CLEMSON. PENN STATE AWAIT 2025 BAD BOY MOWERS PINSTRIPE BOWL

Clemson will attempt to earn a postseason victory for an FBS-record-extending 15th season in a row on Saturday, Dec. 27 when the Tigers face the Penn State Nittany Lions in the 2025 Bad Boy Mowers Pinstripe Bowl. Kickoff at Yankee Stadium in New York is set for noon ET on ABC.

Clemson's postseason participation comes after it engineered one of the largest in-season turnarounds in school history. After a 1-3 start, the 2025 Tigers finished the regular season 7-5, becoming the first squad in program history to reach seven wins after starting a season with one win or fewer through four games.

With an eighth win, Clemson (14 straight seasons with eight or more wins) would join Alabama (18) and Georgia (15) as the only programs in the nation with 15 or more consecutive eight-win seasons. It would represent only the 12th streak of 15 or more consecutive eight-win seasons in the FBS in the AP Poll era (dates to 1936).

The game will represent the second all-time meeting between two of the nation's premier programs in Clemson and Penn State. The programs boast a combined 1,764 all-time victories, and the schools have combined for five national championships since 1981.

The Tigers and Nittany Lions first squared off on New Year's Day in 1988 when Danny Ford's squad concluded a 10-2 campaign in 1987 by handing Joe Paterno and Penn State its largest margin of defeat in a bowl game in school history in a 35-10 Clemson victory in the Citrus Bowl.

tied with Paterno (and Urban Meyer) for the fourth-most wins by an FBS head coach through the first 20 seasons of head coaching career. Paterno amassed a 187-44-2 record in his first 20 seasons; Swinney has a 187-52 record through 17-plus seasons at Clemson, including his stint as interim head coach in 2008.

The Pinstripe Bowl will be Clemson's 22nd bowl game (including College Football Playoff play) under Swinney. Swinney is already the ACC's record holder in career bowl games as an ACC head coach (21) and career bowl victories as an ACC head coach (12).



WHAT TO WATCH FOR THIS WEEK

- Clemson attempting to win a postseason game (conference championship, bowl game and/or national championship game) for a 15th consecutive season. Clemson's active 14-year streak is the longest streak on record in major college football history.
- Clemson attempting to improve to 28-24 all-time in bowl/CFP play.
- Clemson making its 52nd bowl appearance in school history, including CFP play. Clemson was one of 13 programs to enter 2025 having made at least 50 bowl appearances all-time.
- Clemson appearing in a bowl for a 21st consecutive year, the nation's fourth-longest active streak and the 11th-longest streak in FBS history.
- The 2025 Tigers attempting to become the first team in Clemson history to win eight games in a season in which the team started the year with one win or fewer through four games.
- Clemson attempting to push its streak of consecutive eight-win seasons to 15 years.
- Clemson attempting to join Alabama (18) and Georgia (15) as the only programs in the nation with 15 or more consecutive eight-win seasons. No other program has an active streak in double digits.
- Clemson attempting to produce only the 12th streak of 15 consecutive eight-win seasons in the FBS in the AP Poll era (dates to 1936).
- Clemson attempting to become the first program to win eight or more games in 15 consecutive seasons as ACC members. Clemson's current 14-year streak is tied with Florida State's first 14 years of ACC membership for the longest streak in conference history.
- Clemson attempting to produce its 43rd season with eight or more wins all-time.
- Clemson making its Pinstripe Bowl debut. After grouping games together across various titles and sponsor entitlements under their respective umbrellas, the Pinstripe Bowl will be the 17th different bowl in which Clemson has played at least one game all-time.
- Clemson playing a game in New York City for the second time in school history. Clemson played Fordham to a 12-12 tie at Triborough Stadium on Randall's Island in 1952, a game in which Don King rushed for a school-freshman-record 234 yards on 33 carries.
- Clemson attempting to improve to 10-5-2 all-time in games played in active MLB stadiums.
- Clemson attempting to improve to 2-0 all-time against Penn State. Clemson won the programs' lone previous meeting with a 35-10 win in the Citrus Bowl to close the 1987 season.
- Clemson attempting to improve to 6-2 all-time against Big Ten opponents. This does not include meetings against teams presently in the Big Ten prior to their membership in the conference (e.g., Maryland, Penn State, etc.).
- Clemson facing its fourth different Big Ten opponent all-time (only counting games in which the opponent was an active Big Ten member at the time of kickoff). Clemson is 4-1 against Ohio State, 1-0 against Illinois and 0-1 against Minnesota.
- Clemson entering the contest with a .714 winning percentage against Big Ten opponents since facing its first Big Ten opponent (Ohio State) in the 1978 Gator Bowl. Among non-Big Ten members, Clemson has the nation's sixth-best winning percentage against the Big Ten in that span (min. seven games).
- Clemson attempting to produce its 18th seasonending winning streak of five games or more in program history. It would be Clemson's fifth such finish under Dabo Swinney.

- Clemson attempting to earn victories against SEC and Big Ten teams in back-to-back games for the second time in school history (2016). It would be Clemson's first time beating those conferences in consecutive games in that order.
- Clemson attempting to improve to 16-2 in December games since 2015. Clemson's .882 December winning percentage in that span is the best in the nation among teams with at least four games played.
- Clemson attempting to improve to 61-17 in games away from home since 2015.
- Clemson attempting to improve to 147-23 against AP-unranked teams under Dabo Swinney and improve to 124-13 in those games since the start of the 2012 season.
- Clemson attempting to improve to 173-76-3 all-time (and 56-10 since 2011) when facing a coach for the first time.
- Head Coach Dabo Swinney (187-52) attempting to pass Joe Paterno and Urban Meyer (187 each) for the fourth-most victories within the first 20 seasons of a

head coaching career. Swinney trails only Tom Osborne (195), Nick Saban (191) and Bob Stoops (191) despite Swinney being in only his 18th season (and 17th full season). Note: Stoops and Meyer are not credited on the NCAA's official list of most wins through 20 seasons since they did not coach 20 years.

