CLEMSON SEEKS SIXTH STRAIGHT ROAD WIN IN SERIES AT SOUTH CAROLINA ON SATURDAY

Clemson will conclude its 2025 regular season slate on Saturday, Nov. 29 when the Tigers and South Carolina Gamecocks meet in search of Palmetto State supremacy for the 122nd time in series history. Kickoff at Williams-Brice Stadium in Columbia is set for noon ET on SEC Network.

One of the nation's most-played rivalries has been belonged to the visitors in each of the series' last five installments. The last win by a home team in the series was a 56-35 Clemson win during the Tigers' 2018 national championship season. In the years since, Clemson won in Columbia in 2019, 2021 and 2023, South Carolina won in Clemson in 2022 and 2024, and the series was not played amid the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020.

According to Stats Perform, the Clemson-South Carolina series is one of only eight active series in the FBS in which the road team has won each of the last five or more contests. The Bowling Green-Central Michigan series has seen seven straight road wins, and seven series have an active streak of five such games: Clemson-South Carolina, Georgia Tech-Pitt, Louisiana-South Alabama, Louisiana Tech-Western Kentucky, Bowling Green-Buffalo, Arkansas-Auburn and USC-UCLA.

Clemson has won in each of its last five trips to Williams-Brice Stadium, and this week the Tigers will attempt to earn a sixth straight road win against South Carolina for the first time since the 1989-99 seasons. A victory would pull Clemson within one of the record for the longest road winning streak by either team in series history (seven by Clemson from 1934-40).

Last week, Clemson secured bowl eligibility for the 27th consecutive year (including 2004, when the Tigers opted against postseason participation). Clemson is expected to make a bowl appearance for a 21st consecutive year, the nation's fourth-longest active streak.

Clemson enters Saturday's game against 4-7 South Carolina having not lost to a team with a losing record at the time of kickoff since losing to 2-5 Boston College in 2010. Clemson has won 36 straight games against teams with losing records, the nation's third-longest active streak according to Stats Perform (Alabama and Ohio State, 40

WHAT TO WATCH FOR THIS WEEK

- The 2025 Tigers attempting to become the first team in Clemson history to win seven games in a season in which the team started the year with one win or fewer through four games.
- Clemson attempting to improve to 74-44-4 all-time against South Carolina. Clemson's 73 all-time wins against South Carolina are the program's most against any opponent
- Clemson entering the game having led the all-time series with the Gamecocks for 46,398 consecutive days (127 years, 12 days) as of kickoff time on Saturday. South Carolina won the series opener in 1896 before Clemson evened the series in 1897. Clemson won the third game in the series on Nov. 17, 1898 to take a 2-1 series lead, a lead Clemson hasn't relinquished.
- Clemson entering the game having won eight of the last 10 games in the series. In that span, Clemson has outscored South Carolina, 346-159, an average margin of 18.7 points per game. Clemson's two losses in the last 10 games in the rivalry have come by a combined four points.
- Clemson attempting to move its all-time road record against South Carolina to 55-32-3. Clemson's 54 current road wins at South Carolina are nearly double its most all-time road wins against any other opponent, as Clemson's second-most road wins against an opponent are its 28 at Wake Forest. The Tigers have more road wins against the Gamecocks in Columbia (54) than they have total wins against all but three programs (South Carolina, 73; Wake Forest, 72; and NC State, 61).
- Clemson attempting to earn a sixth straight road win against South Carolina for the first time since the 1989-99 seasons. It would also pull Clemson within one of the school record for the longest road winning streak by either team in series history (seven by Clemson from 1934-40).
- Clemson attempting to win a sixth straight game in Columbia to produce Clemson's 11th all-time road winning streak of six or more games against a single opponent.

- Clemson attempting to give the road team the victory in the sixth straight game in the rivalry. The last win by a home team in the series was a 56-35 Clemson win in 2018. Clemson won in Columbia in 2019, 2021 and 2023, South Carolina won in Clemson in 2022 and 2024, and the series was not played in 2020.
- Clemson entering Williams-Brice Stadium, where the Tigers have surrendered two touchdowns and only 20 total points in their last 16 quarters of play (34-10 in 2017, 38-3 in 2019, 30-0 in 2021 and 16-7 in 2023).
- Clemson attempting to improve to 221-66-13 all-time against foes from the state of South Carolina. Clemson has a winning record against all 12 Palmetto State opponents it has faced all-time.
- Clemson facing an opponent from the state of South Carolina for the 300th time in school history. Entering Saturday, Clemson's all-time Palmetto State opponents include South Carolina (121 games), Furman (59), The

Citadel (40), Presbyterian (40), Wofford (16), Erskine (eight), Newberry (six), SC State (five), Charleston Southern (one), Coastal Carolina (one), Camp Sevier (one) and Port Royal (one).

- Clemson attempting to extend its road winning streak to four games.
- Clemson attempting to improve to 9-1 in its last 10 regular season road games.
- Clemson attempting to improve to 44-10 in true road games since the start of the 2015 season. Clemson's 43 wins rank tied for first in the country in true road game victories in that span.
- Clemson (3-1) attempting to win four road games in a season for the eighth time since 2015. An eighth such season would tie Clemson with Ohio State and Boise State for the most seasons with four or more road wins in that span.

- Clemson facing its second SEC opponent of the season. Including 2025, Clemson has faced multiple SEC teams in 19 of the last 20 years, dating to 2006. The lone exception came in 2020 when the SEC opted out of nonconference play amid the COVID-19 pandemic.
- Clemson attempting to improve to 13-6 against SEC opponents in regular season play in the College Football Playoff era.
- Clemson attempting to improve to 26-12 in games against teams to which it lost its last meeting under Dabo Swinney.
- Clemson attempting to avoid being beaten by the same team in back-to-back years for the first time since Florida State did so across a three-year span from 2012-14. With wins against Florida State and Louisville in November, Clemson is 2-0 this season against teams to which it lost a year ago.
- Clemson entering the game having won 36 consecutive games against teams with a losing record, the third-longest active streak in the country. Clemson has not lost to a team with a losing record at the time of kickoff since losing to 2-5 Boston College in 2010.

- Clemson attempting to finish November with a 4-1 record. It would be Clemson's first four-win month since November 2023.
- Clemson attempting to end a regular season on a winning streak of four or more games for the seventh time in Dabo Swinney's tenure (2015, 2017, 2018, 2019, 2021 and 2023). It would be the 26th such regular season in Clemson history.
- Clemson attempting to improve to 110-20 in regular season play since the start of the 2015 season.
- Clemson attempting to improve to 146-23 against AP-unranked teams under Dabo Swinney and improve to 123-13 in those games since the start of the 2012

- Head Coach Dabo Swinney (186-52) attempting to tie Joe Paterno and Urban Meyer for the fourth-most victories within the first 20 seasons of a head coaching career. Swinney trails only Tom Osborne (195), Nick Saban (191), Bob Stoops (191), Paterno (187) and Meyer (187) despite Swinney being in only his 18th season (and 17th full season). Note: Stoops and Meyer are not credited on the NCAA's official list of most wins through 20 seasons since they did not coach 20 years.
- Swinney attempting to match the career win total of College Football Hall of Famer Urban Meyer (187–32).
- Swinney attempting to improve to 10-7 all-time against South Carolina.
- Swinney attempting to join Frank Howard (13) as the only Clemson coaches to defeat South Carolina 10 times.

- Clemson (2,492) needing eight points to reach 2.500 all-time points scored against South Carolina. The Gamecocks would become the first program to surrender 2,500 points all-time to the Tigers.
- Clemson attempting to score in its 306th consecutive game to tie the 1992-2017 Air Force Falcons for the 11th-longest streak in the NCAA's FBS record book.
- Clemson attempting to reach both 200 passing yards and 200 rushing yards in consecutive games for the first time since last season against Florida State and Wake
- Clemson attempting to rush for 200 yards in consecutive games for the first time since last season against Florida State and Wake Forest.
- Clemson entering the game having scored at least one rushing touchdown in a national-best-tying 95 of its 107 games since the start of the 2018 season. Clemson has also rushed for multiple touchdowns in a national-best 77 games in that span.
- Clemson attempting to rush for multiple touchdowns in three consecutive games for the first time since 2024 against Wake Forest, Virginia and Louisville.
- Clemson attempting to throw four or more touchdowns in consecutive games for the first time since 2018 against Florida State and Louisville.
- Clemson attempting to play back-to-back turnoverfree games for the first time since October 2024 at Wake Forest and Florida State.
- Clemson attempting to go six consecutive games without throwing an interception for the first time since a seven-game streak across the 1988-89 seasons.
- Clemson entering the game having thrown 177 consecutive pass attempts without an interception. Clemson's most recent interception came on its thirdto-last pass attempt at Boston College on Oct. 11 on a throw by Christopher Vizzina.
- Clemson attempting to hold four consecutive opponents to fewer than 20 points for the first time since the final two games of 2021 and first two games of 2022. That four-game streak in 2021-22 started with a 30-0 shutout win against South Carolina in Columbia.
- Clemson attempting to hold consecutive opponents to 4.0 or fewer yards per play for the first time since 2023 against Charleston Southern and Florida Atlantic.
- Clemson (28) needing two more sacks to reach 30 sacks for the 14th consecutive season. Clemson's last season with fewer than 30 sacks was in 2011. Clemson was the only program in the nation to enter 2025 having reached 30 sacks in every year of the College Football Playoff era (since 2014).
- Safety Khalil Barnes attempting to become the first Clemson player to record an interception in three different games against a single opponent since K'Von Wallace against NC State in 2016, 2017 and 2018. Barnes has an interception in each of Clemson's last two games against South Carolina.
- Linebacker Sammy Brown (5.0) needing one more sack to take sole possession of a new single-season career high, surpassing his 5.0 as a freshman last year.
- Brown attempting to become the first Clemson player with a full sack in four consecutive games since Shag Lawson in the final four games of 2015.
- Brown attempting to record an interception in backto-back games for the first time in his career.
- Brown attempting to become the second Clemson player to record an interception in consecutive games this season (Ricardo Jones against Boston College and SMU)
- Brown attempting to become the first Clemson linebacker to record an interception in back-to-back games since Wade Woodaz in 2023 against Charleston

Southern and Florida Atlantic.

- Brown attempting to become the first Clemson player under Dabo Swinney to record multiple games in a single season with both an interception and a full sack. He would join Jeremiah Trotter Jr. (one in 2022 and one in 2023) as the only players in Swinney's tenure to record multiple such games in a career.
- Kicker Nolan Hauser (82.4 percent) attempting to finish off the fourth season by a Clemson kicker under Dabo Swinney with a field goal percentage of 82.0 percent or better (min. 2 FGA), joining Chandler Catanzaro's 94.7 percent in 2012 and 92.9 percent in 2013 and Greg Huegel's 84.4 percent in 2015.
- Defensive end Will Heldt (6.0) seeking to add to his single-season career high in sacks.
- Heldt attempting to record a sack in back-to-back games for the first time since the first two games of
- Heldt attempting to become the first Clemson player to force a fumble in consecutive games this season. Three Clemson players accomplished the feat in 2024 (T.J. Parker, Avieon Terrell and Wade Woodaz).
- Quarterback Cade Klubnik (25-13) attempting to pass Charlie Whitehurst (25-15) for sole possession of the fifth-most wins by a Clemson starting quarterback since World War II.
- Klubnik (1-1) attempting to become the 13th Clemson quarterback since 1953 to earn multiple rivalry wins against South Carolina as a starting quarterback, joining Charlie Bussey, Jimmy Addison, Steve Fuller, Homer Jordan, Rodney Williams, DeChane Cameron, Nealon Greene, Woody Dantzler, Charlie Whitehurst, Cullen Harper, Deshaun Watson and Trevor Lawrence.
- Klubnik (nine) attempting to throw for 300 yards to become the fourth player in Clemson history to post 10 career 300-yard passing games, joining Tajh Boyd (18 from 2010-13), Trevor Lawrence (13 from 2018-20) and Deshaun Watson (13 from 2014-16).
- Klubnik (73) needing two touchdown passes to become the fourth player in school history to throw 75 career touchdown passes, joining Tajh Boyd (107 from 2010-13). Deshaun Watson (90 from 2014-16) and Trevor Lawrence (90 from 2018-20).
- Klubnik (9,662) needing four passing yards to pass Charlie Whitehurst (9,665 from 2002-05) for the fourthmost career passing yards in Clemson history.
- Klubnik (9,662) needing 338 passing yards to join Tajh Boyd (11,904 from 2010-13), Deshaun Watson (10,163 from 2014-16) and Trevor Lawrence (10,098 from 2018-20) as the only quarterbacks in Clemson history to throw for 10,000 career passing yards.
- Klubnik (870) needing 31 completions to tie or 32 completions to pass Tajh Boyd (901 from 2010-13) for the Clemson record for career pass completions.
- Klubnik (1,354) throwing 15 passes to move past Charlie Whitehurst (1,368 from 2002-05) for the secondmost career pass attempts in Clemson history. Klubnik is 48 pass attempts shy of Tajh Boyd's school record (1,402 from 2010-13).
- Klubnik entering the game having thrown 115 consecutive pass attempts without an interception. His last interception came on his fourth-to-last pass attempt at Boston College on Oct. 11. His career-long streak is 170 attempts, set in 2023.
- Klubnik (879) chasing No. 10 Ken Pengitore (898), No. 9 DJ Uiagalelei (913 from 2020-22), No. 8 Trevor Lawrence (943 from 2018-20) and No. 7 Kelly Bryant (973 from 2015-18) on Clemson's leaderboard for career rushing vards by a quarterback since Clemson transitioned from the single wing in 1953.
- Klubnik (16) chasing Trevor Lawrence (18 from 2018-20) for fifth on Clemson's all-time leaderboard for

NO QUIT IN THESE TIGERS

In the immediate aftermath of a nail-biting 20-19 road win at No. 19 Louisville on Nov. 14, Head Coach Dabo Swinney spoke passionately to ESPN's Paul Carcaterra about the fight of his 2025 team.

