah Smith for the most in the nation among true freshmen this year.
- The multi-touchdown game was the first of Wesco's career and the first time a Clemson freshman had caught multiple touchdowns in a game since Tyler Brown's two touchdowns against Florida Atlantic in September 2023.
- Wesco's 143 receiving yards tied Danny Coale of Virginia Tech (2010 against Florida State) for the second-most in an ACC Championship Game. The performance trailed only Tee Higgins' 182 receiving yards in the 2019 ACC Championship Game against Virginia in conference history
- Wesco's 143 receiving yards were the most by a freshman in ACC Championship Game history, passing

the 101 posted by Clemson's Cole Turner against North Carolina in 2022

- Wesco became the first Clemson freshman to catch multiple touchdowns in a postseason game since Justyn Ross caught two touchdowns against Notre Dame in the 2018 Cotton Bowl.
- Wesco's 143 receiving yards were the 10th-most by a Clemson true freshman since the NCAA instituted permanent freshman eligibility in 1972. It was the most by a Clemson true freshman in a postseason game since Justyn Ross' 153 yards against Alabama to end the 2018 season.
- Wesco's career day came against an SMU program whose campus is roughly 30 miles from his hometown of Midlothian. Texas.
- Clemson opened the scoring on its first possession on a 35-yard pass from Klubnik to Wesco Jr. on the Tigers' second offensive play.
- The duo of Klubnik and Wesco connected again for a 43-yard touchdown later in the first quarter.
- Tight end Jake Briningstool caught four passes for 23 yards and two touchdowns.
- Briningstool's two touchdowns tied his career high set last season at Miami (Fla.) and earlier this season against Appalachian State.
- Briningstool scored his sixth touchdown of the season on a five-yard pass from Klubnik, giving the Tigers a 14-0 lead fewer than five minutes into the game.
- Briningstool recorded his second touchdown of the game on another five-yard pass from Klubnik in the third quarter.
- Briningstool (seven) broke his previous single-season career high in receiving touchdowns of five set in 2023.
- Briningstool's seven touchdowns this season tied Bennie Cunningham (seven in 1974) and Jordan Leggett (seven in 2016) for the fourth-most in a season by a Clemson tight end all-time. He is now one shy of the school record shared by three players.
- Briningstool (17) is now also one touchdown shy of Jordan Leggett (18 from 2013-16) for the school record for career receiving touchdowns by a tight end.
- With his second touchdown catch of the game, Briningstool (17) tied NC State's George Bryan (17 from 2008-11) and Florida State's Nick O'Leary (17 from 2011-14) for the sixth-most touchdown receptions by a tight end in ACC history. He is one touchdown shy of Clemson's Jordan Leggett (18 from 2013-16) and Louisville's Marshon Ford (2018-22) for fourth.
- Including his two-touchdown performance against Appalachian State in September, Briningstool became the first Clemson tight end to catch multiple touchdown passes in multiple games in a single season since Brandon Ford in 2012 (two).
- The performances by Wesco and Briningstool made Clemson the first team to have multiple players record two or more touchdown receptions in a single ACC Championship Game.
- Clemson won the turnover margin, 2-0, marking Clemson's fifth straight game winning the turnover margin. Clemson has produced three five-game streaks of winning the turnover margin in its last 18 games dating to early November of 2023.
- Clemson finished even or better in the turnover margin in a 12th straight game, Clemson's longest streak since a 17-game streak across the 1989-90 seasons. Dating to last season, Clemson has lost the turnover margin only once in its last 18 games.
- Clemson did not have a giveaway and has now played five games without a giveaway in a single season for the first time since 2019 (six).
- Clemson has now recorded multiple takeaways in five straight games for the first time since ending the 2023

season on a five-game streak.

- On the game's third play from scrimmage, defensive end T.J. Parker recorded a strip-sack that he recovered for the game's first takeaway.
- The fumble was Parker's sixth forced fumble of the season, giving him sole possession of the school record for caused fumbles in a single season, breaking the previous mark of five set by Brandon Maye in 2009.
- Parker (career-high 11.0) entered the Top 10 in sacks in a season in school history and now stands in ninth place in that category.
- The fumble recovery was Parker's second of the season and the third of his career. He has now recorded a fumble recovery in back-to-back games for the first time in his career.
- Parker became the first Clemson player to recover a fumble in back-to-back games since Ben Boulware accomplished the feat in the final two games of the 2014 season
- Parker finished the contest with a team-high 3.5 tackles for loss, pushing his career high this season to 19.0
- Parker became the seventh player nationally to record multiple games with 3.5 or more tackles for loss this season.
- Safety Khalil Barnes recorded Clemson's second takeaway of the first quarter.
- The interception was Barnes' career-high fourth of the season and the seventh of his career.
- Barnes became the first Clemson player to record four or more interceptions in a season since Tanner Muse (four) in 2019.
- Barnes has now recorded an interception in consecutive games for the first time in his career.
- Defensive end Cade Denhoff recorded his second sack of the season and the second of his career in the second quarter when he forced SMU's Kevin Jennings out of bounds shy of the line of scrimmage.
- Linebacker Sammy Brown led the team with 14 tackles.
- Adam Randall set up the game-winning drive with a career-long 41-yard kickoff return on the second kickoff return of his career. It was Clemson's longest kickoff return of the season.
- Clemson committed zero accepted penalties in the game for the first time since committing no penalties in a win against Notre Dame in 2023.
- Clemson became the second team in ACC Championship Game history to not commit a penalty (Virginia Tech, 2010).
- With the performance, Clemson (5,914) entered the Top 10 in school history for yards in a single season.
- Clemson (3,563) entered the Top 10 in school history for passing yards in a single season.
- Clemson made its 10th all-time ACC Championship Game appearance, adding to the Tigers' ACC record (2009, 2011, 2015, 2016, 2017, 2018, 2019, 2020, 2022).
- Clemson became the fifth program ever to appear in 10 conference title games all-time, joining Alabama (15), Florida (13), Oklahoma (12) and Georgia (12).
- Clemson faced its eighth different opponent in 10 all-time ACC Championship Games. Clemson had previously faced North Carolina (2015 and 2022), Virginia Tech (2011 and 2016), Georgia Tech (2009), Miami (2017), Pitt (2018), Virginia (2019) and Notre Dame (2020) prior to facing SMU in 2024.
 - Clemson faced SMU for the first time in history.
- Clemson faced a new opponent for the first time since facing Charleston Southern in the second game of the 2023 season. It was Clemson's first time making its debut against an opponent in a postseason game since facing

lowa State for the first time in the 2021 Cheez-It Bowl.

- Clemson faced its 109th different opponent in program history. With the win, Clemson is 67-38-4 all-time in its first meeting with its 109 opponents, including an 18-1 mark in first meetings since 2003. Clemson has won 20 of its last 22 games when making its all-time debut against a new opponent.
- Captains for the contest were quarterback Cade Klubnik, safety R.J. Mickens, offensive tackle Tristan Leigh and defensive end T.J. Parker.

WITH THE WIN...

- Clemson has now won a postseason game (conference championship, bowl game and/or national championship game) in 14 consecutive seasons, extending the longest streak on record in major college football history.
- Clemson became the first program to win 22 ACC titles. Since helping form the conference in 1953, Clemson leads the ACC with 22 titles all-time, including 21 outright.
- Clemson earned its 28th overall conference championship all-time, including four SIAA championships and two Southern Conference championships prior to the formation of the ACC. Clemson's 28 conference titles across all conferences are the most of any current or former ACC member.
- Clemson tied Utah (28) for the 10th-most conference titles among current FBS programs.
- The win earned Clemson its seventh College Football Playoff berth to become only the second team to earn seven College Football Playoff berths since the institution of the postseason format in 2014 (Alabama, 8).
- Clemson improved to 9-1 all-time in ACC Championship Games. Clemson's .900 all-time winning percentage in conference championship games ranks second among programs who have qualified for at least four conference championship games.
- Clemson has now won each of its last nine ACC Championship Game appearances. Clemson joined Oklahoma (nine straight amid 2004-20) and Alabama (nine straight amid 2009-23) as the only teams ever to win nine consecutive conference title game appearances.
- SMU became the seventh different team defeated by Clemson in an ACC Championship Game all-time. Clemson joined Oklahoma (eight) as the only schools to earn a conference championship win against seven different opponents all-time.
- Head Coach Dabo Swinney won his ninth ACC championship. His nine ACC titles (all outright) are second only to Florida State's Bobby Bowden (12, including 10 outright).
- Swinney won his ninth conference championship to pass College Football Hall of Famer Frank Howard (eight) for sole possession of the most in Clemson history. Howard won two Southern Conference titles (1940,48) and six ACC titles (1956,58,59,65,66,67) in his 30-year run with the Tigers.
- Swinney is now 9-1 in ACC Championship Games. His nine wins are triple the wins of any other coach in the ACC's championship game era (Jimbo Fisher and Frank Beamer, three each). Since the creation of the ACC Championship Game in 2005, 55 different full-time head coaches have coached at least one season in the ACC. Swinney has won nine ACC Championship Games in that span while the other 54 coaches have combined for 11 (four of which came prior to Swinney's promotion to full-time head coach).
- Swinney's nine career conference championships are more than double any other active head coach (Lincoln Riley, Rich Rodriguez and Butch Jones, four each).
- Clemson has now recorded its 20th 10-win season in program history. It is Clemson's 13th 10-win season

under Head Coach Dabo Swinney.