- Swinney entering bowl season as the ACC's all-time record-holder in bowl appearances (21) and bowl/CFP victories (12) by a head coach.
- Swinney coaching in his 22nd career bowl/CFP game to tie LaVell Edwards and Lou Holtz for eighth-most all-time.

- Clemson attempting to score in its 307th consecutive game to pass the 1992-2017 Air Force Falcons for sole possession of the 11th-longest streak in the NCAA's FBS record book
- Clemson attempting to score its second defensive touchdown of the season to give the Tigers multiple defensive touchdowns in 16 straight seasons. The last time Clemson had fewer than two defensive touchdowns in a season was 2009, Dabo Swinney's first full season as head coach, when the Tigers supplemented a single defensive touchdown with six special teams touchdowns.
- Clemson entering the game having scored at least one rushing touchdown in a national-best-tying 96 of its 108 games since the start of the 2018 season. Clemson has also rushed for multiple touchdowns in a national-best 78 games in that span.
- Clemson attempting to rush for multiple touchdowns in four consecutive games for the first time since a five-game streak in early 2023.
- Clemson attempting to produce a 100-yard rusher in four straight games for the first time since a six-game streak in 2019 (all by Travis Etienne).
- Clemson having an opportunity to produce three different 100-yard rushers in three consecutive games for the first time since 2007 (Sadat Chambers, James Davis and C.J. Spiller). Amid Clemson's current threegame streak with a 100-yard rusher, Clemson has two different 100-yard rushers in its last two games (Chris Denson vs. Furman and Adam Randall vs. South

Carolina)

- Clemson attempting to produce both a 100-yard rusher and 100-yard receiver in back-to-back games for the first time since 2015 against Florida State and Syracuse.
- Clemson attempting to hold five consecutive opponents to fewer than 20 points for the first time since an eight-game streak in 2019.
- Clemson attempting to produce multiple takeaways in three straight games for the first time since a five-game streak in November and December 2024.
- Clemson attempting to produce four takeaways in consecutive games for the first time since the final two games of the 2008 regular season. If Clemson were to get only three takeaways, it would be Clemson's first set of consecutive games with three or more takeaways since a three-game streak in games 2-4 of 2024.
- Clemson attempting to produce five or more sacks in consecutive games for the first time since November 2021 against UConn and Wake Forest.
- Linebacker Sammy Brown (5.0) needing one more sack to take sole possession of a new single-season career high, surpassing his 5.0 as a freshman last year.
- Brown attempting to become the first Clemson player under Dabo Swinney to record multiple games in a single season with both an interception and a full sack. He would join Jeremiah Trotter Jr. (one in 2022 and one in 2023) as the only players in Swinney's tenure to record multiple such games in a career.
- Safety Ronan Hanafin attempting to become the first Clemson player to force a fumble in consecutive games this season. Three Clemson players accomplished the feat in 2024 (T.J. Parker, Avieon Terrell and Wade Woodaz).
- Kicker Nolan Hauser (84.2 percent) attempting to finish the fourth season by a Clemson kicker under Dabo Swinney with a field goal percentage of 84.0 percent or better (min. 2 FGA), joining Chandler Catanzaro's 94.7 percent in 2012 and 92.9 percent in 2013 and Greg Huegel's 84.4 percent in 2015.
- Hauser (16-of-19, 84.2 percent) needing at least one field goal attempt and no misses to pass Greg Huegel (27-of-32, 84.4 percent in 2015) for the second-best field goal percentage by a Clemson kicker in a season with 20 or more field goal attempts. The lead in that category is held by Bob Paulling, who went 18-of-20 (90.0) in 1983.
- Hauser (34-of-43) needing three more field goals to move into the Top 10 in school history in career field goals made. Mark Buchholz presently sits 10th with 37 from 2007-08.
- Defensive end Will Heldt (7.5) seeking to add to his single-season career high in sacks.
- Heldt needing 2.5 sacks to give Clemson a 10-sack player in consecutive seasons for the first time since a four-year run from 2013–16. T.J. Parker recorded 11.0 sacks in 2024.
- Heldt (1.5 last game) attempting to become the first Clemson player to post 1.5 or more sacks in consecutive games since Jeremiah Trotter Jr. in 2022.
- Heldt attempting to record a sack in three straight games for the first time in his career.
- Safety Ricardo Jones (six) entering bowl season ranked tied for second in the nation and tied for first among power conference players in interceptions this season.
- Jones (six) entering the game one interception shy of cornerback Fred Knoebel (seven in 1951) for the fourth-most interceptions in a single season in Clemson history. He is two interceptions shy of an existing three-way tie for first in school history, presently shared by Robert O'Neal (eight in 1989), Justin Miller (eight in

The last time Clemson did not win at least one postseason game was in 2010, when Clemson lost in the Meineke Car Care Bowl after not qualifying for the ACC Championship Game.

EIGHT-WIN SEASON STREAK

Sitting at 3-5 on the first day of November, Clemson faced an uphill battle to reach six wins and bowl eligibility. Reaching the eight-win mark from there would require perfection.

Clemson did what it need to do to end the regular season to keep the possibility of an eight-win season alive, going 4-0 down the stretch including two wins against teams that had defeated Clemson's 2024 College Football Playoff squad a year earlier.

With a bowl victory, Clemson would push its streak of consecutive seasons with eight or more wins to 15, tying Georgia for the nation's second-longest active streak. It would be only the 12th such streak at any point in the AP Poll era (since 1936).

CLEMSON RETURNS TO NYC

Though Saturday's game will be Clemson's first Pinstripe Bowl appearance, it will not represent the Tigers' New York City debut. In 1952, Clemson tied Fordham, 12-12, in front of 6,000 people at Triborough Stadium on Randall's Island.