"The tougher it's gotten, the closer they've become, the stronger they've gotten and the more they've dug in," Swinney bellowed. "And that's not normal, not in today's world. That's not normal. Usually when you have some adversity, you divide, [and] people are looking for the sideline or the training room, but not these Tigers, not these seniors... The record don't define you; how you respond is what defines you — in everything. In life, in football, everything. Our record ain't what we want it be, but we've got a hell of a great group of young people right there... A lot of people have quit on 'em. There ain't no quit in that bunch, and there ain't no quit in me. Go Tigers!"

Clemson's 1-3 start through four games in 2025 was its first 1-3 start since 2004. That year, Tommy Bowden's Clemson team went 5-2 over its seven remaining games to finish the year with a 6-5 record. The Tigers earned bowl eligibility that year but declined postseason opportunities.

Clemson has opened a season with one win or fewer through four games 30 times in its 130-season history. The Tigers have fought back to finish .500 or better in nine of those campaigns (1906, 1914, 1934, 1937, 1961, 1963, 1967, 1985 and 2004).

In 16 of the previous 29 seasons with one win or fewer through four games, Clemson was led by a member of the College Football Hall of Fame. That includes four such seasons under Jass Neely, 11 seasons under Frank Howard and one season under Danny Ford. With a win this week, the 2025 Tigers can become the first team in Clemson history to rebound from a 1-3 or worse start to win seven games.

SERIES HISTORY VS. SOUTH CAROLINA

Saturday's game will be the 122nd all-time meeting between Clemson and South Carolina. Before the series was interrupted in 2020 by the COVID-19 pandemic, the teams had played every year from 1909-2019, which at the time was the nation's second-longest active streak of consecutive years played in a rivalry. The only longer consecutive rivalry at the time was Minnesota vs. Wisconsin, which had been played every year since 1907.

Despite the interruption, at 121 games, the Clemson-South Carolina series entered 2025 tied for the 10thmost-played rivalry in the FBS.

The Clemson vs. South Carolina series dates to 1896, the first year of football at Clemson and the fourth season for South Carolina. Clemson holds the series advantage, 73-44-4. South Carolina won the first meeting, 12-6, in Columbia in 1896. Clemson's first win took place the following year, an 18-6 victory in Columbia.

In 2022, South Carolina broke Clemson's seriesrecord-tying seven-game winning streak in the series from 2014-21 (excluding a 2020 season in which the teams did not play amid the COVID-19 pandemic). Clemson's seven-game streak had tied the 1934-40 Tigers for the longest winning streak in the series for either team.

Clemson has more wins (73) over South Carolina than any other opponent, and those victories represent almost nine percent of Clemson's all-time victory total (814). Clemson's 2004 victory in the series was the program's 600th all-time win.

The two teams played in Columbia as part of "Big Thursday" every year through 1959. In the 57 Big Thursday games, Clemson recorded a 33-21-3 advantage. The teams have played 63 games since the last Big Thursday game in 1959 with a similar record, 39-23-1, in favor of Clemson. Clemson is 19-12-1 in the series at Clemson since 1960 and 21-11-0 in the series in Columbia.

SERIES TIDBITS

- Four Clemson quarterbacks have started and defeated South Carolina at least three times, Steve Fuller (1976-78), Homer Jordan (1980-82), Charlie Whitehurst (2002-05) and Deshaun Watson (2014-16). Whitehurst is the only quarterback in the series to start four straight victories
- The visiting team won seven years in a row between 1991-97. The road team enters 2025 having also won each of the last five matchups in the series.
- Clemson has a record of 54-32-3 in Columbia, including wins in its last five visits.
- Clemson entered the 2015 game ranked No. 1 in the nation. It marked the first time either team was ranked No. 1 entering the contest. Clemson won, 37-32, in Columbia. It marked the first of a five-game span in the series in which Clemson ranked in the Top 5.
- Clemson has a 16-10 record against South Carolina when the game is played the Saturday after Thanksgiving or on Thanksgiving Day. The only game played on Thanksgiving was the 1963 contest that was moved from the Saturday before Thanksgiving to Thanksgiving due to the assassination of President John F. Kennedy.

MEMORABLE PLAYS IN THE SERIES

- 1948: Phil Prince blocked a punt and Oscar Thompson returned the ball for a touchdown with 4:15 remaining to give Clemson a 13-7 win in Columbia to help preserve an undefeated season.
- 1959: Harvey White connected with future Super Bowl champion Bill Mathis for a 26-yard touchdown pass in the third quarter to put Clemson up 19-0 in the final Big Thursday game in Columbia. White completed 9-of-10 passes on the day and led the Tigers to the 27-0 victory.
- 1962: Don Chuy and Billy Weaver combined to sack Dan Reeves for a 13-yard loss on fourth down with just 33 seconds left, preserving Clemson's 20-17 victory. South Carolina had driven to the Clemson 25 for that last play.
- 1966: Harry Olszewski, an All-America offensive guard, picked off a fumbled snap in mid-air and ran 12 yards for a touchdown. The 35-10 victory allowed Clemson to win the ACC title.
- 1967: Buddy Gore's 43-yard run in the third period led to a Tiger touchdown and was a momentum-swaying play in Clemson's victory over the Gamecocks, a win that allowed Clemson to clinch a share of the ACC title. That was the key run on this day that saw Gore become the first Clemson back in history to go over 1,000 yards in a season and break Brian Piccolo's ACC single-season rushing record.
- 1971: Eddie Seigler kicked a 52-yard field goal to lead Clemson to a 17-7 win over the Gamecocks. It was the first field goal of at least 50 yards in Clemson history.
- 1972: With Clemson leading 7-6 in the fourth period, Jimmy Williamson batted down a Dobby Grossman twopoint conversion pass to preserve the victory for the Tigers.
- 1977: Jerry Butler caught a 20-yard touchdown pass from Steve Fuller with 49 seconds left to give Clemson a 31-27 win in Columbia. "The Catch" clinched a Gator Bowl bid for the Tigers, Clemson's first bowl bid in 18 years.
- **1980:** Willie Underwood recorded a 37-yard interception return for a touchdown that clinched Clemson's upset of South Carolina and Heisman Trophy winner George Rogers in 1980. Underwood was named Sports Illustrated Player of the Week for his performance in that game.
- 1981: Just as it had happened 33 years earlier, a blocked punt played a major role in a Clemson victory over South Carolina in an undefeated season. Rod McSwain blocked a South Carolina punt and Johnny Rembert recovered in the end zone for the touchdown. Just as it had been 33 years prior, the line of scrimmage was the South Carolina 28.
- 1988: Rodney Williams, a native of Columbia, led Clemson to a 29-10 victory in his final game at Death Valley. Setting the record as Clemson's all-time winningest starting quarterback at the time with 32 wins, he threw for 192 yards, rushed for 38 more and scored a touchdown.
- 1990: Chris Gardocki made his final punt in Death Valley memorable when he had a 78-yard boot in the fourth quarter to give South Carolina bad field position

and clinch Clemson's 24-15 victory over the Gamecocks. It remains the third-longest punt in Clemson history.

- **1995:** Emory Smith carried South Carolina tacklers 20 yards on the way to a 54-yard run that led to the game-clinching touchdown in Columbia. Smith ended the game with 101 rushing yards.
- 2000: Rod Gardner's 50-yard reception "The Catch II" from Woody Dantzler with 10 seconds left led to Aaron Hunt's game-winning 25-yard field goal with three seconds left. Eventual National Championship-winning Co-Offensive Coordinator Jeff Scott served as the holder on the game-winning field goal.
- **2007:** Mark Buchholz kicked a 35-yard field goal on the last play of the game to give Clemson a 23-21 victory in Columbia.
- 2016: Mike Williams caught three touchdown passes in the first half, including one in which he carried a South Carolina defensive back the final nine yards into the end zone. It led to a 56-7 Clemson victory, the Tigers' largest victory margin over the Gamecocks since 1900 (51-0). Deshaun Watson finished his three-game Palmetto Bowl career with a three-game total of 61-of-79 passing (77.2 percent) for 895 yards and nine touchdowns with just one interception, while also rushing 31 times for 146 yards and five scores in those three contests.
- 2023: On the game's second play from scrimmage, freshman safety Khalil Barnes scooped up a dropped lateral and returned it 42 yards for a touchdown. On the next play from scrimmage, Barnes picked off quarterback Spencer Rattler, becoming the first Clemson player to record a takeaway on consecutive plays from scrimmage by an opponent since Brian Dawkins against Duke in 1995. Clemson would go on to win the game 16-7 on the strength of the Barnes scoop-and-score and three Jonathan Weitz field goals.

SIGNIFICANT SERIES WINS FOR CLEMSON

- 1900 (51-0): Part of a perfect 6-0 season under firstyear head coach John Heisman.
- 1928 (32-0): Clemson won a battle of unbeaten teams, as both teams were 5-0 entering the game. Clemson went on to an 8-3 record, a season mark for wins in a season at the time.
- **1939 (27-0):** Banks McFadden led Clemson to victory, an important win in a 9-1 season that ended with a win over Boston College in the Cotton Bowl.
- 1948 (13-7): Phil Prince blocked a field goal late in the game, leading to a Clemson victory that preserved an unbeaten season. Clemson went on to a perfect 11-0 record.
- 1956 (7-0): No. 20 Clemson downed South Carolina in an ACC rivalry game, as the Tigers went on to win the ACC Championship.
- 1959 (27-0): Clemson won the final Big Thursday game in Columbia behind Harvey White. The Tigers went on to a 9-2 record, a No. 11 final ranking and the ACC title.
- 1960 (12-2): Clemson won the first game in Clemson between the two schools.
- 1967 (23-12): Clemson won in the final game of season to clinch an ACC Championship. It marked the final time Clemson won an ACC title by beating South Carolina in the final game. Clemson had done the same a year earlier in 1966.
- 1977 (31-27): Jerry Butler's catch in the final seconds gave the Tigers a come-from-behind victory that sent Clemson to the Gator Bowl, its first bowl game in 18 years.
- 1980 (27-6): Clemson upset 14th-ranked South Carolina behind Willie Underwood's two interceptions and 17 tackles. South Carolina featured Heisman Trophy winner George Rogers and had won at Michigan earlier

in the year. South Carolina was 8-2 entering the game.

- **1981 (29-13):** Clemson closed out its perfect regular season on the way to a National Championship.
- 1988 (29-10): Clemson won a battle of Top 25 teams in Rodney Williams' final home game. Clemson would then beat Oklahoma in a bowl game to finish the season in the Top 10.
- 2000 (16-14): Clemson won another battle of Top 25 teams thanks to Rod Gardner's 50-yard reception from Woody Dantzler in final seconds to set up a 25-yard field goal by Aaron Hunt with three seconds left.
- 2003 (63-17): Clemson posted its most points scored against the Gamecocks and what was then the largest victory margin since 1900. Charlie Whitehurst threw for four touchdown passes and Chad Jasmin scored four.
- 2005 (13-9): Clemson defeated 19th-ranked South Carolina in Columbia, the only time it has beaten a top 20 South Carolina team in Columbia. The victory gave Whitehurst a 4-0 record against South Carolina as starting quarterback.
- 2007 (23-21): Mark Buchholz booted a 35-yard field goal on the last play of the game to give Clemson a 23-21 victory, the only time Clemson has beaten South Carolina with a scoring play on the last play of the game.
- **2008** (31-14): Dabo Swinney defeated South Carolina in his last game as interim head coach, a victory that helped him retain the position in a full-time capacity.
- 2014 (35-17): Clemson ended a five-year drought in the series with a 35-17 victory at Clemson. Deshaun Watson played with a torn ACL but accounted for four touchdowns. Freshman Wayne Gallman rushed for 191 yards, the second most in Clemson history against the Gamecocks, and freshman Artavis Scott had seven receptions for 185 yards, the most receiving yards in history by a Clemson player against the Gamecocks.
- 2018 (56-35): Clemson improved to 12-0 for only the third time in school history by earning a 56-35 home victory against the Gamecocks. In addition to helping propel Clemson to a 15-0 season record and its third national championship, the victory was Clemson's 100th of the decade as well as its fifth consecutive victory over South Carolina
- 2019 (38-3): Clemson finished off a second-straight undefeated regular season with a 38-3 win in Columbia. It was Clemson's 27th consecutive win of its eventual school-record 29-game winning streak across the 2018-19 seasons. Running back Travis Etienne broke James Conner's ACC record for career rushing touchdowns during the contest.
- 2021 (30-0): Cornerback Andrew Booth Jr. recorded two interceptions and linebacker Jeremiah Trotter Jr. tackled Zeb Noland at the three-yard line on the game's final play to preserve Clemson's first shutout in the series since 1989. The win pushed Clemson's winning streak in the series to seven games, matching the longest winning streak in the series by either team all-time.

DID YOU KNOW? UNUSUAL SERIES FACTS

- Though 29 is an unusual point total in football, the winner of the Clemson-South Carolina game has scored exactly 29 points four times since 1981.
- Charlie Whitehurst is the only starting quarterback to lead a team to four wins in the history of the series doing so for Clemson from 2002-05. Deshaun Watson could have potentially matched Whitehurst's accomplishment if he returned for his senior year, but he instead opted to enter the NFL Draft. Trevor Lawrence was 2-0 against South Carolina, with his opportunity at a third win against the Gamecocks nullified by schedule changes during the pandemic in 2020.
- Josh Cody had a 4-0 record for Clemson against South Carolina between 1927-30. He is the only coach

in the series to have a perfect record with a minimum of three games coached.