- Clemson became the 13th program among current power conference programs to record at least 20 seasons all-time with 10 or more wins. Prior to the season, that list included Alabama (44), Oklahoma (42), Michigan (32), Ohio State (31), Georgia (28), USC (28), Nebraska (28), Florida State (26), Penn State (26), Texas (25), Notre Dame (23) and Tennessee (20).
- Clemson's 2023 and 2024 signing classes earned their first ACC Championship. Every Clemson recruiting class in Dabo Swinney's tenure has won at least one ACC Championship.
- Clemson's senior class became the 31st senior class in Clemson history to earn multiple conference championships in a four-year span.
- Clemson's senior class (40-13 since 2021) became the 12th Clemson senior class to average at least 10 wins a year over a four-year span, joining the 1990, 2014, 2015, 2016, 2017, 2018, 2019, 2020, 2021, 2022 and 2023 senior groups.
- Clemson earned its 31st all-time victory against an AP Top 10 opponent.
- Swinney improved to 19-13 against AP Top 10 teams. The only coaches active or inactive who have more wins against AP Top 10 teams since 2009 than Swinney are Nick Saban (34) and Kirby Smart (22).
- Clemson improved to 8-0 all-time in ACC Championship Games held at Bank of America Stadium in Charlotte. Clemson previously earned ACC titles in the facility in 2011, 2015, 2017, 2018, 2019, 2020 and 2022.
- Clemson improved to 23-13 in games at NFL stadiums under Dabo Swinney. Clemson is now 20-9 at NFL stadiums since 2015.
- Clemson improved to 18-1 in December games since 2011. Among teams that have been at the FBS level in that entire time span, Clemson's .947 December winning percentage is the second-highest in the nation behind Alabama (15-0, 1.000).
- Clemson improved to 30-14 all-time in games played in the month of December.
- Clemson improved to 37-9 under Dabo Swinney in games following a loss.
- Swinney (180-46) became the seventh coach in FBS history to win 180 games within the first 20 seasons of a head coaching career. In only his 17th season (and 16th full season), Swinney (179) trails only Tom Osborne (195), Nick Saban (191), Bob Stoops (191), Joe Paterno (187), Urban Meyer (187) and LaVell Edwards (183) in that category. (Note: Stoops and Meyer are not credited on the NCAA's official list of most wins through 20 seasons since they did not coach 20 years.)
- Swinney improved to 40-27 under Dabo Swinney against AP Top 25 teams.
- Clemson improved to 34-19 under Swinney in games in which both teams rank in the AP Top 25.
- Clemson improved to 169-74-3 all-time (and 52-8 since 2011) when facing a coach for the first time. Clemson is 6-1 this season against head coaches facing the Tigers for the first time.
- Clemson has now won 123 of its last 128 games when leading at halftime.
- Clemson is now 88-7 when scoring first since 2015.
- Clemson is now 145-5 since 2011 when leading after three quarters.
- Clemson is now 87-5 when winning the turnover margin since 2011.
- Clemson has now won 40 of its last 52 one-possession games since 2011, the highest winning percentage in the country in one-score games in that span.

Even in the three-year time horizon win which Clemson missed the College Football Playoff from 2021-23, Clemson was one of only 10 schools (and one of only seven power conference schools) with nine or more wins in each of those three seasons (Air Force, Alabama, Fresno State, Georgia, Michigan, Notre Dame, Ohio State, Oregon and UTSA).

Before Clemson's 10-win streak concluded in 2023, Clemson's 12 consecutive 10-win seasons from 2011-22 were the third-longest streak in FBS history, alongside Saban-era Alabama squads and Bowden-era Florida State teams.

SENIOR SUCCESS

Every January, Head Coach Dabo Swinney conducts his first official meeting with his new team. The first order of business in the meeting is to "reset the room," reorganizing the seating arrangement with seniors in front and all succeeding classes in order behind them in the team auditorium.

Several of Swinney's senior classes placed themselves among select company in college football history. The 2017, 2018, 2019 and 2020 Clemson seniors account for four of only 15 four-year classes in FBS history to reach 50 career wins. That includes the 2018 and 2019 groups that are tied with the 2018 Alabama seniors for the most wins in FBS history (55 wins in four years).

HISTORIC CONFERENCE REIGN

In 2020, Clemson became the first program ever to win 20 ACC Championships. That year, Clemson became the first program in the conference championship game era to win six straight conference championship games. Clemson also became the first ACC program to win six consecutive outright titles, as Florida State had a streak of nine straight ACC titles, but that streak included two co-championships that prevented Bobby Bowden's Seminoles from ever winning more than three straight titles outright.

Clemson's 2022 ACC title was the program's seventh in eight years, as the Tigers became the first team in an active power conference to win seven outright conference titles in an eight-year span since Alabama won eight SEC titles in nine seasons from 1971-79.

Including titles from its days as a member of the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association and Southern Conference, Clemson has 28 conference championships overall, also the most of any current ACC school. Duke ranks second among the ACC's current membership with 18 overall conference titles, including 11 Southern Conference titles and seven ACC titles.

The Tigers won the 1900, 1902 and 1903 SIAA Conference championships under John Heisman, then the 1906 SIAA title under Bob Williams. Clemson also won the 1940 and 1948 Southern Conference titles under Frank Howard. Howard won eight total conference titles, including two in the Southern Conference and six in the ACC. Swinney matched Howard with his eighth conference title in 2022 and surpassed the legend with a win in the 2024 ACC Championship Game.

For the last quarter-century, Clemson's ACC success has not been a roller-coaster ride of lofty heights and deep lows. The last time Clemson finished a season

below .500 in regular season conference play was in 1998, when Tommy West's 3-8 squad went 1-7 in ACC play. Clemson's 25-year streak of being .500 or better in conference play is tied for the longest active streak in the country and tied for the fourth-longest of any streak since 1966.

POWER OVER POWER CONFERENCE FOES

Early in his head coaching tenure, Dabo Swinney laid out his belief to then-Clemson athletic director Terry Don Phillips that the Tigers needed to add tough non-conference challenges on top of their tests in ACC play to serve as a foundation for the program's growth.

"I had a conversation with Terry Don and said, 'Terry Don, I know we are not very good right now, but we need to play people because that is going to help me teach and help me develop the culture and the mindset that you have to have to win at the highest level," recounted Swinney, "I didn't think we had that, and that's what we committed to. That's what we've done."

That scheduling philosophy and culture change has resonated in the Clemson program, and since 2013, no team can claim more wins against power conference opponents than the Tigers. In late 2022, Clemson became the first program to reach 100 victories against power conference opponents since 2013.

SIGN AND DEVELOP

While proud of his incoming classes. Head Coach Dabo Swinney has long stated that a true ranking of a recruiting class cannot and should not be published until four years later when the group can be evaluated on performance rather than potential.

Much to Swinney's delight, The Athletic has annually assumed that role in recent years, re-ranking every recruiting class four years later to account for on-field performance.

For its re-rankings, The Athletic uses the following grading scale: 5 points: All-American, award winner, top-50 NFL Draft pick; 4: Multi-year starter, allconference honors; 3: One-year starter or key reserve; 2: Career backup; 0: Minor or no contribution, left the program. The outlet also adds a bonus to each program's class average, derived from its total number of wins from 2017 through 2020 (e.g.: For re-ranking the Class of 2017, Clemson won 51 games, so its class average received a bonus of 0.51).

Even in its current stretch of recruiting success, Swinney has pointed out that Clemson often falls in rankings as its commitment to not oversigning leads to smaller recruiting classes, as well as noting that much of Clemson's on-field success is a function of the program's development, citing All-Americans like former three-star Isaiah Simmons or former two-star Nolan Turner. The re-rankings illustrate Clemson's impressive track record of talent identification, culture fit, resource allocation and player development.

On average, Clemson ranked 10.2 in the 247 Composite team rankings across the 2014-20 recruiting cycles. Upon re-ranking those groups, despite having little room for improvement while recruiting at a Top 15 clip in that span, Clemson ranked 4.0 on average in the re-rankings, a ratings bump of roughly six spots. Each of those Clemson classes averaged at least 10 wins a season during their careers.

TEAM TALENT

Despite the program often fielding questions about its roster-building philosophy and means of talent acquisition, Clemson ranks as having the nation's fifth-most-talented roster in 247Sports' Team Talent Composite.

Clemson has ranked in the top five in this metric every year since 2020 and in the top 10 in every year since 2016.

College Football Hall of Famer Frank Howard, known as "The Bashful Baron of Barlow Bend," compiled a 165-118-12 record in 30 seasons at Clemson from 1940-69.

With a 31-23 upset of No. 12 Notre Dame in 2023, Dabo Swinney earned his 166th career victory as Clemson's head coach, surpassing Howard to become Clemson's all-time winningest coach. Swinney accomplished the feat in his 209th career game.

HEAD COACH CONTINUITY

Over the last decade-and-a-half, Clemson became a beacon of stability in the increasingly unstable environment of college football. Clemson Head Coach Dabo Swinney is in his 22nd overall season at Clemson in 2024, including his 16th full season as head coach (and his 17th including an interim stint in 2008).

From the start of Swinney's first season as full-time head coach in 2009 through 2023, there were 465 head coaching tenures in the FBS (excluding those by interims) but only one such tenure at Clemson.