The game featured one of the greatest individual performances in Clemson history. In that contest, freshman Don King moved to Clemson's single-wing tailback position and rushed for a school-freshman-record 234 rushing yards.

King recorded touchdown runs of 74 and 66 yards in the first quarter. He exceeded 200 rushing yards in the first half alone before suffering an injury before halftime that limited his effectiveness in the second half.

Clemson went 0-for-6 passing in the game, while Fordham passed for 168 yards and two touchdowns, including one in the final minute to pull the score to 12-12. The teams were a combined 0-for-4 on extra points in the draw.

NO QUIT IN THESE TIGERS

In the immediate aftermath of a nail-biting 20-19 road win at No. 19 Louisville on Nov. 14, Head Coach Dabo Swinney spoke passionately to ESPN's Paul Carcaterra about the fight of his 2025 team.

"The tougher it's gotten, the closer they've become, the stronger they've gotten and the more they've dug in," Swinney bellowed. "And that's not normal, not in today's world. That's not normal. Usually when you have some adversity, you divide, [and] people are looking for the sideline or the training room, but not these Tigers. not these seniors... The record don't define you; how you respond is what defines you — in everything. In life, in football, everything. Our record ain't what we want it to be, but we've got a hell of a great group of young people right there... A lot of people have quit on 'em. There ain't no quit in that bunch, and there ain't no quit in me. Go Tigers!"

Clemson's 1-3 start through four games in 2025 was its first 1-3 start since 2004. That year, Tommy Bowden's Clemson team went 5-2 over its seven remaining games to finish the year with a 6-5 record. The Tigers earned bowl eligibility that year but declined postseason opportunities.

Clemson has opened a season with one win or fewer through four games 30 times in its 130-season history. The Tigers had fought back to finish .500 or better in nine of those campaigns (1906, 1914, 1934, 1937, 1961, 1963, 1967, 1985 and 2004) prior to 2025.

In 16 of the previous 29 seasons with one win or fewer through four games, Clemson was led by a member of the College Football Hall of Fame. That includes four such seasons under Jess Neely, 11 seasons under Frank Howard and one season under Danny Ford.

The 2025 Tigers became the first team in Clemson history to rebound from a 1-3 or worse start to win seven

Clemson's most recent win in its first appearance in a new bowl came in 2016 when the Tigers shutout Ohio State, 31-0, in the program's first Fiesta Bowl appearance. That game served as a College Football Playoff semifinal en route to Clemson's second national title.

HISTORY VS. NEW COACHES

The Pinstripe Bowl against Penn State interim coach Terry Smith will be the fifth game this season in which Clemson has faced an opposing head coach for the first time, including games against Troy's Gerad Parker, Syracuse's Fran Brown, North Carolina's Bill Belichick and Boston College's Bill O'Brien. Though Clemson will not face him today, Clemson is 1-0 all-time against incoming Penn State coach Matt Campbell, whose Iowa State team was defeated by Clemson in the 2021 Cheez-It Bowl.

Since 2011, Clemson is 55-10 when facing an opposing head coach for the first time, including a 6-2 mark last season and a 3-1 mark this year.

SERIES HISTORY VS. PENN STATE

Saturday's game will be the second all-time meeting between Clemson and Penn State. The Tigers and Nittany Lions first squared off on New Year's Day in 1988 when Danny Ford's squad concluded a 10-2 campaign in 1987 by handing Joe Paterno and Penn State its largest margin of defeat in a bowl game in school history in a 35-10 Clemson victory in the 1988 Citrus Bowl.

Quarterback Rodney Williams was named the Offensive Player of the Game after he completed 14-of-24 passes for 214 yards. His primary target was wide receiver Keith Jennings, whose career day included seven receptions for 110 yards.

The Tigers rushed for 285 yards in addition to their 214 passing yards. It was the first bowl game in which Clemson had reached 200 yards passing and 200 yards rushing. Terry Allen recorded a team-high 105 rushing yards and one touchdown. Fullback Tracy Johnson ran for 88 yards and three touchdowns, and Joe Henderson

added 54 yards on the ground and another touchdown.

Defensively, Clemson was led by cornerback James Lott's eight tackles. Safety Richard Smith added seven tackles and one pass breakup. Strong safety Gene Beasley and linebacker Doug Brewster both had six tackles.

Linebacker Dorian Mariable was selected the Citrus Bowl's Defensive Player of the Game with his five tackles, including one for a loss. He also intercepted a pass in the end zone and returned it 46 yards in the third quarter.

TEAM TITLES IN 1981 AND 1982

Clemson and Penn State went back-to-back as national champions in 1981 and 1982, respectively.

Clemson earned its first of three national championships in school history in 1981 after the Tigers completed their perfect 12-0 campaign with a 22-15 win against Nebraska in the Orange Bowl. Though Clemson and Penn State did not face one another, Penn State played a key role in Clemson's ascent that season.

Clemson was ranked No. 2 in the AP Poll after its regular season finale, a 29-13 win against South Carolina. A week later, with Clemson idle, No. 11 Penn State and quarterback Todd Blackledge walloped No. 1 Pitt and quarterback Dan Marino, 48-14. By virtue of the result, Clemson ascended to No. 1 in the nation for the first time in school history the following week.

The Penn State win against Pitt assisted Clemson with the unanimity of the Tigers' national title, but it also helped propel Penn State to a title of its own. Penn State rode the momentum of the Pitt upset to an 11-1 record the following year and earn the 1982 national championship with a Sugar Bowl win against Georgia.