- Cary Cox, who passed away in 2008, lettered for the Gamecocks in 1943. After the war, he enrolled at Clemson and served as captain for the Tigers in 1947. Other players to play for both squads include Paul Williams, who lettered for Clemson in 1978 and for South Carolina in 1980, and Tavien Feaster, who spent 2016-18 with Clemson prior to joining South Carolina as a graduate transfer for 2019.
- Clemson had three touchdown plays of at least 76 yards against South Carolina in 2006 in a loss. Jacoby Ford scored on 76-yard touchdown pass, C.J. Spiller on an 80-yard run and Jock McKissic on an 82-yard interception return. It is the only game in Clemson history in which Clemson had three scoring plays of at least 75 yards and still lost.
- In both 1948 and 1981, a blocked punt returned for a touchdown proved to be the pivotal play in a Clemson victory victories that allowed Clemson to go on to an undefeated season. In both instances, the original line of scrimmage was the South Carolina 28-yard-line.
- Willie Underwood had two interceptions to lead Clemson to victory over South Carolina in 1980. A starter for four years, the strong safety never had recorded an interception in any of his first 46 games as a Tiger, then had two against the Gamecocks in his 47th and final game. One of the picks was a 37-yard return for a touchdown, the only touchdown of his career.
- In a placekicking career that spanned five years, Bob Paulling made 107-of-109 extra points. Both of his misses were at South Carolina, one in 1981 and one in 1983. He had a streak of 70 consecutive made extra points between the two miscues.
- In the 30 games that Frank Howard coached for Clemson against South Carolina, Clemson scored 411 points and South Carolina scored 411 points.

LAST MEETING

South Carolina 17, Clemson 14

(Nov. 30, 2024, Clemson, S.C.)

CLEMSON, S.C. — Quarterback Cade Klubnik led No. 12 Clemson inside the 20-yard line with less than a minute to play, but a deflected pass was intercepted by Demetrius Knight Jr. to seal a 17-14 win for No. 14 South Carolina at Memorial Stadium. South Carolina quarterback LaNorris Sellers scored the game-winning touchdown on a 20-yard scramble on 3rd-and-15 with 1:08 to play and the Gamecocks held on for the win.

Klubnik completed 24-for-36 passes for 280 yards and added 10 carries for 62 yards and both of Clemson's touchdowns on the ground. Clemson had six tackles for loss, three sacks and forced three turnovers, but Sellers was able to escape pressure for big gains on several occasions, including the final scoring play.

The teams played a scoreless first quarter. South Carolina took the game's opening drive 51 yards in six plays, but T.J. Parker's fifth forced fumble of the season ended the Gamecock threat. Later in the quarter, Clemson produced a 10-play, 85-yard drive but was stopped short on fourth-and-1 to keep the score at 0-0.

Clemson opened the game's scoring on the Tigers' third drive. Clemson started the drive with a 40-yard pass from Klubnik to Antonio Williams, and two plays later, Klubnik scampered 13 yards for his sixth rushing touchdown of the season and a 7-0 lead for Clemson.

The Gamecocks responded on their ensuing possession with a 25-yard touchdown run by Sellers. The six-play, 75-yard drive evened the score at 7-7 as the teams remained tied heading into halftime.

On Clemson's first drive of the second half, Klubnik capped an 11-play, 80-yard drive with his second

touchdown run of the day. The 18-yard rush put the Tigers up 14-7.

Clemson ended South Carolina's first drive of the second half with the Tigers' second takeaway of the day. Cornerback Avieon Terrell forced his second forced fumble in his last two games, and linebacker Barrett Carter recovered the loose ball to give the ball back to the Tigers. Clemson was unable to capitalize on the turnover when a fumbled exchange between Klubnik and Phil Mafah was credited to the Gamecocks on review.

The turnover exchange continued on South Carolina's next possession as safety Khalil Barnes intercepted a Gamecock pass on the Clemson nine-yard line, marking his career-high-tying third of the season. Barnes now owns an interception in both of his career games against South Carolina.

Following a scoreless drive by Clemson, South Carolina notched back-to-back scoring drives when kicker Alex Herrera converted a 42-yard field goal to cut the lead, and a 20-yard touchdown rush by Sellers with 1:08 left in the fourth quarter put the Gamecocks ahead, 17-14.

Klubnik led a seven-play, 45-yard drive to put the Tigers inside the 20, but South Carolina secured the win with Knight's interception with 12 seconds left on the clock.

LAST MEETING IN COLUMBIA

Clemson 16, South Carolina 7

(Nov. 25, 2023, Columbia, S.C.)

COLUMBIA, S.C. — Clemson's defense scored a touchdown and held rival South Carolina to 169 total yards of offense en route to a 16-7 victory in the Palmetto Bowl at Williams-Brice Stadium on Saturday night. Clemson won its 73rd game in the series and 54th in Columbia all-time. The 169 yards of offense were the fewest allowed by a Clemson defense in the series since 1989, when the Gamecocks totaled 155 yards.

Freshman Khalil Barnes returned a fumble for a touchdown and an interception in the first 44 seconds of the game to set the tone for the Tigers.

After surrendering its only touchdown of the game with 6:39 to play in the first quarter, Clemson's defense forced South Carolina to punt on eight straight drives and allowed just 66 yards on South Carolina's final nine drives of the game. The Tigers piled up 219 yards rushing, including 89 from running back Phil Mafah, 80 from running back Will Shipley, and a then-career-high 52 from quarterback Cade Klubnik. Klubnik also hit 15 of his 27 passing attempts for 100 yards in leading three scoring drives for the offense.

Clemson's defense held South Carolina to 57 yards rushing, totaled six tackles for a loss, five three-and-outs, and only allowed South Carolina to convert on one of 11 third down attempts.

On the second snap of the game, Barnes recovered a lateral that bounced off a receiver's hands and returned it 42 yards for a touchdown just 25 seconds into the game, Clemson's fastest score against South Carolina since C.J. Spiller ran back the opening kickoff in 2009. On South Carolina's next offensive play, Barnes made a diving interception on a deep pass by Spencer Rattler on Clemson's 36-yard line. Barnes became the first Clemson player to record a takeaway on consecutive plays from scrimmage by an opponent since Brian Dawkins against Duke in 1995.

Following a Clemson punt, South Carolina went on a 12-play, 81-yard scoring drive with Luke Doty running the ball one yard for the touchdown on fourth and goal to tie the game 7-7 with 6:39 left in the first quarter.

Clemson responded on its next possession when Jonathan Weitz kicked a then-career-long 50-yard field goal to give Clemson a 10-7 lead with 43 seconds left in

the first quarter.

Clemson and South Carolina both went on to punt on their ensuing drives. After that, Clemson's defense produced two back-to-back tackles for a loss which resulted in a three-and-out and good field positioning at the 45-yard line for the Tigers' offense. Clemson came away with three points as Weitz kicked another long 49-yard field goal with 7:44 left in the first half. Clemson led at halftime, 13-7.

On Clemson's first drive of the second half, a deep 39-yard pass to Tyler Brown set up Weitz to make a 42-yard field goal, his third field goal from 40-plus yards of the game, tying a single-game school record for 40-plus-yard field goals. The kick increased Clemson's lead to 16-7. Ruke Orhorhoro then ended South Carolina's drive, sacking Spencer Rattler for a nine-yard loss and forcing the Gamecocks' fourth three-and-out.

Nick Emmanwori got the ball back for South Carolina as he intercepted Klubnik's pass in the end zone, resulting in a touchback. The Gamecocks' drive would end scoreless, as would its next three. Clemson also punted on its ensuing three possessions.

With 3:19 left in the fourth quarter, Clemson's defense stopped South Carolina on a critical fourth-and-three attempt. The Tigers' offense then recorded three first downs to run out the clock and seal the 16-7 victory and deny South Carolina (5-7) a bowl berth.

NOTES FROM LAST GAME

- Clemson recorded 456 total yards, including 237 passing yards and 219 rushing yards. It was Clemson's second game this season reaching 200 yards in both categories, joining its performance at Boston College in October
- The game was Clemson's 70th game with 200 rushing yards and 200 passing yards under Dabo Swinney. Clemson becomes the sixth program in the country with 70 such games since Swinney became Clemson's head coach in October 2008 (Oregon, Ohio State, Oklahoma, Baylor and Alabama).
- Clemson's 219 rushing yards came on 31 carries, a 7.1-yard average. Clemson's 7.1-yard average was its best since a 10.8-yard average against The Citadel in November 2024.
- Clemson's 45 points matched their season high set against Duke. Clemson is now 135-1 all-time when scoring 45 points in a game.
- Clemson held Furman to 271 total yards on 70 plays, an average of 3.87 yards per play. It was Clemson's second time this season holding an opponent to fewer than 4.0 yards per play (3.62 at Boston College).
- Clemson has now held three consecutive opponents below 20 points for the first time this season.
- Clemson recorded nine tackles for loss, tying its season high set two weeks earlier against Florida State.
- Clemson won the turnover margin, 2-0, and added two turnovers on downs. Clemson is now 3-1 this season when winning the turnover margin.
- Clemson did not commit a turnover, its second such game this season.
- Clemson has now gone five consecutive games without throwing an interception for the first time since the final five games of the 2018 season.

- Clemson has now thrown 177 consecutive pass attempts without an interception. Clemson's most recent interception came on its third-to-last pass attempt at Boston College on Oct. 11 on a throw by Christopher Vizzina.
- Clemson completed a pass to 17 different receivers, tying its most in a game in Swinney's tenure (17 at Georgia Tech in 2020).
- Clemson scored on each of its first three possessions, its third such game this season (at North Carolina and at Boston College).
- Unofficially, Clemson played 105 players in the contest. If that number is confirmed upon film review, it would be tied for Clemson's fourth-most players in a game in Swinney's tenure (117 vs. Charleston Southern in 2023, 111 vs. Charlotte in 2019, 106 vs. Appalachian State in 2024, 105 vs. The Citadel in 2024 and vs. Wofford in 2019).
- Quarterback Cade Klubnik completed 9-of-15 passes for 159 yards and two touchdowns in fewer than 18 minutes of play.
- Klubnik (25) became the sixth Clemson quarterback since World War II to win 25 career games as a starting quarterback, joining Trevor Lawrence (34), Deshaun Watson (32), Tajh Boyd (32), Rodney Williams (32) and Charlie Whitehurst (25).
- Klubnik (25-13) tied Charlie Whitehurst (25-15) for the fifth-most wins by a Clemson starting quarterback since World War II
- Klubnik did not throw an interception and has now thrown 115 consecutive pass attempts without an interception. His last interception came on his fourth-to-last pass attempt at Boston College on Oct. 11.
- Wide receiver Antonio Williams caught two passes for a team-high 57 yards with a career-high-tying two touchdown receptions.
- With his 20th and 21st career touchdown catches, Williams (21) passed Aaron Kelly, Deon Cain and Justyn Ross (20 each) to tie Mike Williams (21) for fourth in Clemson history in career touchdown receptions.
- Williams scored on a 22-yard touchdown pass from Klubnik in the first quarter.
- On that first touchdown, Williams became the eighth player in Clemson history to record 20 career touchdown recentions
- On that touchdown, Williams (201) also became the fifth player in Clemson history to catch 200 career passes. He joined Artavis Scott (245 from 2014-16), Sammy Watkins (240 from 2011-13), Aaron Kelly (232 from 2005-08) and DeAndre Hopkins (206 from 2010-12)
- Williams added a 35-yard touchdown catch from Klubnik in the second quarter.
- The game was Williams' fifth of his career with multiple touchdown receptions and his first since November 2024 against The Citadel.
- Williams became the fifth different Clemson player to record multiple touchdown receptions in a game this season (two games by Bryant Wesco Jr., one each by Christian Bentancur, Adam Randall and T.J. Moore), tied for the most in the country.
- During the contest, Williams (2,270) moved past Jerry Butler (2,223 from 1975-78) for 12th on Clemson's all-time leaderboard for career receiving yards.
- Williams also recorded a career-long 30-yard punt return in the first quarter, surpassing his previous career long of 25 against Appalachian State in 2024.
- Quarterback Chris Denson entered the game in the second half and rushed six times for a team-high 106 yards with a touchdown and completed 4-of-4 passes for 22 yards and another touchdown through the air.
 - Denson's 106 rushing yards represented the first

100-yard rushing game by a Clemson quarterback since Trevor Lawrence's 107 yards against Ohio State in the 2019 Fiesta Bowl.

- Denson's six carries tied for the fifth-fewest needed to record a 100-yard rushing performance in school history.
- Denson's 17.7-yards-per-carry average was the highest by a Clemson quarterback in a game with at least five attempts since Bobby Gage's 30.3-yard average against Presbyterian in 1947 (182 yards on six carries).
- Denson recorded a career-long 50-yard rush in the fourth quarter, Clemson's longest run of the season.
- Later on that drive, Denson threw his first career touchdown on a four-yard pass to tight end Logan Brooking.
- The touchdown came on Brooking's first career reception.
- Denson added the first rushing touchdown of his career on a 10-yard touchdown run in the fourth quarter.
- Wide receiver Tyler Brown recorded his first career rushing touchdown on a 21-yard reverse in the first quarter. It was his fifth career touchdown overall, including his four receiving touchdowns in 2023.
- Clemson has scored at least one rushing touchdown in a national-best 95 of its 107 games since the start of the 2018 season.
- Clemson has now rushed for multiple touchdowns in consecutive games for the first time since November 2024 against The Citadel and South Carolina.
- Tight end Christian Bentancur recorded his third touchdown reception of the season on a six-yard pass from Christopher Vizzina in the second quarter.
- Vizzina entered the game in the second quarter and completed 9-of-15 passes for 52 yards including the touchdown to Bentancur.
- Running back Gideon Davidson recorded a careerlong 28-yard run and finished the contest with a careerhigh 52 rushing yards on seven carries.
- Linebacker Sammy Brown tallied four tackles (2.0 for loss), a sack and an interception.
- Brown recorded a second-quarter sack to force a Furman turnover on downs.
- Brown (5.0) matched his single-season career high in sacks set in his freshman season in 2024 (5.0).
- Brown has now recorded a sack in three consecutive games for the first time in his career.
- Brown became the first Clemson linebacker with a full sack in three consecutive games since Barrett Carter against Stanford, Florida State and Wake Forest in 2024.
- Brown recorded his first career interception in the second quarter.
- Brown became the first Clemson player to record a sack and an interception in the same game since Jeremiah Trotter Jr. in a national-player-of-the-week performance against Notre Dame in November 2023.
- Defensive end Will Heldt created the game's first takeaway in the second quarter, forcing a fumble on his sixth sack of the season.
- On the play, Heldt (6.0) set a new single-season career high in sacks, surpassing his 5.0 at Purdue in 2024.
 - The forced fumble was the first of Heldt's career.
- The fumble was recovered by defensive end T.J. Parker, his second fumble recovery of the season and the fifth of his career.
- Placekicker Nolan Hauser opened the scoring with a 45-yard field goal on the game's opening drive.
- On Hauser's 45-yard first-quarter field goal, the Swinney family held its 200th consecutive field goal attempt. Between Will (2017-21), Drew (2018-22) and Clay (2022-25), members of the Swinney family have held every Clemson placekick since the start of the 2017 season, including all 539 PAT attempts and all 201 field

goal attempts in that span.