Clemson is the only school in the ACC with only one head coach since the start of the 2009 season, and among the 15 schools to qualify for the four-team College Football Playoff from 2014-23, only Clemson had only one head coach since 2009.

SIX "FINAL FOURS" FOR SWINNEY

While the term "Final Four" may still be the linguistic property of college basketball, since the advent of the four-team College Football Playoff in 2014, Head Coach Dabo Swinney had Clemson among the sport's final four teams six times from 2015-20, becoming the first coach to lead a team to six consecutive College Football Playoffs since the format's institution in 2014.

The NCAA men's college basketball tournament dates to 1939. In the history of that tournament, only John Wooden of UCLA (nine from 1967-75) and Mike Krzyzewski of Duke (five from 1988-92) coached teams to at least five consecutive Final Fours. With his sixth "Final Four" appearance in 2020, Swinney joined basketball's Wooden as the only college football or men's basketball coaches to take teams to six consecutive Final Fours in their respective sports.

Swinney is among only nine coaches in football and men's basketball to record six career Final Four berths. He is one of only six with a winning record in Final Four

Swinney's ability to place his team among the nation's elite quartet has also been illustrated by the polls. Clemson finished first in the AP Poll in 2016 and 2018, second in 2015 and 2019, third in 2020 and fourth in 2017. Swinney became just the fourth coach to record at least six consecutive top four finishes since the AP Poll began in 1936, an exclusive list that also includes Florida State's Bobby Bowden (13), USC's Pete Carroll (seven) and Oklahoma's Bud Wilkinson

Clemson's streak represented the fifth time a program has had a run of at least six top four finishes in the AP Poll. Miami (Fla.) had a seven-year run from 1986-92 with two different head coaches leading the

Swinney ranks second among coaches in both College Football Playoff appearances and College Football Playoff wins. Through the College Football Playoff's first 10 years, only 10 head coaches ever won a CFP game, and only six (four of whom are no longer active) have won a CFP national championship.

THROUGH 200 GAMES

The 2022 Orange Bowl was the 200th game in Dabo Swinney's head coaching career. Among coaches who qualify for the NCAA FBS record book by virtue of five years or 50 wins as a major college head coach, 17 coaches had earned at least 150 victories in their first 200 career games as head coach as of the conclusion of the 2022 season.

At 161-39 through 200 games, Swinney tied Bob Stoops and Robert Neyland (162 each) for the fifthmost wins through 200 career games in major college football history.

Four previous Clemson head coaches earned 150+FBS wins in their careers: John Heisman (186), Jess Neely (207), Frank Howard (165) and Ken Hatfield (168). Howard, a College Football Hall of Famer, recorded his 150th victory in his 273rd career game, in a 14-10 victory against Maryland in 1966 that clinched a piece of what later became an outright ACC title. Heisman earned win No. 150 in game No. 203, Neely earned it in game No. 268, and Hatfield did it in game 259, though none of those three won more than 43 games in their Clemson tenures.

After being named Clemson's full-time coach in December of 2008, Head Coach Dabo Swinney set about securing his first signing class in 2009.

His first class, which he tabbed the "Dandy Dozen," brought home Clemson's first ACC title since 1991 during their junior campaign in 2011. With a win in

the 2024 ACC Championship Game, every Clemson signing class under Swinney has at least one ACC title to their credit in their tenures at Clemson, and every signing class from 2012-20 earned at least one College Football Playoff berth.

Clemson finished its 2024 home slate with a 5-2 home record, concluding Clemson's 13-year streak of winning six or more home games, which had been the nation's longest streak. The 2024 season was still Clemson's 19th consecutive season with at least five home wins and its 23rd such season since 2000.

From 2015-23, Clemson produced at least one home win against AP Top 25 opponents in nine straight seasons, which had been the nation's longest active streak prior to its conclusion in 2024.

DEATH VALLEY ROARS

Frank Howard Field at Memorial Stadium garnered its famous nickname in the 1940s when Presbyterian College Head Coach Lonnie McMillian, after many years of bringing his teams in for drubbings, dubbed the venue as "Death Valley."

The name stuck, and its patrons have done their part to make it live up to its name and its reputation. In the first 10 years of the College Football Playoff era from 2014-23, Clemson's home atmosphere helped draw 148 false starts by opponents, the second-most of any home venue in the country and the most by a power conference program.

In 2022, Antonio Williams earned first-team Freshman All-America honors after he caught 56 passes for 604 yards with four touchdowns over 14 games (10 starts). His 10 starts were the most by a Clemson freshman receiver since Hunter Renfrow's redshirt freshman season (10 in 2015) and the most by a true freshman receiver at Clemson since Sammy Watkins (10 in 2011). He became the first true freshman to lead Clemson in receiving yards since Justyn Ross in 2018 and the first freshman to lead Clemson in receptions since Artavis Scott in 2014.

Injury befell Williams in his sophomore season, as he was limited by an ankle injury to only four regular season games in his second season before returning to play a pivotal role in Clemson's come-from-behind Gator Bowl win against Kentucky in 2023. In the offseason to follow, Head Coach Dabo Swinney praised Williams' maturity and laser focus and said the now-redshirt sophomore was in for a big year in 2024.

The head coach's prognostication has proven correct. Williams has started every game for Clemson and has developed into a bona fide top target for Clemson this season with career highs in every receiving category.

Clemson needed — and received — a career day from Williams in its 24-20 win at Pitt on Nov. 16. Williams recorded career highs in receiving yards (149) and receptions (13) and matched his career high with two touchdown receptions. His 13 receptions were the most by a Clemson player since both Mike Williams (15) and Artavis Scott (13) reached the mark against

Pitt in 2016, and his performance tied for the fourthmost receptions in a game in Clemson history.

With his ninth and 10th touchdown catches of the season on Nov. 23 against The Citadel, Williams became the first Clemson player with double-digit touchdown receptions in a season since Tee Higgins in 2019 (13). He has recorded the ninth season in school history with double-digit touchdown receptions.

Klubnik has helped engineer three fourth-quarter comeback wins, including two as a starter:

- vs. Syracuse (2022): Entered in relief of DJ Uiagalelei and became the first backup quarterback to engineer a fourth-quarter comeback win for Clemson since 2018 (Chase Brice vs. Syracuse).
- vs. Kentucky (2023 Gator Bowl): Went 8-for-8 as he led Clemson on a 12-play, 68-yard game-winning drive in 2:17 of elapsed game time as Clemson earned its largest fourth-quarter comeback win in a bowl game in school history.
- at Pitt (2024): After Clemson was held to only 27 yards in the first 28 minutes of the second half, Klubnik got the ball with 1:36 remaining and engineered a three-play, 75-yard drive that he finished by rushing for a game-winning 50-yard touchdown with 1:16 remaining.

Klubnik's rushing touchdowns in 2024 haven't come on run-of-the-mill short yardage plunges. Among his rushing touchdowns this season are touchdown runs of 55 yards against NC State, 34 yards against Stanford and a game-winning 50-yarder at Pitt.

Klubnik's 50-yard rushing touchdown at Pitt was Clemson's longest game-winning offensive touchdown inside the final two minutes of a game on record. Klubnik became the first Clemson player to record multiple 50-yard rushing touchdowns in a single season since Travis Etienne in 2019 (two), and he also became the first Clemson quarterback to record multiple 50-yard rushing touchdowns in a career since Woodrow Dantzler (three from 1999-2001).

HISTORIC NIGHT VS. APP STATE

Klubnik put together one of the greatest single-game performances in Clemson and ACC history in Clemson's 66-20 win against Appalachian State on Sept. 7. Klubnik only played the first half but finished the contest having completed 24-of-26 passes for a careerhigh 378 yards and five passing touchdowns in addition to scoring two rushing touchdowns while leading the Tigers to touchdowns on all eight drives he engineered.

For the performance, Klubnik collected Walter Camp National Offensive Player of the Week, Davey O'Brien National Quarterback of the Week and PFF Offensive Player of the Week honors while splitting ACC Quarterback of the Week accolades. Included below are some of the statistical superlatives from No. 2's

offensive clinic in game No. 2:

- Klubnik finished with a pass efficiency rating of 277.9, breaking Tajh Boyd's school record for a single game with a minimum of 20 attempts (261.9 vs. Syracuse in 2013).
- According to ESPN Stats & Info, Klubnik became the first FBS quarterback in the last 25 years with five or more passing touchdowns, multiple rushing touchdowns and a completion percentage of 90.0 percent or better.
- Klubnik's 378 passing yards were the most by a Clemson quarterback in a half since Trevor Lawrence's 391-yard first half at Georgia Tech in 2020.
- Despite playing only one half, Klubnik's 378 passing yards tied for the 19th-most in a game in school history. It was the most by a Clemson quarterback since Trevor Lawrence's 400 passing yards against Ohio State to end the 2020 season.
- Klubnik's five passing touchdowns set a career high, passing his previous high of four set twice last season. It was the first five-touchdown passing game by a Clemson quarterback since DJ Uiagalelei's five passing touchdowns at Wake Forest in 2022.
- Klubnik's five passing touchdowns in the first half tied a school record, matching Tajh Boyd (vs. Wake Forest in 2012 and The Citadel in 2013) and Trevor Lawrence (vs. Georgia Tech in 2020).
- Klubnik became the first Clemson quarterback to be responsible for seven combined passing and rushing touchdowns since Tajh Boyd's ACC-record eight-touchdown performance against NC State in 2011. (Note: Lamar Jackson later tied Boyd's ACC record against in 2016).
- Klubnik became the first ACC quarterback to record at least four passing touchdowns and multiple rushing touchdowns in a single half since Louisville's Lamar Jackson in 2016, according to ESPN Stats & Info. Klubnik finished with five passing touchdowns and two rushing touchdowns in the first half.
- Klubnik recorded multiple passing touchdowns and multiple rushing touchdowns in a single game for the first time in his career. He became the first Clemson quarterback to accomplish the feat since Deshaun Watson against Virginia Tech in the 2016 ACC Championship Game.
- Klubnik completed his first 13 passes of the game, the longest streak of consecutive completions in his career.