NOTES FROM LAST GAME

- Clemson recorded four takeaways, its most since the 2023 Gator Bowl against Kentucky.
- Clemson's four takeaways were its most against South Carolina since recording four takeaways in a 2008 win against the Gamecocks. It was Clemson's first four-takeaway game at South Carolina since 2005.
- Clemson won the turnover margin, 4-1. Clemson finished plus-three or better in the turnover margin for the first time since September 2024 against NC State.
- Clemson is now 24-0 under Dabo Swinney when finishing plus-three or better in the turnover margin.
 - Clemson has now held four consecutive opponents to

- fewer than 20 points for the first time since the final two games of 2021 and first two games of 2022. That fourgame streak in 2021-22 started with a 30-0 shutout win against South Carolina in Columbia.
- In its last five games at Williams-Brice Stadium, Clemson has surrendered only four touchdowns and only 34 total points to South Carolina.
- One year after allowing South Carolina quarterback LaNorris Sellers to rush for 166 yards, Clemson held Sellers to two rushing yards on Saturday.
- Clemson did not allow a third-down conversion in the game until the final two minutes. South Carolina finished 1-for-11 on third downs, the fewest third down conversions allowed by Clemson since 2021 against UConn (zero).
- Clemson's 12 pass breakups were its most since 2022 against Louisiana Tech (12).
- On its eighth point of the contest, Clemson (2,520) reached 2,500 all-time points scored against South Carolina. The Gamecocks became the first program to surrender 2,500 points all-time to the Tigers.
- Quarterback Cade Klubnik completed 24-of-39 passes for 268 yards. He also added 12 rushing yards and a touchdown on the ground.
- Klubnik (26-13) passed Charlie Whitehurst (25-15) for sole possession of the fifth-most wins by a Clemson starting quarterback since World War II.
- Klubnik (2-1) became the 13th Clemson quarterback since 1953 to earn multiple rivalry wins against South Carolina as a starting quarterback, joining Charlie Bussey, Jimmy Addison, Steve Fuller, Homer Jordan, Rodney Williams, DeChane Cameron, Nealon Greene, Woody Dantzler, Charlie Whitehurst, Cullen Harper, Deshaun Watson and Trevor Lawrence.
- On a 25-yard pass on the game's opening play from scrimmage, Klubnik (9,930) passed Charlie Whitehurst (9,665 from 2002-05) for the fourth-most career passing yards in Clemson history.
- On his 15th pass attempt of the game, Klubnik (1,393) passed Charlie Whitehurst (1,368 from 2002-05) for the second-most career pass attempts in Clemson history.
- Klubnik recorded his 17th career rushing touchdown in the second quarter. On the play, he was stripped in the backfield while attempting to pass but recovered and advanced the fumble for the touchdown.
- With the rushing touchdown, Klubnik (17) moved past Kelly Bryant (16 from 2015-18) for sole possession of the sixth-most rushing touchdowns by a Clemson quarterback since the Tigers moved away from the single wing in 1953.
- The rushing touchdown was Klubnik's third of his career against South Carolina. He became the first Clemson quarterback to post three or more career rushing touchdowns against the Gamecocks since Deshaun Watson's five from 2014-16.
- Clemson has now rushed for multiple touchdowns in three consecutive games for the first time since 2024 against Wake Forest, Virginia and Louisville. Clemson has scored multiple rushing touchdowns in a national-best 78 games since 2018.
- Klubnik threw an interception on his eighth pass attempt of the game, ending Clemson's team streak of 184 consecutive pass attempts without an interception. Prior to the game, Clemson's most recent interception had come on its third-to-last pass attempt at Boston College on Oct. 11 on a throw by Christopher Vizzina.
- The interception also ended Klubnik's personal streak of 122 consecutive pass attempts without an interception. His last interception prior to the game had come on his fourth-to-last pass attempt at Boston College on Oct. 11.
 - Running back Adam Randall rushed a career-high 24

times for 102 yards with a rushing touchdown.

- Randall's 100-yard rushing game was his fourth of the season and the fourth of his career.
- During the contest, Randall became the fourth player in Clemson history to reach 750 career rushing yards and 750 career receiving yards, joining Travis Zachery, C.J. Spiller and Travis Etienne. He now has 823 career rushing yards and 779 career receiving yards.
- Randall opened the scoring on a 10-yard rushing touchdown early in the second quarter.
- The rushing touchdown was Randall's ninth of the season and of his career.
- Randall's touchdown gave Clemson at least one rushing touchdown in 96 of its 108 games since the start of the 2018 season. Clemson entered the week tied for the national lead in the category.
- Randall added a two-point conversion on a reception in the fourth quarter.
- Wide receiver T.J. Moore recorded six receptions for a team-high 101 yards.
- The 100-yard receiving game was Moore's third of the season and fourth of his career.
- Moore tied Bryant Wesco Jr.'s team lead in 100-yard receiving games this season (three each).
- With the performances by Moore and Randall, Clemson posted its second game of the season with both a 100-yard rusher and 100-yard receiver. It was Clemson's first such game since the second game of the season against Troy.
- Wide receiver Antonio Williams caught a team-high seven receptions for 66 yards.
- On his sixth reception of the game, Williams (208) passed DeAndre Hopkins (206 from 2010-12) for fourth on Clemson's all-time leaderboard for career receptions.
- During the contest, Williams (2,336) passed Derrick Hamilton (2,312 from 2001-03) to move into 11th on Clemson's all-time leaderboard for career receiving yards.
- In his first career start, tight end Christian Bentancur recorded a career-high five receptions for 51 yards.
- Offensive lineman Collin Sadler recorded his first career reception, gaining two yards on a batted ball. It was the first reception for a gain by a Clemson offensive lineman since William Henry's five-yard reception vs. Furman in 2003
- Clemson recorded five sacks, its third game of the season in which it has reached five or more sacks.
- Clemson's five sacks were its most in a game against South Carolina since its five against the Gamecocks in 2014
- On its second sack of the game, Clemson (33) reached 30 sacks for the 14th consecutive season. Clemson is the only program in the nation to have reached 30 sacks in every year of the College Football Playoff era (since 2014).
- Safety Ricardo Jones recorded a career-high two interceptions. He posted Clemson's first multi-interception game since Andrew Booth Jr.'s two interceptions in the same stadium in a 30-0 win at South Carolina in 2021.
- Jones pushed his team lead in interceptions this season to six, the most by a Clemson player since DeAndre McDaniel's eight interceptions in 2009.
- Jones returned his second interception of the game 12 yards for a touchdown, the first pick-six of his career.
- The pick-six by Jones was Clemson's first defensive touchdown since Payton Page's 57-yard interception return for touchdown against The Citadel in November 2024.
- Cornerback Avieon Terrell forced the game's first takeaway by adding to his single-season career high in forced fumbles with his fifth of the season.
- Terrell (five) joined Brandon Maye (five in 2009) and T.J. Parker (six in 2024) as the only players in school

history to force five fumbles in a single season.