- Hauser pushed his second field goal attempt a 36-yarder wide right, ending a streak of 11 consecutive made field goals. His 11-attempt streak without a miss tied Aaron Hunt (11 in 2003) for the seventh-longest streak in Clemson history.
- Placekicker Quinn Castner went 3-for-3 on PATs to score in a game for the second time in his career, joining a 2023 game against Charleston Southern in which he kicked an extra point.
- Punter Jack Smith averaged a career-high 48.5 yards on two punts.
- Wide receiver Juju Preston made his collegiate debut and recorded a 10-yard punt return in the second quarter.
- Offensive lineman Blake Miller started his 52nd consecutive game to extend his school record for consecutive starts by a non-specialist. Miller has started all 52 games played by Clemson since his arrival as a true freshman in 2022
- Miller (52) tied kicker Chandler Catanzaro (52 from 2010-13) and defensive tackle Tyler Davis (52 from 2019-23) for the fourth-most career starts in Clemson history.
- Safety Tyler Venables played in his 61st career game to tie defensive end Xavier Thomas (61 from 2018-23) for the eighth-most games played in Clemson history.
- Clemson faced the opponent against whom the team played its first game in program history. Guided by Head Coach Walter Riggs, Clemson earned a 14-6 road victory against the Furman Purple Hurricane in the Tigers' gridiron debut on Oct. 31, 1896.
- Furman punter Ian Williams recorded a 74-yard punt in the third quarter. It was the longest punt by a Clemson opponent since a 75-yard punt by NC State's Trenton Gill in 2019.
- Clemson had three flag bearers for Military Appreciation Day: defensive end T.J. Parker, safety Ronan Hanafin and former Clemson fullback (and reserve Marine) Alex Pearson.
- Captains for the contest were Clemson's entire senior class. Representing the team at the coin toss were offensive lineman Tristan Leigh, center Ryan Linthicum, safety Tyler Venables and linebacker Wade Woodaz.

WITH THE WIN...

- Clemson earned its sixth win of the season to clinch bowl eligibility. Clemson entered 2025 with the fourth-longest active streak of consecutive seasons with a bowl appearance (20 from 2005-24 with another selection pending). Clemson remains tied for the third-longest active streak of consecutive seasons being bowl eligible (now 27, dating to 1999).
- Clemson earned a sixth win for the 27th consecutive year, dating to 1999. Clemson, Ohio State, Georgia and Oklahoma are the only schools to have won at least six games every year in that span.
- Clemson improved to 45-10-4 against Furman all-time. Clemson's 45 all-time wins against Furman are its fourth-most against a single opponent in Clemson history (73 vs. South Carolina, 72 vs. Wake Forest and 61 vs. NC State).
- Clemson won its 33rd consecutive contest against Furman and extended its unbeaten streak (including ties) against the Paladins to 34 consecutive games. The last tie between the two teams occurred in 1937, and the most recent Furman victory in the series came during the 1936 campaign. Clemson's current 33-game winning streak against Furman is its longest winning streak both active and all-time against any opponent.
- Clemson won its 23rd consecutive home game against Furman to add to its longest single-opponent home winning streak in school history. The streak dates

- to 1938 and predates the opening of Memorial Stadium in 1942.
- Clemson improved to 220-66-13 all-time against foes from the state of South Carolina. Clemson has a winning record against all 12 Palmetto State opponents it has faced all-time.
- Clemson improved to 40-0 against FCS teams since the NCAA split Division I in 1978.
- Clemson improved to 43-6 in non-conference home games under Dabo Swinney. Clemson is now 33-3 in its last 36 non-conference games at Death Valley.
- Clemson improved to 73-9 at Death Valley in the College Football Playoff era.
- Clemson has now won at least three home games in 49 straight seasons. The last time Clemson won fewer than three games at home in a season was in 1976 when Head Coach Red Parker's 3-6-2 squad went 2-2-1 at home
- Clemson improved to 109-20 in regular season play since the start of the 2015 season.
- Clemson improved to 145-23 against AP-unranked teams under Dabo Swinney and 122-13 in those games since the start of the 2012 season.
- Head Coach Dabo Swinney (186-52) pulled within one win of Joe Paterno and Urban Meyer for the fourthmost victories within the first 20 seasons of a head coaching career. Swinney trails only Tom Osborne (195), Nick Saban (191), Bob Stoops (191), Paterno (187) and Meyer (187) despite Swinney being in only his 18th season (and 17th full season). Note: Stoops and Meyer are not credited on the NCAA's official list of most wins through 20 seasons since they did not coach 20 years.
- Swinney (186) surpassed the career win total of College Football Hall of Famer Johnny Majors (185-137-10)
- Clemson is now 93-9 when scoring first since the start of the 2015 season.
- Clemson is now 160-12 under Dabo Swinney when leading at halftime, including a 143-8 mark since the start of the 2011 season.
- Clemson is now 150-7 when leading after three quarters since the start of the $2011\ season$.
- Clemson is now 142-12 when totaling more first downs than its opponent since 2011.
- Clemson now has a 90-6 record when winning the turnover margin since 2011.
- Clemson is now 126-3 in its last 129 games when holding teams to fewer than 23 points, a span that dates to the middle of the 2010 season.
- Clemson improved to 88-4 when rushing for 200+ yards under Dabo Swinney.
- Clemson is now 68-2 when both passing and rushing for 200+ yards under Dabo Swinney. Overall, Clemson is 118-2-1 in program history when reaching those marks.
- Clemson is now 72-6 when having a 100-yard rusher since 2011.

SCORING CHANGES

- With 6:12 to play in the second quarter, a tackle for loss initially credited entirely to No. 50 Fletcher Cothran is now split with No. 15 Jahiem Lawson.
- With 5:20 to play in the second quarter, a tackle for loss initially split by No. 11 Peter Woods and No. 63 T.J. Parker is now credited entirely to Woods.
- Stat input issues have been amended to properly credit Kylon Griffin with a forced fumble and correct time of possession.
- A recovered kickoff by No. 3 Tristan Smith has been updated to remove a zero-yard kickoff return since there was no attempt to advance the ball.
- Furman's roster has been updated to credit all stats for No. 99 to Joseph Perez-Garibay, not Bruce Knauber.

ON THIS DATE

- Nov. 29, 1900: Clemson's 35-0 win over Alabama allowed John Heisman's team to finish the year undefeated (6-0). It was Clemson's first undefeated team and was Clemson's only perfect team (no ties) until the 1948 squad went 11-0. Clemson won the SIAA Championship, its first conference title.

- Nov. 29, 1906: Clemson's first forward pass occurred in a 10-0 win over Georgia Tech. Powell Lykes dropped back to kick, but instead made a forward pass of 30 yards to George Warren.

- Nov. 29, 1948: Clemson ranked 11th in the final AP Poll. Clemson suffered from not having a poll after the bowl games, as Clemson won another regular season game and then defeated Missouri in the Gator Bowl to close a perfect season. But those wins were not reflected in the final ranking, and the AP did not create a post-bowl poll until 1968.

- Nov. 29, 1993: Tommy West was named Clemson's 23rd head coach and took over the team heading for the Peach Bowl. West, who spent the 1993 regular season as head coach at Chattanooga, became the sixth coach in Division I history to make his head coaching debut for a school in a bowl game and the second coach to ever become head coach for a bowl game after not serving as an assistant at that school during the regular season.

- Nov. 29, 2008: Clemson defeated South Carolina 31-14 to become bowl eligible for the 10th straight year. It was Dabo Swinney's first game as a head coach in the rivalry and it gave the Tigers four wins in the last five games of the regular season to finish on a strong note and earn him the job on a full-time basis.

- Nov. 29, 2014: Playing with a torn ACL, Deshaun Watson threw for two scores and ran for two others in Clemson's 35-17 win over South Carolina that ended the Gamecocks' record five-game winning streak in the series. Artavis Scott had seven catches for 185 yards and two scores, the most receiving yards by a Clemson player against South Carolina and the most ever by a Tiger in Death Valley. Wayne Gallman added 191 yards rushing in 27 carries, the second-most rushing yards by a Tiger against South Carolina.

COLLEGE FOOTBALL PLAYOFF STAPLES

From 2014-23, Clemson cemented itself as one of the College Football Playoff's powerhouses of the tournament's inaugural decade. In the 10-year history of the four-team format prior to 2024, only 15 programs earned at least one College Football Playoff berth, and Clemson ranked second in CFP berths, CFP title game appearances, total CFP wins and CFP titles.

Clemson returned to the College Football Playoff in 2024 in the format's first year of expansion to 12 teams and is one berth shy of Alabama (eight) for the most in history.

With a No. 16 ranking in the final College Football Playoff rankings in 2024, Clemson remained one of three programs (alongside Alabama and Ohio State) to finish in the CFP Top 25 in each of the tournament's first 11 years.

The nine-win-season streaks by Clemson (Dabo Swinney) and Florida State (Bobby Bowden) were compiled by single head coaches. The top two streaks were split among multiple head coaches, including Bob Devaney (four from 1969-72), Tom Osborne (25 from 1973-97) and Frank Solich (four from 1998-2001) for Nebraska, and Nick Saban (16 from 2008-23) and Kalen DeBoer (one in 2024) for Alabama.

Of the now 136 active FBS schools, only six programs entered 2025 having won at least six games at the FBS level in every year of the College Football Playoff era. That number dipped to four when pushing the total to seven wins and to two when dropping it to nine wins.

In 2020, Clemson became the first program ever to win 20 ACC Championships. That year, Clemson became the first program in the conference championship game era to win six straight conference championship games.

Two years later, Clemson's 2022 ACC title was the program's seventh in eight years, as the Tigers became the first team in an active power conference to win seven

outright conference titles in an eight-year span since Alabama won eight SEC titles in nine years from 1971-79.

Including titles from its days as a member of the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association and Southern Conference, Clemson has 28 conference championships overall, also the most of any current ACC school. Duke ranks second among the ACC's current membership with 18 overall conference titles, including 11 Southern Conference titles and seven ACC titles.

The Tigers won the 1900, 1902 and 1903 SIAA Conference championships under John Heisman, then the 1906 SIAA title under Bob Williams. Clemson also won the 1940 and 1948 Southern Conference titles under Frank Howard. Howard won eight total conference titles, including two in the Southern Conference and six in the ACC. Swinney surpassed the legend with a win in the 2024 ACC Championship Game.

For the last quarter-century, Clemson's ACC success has not been a roller-coaster ride of lofty heights and deep lows. The last time Clemson finished a season below .500 in regular season conference play was in 1998, when Tommy West's 3-8 squad went 1-7 in ACC play.

In 2025, Clemson extended its streak of being .500 or better in conference play to 27 years, tied for the longest active streak in the country and tied for the fourth-longest of any streak since 1966.

POWER OVER POWER CONFERENCE FOES

Early in his head coaching tenure, Dabo Swinney laid out his belief to then-Clemson athletic director Terry Don Phillips that the Tigers needed to add tough non-conference challenges on top of their tests in ACC play to serve as a foundation for the program's growth.

"I had a conversation with Terry Don and said, 'Terry Don, I know we are not very good right now, but we need

to play people because that is going to help me teach and help me develop the culture and the mindset that you have to have to win at the highest level," recounted Swinney. "I didn't think we had that, and that's what we committed to. That's what we've done."

That scheduling philosophy and culture change has resonated in the Clemson program, and since 2011, as Clemson ranks among the national leaders in wins against power conference opponents in that time span.

Clemson's 138 power conference wins since 2011 include at least one victory against 27 different programs, including Wake Forest (14), Boston College (13), Georgia Tech (11), Syracuse (10), NC State (10), Florida State (10), Louisville (9), South Carolina (8), Virginia Tech (7), North Carolina (7), Virginia (4), Notre Dame (4), Auburn (4), Miami (Fla.) On a year-by-year basis, Clemson has finished the season atop the country in wins against power conference opponents a national-best four times since the institution of the College Football Playoff in 2014. That includes 13 wins against power conference opponents in 2018, the first team ever to reach that figure.

SIGN AND DEVELOP

While proud of his incoming classes, Head Coach Dabo Swinney has long stated that a true ranking of a recruiting class cannot and should not be published until four years later when the group can be evaluated on performance rather than potential.

Much to Swinney's delight, The Athletic annually assumed that role for the classes of 2014-20, reranking each recruiting class four years later to account for on-field performance.

For its re-rankings, The Athletic uses the following grading scale: 5 points: All-American, award winner, top-50 NFL Draft pick; 4: Multi-year starter, all-conference honors; 3: One-year starter or key reserve; 2: Career backup; 0: Minor or no contribution, left the program. The outlet also adds a bonus to each program's class average, derived from its total number of wins from 2017 through 2020 (e.g., For re-ranking the Class of 2017, Clemson won 51 games, so its class average received a bonus of 0.51).