SPREADING THE BALL AROUND

Offensive Coordinator Garrett Riley's scheme places importance on spreading the ball to various playmakers, and coaches have praised Klubnik's natural penchant for distributing the ball to his various weapons.

In Week 2 of 2023, Klubnik and his fellow quarterbacks completed passes to 16 different receivers, Clemson's second-most in a single game in Dabo Swinney's tenure.

Clemson's highwater mark in that category in 2024 came in its second game of the season when it completed passes to 13 different receivers against App State.

FROM THE SIDELINE TO THE STAGE

Klubnik's national breakout came in the 2022 ACC Championship Game against North Carolina. He entered the game on Clemson's third possession and completed 20-of-24 passes for 279 yards and a passing touchdown and added seven carries for 30 yards and a rushing touchdown. His 83.3 completion percentage set an ACC Championship Game record and led to his selection as the game's Most Valuable Player in Clemson's 39-10 victory. He became the third freshman (and second true freshman) in the game's history to earn the honor.

Two years later, Klubnik repeated as ACC Championship Game MVP in a 34-31 win against SMU. He joined Virginia Tech's Tyrod Taylor and Clemson's Deshaun Watson as the only two-time MVPs in ACC Championship Game history.

300+ IN FIRST CAREER START

In the 2022 Orange Bowl, Cade Klubnik completed 30-of-54 passes for 320 yards and also rushed 20 times for 51 yards with a touchdown. His 74 plays of total offense (combined rush attempts and pass attempts) were the fifth-most by an individual in Clemson history.

Klubnik's 320 yards were the fourth-most by a Clemson quarterback making his first career start since 1953, as he became only the fourth Clemson quarterback to exceed 300 passing yards in their first start.

Klubnik became the first Clemson freshman quarterback on record to make his starting debut in postseason play. He also became the first Clemson quarterback to make his first career start against an AP Top 6 opponent since Brandon Streeter did so against No. 5 Florida State in 1997.

Klubnik became only the eighth true freshman to start at quarterback for Clemson since the NCAA instituted permanent freshman eligibility in 1972, joining Steve Fuller (1975), Willie Jordan (1975), Patrick Sapp (1992), Nealon Greene (1994), Deshaun Watson (2014), Trevor Lawrence (2018) and DJ Uiagalelei (2020).

100-YARD RUSHING GAMES

After recording one 100-yard rushing game in 2022 and one in 2023, running back Phil Mafah has reached the century mark in rushing yards in six games in 2024.

After being held to 59 yards in the opener, he recorded 100 yards in four of Clemson's next five contests, becoming the first Clemson player to reach 100 yards

in four games in a five-game span since Travis Etienne rushed for 100 yards in a school-record six straight games in 2019

Mafah's six 100-yard games this season are the sixthmost in a season in school history.

MAFAH MAN'S CAREER DAY I

Mild-mannered but hard-running, Mafah was long referenced as part of a one-two punch at running back alongside his then-roommate Will Shipley for most of his career. But with Shipley out with a concussion against No. 12 Notre Dame in early November in 2023, Mafah moved from a co-starring role to featured status and ran with the opportunity.

Technically, he ran with the opportunity a school-record-tying 36 times.

Mafah, dubbed "Mafah Man" by Running Backs Coach C.J. Spiller, recorded a career-high 186 rushing yards on those 36 carries with two rushing touchdowns in the 31-23 win against the Irish. His 36 carries tied the school record shared by Jim Shirley (36 against NC State in 1951), Ray Yauger (36 against Wake Forest in 1969) and Raymond Priester (36 against Maryland in 1997).

Mafah's 186 yards were the most by a Clemson player since Kobe Pace's 191-yard rushing performance against Wake Forest in 2021. It was the first 150-yard rushing game by a Clemson player since Shipley's 172-yard rushing performance against Syracuse in 2022.

"I knew going into the game that I would probably have to take a bigger load so I just came in with a mindset that whatever carries I get, I'm going to try to make the most out of each and every one," Mafah said following the defeat of Notre Dame. "I'm just glad that included a win for us."

MAFAH MAN'S CAREER DAY II

Mafah earned Most Valuable Player honors for the 2023 Gator Bowl after scoring a career-high four rushing touchdowns on 11 carries against Kentucky. His four rushing touchdowns in the game broke the Clemson bowl record (three by Tracy Johnson vs. Penn State in the 1988 Citrus Bowl) and the Gator Bowl record (three set by many players), as he became the first Clemson player to rush for four touchdowns in a game since C.J. Spiller against Georgia Tech in the 2009 ACC Championship Game.

Three of Mafah's Gator Bowl touchdowns came in the fourth quarter, making him the first Clemson player to score three touchdowns in any single quarter since DeAndre Hopkins against Duke in 2012. He became the first Clemson player with three touchdowns in a fourth quarter since at least 1996.

BRINNY'S BIG BREAKOUT IN 2023

The departure of long-time trusted tight end Davis Allen after Allen's selection by the Los Angeles Rams in the 2023 NFL Draft created an opportunity for Briningstool in his junior season in 2023. The Nashville-area native who was the top-ranked tight end in the 2021 recruiting class that also included Brock Bowers took advantage with a career year that included a number of record-setting performances.

Briningstool recorded career highs in receptions (50), receiving yards (498) and receiving touchdowns (five) in 2023 en route to AII-ACC honors.

Briningstool turned in his first signature performance of his career to date on Oct. 21 last season, catching five passes for a school-tight-end-record 126 yards with two touchdowns against Miami (Fla.). Briningstool's 126 yards were the most in a game by an ACC tight end this season and the most by an ACC tight end (per PFF designations) since Oct. 5, 2019, when Miami's Brevin Jordan had 136 yards on two more catches against Virginia Tech.

Briningstool is responsible for three of the eight 100yard receiving games by tight ends in Clemson history. His three career 100-yard receiving games are the most by a tight end in school annals.

In Clemson's dramatic bowl win to close 2023, Briningstool gained 91 yards on nine receptions, tying the Clemson single-game school record for receptions by a tight end, matching John McMakin (vs. Florida State in 1970) and Brandon Ford (vs. LSU in 2012). His

ninth reception of the game was his 50th of the season, tying the single-season school record for receptions by a tight end set by Dwayne Allen in 2011 (50).

Clemson's tight ends combined for nine catches for 130 yards and two touchdowns in its Sept. 7 win against Appalachian State, the most receiving yards by a tight end group in a game under Dabo Swinney.

True freshman Bryant Wesco Jr. recorded one catch in 12 snaps in Clemson's season opener, as missed opportunities and inefficiency by Clemson — combined with a condensed contest that featured the fewest combined snaps (112) in a Clemson game since 2006 — limited his involvement in his collegiate debut. Afterward, Clemson's coaches vowed to involve him more the following week.

Consider that vow fulfilled.

In his second career game, Wesco caught three passes for 130 yards and a touchdown against Appalachian State, tying the Clemson record for the fewest games needed to record a 100-yard receiving game.

Clemson was impacted by starting six different offensive line combinations in 2023 while both trying to find its best option at left tackle and managing the long-term losses of starting guards Walker Parks and Marcus Tate. In 2024, Clemson started only two offensive lines over the first eight weeks but then had to start three new combinations over its next three games before reassembling its starting unit in the regular season finale.

"He brings an incredible résumé and a wealth of experience and has worked with a bunch of great coaches and players over his career," Dabo Swinney said of Luke's hire. "I have no doubt he will be a great addition."

BARRETT CARTER

Though Clemson lost two-time All-America linebacker Jeremiah Trotter Jr. to the 2024 NFL Draft, Clemson's linebacking corps received a boost when 2023 All-ACC selection Barrett Carter opted to return for his senior season.

"He's one of the best football players in my 20 years at Clemson," Swinney said. "He's a pure *football player*. I mean, the guy can play anywhere. He could go play tailback, he could play corner, he can play safety, he can play Nickel/Sam, he can play Mike, he can play Will. He's special... He's so smart and he's got unbelievable instincts for the game."

Close observers of Clemson in 2022 quickly recognized Carter's impact in his first year as a starter, and Carter served notice of his arrival to the country with a signature performance against Louisville that year. Carter recorded eight tackles (3.5 for loss), two sacks, an interception and a pass breakup, becoming the first player to record 3.5 or more tackles for loss, 2.0 or more sacks and an interception in a game between two Power Five teams since South Carolina's Melvin Ingram against Auburn in 2011.

Carter finished 2022 credited by the coaching staff with 77 tackles (10.5 for loss), tied for third-most on the team, with 5.5 sacks, eight pass breakups, two interceptions and two forced fumbles in a unit-high 832 snaps over 13 games (all starts). His 832 snaps were the sixth-most by a Clemson linebacker on record.