- Terrell recorded his eighth career forced fumble to tie linebacker Danny Triplett (eight from 1979-82), middle guard William Perry (eight from 1981-84), defensive tackle Chester McGlockton (eight from 1989-91) and defensive end Malliciah Goodman (eight from 2009-12) for the third-most career forced fumbles in Clemson history.
- Terrell added to his Clemson record for career forced fumbles by a defensive back (eight) and has now set the single-season school record in the category as well (five).
- The fumble forced by Terrell was recovered by defensive end T.J. Parker.
- Parker has now recovered a fumble in back-to-back games for the second time in his career (vs. South Carolina and SMU in 2024).
- The fumble recovery was Parker's career-high third of the season and sixth of his career.
- Parker tied Willie Smith (six from 1954-57), Ronnie Ducworth (six from 1966-68), Gene Beasley (six from 1985-88) and Doug Brewster (six from 1987-90) for fourth-most career fumbles recovered in Clemson history.
- In addition to the fumble recovery, Parker finished the game with a season-high 3.0 sacks among his four tackles.
- With his 3.0 sacks in the contest, Parker (21.5) passed Chester McGlockton (20.5 from 1989-91) for the 10th-most career sacks in Clemson history.
- Fittingly, Parker's 3.0 sacks tied Chester McGlockton (3.0 in 1990) for the most against South Carolina in Clemson history.
- Parker's 3.0 sacks were his second-most in a game in his career, one shy of his 4.0 at Pitt in 2024.
- Parker joined Vic Beasley (two) as the only players in the Swinney era to record multiple career games with 3.0 or more sacks.
- Defensive end Will Heldt recorded four tackles with a season-high 1.5 sacks and added one pass breakup.
- Heldt (7.5) added to his single-season career high in sacks. He leads Clemson in that category this season.
- Heldt recorded his seventh sack of the season on a five-yard sack of LaNorris Sellers in the first quarter
- Heldt has now recorded a sack in back-to-back games for the first time since the first two games of the season.
- Heldt added another half-sack in the second quarter, splitting a sack with Parker.
- Parker added another half-sack in the third quarter, splitting a sack with defensive tackle Stephiylan Green.
- Parker recorded two full sacks in the fourth quarter.
- Safety Ronan Hanafin helped create Clemson's fourth takeaway of the game with his second forced fumble of the season and of his career.
- The fumble forced by Hanafin was recovered by linebacker Sammy Brown, the first fumble recovery of Brown's career.
- Placekicker Nolan Hauser gave Clemson a 17-14 halftime lead with a 32-yard field goal with 56 seconds remaining in the first half.
- Hauser added a 42-yard third-quarter field goal, giving him his ninth career multi-field-goal game and his third in a four-game span.
- Hauser is now 16-of-19 on field goal attempts this season (84.2 percent). If it stands, it would be the seventh-best field goal percentage in a season by a Clemson player (min. 10 attempts).
- Offensive lineman Blake Miller started his 53rd consecutive game to extend his school record for consecutive starts by a non-specialist. Miller has started all 53 games played by Clemson since his arrival as a true freshman in 2022.
- Miller (53) moved past kicker Chandler Catanzaro (52 from 2010-13) and defensive tackle Tyler Davis (52 from

2019-23) for sole possession of the fourth-most career starts in Clemson history.

- Safety Tyler Venables played his 62nd career game to pass defensive end Xavier Thomas (61 from 2018-23) for sole possession of the eighth-most games played in Clemson history.
- Clemson faced an opponent from the state of South Carolina for the 300th time in school history. Clemson's all-time Palmetto State opponents include South Carolina (122 games), Furman (59), The Citadel (40), Presbyterian (40), Wofford (16), Erskine (eight), Newberry (six), SC State (five), Charleston Southern (one), Coastal Carolina (one), Camp Sevier (one) and Port Royal (one).
- Clemson scored in its 306th consecutive game to tie the 1992-2017 Air Force Falcons for the 11th-longest streak in the NCAA's FBS record book.
- Clemson faced its second SEC opponent of the season. Clemson has faced multiple SEC teams in 19 of the last 20 years, dating to 2006. The lone exception came in 2020 when the SEC opted out of non-conference play amid the COVID-19 pandemic.
- Captains for the contest were defensive tackle DeMonte Capehart, quarterback Cade Klubnik, wide receiver Antonio Williams and defensive tackle Peter Woods.

WITH THE WIN...