Swinney has pointed out that Clemson often falls in rankings as its retention and its commitment to

not oversigning leads to smaller recruiting classes. He also notes that much of Clemson's on-field success is a function of the program's development, citing All-Americans like former three-star Isaiah Simmons or former two-star Nolan Turner. The re-rankings illustrate Clemson's impressive track record of talent identification, culture fit, resource allocation and player development.

On average, Clemson ranked 10.2 in the 247 Composite team rankings across the 2014-20 recruiting cycles. Upon re-ranking those groups, despite having little room for improvement while recruiting at a Top 15 clip in that span, Clemson ranked 4.0 on average in the re-rankings, a ratings bump of roughly six spots. Each of those Clemson classes averaged at least 10 wins a season during their careers.

SENIOR SUCCESS

Every January, Head Coach Dabo Swinney conducts his first official meeting with his new team. The first order of business in the meeting is to "reset the room," reorganizing the seating arrangement with seniors in front and all succeeding classes in order behind them in the team auditorium.

Several of Swinney's senior classes placed themselves among select company in college football history. The 2017, 2018, 2019 and 2020 Clemson seniors account for four of only 15 four-year classes in FBS history to reach 50 career wins. That includes the 2018 and 2019 groups that are tied with the 2018 Alabama seniors for the most wins in FBS history (55 wins in four years).

HEAD COACH CONTINUITY

Over the last decade-and-a-half, Clemson became a beacon of stability in the increasingly unstable environment of college football. Clemson Head Coach Dabo Swinney is in his 23rd overall season at Clemson in 2025, including his 17th full season as head coach (and his 18th including an interim stint in 2008).

From the start of Swinney's first season as full-time head coach in 2009 through 2024, there were 498 head coaching tenures in the FBS (excluding those by interims) but only one such tenure at Clemson. Clemson is one of five schools with only one head coach

in that span.

Clemson is the only school in the ACC with only one head coach since the start of the 2009 season, and among the 21 schools ever to qualify for the College Football Playoff, only Clemson has had only one head coach since 2009.

SIX "FINAL FOURS" FOR SWINNEY

While the term "Final Four" may still be the linguistic property of college basketball, since the advent of the four-team College Football Playoff in 2014, Head Coach Dabo Swinney had Clemson among the sport's final four teams six times from 2015-20, becoming the first coach to lead a team to six consecutive College Football Playoffs since the format's institution in 2014.

The NCAA men's college basketball tournament dates to 1939. In the history of that tournament, only John Wooden of UCLA (nine from 1967-75) and Mike Krzyzewski of Duke (five from 1988-92) coached teams to at least five consecutive Final Fours. With his sixth "Final Four" appearance in 2020, Swinney joined basketball's Wooden as the only college football or men's basketball coaches to take teams to six consecutive Final Fours in their respective sports.

Swinney is among only nine coaches in football and men's basketball to record six career Final Four berths. He is one of only six with a winning record in Final Four games.

Swinney's ability to place his team among the nation's elite quartet has also been illustrated by the polls. Clemson finished first in the AP Poll in 2016 and 2018, second in 2015 and 2019, third in 2020 and fourth in 2017. Swinney became just the fourth coach to record at least six consecutive top four finishes since the AP Poll began in 1936, an exclusive list that also includes Florida State's Bobby Bowden (13), USC's Pete Carroll (seven) and Oklahoma's Bud Wilkinson (six).

Clemson's streak represented the fifth time a program has had a run of at least six top four finishes in the AP Poll. Miami (Fla.) had a seven-year run from 1986-92 with two different head coaches leading the program.

FIRST 15 SEASONS // FIRST 20 SEASONS?

Dabo Swinney completed his 15th season (and his 14th full season) in 2022 with a 161-39 record. Swinney amassed the second-most wins through a coach's first 15 seasons in FBS history despite not having the benefit of a full season in his first year, as he went 4-3 on an interim basis in his first season in 2008 after taking over for Tommy Bowden in October.

With a win against future Pro Football Hall of Famer Bill Belichick on Oct. 4, Swinney joined a list of head coaches across the collegiate and pro levels to defeat both Nick Saban and Bill Belichick that includes Bill Cowher, Gary Kubiak, Eric Mangini, Mike McCarthy, Dick Jauron, Tony Dungy, Herm Edwards, Dick Vermeil, Romeo Crennel, Jim Harbaugh and Steve Spurrier. Swinney's success against the Saban/Belichick duo includes a 28-point win in his most recent bout against both marquee coaches.

THROUGH 200 GAMES

The 2022 Orange Bowl was the 200th game in Dabo Swinney's head coaching career. Among coaches who qualify for the NCAA FBS record book by virtue of five years or 50 wins as a major college head coach, 17 coaches had earned at least 150 victories in their first 200 career games as head coach as of the conclusion of the 2022 season.

At 161-39 through 200 games, Swinney tied Bob Stoops and Robert Neyland (161 each) for the fifthmost wins through 200 career games in major college football history.

ONE OF THE FASTEST TO 150 WINS

Four previous Clemson head coaches earned 150+FBS wins in their careers: John Heisman (186), Jess Neely (207), Frank Howard (165) and Ken Hatfield (168). Howard, a College Football Hall of Famer, recorded his 150th victory in his 273rd career game, in a 14-10 victory against Maryland in 1966 that clinched a piece of what later became an outright ACC title. Heisman earned win No. 150 in game No. 203, Neely earned it in game No. 268, and Hatfield did it in game 259, though none of those three won more than 43 games in their Clemson tenures.

After being named Clemson's full-time coach in December of 2008, Head Coach Dabo Swinney set about securing his first signing class in 2009.

His first class, which he tabbed the "Dandy Dozen," brought home Clemson's first ACC title since 1991 during their junior campaign in 2011. With a win in the 2024 ACC Championship Game, every Clemson signing class under Swinney has at least one ACC title to their credit in their tenures at Clemson, and every signing class since 2012 has earned at least one College Football Playoff berth.

DEATH VALLEY ROARS

Frank Howard Field at Memorial Stadium garnered its famous nickname in the 1940s when Presbyterian College Head Coach Lonnie McMillian, after many years of bringing his teams in for drubbings, dubbed the venue as "Death Valley."

The name stuck, and its patrons have done their part to make it live up to its reputation. In the first 11 years of the College Football Playoff era from 2014-24, Clemson's home atmosphere helped draw 157 false starts by opponents, the second-most of any home venue in the country and the most by a power conference program.

Antonio Williams earned first-team Freshman All-America honors in 2022 after he caught 56 passes for 604 yards with four touchdowns over 14 games (10 starts). Injury befell Williams in his sophomore season in 2023, as he was limited by an ankle injury to only four regular season games in his second season before returning to play a pivotal role in Clemson's come-frombehind Gator Bowl win against Kentucky.

In the offseason to follow, Head Coach Dabo Swinney praised Williams' maturity and laser focus and said the now-redshirt sophomore was in for a big year in 2024. The head coach's prognostication proved correct. Williams started every game for Clemson and developed into a bona fide top target for Clemson with career highs in every receiving category in 2024.

Williams tied Miami's Xavier Restrepo for the ACC lead in receiving touchdowns in 2024 and finished tied for seventh in that category nationally.

Williams' versatility was on display in 2024. In addition to posting double-digit touchdown catches, Williams rushed for a touchdown and threw another. Williams' 2024 season marked only the ninth time since 1969 that a Clemson player has passed for a touchdown, rushed for a touchdown and caught a touchdown in a single season, joining Sammy Watkins (2012), C.J. Spiller (2008 and 2009), Jacoby Ford (2009), Ray Williams (1985), Charlie Waters (1969) and Ray Yauger (1969).

VERSATILITY

Williams' production in the passing game hasn't been limited to the receiving end of throws.

Williams has thrown four career passes, going 4-for-4 for 143 yards and two touchdowns for a career pass efficiency rating of 565.3. His 565.3 pass efficiency rating is the highest by a Clemson passer with multiple attempts on record.

Williams opened Clemson's Oct. 4 win at North Carolina with a 75-yard touchdown pass on the game's first play from scrimmage. It was his second career touchdown pass, making him the first non-quarterback to throw multiple career touchdown passes for Clemson since C.J. Spiller from 2006-09.

Williams has thrown two of Clemson's 19 touchdown passes delivered by non-quarterbacks since 1953.

Klubnik has helped engineer four fourth-quarter comeback wins, including three as a starter:

- vs. Syracuse (2022): Entered in relief of DJ Uiagalelei and became the first backup quarterback to engineer a fourth-quarter comeback win for Clemson since 2018 (Chase Brice vs. Syracuse).
- vs. Kentucky (2023): Went 8-for-8 as he led Clemson on a 12-play, 68-yard game-winning drive in 2:17 of elapsed game time as Clemson earned its largest fourth-quarter comeback win in a bowl game in school history in the 2023 Gator Bowl.
- at Pitt (2024): After Clemson was held to only 27 yards in the first 28 minutes of the second half, Klubnik got the ball with 1:36 remaining and engineered a three-play, 75-yard drive that he finished by rushing for a game-winning 50-yard touchdown with 1:16 remaining.
- at Louisville (2025): Trailing 19-13 after three quarters, Adam Randall's one-yard plunge on fourth-and-goal gave Clemson the lead, and two missed field goals by Louisville gave the Tigers a 20-19 road win against the 19th-ranked Cardinals.
- **Notes:** Klubnik recorded a game-winning drive in the 2024 ACC Championship Game against SMU, but the game was tied at the time and Clemson never trailed in the contest. Klubnik also helped Clemson overcome a 16-point first-half deficit against Troy in 2025, though Clemson's third-quarter surge gave the Tigers the lead prior to the fourth quarter.

With his first rushing touchdown of the 2025 season at Georgia Tech, Klubnik joined Nealon Greene (1994-97), Charlie Whitehurst (2002-05), Tajh Boyd (2010-13) and Kelly Bryant (2015-18) as the only Clemson quarterbacks to rush for a touchdown in four different seasons since Clemson transitioned away from the single wing in 1953.

A year earlier, Klubnik's seven rushing touchdowns included long touchdown runs of 55 yards against NC State, 34 yards against Stanford and a game-winning 50-yarder at Pitt. Klubnik's 50-yard rushing touchdown at Pitt was Clemson's longest game-winning offensive touchdown inside the final two minutes of a game on record. Klubnik became the first Clemson player to record multiple 50-yard rushing touchdowns in a single season since Travis Etienne in 2019 (two), and he also became the first Clemson quarterback to record multiple 50-yard rushing touchdowns in a career since Woodrow Dantzler (three from 1999-2001).

2024 IN REVIEW

Klubnik took a major leap in his second full season as a starter in 2024. As a junior, he completed 308-of-486 passes for 3,639 yards with 36 passing touchdowns and added career highs with 463 yards and seven touchdowns on 119 rushing attempts.

Klubnik combined for 4,100 yards of total offense and 43 total touchdowns while committing only seven turnovers. Research by ESPN.com's David Hale illustrated that Klubnik became only the eighth quarterback to reach those thresholds in the College Football Playoff era. The other seven all finished in the Top 4 in Heisman voting, including five Heisman winners

FROM THE SIDELINE TO THE STAGE

Klubnik's national breakout came in the 2022 ACC Championship Game against North Carolina. He entered the game on Clemson's third possession and completed 20-of-24 passes for 279 yards and a passing touchdown and added seven carries for 30 yards and a rushing touchdown. His 83.3 completion percentage set an ACC Championship Game record and led to his selection as the game's Most Valuable Player in Clemson's 39-10 victory. He became the third freshman (and second true freshman) in the game's history to earn the honor.

WHO'S NEXT AT RUNNING BACK?

Clemson entered 2025 with a relative rarity in the Dabo Swinney era: public unknowns at running back.

Under Swinney, the Tigers have enjoyed a run of feature backs that has included C.J. Spiller, Andre Ellington, Wayne Gallman, Travis Etienne, Will Shipley and Phil Mafah among a bevy of other substantial contributors.

With both members of the Shipley/Mafah duo from Clemson's 2021 recruiting class now having matriculated to the NFL, outside observers were curious to see who would helm Clemson's rushing attack in 2025

Adam Randall seized the role prior to Week 1 and has been a bright spot and an emerging star for Clemson's offense. Randall is in his first season at running back after spending his first three seasons at Clemson at wide receiver. A 41-yard kickoff return as an emergency contributor in the 2024 ACC Championship Game against SMU sparked the idea of the position switch, and he contributed at running back in a pinch in the 2024 College Football Playoff and ripped off a 41-yard run at Texas before making the full-time transition this past offseason.

RANDALL'S HOT START

Before being held out of the end zone in Clemson's seventh game of the season, Randall scored at least one touchdown in each of Clemson's first six games in 2025, becoming the first Clemson player to reach the end zone in each of the first six games of a campaign since Travis Etienne in 2018. Randall, Etienne, C.J. Spiller (2009) and Bill Mathis (1959) are the only Clemson players to accomplish the feat in records back

Randall's position coach, C.J. Spiller, holds the Clemson record for the most consecutive games with a touchdown to start a season when he scored in all 14 games of Clemson's 2009 campaign.

DYNAMIC DUO

There was no shortage of contributing factors to Clemson's leap in passing efficiency and explosiveness from 2023 and 2024, but notable among them was the arrival of T.J. Moore and Bryant Wesco Jr. in 2024. While Moore's late-season surge was a bit too belated to garner national recognition, Wesco collected Freshman All-America honors from 247Sports, PFF, ESPN, The Athletic and the FWAA.

The duo ranked in the top six nationally in receiving vards by freshmen.

100-YARD GAMES IN 2025

Wesco reached the century mark in two of Clemson's first three games this season. He recorded 118 yards against Troy and 126 yards against Georgia Tech, becoming the first Clemson player with consecutive 100-yard receiving games since Cornell Powell against Notre Dame and Pitt in 2020.