Carter was one of only three players in the Power Five with at least 10 tackles for loss, 5.0 sacks, multiple interceptions and multiple forced fumbles in 2022. Before Carter and two others reached the marks in 2022, the last two Power Five players to reach Carter's numbers in all four categories were both Butkus Award winners: Georgia's Nakobe Dean (2021) and Clemson's Isaiah Simmons (2019).

No. O has also been a hero in the community. He has volunteered his time for the Our Friend Christopher organization in the memory of his late former teammate Christopher Miles, who died of a brain tumor. He also routinely reads to local elementary schools and serves as a mentor to local youth and has aspirations of one day opening a training facility for young athletes.

"I remember I was that young kid that looked up to football players," Carter said. "Now that I have the opportunity to give back, I have no choice but to do so. I just put myself in those shoes and remember when I was that kid."

BUTKUS AWARD FINALIST

The Butkus Foundation announced on Nov. 25 that Carter was named as one of five finalists for this year's Butkus Award, presented annually to the nation's top linebacker.

Carter became the seventh Butkus Award finalist in Clemson history, joining Levon Kirkland (1990), Keith Adams (2000), Dorian O'Daniel (2017), Tre Lamar (2018, Isaiah Simmons (2019) and Jeremiah Trotter Jr. (2023). Simmons became the first Butkus Award winner in school history when he collected the honor in 2019.

CARTER'S GATOR BOWL PERFORMANCE

Carter was a star of Clemson's thrilling 38-35 Gator Bowl win against Kentucky to close the 2023 season. Clemson's ability to outscore Kentucky 28-14 in the final frame to earn the comeback win was buoyed by Clemson's

four takeaways in the fourth quarter.

Trailing by five, Carter batted a Devin Leary pass into the air, spun around and dove to secure an interception that led to a Clemson field goal. On Kentucky's very next offensive play, Carter recovered a Barion Brown fumble that led to a Phil Mafah go-ahead touchdown on the following play.

Carter's performance marked the second straight game in which a Clemson defender recorded a takeaway on consecutive plays, joining Khalil Barnes' performance at South Carolina in Clemson's regular season finale. Prior to Barnes and Carter accomplishing the feat, the last time it had been accomplished was in 1995, when future Pro Football Hall of Famer Brian Dawkins accomplished the feat against Duke.

Against Kentucky, Carter was credited with five tackles, three pass breakups, an interception, a fumble recovery and a half-sack in the game, earning selection to the AP's All-Bowl Team.

OPENING A CAN OF WOODAZ

As conference and national acclaim began to accrue for Clemson's linebacking duo of Barrett Carter and Jeremiah Trotter Jr. in recent years, Dabo Swinney was quick to advise observers not to sleep on Wade Woodaz.

"He's a baller," Swinney said. "The kid is tough, physical, he can really run. He really understands the game at a high level. He played most of his [prep] career as a quarterback and as a safety, so he has a great understanding of the game. He plays really, really hardhe's a great effort guy, he's a great preparer and he loves it. He's a fun guy to coach and a fun guy to watch play because he plays the way you want everybody to play."

The first career start for versatile hybrid linebacker from Tampa actually came at safety in the 2022 ACC Championship Game. He then served as Clemson's primary Sam linebacker in the 2022 Orange Bowl.

Woodaz opened the 2023 season with a takeaway in three straight games. He recovered a muffed punt in the season opener at Duke, his second straight season opener with an impact special teams play after blocking a punt in his collegiate debut a year earlier. In Clemson's second game against Charleston Southern, he recorded his first career interception and returned it 35 yards for a touchdown to help Clemson blow the game open.

A week later against Florida Atlantic, he returned another interception 59 yards. In doing so, he became the first Clemson linebacker with an interception in consecutive games since Isaiah Simmons accomplished the feat in the ACC Championship Game and Fiesta Bowl of his Butkus Award-winning 2019 campaign.

WE SEE YOU, T.J. PARKER ●●

While preseason praise and accolades for Clemson's 2023 true freshmen defensive linemen were aimed primarily at defensive lineman Peter Woods, Woods' best friend, defensive end T.J. Parker, emphatically announced his arrival last season.

Parker's production behind the line of scrimmage in 2023 was the best by a first-year freshman in school history.

Parker tied for the national lead in tackles for loss among freshmen in 2023 with 12.5. Additionally, his 5.5 sacks ranked fourth nationally (and second in power conferences) among freshmen.

Parker initially committed to Penn State but coveted a Clemson offer. He decommitted from the Nittany Lions in hopes of soliciting Clemson, and Clemson's 2023 recruiting class immediately went to work.

"CV [Christopher Vizzina], Peter and a few other guys on the team, they hit me up with the eyes emoji on Instagram," Parker said. "It was like, 'You know what time it is.' I texted Coach Ski [Then-Clemson Defensive Ends Coach Lemanski Hall] the eyes emoji, the same thing they sent me, and from there we got in contact and a few days later they offered and I committed."

PARKER'S RECORD DAY AT PITT

Through nine games in 2024, Parker was having a nice sophomore campaign with 8.5 tackles for loss, 5.0 sacks and three forced fumbles. Parker then put together one of the most dominant defensive performances in school history in Clemson's 10th game, collecting seven tackles, 5.0 tackles for loss, a school-record-tying 4.0 sacks, his fourth forced fumble of the season and a pass breakup.

Parker earned ACC Defensive Lineman of the Week, Bednarik Award National Player of the Week and Walter Camp Defensive Player of the Week for his performance.

SAMMY'S SENSATIONAL START

Linebacker Sammy Brown arrived at Clemson in January 2024 as a consensus Top 30 player in his recruiting class and as the nation's reigning High School Butkus Award winner.

Head Coach Dabo Swinney praised Brown as an "alpha," but spoke frequently about Brown's learning curve at the linebacker position after playing both running back and linebacker at Jefferson High School in Commerce, Ga. The linebacker tabbed as 247Sports' No. 1 "freak athlete" in the 2024 recruiting class had the benefit of learning behind and aside veteran All-ACC and All-America candidates Barrett Carter and Wade Woodaz this season.

In addition to immediately earning a role on special teams, Brown saw extended action at linebacker in runaway wins against App State, NC State and Stanford in September, combining for 30 tackles (as credited by gameday stat crews), 5.5 tackles for loss, 2.0 sacks and two pass breakups in reserve in those three contests.

After Clemson opened its first eight games in twolinebacker sets, Brown earned his first start at Virginia Tech on Nov. 9 as Clemson opened the game with three linebackers. The former five-star prospect delivered, recording a team-high eight tackles (per the gameday stat crew) with 2.5 tackles for loss and a sack.

"Sammy's been getting better and better and better and it was awesome to see him have that type of game," Swinney said after Brown's performance at Virginia Tech. "He's just a confident young man, and, boy, he's got a bright future ahead of him. He's going to be a great one."

Despite playing only 375 defensive snaps and making only five starts this season, Brown ranks second in the nation in tackles for loss among freshmen.

DEFENSIVE TOUCHDOWNS

WHO'S YOUR HAUSER?

Placekicker Nolan Hauser arrived at Clemson in January 2024 as the national high school record-holder for career field goals made (66) during his career at Hough High School in Cornelius, N.C. As one of two scholarship kickers on the roster, he earned Clemson's starting placekicker job coming out of fall camp.

Hauser (pronounced HOO-zer, not HOW-zer) opened his career with a streak of 25 consecutive made kicks (five field goals & 20 PATs) before a blocked PAT against Stanford in game four accounted for his first miss.

A week later at Florida State, Hauser made five field goals and accounted for 17 total points in Clemson's 16-point road win. The five-field-goal performance by Hauser was Clemson's first since Chandler Catanzaro went 5-for-5 on field goal attempts against Boston College in 2011. It was the seventh five-field-goal performance by a kicker in Clemson history.

Hauser is a second-generation Clemson student-athlete. His mother, Sheri Hauser (née Bueter), was an All-American soccer player at Clemson from 1994-97, and his father, Scott, played baseball at Clemson in 1996 and 1997 and was 6-2 as a pitcher on Clemson's College World Series team of 1996. His sister, Ella, is also currently a member of Clemson's women's soccer

HAUSER'S HIGHLIGHT

Though the pronunciation of his last name often trips up observers, Hauser made his name much more nationally recognizable with the seminal highlight of the 2024 ACC Championship Game.

In what Clemson Head Coach Dabo Swinney called "the biggest kick in Clemson history," the true freshman booted a 56-yard game winning field goal as time expired to give Clemson its 22nd ACC title, its 10th win of the season and its seventh College Football Playoff berth. Of note:

- Hauser's field goal gave Clemson the first walk-off win in ACC Championship Game history.
- Hauser became the first Clemson player to kick a game-winning walk-off field goal since Chandler Catanzaro hit a 37-yard field goal to beat LSU to end the 2012 Chick-Fil-A Bowl.
- Hauser's 56-yard field goal was the longest gamewinning field goal as time expired in Clemson history.
- Hauser's career-long 56-yard field goal was the fourth-longest field goal in Clemson history but its longest away from Death Valley. It was also the longest field goal in postseason play in Clemson history.
- Hauser became the first FBS player ever to win a conference championship game by kicking a field goal of 50 or more yards as time expired.
- Hauser's 56-yard field goal was the longest in ACC Championship Game history, surpassing a 52-yarder by B.T. Potter in 2022 against North Carolina.
- The game-winning field goal game in Hasuer's home metro area, as his hometown of Cornelius, N.C. is roughly 20 miles north of Bank of America Stadium in Charlotte.