- The 2025 Tigers became the first team in Clemson history to win seven games in a season in which the team started the year with one win or fewer through four games.
- Clemson improved to 74-44-4 all-time against South Carolina. Clemson's 74 all-time wins against South Carolina are the program's most against any opponent.
- Clemson has now led the all-time series with the Gamecocks for 46,398 consecutive days (127 years, 12 days). South Carolina won the series opener in 1896 before Clemson evened the series in 1897. Clemson won the third game in the series on Nov. 17, 1898 to take a 2-1 series lead, a lead Clemson hasn't relinquished.
- Clemson has now won nine of the last $11\ \mathrm{games}$ in the series.
- Clemson improved its all-time road record against South Carolina to 55-32-3. Clemson's 55 current road wins at South Carolina are nearly double its most all-time road wins against any other opponent (28 at Wake Forest). The Tigers have more road wins against the Gamecocks in Columbia (55) than they have total wins against all but three programs (South Carolina, 74; Wake Forest, 72; and NC State, 61).
- Clemson earned a sixth straight road win against South Carolina for the first time since the 1989-99 seasons. It pulled Clemson within one of the school record for the longest road winning streak by either team in series history (seven by Clemson from 1934-40).
- Clemson has now produced its 11th all-time road winning streak of six or more games against a single opponent.
- The game marked the sixth consecutive game in the Clemson-South Carolina series won by the road team. The last win by a home team in the series was a 56-35 Clemson win in 2018.
- Clemson extended its current road winning streak to four games.
- Clemson improved to 9-1 in its last 10 regular season road games.
- Clemson (4-1 in road games in 2025) has now won at least four road games in a season for the eighth time since 2015. Its eighth such season ties Clemson with Ohio State and Boise State for the most seasons with four or more road wins in that span.
- Clemson improved to 44-10 in true road games since the start of the 2015 season.

- Clemson improved to 221-66-13 all-time against foes from the state of South Carolina. Clemson has a winning record against all 12 Palmetto State opponents it has faced all-time.
- Clemson improved to 13-6 against SEC opponents in regular season play in the College Football Playoff era.
- Clemson is now 26-12 in games against teams to which it lost its last meeting under Dabo Swinney.
- Clemson still has not been beaten by the same team in back-to-back years since Florida State did so across a three-year span from 2012-14. Clemson went 3-0 this regular season against teams to which it lost a year ago.
- Clemson has now won 37 consecutive games against teams with a losing record, the third-longest active streak in the country. Clemson has not lost to a team with a losing record at the time of kickoff since losing to 2-5 Boston College in 2010.
- Clemson finished November with a 4-1 record. It is Clemson's first four-win month since November 2023.
- Clemson has now ended a regular season on a winning streak of four or more games for the seventh time in Dabo Swinney's tenure (2015, 2017, 2018, 2019, 2021, 2023 and 2025). It is the 26th such regular season in Clemson history.
- Clemson improved to 110-20 in regular season play since the start of the 2015 season.
- Clemson improved to 146-23 against AP-unranked teams under Dabo Swinney and improved to 123-13 in those games since the start of the 2012 season.
- Clemson is now 38-7 in regular season non-conference games since the start of the 2014 season.
- Head Coach Dabo Swinney (187-52) tied Joe Paterno and Urban Meyer (187 each) for the fourth-most victories within the first 20 seasons of a head coaching career. Swinney trails only Tom Osborne (195), Nick Saban (191) and Bob Stoops (191) despite Swinney being in only his 18th season (and 17th full season). Note: Stoops and Meyer are not credited on the NCAA's official list of most wins through 20 seasons since they did not coach 20 years.
- Swinney matched the career win total of College Football Hall of Famer Urban Meyer (187–32).
- Swinney improved to 10-7 all-time against South Carolina.
- Swinney joined Frank Howard (13) as the only Clemson coaches to defeat South Carolina 10 times.
- Clemson improved to 94-9 when scoring first since the start of the 2015 season. Clemson has scored first in each of its last six games against South Carolina. It has also scored first in each of its last six games at South Carolina.
- Clemson is now 79-4 since 2015 when outscoring opponents in the "Middle Eight," defined as the final four minutes of the first half and the first four minutes of the second half.
- Clemson improved to 161-12 under Dabo Swinney when leading at halftime, including a 144-8 mark since the start of the 2011 season.
- Clemson is now 151-7 when leading after three quarters since the start of the $2011\ season$.
- Clemson is now 143-12 when totaling more first downs than its opponent since 2011.
- Clemson now has a 91-6 record when winning the turnover margin since 2011.
- Clemson improved to 44-1 when intercepting multiple passes in a game since the start of the 2015 season.
- Clemson is now 73-6 when having a 100-yard rusher since 2011.
- Clemson is now 127-3 in its last 130 games when holding teams to fewer than 23 points, a span that dates to the middle of the 2010 season.

SCORING CHANGES

- A zero-yard punt return for No. O Antonio Williams late in the second quarter is no longer charged as a punt return as he made no attempt to advance the ball while fielding it on the sideline.
- A punt coverage tackle initially credited to No. 45 Vic Burley has been changed to No. 45 Philip Florenzo.
- No. 23 Ashton Hampton has been credited with a pass breakup on No. 6 Ricardo Jones' interception return for touchdown in the fourth quarter. The change pushed Clemson's pass breakup total for the game to 12.

ON THIS DATE

- **Dec. 27**, **1926**: Josh Cody was named head football coach at Clemson. The Clemson Athletic Hall of Famer led Clemson to a 29-11-1 record over four seasons, including four victories against South Carolina.
- **Dec. 27, 2005** Clemson defeated Colorado in the Champs Sports Bowl 19-10 behind a 150-yard rushing performance by freshman James Davis, who was named MVP. The game started Clemson's active 21-year bowl streak that continues with the 2025 Pinstripe Bowl.

-- CFP SUCCESS --

COLLEGE FOOTBALL PLAYOFF STAPLES

From 2014-23, Clemson cemented itself as one of the College Football Playoff's powerhouses of the tournament's inaugural decade. In the 10-year history of the four-team format prior to 2024, only 15 programs earned at least one College Football Playoff berth, and Clemson ranked second in CFP berths, CFP title game appearances, total CFP wins and CFP titles in that span.

Clemson returned to the College Football Playoff in 2024 in the format's first year of expansion to 12 teams. Clemson is tied for the second-most College Football Playoff berths all-time.

Prior to the streak's conclusion in 2025, Clemson was one of three programs (alongside Alabama and Ohio State) to finish in the CFP Top 25 in each of the system's first 11 years.