Moore added his first 100-yard effort of the season on Oct. 4 with a five-catch, 108-yard performance highlighted by a 75-yard score on the game's opening play from scrimmage. Wesco added a 106-yard performance at Boston College on Oct. 11, and Moore contributed a 124-yard effort vs. SMU on Oct. 18, giving the duo a 100-yard performance in all three of Clemson's October games.

Wide receiver Antonio Williams added his first 100-yard game of the season on Nov. 1 against Duke. His performance gave Clemson a 100-yard receiver in four consecutive games for the first time since 2016 when five players reached the mark over a four-game span against NC State, Florida State, Syracuse and Pitt.

snaps in Clemson's 2024 season opener, as missed opportunities and inefficiency by Clemson — combined with a condensed contest that featured the fewest combined snaps (112) in a Clemson game since 2006 — limited his involvement in his collegiate debut as a true freshman. Afterward, Clemson's coaches vowed to involve him more the following week.

Consider that vow fulfilled. In his second career game, Wesco caught three passes for 130 yards and a touchdown against Appalachian State, tying the Clemson record for the fewest games needed to record a 100-yard receiving game.

CV'S STARTING DEBUT

Commonly referred to by his initials "CV," redshirt sophomore quarterback Christopher Vizzina was thrust into his starting debut on Oct. 18 against SMU while Cade Klubnik recovered from an ankle injury.

Vizzina became the 49th different player to start a game at quarterback since Clemson abandoned the single wing in 1953. Despite the performance coming in a defeat, the Alabama native played valiantly in his first career start, completing 29-of-42 passes for 317 yards with three touchdowns and no interceptions for a pass efficiency rating of 156.0.

Clemson is 28-20-1 in starting quarterback debuts since 1953.

Clemson lost its school record holder for career receptions by a tight end over the 2025 offseason when Jake Briningstool graduated and signed with the Kansas City Chiefs. Briningstool caught 127 career passes for 1,380 yards and 17 touchdowns over 48 career games.

Clemson's current group of tight ends will seek to continue the unit's production that has seen the tight end group post 60-plus catches in each of the last three seasons, a first in the Dabo Swinney era.

-- OFFENSIVE LINE --

A VETERAN UNIT IN 2025

Clemson received instant impact from the addition of veteran offensive line coach Matt Luke in his first full season at Clemson in 2024. In his second full season with the Tigers in 2025, he returned an exceedingly veteran unit that returns four of its five primary starters and boasts seven players who have started at least one game for Clemson.

The unit includes two of Clemson's recent iron men. Blake Miller entered his senior season already ranked in the Top 10 in school history in career snaps from scrimmage. Prior to 2025, the two-time All-ACC selection started every game for Clemson at right tackle from 2021-23, and he became the first offensive lineman to start every game played by Clemson during his freshman, sophomore and junior campaigns without the benefit of a redshirt year since starting center Ralph lenkins from 1943-45

Miller plays alongside a remarkable comeback story in Walker Parks, who started all 14 games for Clemson in 2024 after missing the majority of the 2022 and 2023 seasons with career-threatening ankle injuries. A veteran of 53 games and 42 starts from 2020-24, Parks is a self-professed Clemson lifer who said of Clemson, "If there were no eligibility [rules], I would stay here forever," a maxim validated by his decision to utilize an extra year of eligibility for a sixth season in 2025.

Clemson's other two returning primary starters include one of the team's foremost leaders and one of its active parables of patience. Left tackle Tristan Leigh started 23 games over the two previous seasons, and his progression from five-star recruit to off-radar redshirt to trusted contributor has given him stature and respect as one of the team's most trusted leaders. Center Ryan Linthicum, meanwhile, was one of Clemson's revelations of 2024. Last spring, the thencareer backup was entering his fourth year with limited experience, and he was given spring practice to audition for the role before Clemson sought veteran help at the position. Instead, Linthicum seized the role, starting all 14 games for Clemson and playing 982 snaps from scrimmage, the most of any Clemson player in 2024.

Though depth and injuries combined to limit them to four combined starts in 2024, redshirt junior Collin Sadler and junior Harris Sewell entered 2025 with a combined 40 games and 14 starts of experience along the Tiger offensive line. Sadler provides versatility across the four tackle and guard positions, while Sewell offers tremendous value as a versatile interior piece

across the center and guard spots.

Clemson had a breakout young star's trajectory take a brief detour in late 2024. As a true freshman, Elyjah Thurmon impressed when called upon to play 74 outstanding snaps in reserve on the road at Virginia Tech last year, and he earned a start the following week before being lost for the remainder of the season on the game's opening play from scrimmage. Whether as a starter or rotational piece, Thurmon stands primed to be a significant fixture on Clemson's line for the next several seasons.

Clemson's full offensive line group entered the 2025 season with a combined 249 game appearances, 135 starts and 10,403 career offensive snaps.

A year ago, Allen led Penn State defensive end Abdul Carter to unanimous All-America honors and the No. 3 overall pick in the 2025 NFL Draft. Though he did not garner first-team all-conference honors from the ACC, Parker earned All-America honorable mention recognition from Phil Steele after he broke the Clemson single-season school record for forced fumbles in a season (six), surpassing Brandon Maye's five from 2009. His six forced fumbles finished tied for second in the nation and tied for the national lead among power conference players.

PARKER'S RECORD DAY AT PITT IN 2024

Parker put together one of the most dominant defensive performances in school history in Clemson's 2024 game at Pitt, collecting seven tackles, 5.0 tackles for loss, a school-record-tying 4.0 sacks, his fourth forced fumble of the season and a pass breakup.

Parker earned ACC Defensive Lineman of the Week, Bednarik Award National Player of the Week and Walter Camp Defensive Player of the Week for his performance.

His 4.0 sacks tied for the most of any FBS player in a single game that season. His 5.0 tackles for loss in that game ranked tied for second.

Parker's record day powered Clemson's season highs with eight sacks and 16 tackles for loss in the contest. Clemson's 16 tackles for loss tied for fourth-most in program history and its eight sacks tied for eighth.

WE SEE YOU, T.J. ••

Parker emphatically announced his arrival as a freshman in 2023 when he set a Clemson true freshman record with 12.5 tackles for loss. That total tied for the national lead in tackles for loss among freshmen.

Parker initially committed to Penn State but coveted a Clemson offer. He decommitted from the Nittany Lions in hopes of soliciting Clemson, and Clemson's 2023 recruiting class immediately went to work.

"CV [Christopher Vizzina], Peter [Woods] and a few other guys on the team, they hit me up with the eyes emoji on Instagram," Parker said. "It was like, 'You know what time it is.' I texted Coach Ski [Then-Clemson Defensive Ends Coach Lemanski Hall] the eyes emoji, the same thing they sent me, and from there we got in contact and a few days later they offered and I committed."

-- NO. 8 CB AVIEON TERRELL --

IMPACT STARTER

Avieon Terrell made his first start at Clemson on Nov. 4, 2023, when he was inserted into the lineup as a true freshman in Clemson's 31-23 home upset of Notre Dame. Beginning that day, Terrell has started every game for Clemson, including the final five games of 2023, all 14 games in 2024 and every game to date in 2025.

As part of his all-conference campaign in 2024, Terrell recorded three forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries and two interceptions. He became the first Clemson player under Dabo Swinney to finish a season with at least three forced fumbles, multiple interceptions and multiple fumble recoveries.

Terrell added three forced fumbles over Clemson's first five games of the 2025 season, and the Thorpe Award semifinalist added his fourth of the year at Louisville in November.

His seven career forced fumbles are a Clemson school record for a defensive back and tied for seventhmost in school history across all positions.

On Sept. 20, Terrell made his first start at Clemson's "Tiger" position as the slot cornerback vs. Syracuse. In his first start at the position, he recorded five pass breakups, tying Clemson's single-game school record set by Perry Williams in 1985 against Virginia Tech.

Terrell is the only player in the nation this season credited with at least nine passes defended and four or more forced fumbles. The only other player in the nation

to reach even six passes defended and four forced fumbles is Texas Tech linebacker Jacob Rodriguez, presumed to be among the frontrunners for the Butkus Award and other prominent national defensive awards.

-- NO. 17 LB WADE WOODAZ --

OPENING A CAN OF WOODAZ

In each of linebacker Wade Woodaz's first three seasons at Clemson, the Tampa product has watched as one of his linebacker counterparts earned All-America recognition, including honors for Barrett Carter in 2022 and 2024 and for Jeremiah Trotter Jr. in 2022 and 2023. Head Coach Dabo Swinney was quick though to warn observers not to overlook Woodaz.

"He's a baller," Swinney said. "The kid is tough, physical, he can really run. He really understands the game at a high level. He played most of his [prep] career as a quarterback and as a safety, so he has a great understanding of the game. He plays really, really hard; he's a great effort guy, he's a great preparer and he loves it. He's a fun guy to coach and a fun guy to watch play because he plays the way you want everybody to play."

Though Clemson's linebacker corps in 2024 included All-American Barrett Carter and ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year Sammy Brown, it was Woodaz who led the team in tackles, a feat he accomplished despite missing two games with a leg contusion. Coaches credited Woodaz with 89 stops, 10 tackles for loss, 3.0 sacks, six pass breakups, three forced fumbles and an interception.

Woodaz was one of six power conference players to record double-digit tackles for loss, three or more forced fumbles and an interception in 2024 (Texas' Anthony Hill Jr. and Colin Simmons, Indiana's Jailin Walker, UCLA's Kain Medrano and Texas Tech's Jacob Rodriguez). He also became the first Clemson player credited with at least 75 tackles and at least three forced fumbles since Isaiah Simmons in 2018.

-- NO. 47 LB SAMMY BROWN --

SAMMY'S SENSATIONAL START

Linebacker Sammy Brown arrived at Clemson in January 2024 as a consensus Top 30 player in his recruiting class and as the nation's reigning High School Butkus Award winner.

Head Coach Dabo Swinney praised Brown as an "alpha," but spoke frequently about Brown's learning curve at the linebacker position after playing both running back and linebacker at Jefferson High School in Commerce, Ga. The linebacker tabbed as 247Sports' No. 1 "freak athlete" in the 2024 recruiting class proved to be a quick study, appearing in all 14 games for Clemson with six starts.

After Clemson opened its first eight games of 2024 in two-linebacker sets, Brown earned his first start at Virginia Tech in November that year as Clemson opened the game with three linebackers. The former five-star prospect delivered, recording a team-high eight tackles (per the gameday stat crew) with 2.5 tackles for loss and a sack.

"Sammy's been getting better and better and better and it was awesome to see him have that type of game," Swinney said after Brown's performance at Virginia Tech. "He's just a confident young man, and, boy, he's got a bright future ahead of him. He's going to be a great one."

Despite playing only 444 defensive snaps over 14 games in 2024, Brown ranked second in the nation in tackles for loss among freshmen.

MEET THE NEW GUYS

- WR Tristan Smith (signed Dec. 18): Smith joined Clemson after playing the 2024 season at Southeast Missouri State, helping the Redhawks to a first-place finish in the Big South-OVC Football Association and a berth in the Football Championship Subdivision playoffs. The 2024 all-conference honoree played in SEMO's final 11 games of the season, catching 76 passes for 934 yards and six touchdown receptions in addition to rushing for one touchdown.
- **DE Will Heldt (signed Dec. 19):** Heldt signed with Clemson after playing his first two collegiate seasons at Purdue, appearing in all 24 games for the Boilermakers from 2023-24. As a sophomore in 2024, gameday stat crews credited Heldt with 56 tackles (10.0 for loss), 5.0 sacks and a fumble recovery he returned 16 yards for a touchdown. He recorded 2.5 sacks and the 16-yard scoop-and-score in back-to-back games against ranked opponents Illinois and Oregon in October.
- LB Jeremiah Alexander (signed Jan. 8): Alexander played his first three collegiate seasons at Alabama from 2022-24. Following a redshirt year in 2022 in which he appeared in three games, Alexander played in 24 of the Crimson Tide's 27 games across the 2023-24 seasons and was credited with eight tackles in those contests. In high school, he led Alabama's Thompson High School to the 2021 state championship (alongside current Clemson defensive lineman Peter Woods) as a consensus five-star recruit across most major outlets and ranked among the nation's top 50 players in his class.

Head Coach Dabo Swinney expounded on Clemson's strategy for the three winter transfer additions:

"As I've always said, we do what's best for Clemson. We'll use the portal whenever we need it and we'll be strategic with it. We needed it four years ago; we needed a backup quarterback and we got one. The next year, we needed a backup quarterback and we got one and he was here for two years.

"This year, we didn't anticipate signing a defensive line portal guy. We had two great ones committed and we were taking two. But as y'all know, things can change in recruiting. We had a young man back out and decide to go somewhere else, so there wasn't anybody left to recruit that could fill the need. Now we [had] a gap so we had to go use the portal and we needed a high-level guy and we got the guy I wanted to hit [Heldt].

"From a receiver standpoint, we had two guys go in the portal, and so we had a gap. We needed to go get a guy, and we needed somebody that could come in and help us with our depth and come in and compete and we found a great kid in Tristan out in Southeast Missouri. We were looking for a little length, and high school recruiting was over; there was nobody to get. We needed to go get a guy.

"And then the linebacker situation, honestly, we weren't really going to take a 'backer. We knew we needed another guy. Logan Anderson, our signee, tore his ACL. Kobe [McCloud], his situation [rehabbing from a knee injury]. We knew we probably needed another guy, but we were going to wait until May. And then Jeremiah popped up. We knew all about him, obviously recruited him hard, knew his family. That was a really good situation that worked out for us.