SWANSON'S SURGE

Punter Aidan Swanson returned for his sixth year at Clemson in 2024 following a breakout campaign in his second year as Clemson's starting punter in 2023.

Last year, he improved his punting average from 2022 by roughly a yard-and-a-half and nearly doubled the rate at which he was pinning opponents inside the 20.

Swanson's 28 punts downed inside the 20 in 2023 tied Bradley Pinion's school record for punts inside the 20 in a single season (28 in 2014).

Swanson's 2023 punting average of 43.67 yards ranked fifth in a season in Clemson history and was only the second average of 43+ yards by a Clemson punter since the turn of the century. He also recorded a 41.98-yard net punting average according to the NCAA formula for the metric, the second-best mark in school history behind Dale Hatcher's 42.4 in 1984.

SEMINAL SWANSON SHOWINGS

Vs. Florida State (2023): Swanson had a career day against Florida State on Sept. 23. His 53.2-yard average was a single-game high for his career, surpassing his 52.5-yard average against Syracuse in 2022. It was the best average by a Clemson punter with a minimum of three punts since Will Spiers' 53.6-yard average against Syracuse in 2020.

Swanson's four punts in that game included a 60-yarder in the first quarter and a 62-yarder in the third quarter. He joined Pittsburgh's Daniel Sparks (2022), Wake Forest's Dom Maggio (2019) and Miami's Pat O'Donnell (2013) as the only ACC players since 2008 with multiple 60-yard punts in a single game, according to Stats Perform.

Vs. Notre Dame (2023): Swanson placed a thencareer-high five of his six punts inside the 20 against the Irish. It was the most punts placed inside the 20 by a Clemson punter since Will Spiers in the National Championship Game to end the 2019 season (five vs. LSU), earning Swanson ACC Specialist of the Week honors.

At South Carolina (2023): Swanson immediately tied that mark for punts inside the 20 in the regular season finale, dropping five punts inside the 20 in a nine-point win against South Carolina.

At Virginia Tech (2024): After having four punts downed inside the 20 in the season's first eight games, Swanson placed a season-high four of his five punts at Virginia Tech inside the 20 in a 10-point win.

At Pitt (2024): Swanson recorded a career-high six punts downed inside the 20 in Clemson's four-point comeback win. His six punts inside the 20 were one shy of the school record in the category of seven set by Kevin Laird in the 1996 Peach Bowl against LSU.

THE OTHER SWINNEY DYNASTY

Like the Colquitt family punting at Tennessee, the Swinney family holding for placekicks at Clemson has become a dynasty of its own.

Head Coach Dabo Swinney's oldest son, Will, arrived at Clemson in 2017 and immediately earned Clemson's starting holder position on placekicks. He played five seasons and a record-tying 69 games at Clemson through 2021. In those five seasons, Clemson scored 565 points on placekicks, including field goals and PATs, and he held for 555 of those 565 points. The

only 10 Clemson kicking points not held by Will in his career were instead held by his brother, Drew, who was Clemson's starter at the position in 2022.

Will and Drew were succeeded by the youngest of the three Swinney boys, Clay, a redshirt sophomore who entered his second season as Clemson's starting holder in 2024. Clay's presence creates a plausible scenario in which every Clemson placekick in a full 10-year span from 2017-26 could be held by a Swinney.

Clemson's last hold by any player outside the Swinney family was on the final point of Clemson's 2016 national championship, as Seth Ryan, coincidentally also the son of a famous long-time coach (Rex Ryan), held the PAT following Hunter Renfrow's game-winning touchdown with one second remaining.

Clemson's Sept. 28 win against Stanford marked Clemson's 100th consecutive game with a Swinney as holder, a game that ironically resulted in Dabo Swinney's 100th career home win at Memorial Stadium. The family crossed 800 kicking points held for in the contest as well.

CONFERENCE PLAY IN REVIEW

Clemson concluded ACC regular season play on Nov. 16 with a thrilling 24-20 win at Pitt. The Tigers finished second in the ACC with a 7-1 conference record to earn an ACC Championship Game berth.

This season marked Clemson's 11th in school history with seven or more ACC wins, joining the 1983, 2012, 2013, 2015, 2016, 2017, 2018, 2019, 2020 and 2022 campaigns.

Clemson has 10 seasons with seven or more conference wins since Dabo Swinney was hired as the full-time coach prior to the 2009 season, more than double any other ACC program in that span.

TURNOVER TURNAROUND

Amid Clemson's frustrating 4-4 start to the 2023 season, Head Coach Dabo Swinney was running out of descriptors to explain Clemson's maddening penchant for turning the ball over — and doing so catastrophically.

This season, Clemson has been one of the nation's best teams at protecting the football. The Tigers rank tied for second in the nation in turnover margin (+16) and are one of only 14 teams nationally to commit single-digit turnovers this year (nine).

EXPLOSIVENESS IS BACK

From 2018-20, Clemson strung together its three best seasons in school history in yards per play while accumulating a 39-3 record and three College Football Playoff berths. In the three years to follow, Clemson's explosiveness dropped from an average of seventh nationally to an average of 91st.

The Tigers have taken a significant jump nationally in yards per play and scrimmage plays of various distances.

FIRST HALF IN REVIEW

Head Coach Dabo Swinney often likes to break the 12-game regular season into three-game "quarters" for his team. Clemson finished the first quarter of its 2024 regular season 2-1, but Clemson responded resoundingly to a disappointing loss to Georgia in the season opener. Clemson then went a resounding 3-0 in its "second quarter," including a home win against Stanford and two road wins at Florida State and Wake Forest

Clemson's first quarter was powered largely by two of Clemson's most explosive offensive performances in recent memory. Clemson scored 66 points on 712 yards against App State (9.8 yards per play) and scored 59 points on 523 yards against NC State (7.8 yards per play) in blowout victories. In doing so, Clemson scored 59 or more points in back-to-back games for only the third time in school history.

Despite being held to three points in its season opener, Clemson's scored 246 points through its first six games this season, the fifth-most through six games in school history.

Clemson drew Georgia to a 0-0 stalemate after one quarter in the opener and then proceeded to run out to first quarter leads of 35-0 and 28-0 against App State and NC State, respectively. According to ESPN, Clemson became the first FBS team in the last 20 seasons to lead by 28 or more points after the first quarter of consecutive games.

Clemson did not surrender a point in a first quarter this season until Wake Forest scored a touchdown with 1:32 remaining in the first quarter of Clemson's sixth game. Clemson held opponents scoreless in the first quarter of each of the first five games of a season for the first time since 1990 and played 88:28 of game time in first quarters this season before allowing a first-quarter point.

Clemson has outscored opponents 142-27 in the first quarter of games this season. Clemson's first quarter scoring differential of +8.85 points ranks first nationally.

DEFEATS IN REVIEW

Clemson has lost 20 games since 2015, the third-fewest in the nation. Eight of Clemson's 20 losses since 2015-40 percent — have come against AP Top 5 teams.

The opponents to whom Clemson has lost since 2015 have a combined final record of 197-61, a winning percentage of .764. Clemson has not lost to a team that finished with a losing record since 2017 and

has not lost to a team with a losing record at the time of the game since losing to 2-5 Boston College in 2010, Dabo Swinney's second full season as head coach.

RETURNING EXPERIENCE

According to traditional accounting, Clemson entered the spring of 2024 returning 11 of its 22 primary offensive and defensive starters from 2023. However, Clemson has 33 different players (including K/P/LS) who have started at least one game during their Clemson careers, including 18 of the team's 22 starters from last year's season-ending Gator Bowl win.

OFFENSIVE BALANCE

Clemson has fielded one of the nation's most balanced offenses since 2018, averaging 261 passing yards per game and 193 rushing yards per game from 2018-23. Clemson was one of only seven power conference teams to average at least 250 passing yards and at least 190 rushing yards on a per-game basis in

Clemson was perfect when exceeding both 200 rushing yards and 200 passing yards — 58-0 under Swinney and 108-0-1 all-time — until a defeat at Duke to open the 2023 season in which the Tigers reached the double-century mark in both categories. The defeat was also a statistical anomaly nationally, as from 2014 through the 2023 season opener, there had been 1.789 instances in which an FBS team had passed for 200-plus yards, rushed for 200-plus yards and given up 28 or fewer points in a single game. Teams who accomplished all three metrics were a combined 1748-41 (97.7 percent).

The anomaly struck again in 2024 when Clemson reached 200 yards in both categories in a loss to Louisville. After Clemson's loss in that game, FBS teams who, like Clemson, reached 200 passing yards and 200 rushing yards while also producing 30+ first downs and no turnovers were a combined 326-21 (93.9 percent) since 2000.

Clemson's 34 games reaching both 200 passing yards and 200 rushing yards since the start of the 2018 season are among the most in the country.

The approach to creating functional depth and rewarding players ready to play has been a key philosophy for Head Coach Dabo Swinney, whose own

collegiate playing career was hatched as a walk-on fighting for playing time in Alabama's receiving corps.

"We're fully committed to playing guys who deserve to play," Swinney said. "You commit to a guy early in the season, and even if a guy has only played 10 percent of the snaps, when you get to game eight or nine, they've got some good experience."