The nine-win-season streaks by Clemson (Dabo Swinney) and Florida State (Bobby Bowden) were compiled by single head coaches. The top two streaks were split among multiple head coaches, including Bob Devaney (four from 1969-72), Tom Osborne (25 from 1973-97) and Frank Solich (four from 1998-2001) for Nebraska, and Nick Saban (16 from 2008-23) and Kalen DeBoer (one in 2024) for Alabama.

In 2020, Clemson became the first program ever to win 20 ACC Championships. That year, Clemson became the first program in the conference championship game era to win six straight conference championship games.

Two years later, Clemson's 2022 ACC title was the program's seventh in eight years, as the Tigers became the first team in an active power conference to win seven outright conference titles in an eight-year span since Alabama won eight SEC titles in nine seasons from 1971-79

Including titles from its days as a member of the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association and Southern Conference, Clemson has 28 conference championships overall, also the most of any current ACC school. Duke ranks second among the ACC's current membership with 18 overall conference titles, including 11 Southern Conference titles and seven ACC titles.

The Tigers won the 1900, 1902 and 1903 SIAA Conference championships under John Heisman, then the 1906 SIAA title under Bob Williams. Clemson also won the 1940 and 1948 Southern Conference titles under Frank Howard. Howard won eight total conference titles, including two in the Southern Conference and six in the ACC. Swinney surpassed the legend with a win in the 2024 ACC Championship Game.

POWER OVER POWER CONFERENCE FOES

Early in his head coaching tenure, Dabo Swinney laid out his belief to then-Clemson athletic director Terry Don Phillips that the Tigers needed to add tough non-conference challenges on top of their tests in ACC play to serve as a foundation for the program's growth.

"I had a conversation with Terry Don and said, 'Terry Don, I know we are not very good right now, but we need to play people because that is going to help me teach and help me develop the culture and the mindset that you have to have to win at the highest level." recounted Swinney. "I didn't think we had that, and that's what we committed to. That's what we've done."

That scheduling philosophy and culture change has resonated in the Clemson program, and since 2011, as Clemson ranks among the national leaders in wins against power conference opponents in that time span.

SIGN AND DEVELOP

While proud of his incoming classes, Head Coach Dabo Swinney has long stated that a true ranking of a recruiting class cannot and should not be published until four years later when the group can be evaluated on performance rather than potential.

Much to Swinney's delight, The Athletic annually assumed that role for the classes of 2014-20, reranking each recruiting class four years later to account for on-field performance.

For its re-rankings, The Athletic uses the following grading scale: 5 points: All-American, award winner, top-50 NFL Draft pick; 4: Multi-year starter, allconference honors; 3: One-year starter or key reserve; 2: Career backup; 0: Minor or no contribution, left the program. The outlet also adds a bonus to each program's class average, derived from its total number of wins from 2017 through 2020 (e.g., For re-ranking the Class of 2017, Clemson won 51 games, so its class average received a bonus of 0.51).

Swinney has pointed out that Clemson often falls in rankings as its retention and its commitment to not oversigning leads to smaller recruiting classes. He also notes that much of Clemson's on-field success is a function of the program's development, citing All-Americans like former three-star Isaiah Simmons or former two-star Nolan Turner. The re-rankings illustrate Clemson's impressive track record of talent identification, culture fit, resource allocation and player development.

On average, Clemson ranked 10.2 in the 247 Composite team rankings across the 2014-20 recruiting cycles. Upon re-ranking those groups, despite having little room for improvement while recruiting at a Top 15 clip in that span, Clemson ranked 4.0 on average in the re-rankings, a ratings bump of roughly six spots. Each of those Clemson classes averaged at least 10 wins a season during their careers.

SENIOR SUCCESS

Every January, Head Coach Dabo Swinney conducts his first official meeting with his new team. The first order of business in the meeting is to "reset the room," reorganizing the seating arrangement with seniors in front and all succeeding classes in order behind them in the team auditorium.

Several of Swinney's senior classes placed themselves among select company in college football history. The 2017, 2018, 2019 and 2020 Clemson seniors account for four of only 16 four-year classes in FBS history to reach 50 career wins. That includes the 2018 and 2019 groups that are tied with the 2018 Alabama seniors for the most wins in FBS history (55 wins in four years).

The 2025 Clemson seniors (excluding "Super Seniors" using extra years of eligibility afforded by the NCAA) went 30-11 in their first three years from 2022-24. The class entered the 2025 season as one of 14 nationally to have averaged at least 10 wins a year over its first three seasons.

CLEMSON'S WINNINGEST COACH

College Football Hall of Famer Frank Howard, known as "The Bashful Baron of Barlow Bend," compiled a 165-118-12 record in 30 seasons at Clemson from 1940-69.

With a 31-23 upset of No. 12 Notre Dame in 2023, Dabo Swinney earned his 166th career victory as Clemson's head coach, surpassing Howard to become Clemson's all-time winningest coach. Swinney accomplished the feat in his 209th career game.

HEAD COACH CONTINUITY

Over the last decade-and-a-half, Clemson became a beacon of stability in the increasingly unstable environment of college football. Clemson Head Coach Dabo Swinney is in his 23rd overall season at Clemson in 2025, including his 17th full season as head coach (and his 18th including an interim stint in 2008).

From the start of Swinney's first season as full-time head coach in 2009 through 2024, there were 498 head coaching tenures in the FBS (excluding those by interims) but only one such tenure at Clemson. Clemson is one of five schools with only one head coach in that span.

Clemson is the only school in the ACC with only one head coach since the start of the 2009 season, and among the 21 schools ever to qualify for the College Football Playoff, only Clemson has had only one head coach since 2009.