"That's really it. Nothing different. I know everybody

likes to write about it, but our process is still the same. We're going to recruit high school kids as long as we can get the best of the best. As long as we can get the Gideon Davidsons of the world and the Sammy Browns of the world and the T.J. Parkers and Peter Woods and Cade Klubniks, that's what we're going to do, and we're going to develop... And then we have to respond if we have a situation and we have a gap in our roster or we have kids that leave. For us, that's how we use the portal, but the process isn't any different. They've still got to be the right fit, they've got to check all the boxes, they can't *just* be a good player. No different than our high school recruiting."

Clemson has a track record of producing one of the nation's top defenses in most seasons since the advent of the College Football Playoff in 2014.

Clemson ranked in the Top 30 in the country in total defense in each of the first 10 seasons of the CFP era and also ranked among the Top 30 in scoring defense in those 10 campaigns (including five Top 5 finishes in the category).

Clemson's defensive anomaly in 2024 led to a change in leadership, as the Tigers plucked Penn State Defensive Coordinator Tom Allen for Clemson's defensive coordinator position immediately following the Nittany Lions' exit from the College Football Playoff. Allen now leads a Clemson defense that tied for the national lead in Top 10 finishes in average yards allowed per game in the College Football Playoff era.

ALLEN IS ALL IN

Clemson officially announced Tom Allen as its new defensive coordinator on Jan. 14.

"Tom checked every box that I was looking for," Head Coach Dabo Swinney said. "We've got a great football coach — and a great leader of men — coming to Clemson... He brings a ton of experience and was highly recommended by some of the best people in this business. He is obviously coming off of a great year as the defensive coordinator at Penn State, and we're excited to welcome him as our defensive coordinator here at Clemson."

Allen joined the Tigers with more than three decades of coaching experience. In 2024, he helped Penn State to a school-record 13 wins and a College Football Playoff berth. His defense recorded two pick-sixes in

Penn State's 38-10 win against SMU in the College Football Playoff First Round, and in the following game, his unit bottled up Heisman runner-up Ashton Jeanty, holding the star running back to a season-low 3.47 yards per carry and no touchdowns in a 31-14 Penn State victory in the CFP Quarterfinal at Fiesta Bowl.

Penn State finished seventh in the nation in total defense (294.8 yards per game) and eighth in the nation in scoring defense (16.5 points per game) under Allen's guidance in 2024.

WHO'S YOUR HAUSER?

Placekicker Nolan Hauser arrived at Clemson in January 2024 as the national high school record-holder for career field goals made (66) during his career at Hough High School in Cornelius, N.C.

Hauser (pronounced HOO-zer, not HOW-zer) opened his career with a streak of 25 consecutive made kicks (five field goals & 20 PATs) in 2024 before a blocked PAT against Stanford accounted for his first miss.

A week later at Florida State, Hauser made five field goals and accounted for 17 total points in Clemson's 16-point road win. The five-field-goal performance by Hauser was Clemson's first since Chandler Catanzaro went 5-for-5 on field goal attempts against Boston College in 2011.

Hauser's six points against Virginia Tech in November 2024 gave him the school record for points in a true freshman season, breaking the previous mark of 78 set by Sammy Watkins in 2011. In the ACC Championship Game, he reached the century mark to post the first 100-point season by a true freshman in Clemson history.

Hauser's 113-point 2024 season ranked tied for sixth in Clemson history in kicking points scored in a single season and tied for ninth in school history in points scored by any means in a single season.

Hauser is a second-generation Clemson student-athlete. His mother, Sheri Hauser (née Bueter), was an All-American soccer player at Clemson from 1994-97, and his father, Scott, played baseball at Clemson in from 1995-97 and was 6-2 as a pitcher on Clemson's College World Series team of 1996. His sister, Ella, was also a member of Clemson's women's soccer team from 2021-24.

HAUSER'S HIGHLIGHT

Though the pronunciation of his last name often trips up observers, Hauser made his name much more nationally recognizable with the seminal highlight of the 2024 ACC Championship Game.

In what Clemson Head Coach Dabo Swinney called "the biggest kick in Clemson history," the true freshman booted a 56-yard game winning field goal as time expired to give Clemson its 22nd ACC title, its 10th win of the season and its seventh College Football Playoff berth. Of note:

- Hauser's field goal gave Clemson the first walk-off win in ACC Championship Game history.
- Hauser became the first Clemson player to kick a game-winning walk-off field goal since Chandler Catanzaro hit a 37-yard field goal to beat LSU to end the 2012 Chick-Fil-A Bowl.
- Hauser's 56-yard field goal was the longest gamewinning field goal as time expired in Clemson history.
- Hauser's career-long 56-yard field goal was the fourth-longest field goal in Clemson history but its longest away from Death Valley. It was also the longest field goal in postseason play in Clemson history.
- Hauser became the first FBS player ever to win a conference championship game by kicking a field goal of 50 or more yards as time expired.
- The game-winning field goal came in Hauser's home metro area, as his hometown of Cornelius, N.C. is roughly 20 miles north of Bank of America Stadium in Charlotte.

HAUSER IN 2025

After a shaky start to his sophomore season that included a miss in two of Clemson's first three games (and an additional miss wiped out by a pre-snap timeout), Hauser responded by hitting 11 consecutive field goal attempts from the start of October until his next miss on Nov. 22.

THE OTHER SWINNEY DYNASTY

Like the Colquitt family punting at Tennessee, the Swinney family holding for placekicks at Clemson has become a dynasty of its own.

Head Coach Dabo Swinney's oldest son, Will, arrived at Clemson in 2017 and immediately earned Clemson's starting holder position on placekicks. He played five seasons and a record-tying 69 games at Clemson through 2021. In those five seasons, Clemson scored 565 points on placekicks, including field goals and PATs, and he held for 555 of those 565 points. The only 10 Clemson kicking points not held by Will in his career were instead held by his brother, Drew, who was Clemson's starter at the position in 2022.

Will and Drew were succeeded by the youngest of the three Swinney boys, Clay, a redshirt junior in his third season as Clemson's starting holder in 2025. Clay's presence creates a plausible scenario in which every Clemson placekick in a full 10-year span from 2017-26 could be held by a Swinney.

Clemson's last hold by any player outside the Swinney family was on the final point of Clemson's 2016 national championship, as Seth Ryan, coincidentally also the son of a famous long-time coach (Rex Ryan),

held the PAT following Hunter Renfrow's game-winning touchdown with one second remaining.

Clemson's 2024 win against Stanford marked Clemson's 100th consecutive game with a Swinney as holder, a game that ironically resulted in Dabo Swinney's 100th career home win at Memorial Stadium. The family crossed 800 kicking points held for in the contest as well.

Against Furman in November 2025, the Swinney family held its 200th consecutive field goal attempt.

DEFEATS IN REVIEW

Clemson has lost 26 games since 2015, the fourth-fewest in the nation in that span. Eleven of Clemson's 26 losses since 2015 — 42.3 percent — have come against AP Top 10 teams.

The opponents to whom Clemson has lost since 2015 have a combined final record of 244-88, a winning percentage of .735. Clemson has not lost to a team that finished with a losing record since 2017 and has not lost to a team with a losing record at the time of the game since losing to 2-5 Boston College in 2010, Dabo Swinney's second full season as head coach.

Clemson was held without a rushing touchdown in its 34-21 home loss to Syracuse on Sept. 20. Prior to that game, Clemson had an active streak of 62 consecutive home games with a rushing touchdown at Death Valley. Clemson has not only often led the nation in that category but has often lapped the field. In 2019, Clemson played an average of 76.0 players per game, an average that far exceeded all power conference programs by more than 11 players — a full unit — per game.

The approach to creating functional depth and rewarding players ready to play has been a key philosophy for Head Coach Dabo Swinney, whose own collegiate playing career was hatched as a walk-on fighting for playing time in Alabama's receiving corps.

"We're fully committed to playing guys who deserve to play," Swinney said. "You commit to a guy early in the season, and even if a guy has only played 10 percent of the snaps, when you get to game eight or nine, they've got some good experience."

Clemson has played 100+ players in a game seven times under Dabo Swinney, including playing 105 against Furman on Nov. 22 in 2025.

FINISH

In 2018, Clemson debuted a new version of its "This is Why We Work" fourth quarter video at Death Valley, a hype video imploring the team to finish and featuring Director of Strength and Conditioning Joey Batson bellowing:

"Let me tell you something right now: they don't put championship rings on smooth hands! You gotta go earn it! You gotta go earn it six seconds at a time! You win championships when the stadium is empty, when the band ain't playing, when the cheerleaders ain't cheering, when it's just you and your brothers right beside you. That's when you win championships! In the fourth quarter, that is when we shine!"

The video and the speech became a part of Clemson lore, buoyed by its playing during Clemson's comeback win against Syracuse that year en route to a 15-0 national championship season. Over the years, the video has changed but the speech remains the same, with many Clemson fans yelling it in unison as it plays.

Clemson holds a 166-10 record under Dabo Swinney when leading after three quarters, including a 150-7 mark since 2011.

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

- Entering the 2025 fall semester, of the 410 eligible players who completed their athletic eligibility at Clemson and/or graduated early in Dabo Swinney's 16+ full years as head coach, 404 (98.5 percent) have earned a degree during their time at Clemson.
- Clemson earned the AFCA Academic Achievement Award for 2024. The award was Clemson's fourth in the last seven years, but it was Clemson's fourth in the last five years that the honor was actually awarded, as the organization did not name recipients during a two-year period amid the COVID-19 pandemic.
- Clemson broke program multi-year NCAA Academic Progress Rate (APR) records in three straight years from 2017-19 (987 in 2016-17, 992 in 2017-18 and 993 in 2018-19) before the NCAA suspended APR reporting during the COVID-19 pandemic. Upon reinstatement of APR reporting in June 2022, Clemson shattered its multi-year APR record with a 999 covering the 2017-18 through 2020-21 academic years. Clemson has posted a 995 multi-year APR in each of the last three cycles.
- Most recently, Clemson posted a 995 multi-year APR covering 2020-21 through 2023-24, tied for fifth-best in the FBS. Clemson's lofty academic success in that period coincided with 40 wins in a four-year span and two ACC titles.

- Prior to the suspension of APR Public Recognition Awards following the COVID-19 pandemic, the NCAA recognized Clemson with its annual honor, which is bestowed upon programs ranking in the Top 10 percent of their respective sports, for nine of the award's last 10 reported academic cycles. Only 37 FBS programs earned at least one APR recognition across the 2009-10 through 2018-19 academic years. Only 30 programs earned it multiple times. Clemson, Duke and Northwestern were the only ones to earn the award 9+ times in that 10-year span.
- With its award for the 2018-19 academic year, Clemson became the only FBS program since the NCAA created the APR metric in 2003 to win a national championship and an APR Public Recognition Award in the same year multiple times. Alabama is the only other school to accomplish the title/APR double in a single year once (2011-12 academic year).
- A program-record 98 individuals earned a 3.0 GPA or better in Fall 2024. That included program-record 20 perfect 4.0s.
- Clemson set a record in Fall 2024 with the highest single-semester GPA in program history with a 3.19 team GPA. Clemson followed that up with a 3.18 spring semester.
- Entering the 2025 fall semester, Clemson has had 75+ individuals earn a 3.0 or better GPA in eight consecutive semesters

HISTORIC GRADUATION SUCCESS RATE

Aided in part by another elite academic performance by Clemson Football, Clemson Athletics tied for second among institutions in Graduation Success Rate (GSR) with a 96 percent mark for the 2015-18 cohort in data released by the NCAA in November 2025.

After posting a 99 percent mark for each of the previous two cohorts, Clemson Football recorded a 98, tied for fifth in Division I and tied for third in the FBS. Clemson and Harvard represent the only two Division I programs to post a 98 percent or better over each of the last three cohorts, and Clemson is the only program in the FBS to accomplish the feat.

Since assuming the head role midseason in 2008, Head Coach Dabo Swinney has produced 86 NFL draft picks during his head coaching tenure. His 86 draft picks produced are the most by any active coach in the nation since the 2009 NFL Draft, and his 18 first-rounders are the fourth-most overall and second-most of any active coach in that span.

Additional nuggets on Clemson's recent success in the NFL Draft are included below:

- Clemson has had at least one player selected in 23 consecutive drafts since 2003, representing the second-longest streak in school history behind a 24year streak across the 1951-74 NFL Drafts.
- Clemson is one of only six schools to have produced multiple draft picks in each of the last 23 NFL Drafts (LSU, Michigan, Oklahoma, Ohio State and USC).
- Clemson has had at least three selections in 16 of its 17 drafts since Dabo Swinney was elevated to head coach. Clemson is one of six schools to have produced three or more picks at least 16 times in that span alongside Alabama, LSU, Ohio State, Oklahoma and USC.
- Including two defensive picks in the 2025 NFL Draft, Clemson has produced multiple defensive draft picks in 14 of the 17 drafts of the Dabo Swinney era. Clemson, LSU, Alabama, Ohio State and Georgia are the only programs to produce multiple draft picks from their defenses in at least 14 drafts in that span.
- Clemson has had at least one player chosen by 30 of the 32 NFL franchises since 2003. The lone exceptions in that time frame are the Patriots, who last selected a Tiger in 1991, and the Panthers, who have never selected a Clemson player despite playing their first season in franchise history in Death Valley.
- Head Coach Dabo Swinney has produced a draft pick for 28 of the 32 NFL teams in his head coaching tenure; the only NFL teams not to select a Clemson player in Swinney's head coaching tenure are the Chicago Bears, Denver Broncos, New England Patriots and Carolina Panthers.
- Though Clemson did not have a player selected in the first round of the 2025 NFL Draft, Clemson has had at least one first-round draft choice in 10 of the last

- 13 years, standing alongside Alabama, Florida, Georgia and Ohio State as the only programs to produce a firstround pick in at least 10 of the last 13 years.
- Since 2013, Clemson has produced first-round picks from the QB, RB, WR, DE, DT, LB and DB position groups. The only other school with at least one firstrounder at all those positions in that span is Alabama.
- Linebacker Barrett Carter's selection in the 2025 NFL Draft represented the fourth consecutive draft in which Clemson had a linebacker selected. Clemson and Alabama are the only programs in the nation to produce at least one linebacker in each of the last four NFL Drafts.
- Safety R.J. Mickens' selection in the 2025 NFL Draft gave Clemson at least one drafted defensive back in 13 of Clemson's 17 drafts in the Dabo Swinney era.