Clemson has played 100+ players in a game six times under Dabo Swinney, including a 106-player effort against App State on Sept. 7 and a 105-player day against The Citadel on Nov. 23. This year, Clemson set its Swinney-era record for most players played against a power conference opponent when 96 players appeared against NC State.

FINISH

In 2018, Clemson debuted a new version of its "This is Why We Work" fourth quarter video at Death Valley, a hype video imploring the team to finish and featuring Director of Strength and Conditioning Joey Batson bellowing:

"Let me tell you something right now: they don't put championship rings on smooth hands! You gotta go earn it! You gotta go earn it six seconds at a time! You win championships when the stadium is empty, when the band ain't playing, when the cheerleaders ain't cheering, when it's just you and your brothers right beside you. That's when you win championships! In the fourth quarter, that is when we shine!"

The video and the speech became a part of Clemson lore, buoyed by its playing during Clemson's comeback win against Syracuse that year en route to a 15-0 national championship season. Over the years, the video has changed but the speech remains the same, with many Clemson fans yelling it in unison as it plays.

Clemson holds a 145-5 record since 2011 when leading after three quarters. And though Head Coach Dabo Swinney frequently reiterates the phrase, "There is nothing less important than the score at halftime," Clemson ranks first since 2017 in both A) number of games leading at halftime and B) winning percentage in those games.

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

- Entering the 2024 fall semester, of the 381 eligible players who completed their athletic eligibility at Clemson and/or graduated early in Dabo Swinney's 15+ full years as head coach, 375 (98.4 percent) have earned a degree during their time at Clemson.
- Clemson broke program multi-year APR records in three straight years from 2017-19 (987 in 2016-17, 992 in 2017-18 and 993 in 2018-19) before the NCAA suspended APR reporting during the COVID-19 pandemic. Upon reinstatement of APR reporting in June 2022, Clemson shattered its multi-year APR record with a 999 covering the 2017-18 through 2020-21 academic years.
- Most recently, Clemson posted a 995 multi-year APR covering 2019-20 through 2022-23, fifth-best in the FBS. Clemson's lofty academic success in that period coincided with on-field excellence that included three ACC titles, two College Football Playoff berths and a national championship game berth.

- Clemson, Air Force and Northwestern are the only FBS programs to produce a 990+ multi-year APR in each of the last five reported cycles.
- Clemson was the only program in the country to finish among the Top 25 in APR rate among FBS schools and the AP Top 25 in all 12 years covering the 2011-22 seasons. Clemson finished in the AP Top 25 in 2023 as well and is awaiting APR reporting for that academic year.
- Prior to the suspension of APR Public Recognition Awards following the COVID-19 pandemic, the NCAA recognized Clemson with its annual honor, which is bestowed upon programs ranking in the Top 10 percent of their respective sports, for nine of the award's last 10 reported academic cycles. Only 37 of the 130 FBS programs earned at least one APR recognition across the 2009-10 through 2018-19 academic years. Only 30 programs earned it multiple times. Clemson, Duke and Northwestern were the only ones to earn the award 9+ times in that 10-year span.
- With its award for the 2018-19 academic year, Clemson became the only FBS program since the NCAA created the APR metric in 2003 to win a national championship and an APR Public Recognition Award in the same year multiple times. Alabama is the only other school to accomplish the title/APR double in a single year once (2011-12 academic year).

Clemson earned a team 3.03 GPA during the 2023 season, the second-highest fall GPA in program history and its fourth semester in a row with a team GPA of 3.0 or better. A total of 87 individuals earned a 3.0 GPA or better, the second-highest number of 3.0+ GPAs in program history. That included 18 perfect 4.0s.

- Clemson has had 80+ individuals earn a 3.0 or better GPA in five consecutive semesters.

HISTORIC GRADUATION SUCCESS RATE

Aided in part by historically elite academic performance by Clemson Football, Clemson Athletics tied for best in the NCAA among public Power Five institutions in Graduation Success Rate (GSR) with a 96 percent mark for the 2014-17 cohort in data released by the NCAA in November 2024.

Football reached a 99 percent mark for the second year in a row, again tying the highest GSR score for any Power Five football program, and tying the highest ever recorded among public Power Five football programs in the 20 years the NCAA has tracked the metric. Football trailed only Air Force and LIU (100 percent) in this release, and tied Columbia, Harvard and Northwestern.

CHURNING OUT NFL TALENT

Since assuming the head role midseason in 2008, Head Coach Dabo Swinney has produced 83 NFL draft picks during his head coaching tenure (plus an additional supplemental draft selection). His 83 draft picks produced are the most by any coach in the nation since the 2009 NFL Draft, and his 18 first-rounders are the third-most overall and most of any active coach in that span.

Additional nuggets on Clemson's recent success in the NFL Draft are included below:

- Clemson has produced at least five selections five times in the last six NFL Drafts, including six selections in 2019, seven selections in 2020, five selections in 2021, six in 2023 and six in 2024. Clemson has produced at least five picks nine times in the last 11 drafts; only Alabama (11) and Ohio State (10) have done so more times in that span.
- Clemson has now had at least one first-round draft choice in 10 of the last 12 years, standing alongside Alabama, Florida, Georgia and Ohio State as the only programs to produce a first-round pick in at least 10 of the last 12 years.
- Clemson has produced at least one Top 50 pick in 17 of the last 19 NFL Drafts, dating to 2006. The only drafts in that span in which Clemson did not produce a Top 50 pick were in 2009 and 2018. Florida (18), Clemson (17), Alabama (17), Ohio State (17) and USC (17) are the only schools to enter the 2024 NFL Draft

having produced at least one Top 50 pick in at least 17 of the last 19 NFL Drafts.

- Since 2013, Clemson has produced first-round picks from the QB, RB, WR, DE, DT, LB and DB position groups. The only other school with at least one firstrounder at all those positions in that span is Alabama.
- Clemson has had at least one player chosen by 30 of the 32 NFL franchises since 2003. Head Coach Dabo Swinney has produced a draft pick for 28 of the 32 NFL teams in his head coaching tenure.
- Clemson has had at least one player selected in 22 consecutive drafts since 2003, representing the second-longest streak in school history behind a 24year streak across the 1951-74 NFL Drafts.
- Clemson is one of only six schools to have produced multiple draft picks in each of the last 22 NFL Drafts (LSU, Michigan, Oklahoma, Ohio State and USC).

ATLANTA — No. 1 Georgia used a 28-3 second half run to pull away from No. 14 Clemson, 34-3, in the Aflac Kickoff Game at Mercedes-Benz Stadium in At-

Linebacker Wade Woodaz led Clemson with a career-high eight tackles (seven solo, one for loss), while sophomore defensive lineman Peter Woods added a career-high 2.5 tackles for loss. Antonio Williams led Clemson's offense with six receptions for 76 yards.

The game was scoreless after the first quarter, as the teams traded punts on each of the game's first five possessions. Second-quarter field goals of 30 and 55 yards by Peyton Woodring gave Georgia a 6-0 halftime edge. The tightly contested first half featured only 50 combined plays from scrimmage, 10 combined first downs and eight combined punts.

Georgia extended its lead to 13-0 on the opening possession of the second half when Carson Beck found Colbie Young for a seven-yard touchdown. Clemson scored on its first possession of the second half when freshman Nolan Hauser made a 26-yard field goal, the first of his collegiate career, to cut the lead to 13-3. However, Georgia extended its advantage to 20-3 with 3:15 remaining in the third quarter on a one-yard touchdown run by Nate Frazier.

Georgia's London Humphreys added a 40-yard touchdown reception on a pass from Beck with 9:57 to play in the fourth quarter to make the score 27-3 in favor of the Bulldogs. An interception by Georgia's Malaki Starks — the game's lone takeaway — set up Cash Jones to cap the ensuing Georgia drive with a 15-yard rushing touchdown, pushing the final score to 34-3.

CLEMSON, S.C. — Clemson scored a touchdown on each of its first eight possessions of the first half to ride a 35-0 first guarter lead and 56-13 halftime edge to a 66-20 win against Appalachian State in Death Valley.

Cade Klubnik earned Walter Camp National Offensive Player of the Week and Davey O'Brien National Quarterback of the Week for his performance in which he completed 24-of-26 passes for 378 yards and five passing touchdowns and rushed for two additional touchdowns in only one half of play. According to ESPN, he became the only FBS player win the last 25 years to record five passing touchdowns, two rushing touchdowns and a completion rate of 90 percent or better in a game.

Clemson's 712 yards of offense were the sixth-most in school history. That total included a school-record 525 yards in the first half. Clemson's 35 first-quarter points were the most in a first quarter in school history, and its 56 first-half points were a modern record for the program.

Clemson recorded its first game with a 300-yard passer (Klubnik), a 100-yard rusher (Phil Mafah) and two 100-yard receivers (Bryant Wesco Jr. & Jake Briningstool) since 2012 against NC State when Clemson had a 300-yard passer (Tajh Boyd), two 100-yard rushers (Andre Ellington and Tajh Boyd) and two 100-yard receivers (Sammy Watkins and Brandon Ford).

CLEMSON, S.C. — Clemson earned its 800th victory in program history with a 59-35 victory against NC State at Memorial Stadium. Clemson became the 14th FBS program and first ACC team ever to reach 800 wins.