CLEMSON, S.C. - Trailing by seven late in the game, Clemson drove to the LSU 15-yard line but was stopped on downs as No. 9 LSU defeated No. 4 Clemson, 17-10.

Quarterback Cade Klubnik finished 19-of-38 for 230 passing yards. Defensively, Clemson had eight tackles for loss, forced two takeaways and held LSU to 354 yards of total offense. In his first career start, safety Ronan Hanafin led Clemson with 12 tackles, followed by linebacker Sammy Brown with 11 tackles.

Ricardo Jones returned a fumble forced by Avieon Terrell 24 yards to the LSU 24 to set up Clemson's first score, a Nolan Hauser 42-yard field goal with 8:57 to play in the first quarter. LSU later knotted the score at 3-3 on a 52-yard field goal by Damian Ramos 4:07 into the second quarter.

Klubnik then led Clemson on a 13-play, 75-yard drive capped by one-yard touchdown by Adam Randall, giving Clemson a 10-3 lead with 4:36 to play in the half.

After Clemson missed a 48-yard field goal early in the third quarter, LSU evened the score at 10-10 on a two-yard touchdown run by Caden Dunham. LSU took its first lead of the game with 12:18 remaining in the fourth quarter when LSU quarterback Garrett Nussmeier completed an 11-play, 73-yard drive with an eightyard touchdown pass to Trey'Dez Green to give LSU a 17-10 lead

After trading several scoreless fourth-quarter possessions. Clemson forced an LSU punt after the two-minute timeout to give Clemson one final drive. After a 16yard punt return by Bryant Wesco Jr. set up Clemson at its own 43, Clemson drove 42 yards but was ultimately stopped in the LSU red zone with 59 seconds to play.

CLEMSON, S.C. - No. 8 Clemson scored the final 27 points of the game en route to a 27-16 win against Troy at Memorial Stadium.

Running back Adam Randall led Clemson with 165 all-purpose yards including a career-high 112 rushing yards and one touchdown in addition to four catches for 23 yards. Wide receiver Bryant Wesco Jr. caught two touchdowns, leading all receivers with seven catches for 118 yards. Clemson intercepted three passes and sacked Troy four times.

Troy opened the game with a five-play, 75-yard drive that ended in a 44-yard touchdown from Goose Crowder to Tray Taylor. Shortly after, the game entered into a 92-minute lightning delay with Troy leading 7-0.

Coming out of the break, Troy extended its lead to 16-0 on a 37-yard first-quarter field goal and a fouryard second-quarter pick-six on a batted ball. But Clemson scored its first of its 27 unanswered points late in the first half on a 25-yard Nolan Hauser field goal to bring the halftime score to 16-3.

Clemson got in gear coming out of halftime, immediately marching 75 yards in eight plays, 59 yards of which came via Randall on the ground including a oneyard touchdown run. Clemson took the lead 58 seconds later, cashing in an interception with a 26-yard Wesco touchdown one play later. The Tigers' next two possessions resulted in a 30-yard Hauser field goal and a 34yard scoring pass to Wesco to bring the score to 27-16.

In all, after the slow start, Clemson scored on five consecutive possessions across the final three quarters before running out the final 4:24 of clock on the game's final drive.

Bryant Wesco Jr. hauled in seven passes for 126 yards, including a go-ahead 73-yard touchdown reception. Adam Randall added 80 rushing yards on 15 carries and a late game-tying touchdown.

Georgia Tech ran out to a 13-0 second quarter lead, converting a Clemson fumble into a field goal in the first quarter and adding the first 10 points of the second quarter. Clemson got on the board with a 16-play, 75yard drive capped by a one-yard Cade Klubnik rushing touchdown to make it 13-7 at halftime.

CLEMSON, S.C. - Clemson racked up 503 yards of offense, but Syracuse ran out to a 24-7 first-half lead en route to a 34-21 Orange win at Memorial Stadium.

Running back Adam Randall recorded 227 all-purpose yards, including seven catches for 44 yards and a touchdown in addition to his 130 rushing yards. Quarterback Cade Klubnik went 37-for-60 for 363 yards and three touchdown passes.

Syracuse scored on its first drive when quarterback Steve Angeli connected with Justus Ross-Simmons on a 12-yard touchdown pass. Syracuse then used a surprise onside kick and 11 plays to add another three points.

Clemson capitalized on its first possession, finishing a nine-play, 75-yard drive with a 38-yard touchdown pass from Klubnik to Bryant Wesco Jr.

Syracuse extended its lead to 17-7 with a nineyard rushing touchdown, and after forcing Clemson to punt, Darrell Gill Jr. caught a 22-yard touchdown pass to make the score 24-7. Klubnik's six-yard touchdown pass to Randall with 1:06 left to play in the half cut Syracuse's halftime advantage to 24-14.

The teams incurred a one-hour-and-36-minute lightning delay that began with four minutes remaining in halftime. Syracuse increased its lead in the third quarter as Woody converted a 49-yard field goal with 11:44 on the clock. Later in the quarter, the Orange recovered a Clemson fumble, and Rickie Collins connected with Ross-Simmons on an 18-yard touchdown pass to extend their lead 34-14.

A nine-yard fourth-quarter touchdown pass from Klubnik to Wesco made the score 34-21, but an interception and a turnover on downs on Clemson's final two possessions gave Syracuse the victory.

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. - Clemson scored a touchdown on its first offensive play and on each of its first four possessions as the Tigers rode a 28-3 first-quarter lead to a 38-10 victory at Kenan Stadium.

The contest was the 300th overall game for Dabo Swinney at Clemson, including 68 games as an assistant coach and 232 as head coach. His matchup with Bill Belichick was the second time in college football history a coach with multiple FBS national championships as a head coach faced one with multiple Super Bowl titles as a head coach.

Quarterback Cade Klubnik finished 22-of-24 for 254 passing yards and four touchdowns through the air. Wide receiver T.J. Moore hauled in five passes for 108 yards and a touchdown, and running back Adam Randall and tight end Christian Bentancur each added two receiving touchdowns.

Moore scored on the game's first play from scrimmage, converting a double pass from Antonio Williams for a 75-yard touchdown. North Carolina cut the lead to 7-3 on its opening possession, but Clemson added touchdowns on its next three possessions — a 35-yard pass to Randall, a 45-yard pass to Bentancur and another 23-yard pass to Randall — for a 28-3 edge.

Clemson pushed its halftime advantage to 35-3 in front of an emptying crowd with an eight-yard pass to Bentancur with 2:02 to play in the half.

Clemson's reserves pushed the score to 38-3 early in the fourth quarter. North Carolina found the end zone for the first time on an 11-yard touchdown run by Benjamin Hall with 10:25 to play, but Clemson ultimately earned its seventh straight win against the Tar Heels.

CHESTNUT HILL, Mass. - Clemson scored on all six of its first-half drives to earn a 41-10 win over Boston College at Alumni Stadium. The win pushed the Tigers' winning streak against Boston College to 13 games.

The Boston College Gridiron Club presented the Leather Helmet Award to quarterback Cade Klubnik as the game's MVP. Klubnik finished 22-for-30 for 280 yards passing and a 38-yard touchdown pass to Bryant Wesco Jr. and also ran for 48 yards and a touchdown on nine carries. Wesco amassed a team-high 106 yards and a touchdown on five catches.

The Eagles entered the contest ranked 10th nationally at 313.4 passing yards per game, but Clemson held BC to just 136 passing yards. The defense also added five sacks, seven tackles for loss, an interception and a fumble recovery.

Clemson opened the game with a 13-play field goal goal drive on offense and a three-and-out on defense, setting up an Adam Randall eight-yard touchdown run. The Eagles answered with a field goal, but the Tigers respeonded with another touchdown drive ending in the first career touchdown for defensive tackle Peter Woods on a two-yard run.

Boston College cut the Clemson lead to 17-10 in the second quarter on a two-yard Turbo Richard touchdown run, but the score would be the Eagles' final points of the game. Klubnik scampered for a six-yard touchdown on Clemson's next possession, and the Tigers tacked on 10 more points before halftime on Klubnik's shot to Wesco and an end-of-half 50-yard field goal by Hauser to give the Tigers a 34-10 halftime advantage.

Clemson pushed the final score to 41-10 on a 10-play, 60-yard drive that resulted in a one-yard touch-down run by Keith Adams Jr. in the final minute.

CLEMSON, S.C. — Clemson stormed back from a 21-7 first-quarter deficit to take a lead into the fourth quarter, but a touchdown and two-point conversion in the final minute gave Duke a 46-45 win, its first victory at Death Valley since 1980.

Clemson recorded season highs to date with 45 points and 560 yards. The Tigers dropped to 134-1 all-time when scoring 45 points in a game and 61-3 all-time when recording 550 or more yards in a game.

Quarterback Cade Klubnik went 27-for-36 passing for a career-high 385 yards and two touchdown passes. Antonio Williams led Clemson with 142 receiving yards on 10 catches and scored two touchdowns - one receiving and one rushing.

Interrupted only by Williams' second career rushing touchdown, Duke scored touchdowns on each of its first three possessions for a 21-7 edge after one quarter. Clemson later led 45-38 and pinned Duke at its own six with 5:19 to play, but Duke drove 94 yards for a Nate Sheppard touchdown run and a two-point conversion with 40 seconds remaining to earn the win.

Clemson sacked Florida State six times, led by cornerback Avieon Terrell, who recorded 2.0. Right tackle Blake Miller earned his 50th consecutive start. breaking Dalton Freeman's school record for consecutive starts by a non-specialist.

Clemson drove 75 yards in 13 plays on the game's opening possession, punctuated by a four-yard Klubnik touchdown run and a two-point conversion on a fake PAT by Clay Swinney for an 8-0 lead. Clemson added to its lead in the second quarter, as two plays after Florida State dropped a potential fourth-down conversion, Klubnik hit Antonio Williams on a flea flicker for a 34-vard touchdown.

Clemson tacked on a Nolan Hauser field goal late in the second quarter, and Florida State scored its only touchdown of the game on a seven-yard pass with 33 seconds remaining in the half, bringing the halftime score to 18-7.

Two Hauser field goals pushed Clemson's lead to 24-7 early in the fourth quarter. Florida State added a fourth-quarter field goal but wouldn't score again, as Clemson produced all six of its sacks in the second half to help stifle the Seminole offense.

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — After running back Adam Randall scored his second touchdown of the game on fourth-and-goal with 7:16 to play, Clemson held Louisville to two missed field goals and a turnover on downs to earn a 20-19 road win at No. 19/21 Louisville.

Randall rushed for 105 yards and two touchdowns on 15 carries. Linebacker Sammy Brown led Clemson with 11 tackles (2.0 for loss) and a sack, and cornerback Avieon Terrell forced and recovered a fumble, which gave him sole possession of the Clemson record for career forced fumbles by a defensive back (seven).

Clemson struck first, finishing a 12-play, 65-yard opening drive with a 27-yard Nolan Hauser field goal. Louisville leveled the score at 3-3 late in the first quarter with a 51-yard field goal by Cooper Ranvier.

Louisville quarterback Miller Moss scored a one-yard rushing touchdown to give Louisville its first lead of the game. The Cardinals held a 9-3 lead following a missed extra point by Ranvier. After a Clemson punt, Terrell's strip gave Clemson the ball in Louisville territory at the 25-yard line. On the next play, Randall rushed for a 25-yard touchdown to give Clemson a 10-9 halftime lead.

Louisville received the ball to start the second half and capped a seven-play, 75-yard drive with a two-yard touchdown pass from wide receiver Caullin Lacy to Nate Kurisky. Clemson cut the deficit to 16-13 on the ensuing possession on a 48-yard Hauser field goal and Louisville responded with a 39-yard field goal.

A wild fourth quarter included Louisville stopping Clemson on fourth-and-goal at the Louisville 1, but the Tigers got the ball back and took the lead on Randall's one-yard touchdown. Louisville had opportunities for go-ahead field goals from 50 and 46 yards in the final 4:06 but converted neither before Clemson forced a final turnover on downs to earn the Friday night win.

CLEMSON, S.C. —Clemson raced out to a 31-0 second-quarter lead and honored its seniors in style with a 45-10 win over Furman. With the victory, Clemson earned bowl eligibility for a 27th consecutive season, including the 2004 season in which Clemson opted against postseason participation.

Clemson used a balanced offensive attack to tally 456 total yards. Nine players recorded a carry for 219 rushing yards, while 17 Tigers caught a pass for 237 receiving yards. Antonio Williams scored two touchdowns including one on his 200th career reception, and quarterback Chris Denson ran for a team-high 106 yards on six carries in leading two late touchdown drives.

Clemson scored on each of its first three possessions. After Nolan Hauser's 45-yard field goal on the game's opening drive, Williams scored his 20th career touchdown reception on his 200th career catch on a pass from Cade Klubnik. Wide receiver Tyler Brown made it 17-0 on a 21-yard reverse.

Clemson increased the lead to 24-0 in the second quarter on Williams' second touchdown of the contest. A teary-eyed Klubnik would receive a curtain call in his final game in Death Valley on Clemson's next drive.

A Christian Bentancur touchdown from Christopher Vizzina and an Ian Williams field goal for Furman made the halftime score 31-3.

Furman cut the lead to 31-10 in the third quarter before Denson's dazzling two fourth-quarter drives began. A 50-yard Denson run helped set up his first career touchdown pass to Logan Brooking, and Denson added the first touchdown run of his career on a 10-yard score to push him over the century mark on the evening.