Quarterback Cade Klubnik completed 16-of-24 passes for 209 yards with three passing touchdowns and added four carries for a career-high 70 rushing yards and one rushing touchdown. Running back Phil Mafah rushed seven times for 107 yards with a touchdown. Clemson's first-team offense scored points on eight of its nine drives, including seven touchdowns and one field goal.

Clemson raced out to a 28-0 first-quarter lead, becoming the first FBS team in 20 years of accessible ESPN data to hold a lead of 28 or more points after the first quarter of consecutive games. After NC State got on the board early in the second quarter, Clemson scored an additional 17 points to give the Tigers a 45-7 halftime advantage.

Adam Randall caught his first career touchdown on Clemson's first drive of the third quarter and defensive back Ashton Hampton scored on a 53-yard pick-six to push the score to 59-14 after three guarters. NC State would add 21 points against Clemson's backups in the fourth quarter to pull the final score to 59-35.

CLEMSON, S.C. - Head Coach Dabo Swinney earned his 100th home win as Clemson defeated Stanford, 40-10, at Death Valley in the teams' first matchup as conference foes.

Quarterback Cade Klubnik completed 15-of-31 passes for 255 yards with four passing touchdowns and added seven carries for 48 yards with a rushing touchdown. Wide receiver Bryant Wesco Jr. caught two passes for a team-high 104 yards and a touchdown.

Defensively, Clemson recorded four sacks while adding three takeaways and three turnovers on downs. Linebacker Barrett Carter tied his career high with 3.5 tackles for loss, while linebacker Sammy Brown recorded 2.0 sacks for his first career multi-sack game.

After Clemson turned Stanford over on downs on the game's opening possession, the Tigers opened the scoring on a 34-yard touchdown scramble by Klubnik. Red zone interceptions by Avieon Terrell and Jeadyn Lukus and a 20-yard Nolan Hauser field goal gave Clemson a 10-0 first-quarter lead. The teams traded secondquarter touchdowns to make the game 17-7 at the half.

Clemson pulled away in the second half thanks to three of Klubnik's four passing touchdowns on the day. Wide receiver Cole Turner and tight end Olsen Patt-Henry each recorded their first career receiving touchdowns, as the former rose up to haul in a 43-yard pass from Klubnik and the latter snagged a two-yard Klubnik throw in the end zone. Wesco scored on a 34-yard catch-and-run and joined Sammy Watkins as the only players in Clemson history to record multiple 100-yard receiving games in the first four games of a career.

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. — Phil Mafah ran for 154 yards as the No. 15 Tigers defeated Florida State in Doak Campbell Stadium. The victory was the 174th career head coaching win for Clemson Head Coach Dabo Swinney, who broke College Football Hall of Famer Bobby Bowden's conference record for career victories as an ACC head coach.

Quarterback Cade Klubnik finished 19-for-33 for 235 passing yards and a pair of first-half touchdowns and added 62 rushing yards on 11 carries. Wide receiver Antonio Williams tallied career-bests in receiving yards (84), rushing yards (36) and all-purpose yards (157). Freshman Nolan Hauser hit five field goals, becoming the first Clemson kicker to hit five in a game since Chandler Catanzaro in 2011.

Clemson jumped out to a 17-0 lead on the 1-4 Seminoles, as the Tigers supplemented Hauser's first field goal with Klubnik touchdown passes to Williams and T.J. Moore. The 17 points pushed Clemson's edge in first quarters through five games to 90-0.

A Brock Glenn touchdown pass cut the Clemson lead to 17-6, but a pair of Hauser field goals in the final two minutes brough the halftime score to 23-7.

Florida State scored early in the fourth quarter, but a two-point conversion attempt to try to cut the lead to eight fell incomplete. The Tigers leaned on their running game to close out the victory, as the Tigers gained 109 yards on 11 carries — with zero pass attempts — in the final frame to tack on two more Hauser field goals and earn the 29-13 win.

Additionally, Antonio Williams became the first Tiger since C.J. Spiller in 2009 to throw and catch a touchdown in a game, hauling in a 22-yarder from Klubnik in the second quarter and hitting Briningstool on a 28yard double pass in the third quarter.

The Tigers rolled up 566 yards of offense and 37 first downs -third-most in school history - and held possession for a season-best 36:29 while holding Wake Forest to just 233 yards of offense and 16 first downs.

Wake Forest opened the scoring on the game's fifth possession, when quarterback Hank Bachmeier found Horatio Fields for a 31-yard touchdown late in the first quarter. The touchdown represented the first points surrendered by Clemson in a first quarter this season. The Tigers would outscore Wake Forest 49-7 over the next three quarters.

Six different Tigers (two by Mafah, one each by Williams, Troy Stellato, Adam Randall, Briningstool and Keith Adams Jr. scored touchdowns in the contest. Safeties Kylon Griffin and Khalil Barnes recorded interceptions, and Barrett Carter notched a sack in a third consecutive game.

CLEMSON, S.C. - Running back Jay Haynes ran for 118 yards and two touchdowns on just five carries as Clemson cruised past The Citadel on Senior Day and Military Appreciation Day. The win gave Clemson nine wins in 14 consecutive seasons, tying Florida State for the third-longest streak in major college football history.

The Tigers scored three touchdowns of 55 yards or longer in the first half. Defensive tackle Payton Page intercepted a pass and took it 57 yards for a touchdown, freshman wide receiver Bryant Wesco Jr. scored on a 55-yard pass, and Haynes broke free for a 70-yard rushing score. The Tigers established a 42-0 lead with 13:13 to play in the second half before removing the majority of its first unit.

Linebacker Barrett Carter found his way into the end zone on a running play with 6:25 to play to go along with six tackles. Freshman linebacker Sammy Brown added a team-high 11 stops.

Clemson scored touchdowns on each of its first five possessions and added a 32-yard Nolan Hauser field goal on its sixth possession. The Tigers held a 45-7 lead after three quarters.

The Citadel opened the fourth guarter with a blocked field goal followed by a 66-yard touchdown reception by Javonte Graves-Billips on a flea flicker to cut the score to 45-14. The Tigers answered with a nine-play, 70-yard touchdown drive, with Carter rushing four yards into the end zone on the first offensive snap of his career to bring the final score to 51-14.

CLEMSON, S.C. - Cade Klubnik led No. 12 Clemson (9-3) inside the 20-yard line with less than a minute to play, but a deflected pass was intercepted by Demetrius Knight Jr. to seal a 17-14 win for No. 14 South Carolina (9-3) at Memorial Stadium.

Klubnik completed 24-for-36 passes for 280 yards and added 10 carries for 62 yards and both of Clemson's touchdowns on the ground. Clemson had six tackles for loss, three sacks and forced three turnovers.

After a scoreless first quarter, Clemson opened the game's scoring on the Tigers' third drive. Klubnik scampered 13 yards to give Clemson a 7-0 lead. The Gamecocks responded on their ensuing possession with a 25-yard touchdown run by LaNorris Sellers. The six-play, 75-yard drive evened the score at 7-7 as the teams remained tied heading into halftime.

On Clemson's first drive of the second half, Klubnik capped an 11-play, 80-yard drive with his second touchdown run of the day, this time covering 18 yards.

After a T.J. Parker strip-sack in the first quarter, Clemson recorded its second and third takeaways of the day in the second half. Avieon Terrell forced a thirdquarter fumble that was recovered by Barrett Carter, and Khalil Barnes ended a scoring threat with a fourthquarter interception as Clemson carried a 14-7 lead into the fourth quarter.

South Carolina notched back-to-back scoring drives late in the contest when kicker Alex Herrera converted a 42-yard field goal to cut the lead. A 20-yard touchdown rush by Sellers with 1:08 left in the fourth quarter ended a nine-play, 75-yard drive by putting the Gamecocks ahead, 17-14.

Klubnik then led a seven-play, 45-yard drive to put the Tigers inside the 20, but South Carolina secured the win with Knight's interception with 12 seconds left on the clock.

CHARLOTTE - Freshman Nolan Hauser made a 56-yard field goal as time expired as No. 17 Clemson won the ACC Championship Game and earned its seventh College Football Playoff berth with a 34-31 victory over No. 8 SMU at Bank of America Stadium.

Clemson led 31-14 after three quarters, but SMU scored 17 in a row and tied the game 31-31 with 16 seconds remaining. But Clemson responded as Adam Randall's 41-yard kickoff return got the Tigers to the Clemson 45-yard line. After quarterback Cade Klubnik hit Antonio Williams for 17 yards, Hauser put the 56-yarder down the middle to capture the title. It was the longest game-winning field goal in Clemson history and the first game-winning field goal of 50-plus yards in conference championship game history.

Klubnik went 24-of-41 passing for 262 yards and an ACC Championship Game record-tying four passing touchdowns to earn Most Valuable Player honors. He became only the third player ever to win multiple ACC Championship Game MVP honors (Deshaun Watson and Tyrod Taylor, two each).

Freshman wide receiver Bryant Wesco Jr. had eight catches for 143 yards and two touchdowns, and junior tight end Jake Briningstool recorded four catches for 23 yards and two touchdowns. Defensively, Clemson forced two first-half turnovers, a strip sack by sophomore defensive end T.J. Parker, who also recorded eight tackles (3.5 for loss), and an interception by sophomore safety Khalil Barnes. Sammy Brown led the defense with 14 tackles (0.5 for loss).

The conference title was Clemson's 28th all-time and its 22nd as a member of the ACC.