SIX "FINAL FOURS" FOR SWINNEY

While the term "Final Four" may still be the linguistic property of college basketball, since the advent of the four-team College Football Playoff in 2014, Head Coach Dabo Swinney had Clemson among the sport's final four teams six times from 2015-20, becoming the first coach to lead a team to six consecutive College Football Playoffs since the format's institution in 2014.

The NCAA men's college basketball tournament dates to 1939. In the history of that tournament, only John Wooden of UCLA (nine from 1967-75) and Mike Krzyzewski of Duke (five from 1988-92) coached teams to at least five consecutive Final Fours. With his sixth "Final Four" appearance in 2020, Swinney joined basketball's Wooden as the only college football or men's basketball coaches to take teams to six consecutive Final Fours in their respective sports.

Swinney is among only nine coaches in football and men's basketball to record six career Final Four berths. He is one of only six with a winning record in Final Four games.

Swinney's ability to place his team among the nation's elite quartet has also been illustrated by the polls. Clemson finished first in the AP Poll in 2016 and 2018, second in 2015 and 2019, third in 2020 and fourth in 2017. Swinney became just the fourth coach to record at least six consecutive top four finishes since the AP Poll began in 1936, an exclusive list that also includes Florida State's Bobby Bowden (13), USC's Pete Carroll (seven) and Oklahoma's Bud Wilkinson (six).

Clemson's streak represented the fifth time a program has had a run of at least six top four finishes in the AP Poll. Miami (Fla.) had a seven-year run from 1986-92 with two different head coaches leading the program.

Dabo Swinney completed his 15th season (and his 14th full season) in 2022 with a 161-39 record. Swinney amassed the second-most wins through a coach's first 15 seasons in FBS history despite not having the benefit of a full season in his first year, as he went 4-3 on an interim basis in his first season in 2008 after taking over for Tommy Bowden in October.

Dabo Swinney earned his 150th career head coaching win in only his 186th career game in the 2021 Cheez-It Bowl. He became the sixth-fastest FBS coach to 150 career wins — two games behind Fielding Yost and Joe Paterno — and the fourth-fastest in the modern era

game 259, though none of those three won more than 43 games in their Clemson tenures.

CHAMPIONSHIP LINEAGE

After being named Clemson's full-time coach in December of 2008, Head Coach Dabo Swinney set about securing his first signing class in 2009.

His first class, which he tabbed the "Dandy Dozen," brought home Clemson's first ACC title since 1991 during their junior campaign in 2011. With exception of Clemson's current freshman class, every Clemson prior signing class under Swinney tallied at least one ACC title to their credit in their tenures at Clemson, and every prior signing class from 2012-24 earned at least one College Football Playoff berth.

- Is 127-3 in its last 130 games when holding teams to fewer than 23 points, a span that dates to the middle of the 2010 season.
- Is 41-15 in one-possession games since the start of the 2011 season, the highest winning percentage in the country in one-score games in that span.

ACC SUCCESS

Clemson has won 83 of its last 97 games vs. ACC opponents, a time frame that includes ACC Championship Game wins against North Carolina (2015 and 2022), Virginia Tech (2016), Miami (2017), Pitt (2018), Virginia (2019), Notre Dame (2020) and SMU (2024).

DEATH VALLEY ROARS

Frank Howard Field at Memorial Stadium garnered its famous nickname in the 1940s when Presbyterian College Head Coach Lonnie McMillian, after many years of bringing his teams in for drubbings, dubbed the venue as "Death Valley."

The name stuck, and its patrons have done their part to make it live up to its name and its reputation. In the first 11 years of the College Football Playoff era from 2014-24, Clemson's home atmosphere helped draw 157 false starts by opponents, the second-most of any home venue in the country and the most by a power conference program.

Klubnik has helped engineer four fourth-quarter comeback wins, including three as a starter:

- vs. Syracuse (2022): Entered in relief of DJ Uiagalelei and became the first backup quarterback to engineer a fourth-quarter comeback win for Clemson since 2018 (Chase Brice vs. Syracuse).
- vs. Kentucky (2023): Went 8-for-8 as he led Clemson on a 12-play, 68-yard game-winning drive in 2:17 of elapsed game time as Clemson earned its largest fourth-quarter comeback win in a bowl game in school history in the 2023 Gator Bowl.
- at Pitt (2024): After Clemson was held to only 27 yards in the first 28 minutes of the second half, Klubnik got the ball with 1.36 remaining and engineered a three-play, 75-yard drive that he finished by rushing for a game-winning 50-yard touchdown with 1.16 remaining.
- at Louisville (2025): Trailing 19-13 after three quarters, Adam Randall's one-yard plunge on fourth-and-goal gave Clemson the lead, and two missed field goals by Louisville gave the Tigers a 20-19 road win against the 19th-ranked Cardinals.
- **Notes:** Klubnik recorded a game-winning drive in the 2024 ACC Championship Game against SMU, but the game was tied at the time and Clemson never trailed in the contest. Klubnik also helped Clemson overcome a 16-point first-half deficit against Troy in 2025, though Clemson's third-quarter surge gave the Tigers the lead prior to the fourth quarter.

With his first rushing touchdown of the 2025 season at Georgia Tech, Klubnik joined Nealon Greene (1994-97), Charlie Whitehurst (2002-05), Tajh Boyd (2010-13) and Kelly Bryant (2015-18) as the only Clemson quarterbacks to rush for a touchdown in four different seasons since Clemson transitioned away from the single wing in 1953.

A year earlier, Klubnik's career-high seven rushing touchdowns included long touchdown runs of 55 yards against NC State, 34 yards against Stanford and a gamewinning 50-yarder at Pitt. Klubnik's 50-yard rushing touchdown at Pitt was Clemson's longest game-winning offensive touchdown inside the final two minutes of a game on record. Klubnik became the first Clemson player to record multiple 50-yard rushing touchdowns in a single season since Travis Etienne in 2019 (two), and he also became the first Clemson quarterback to record multiple 50-yard rushing touchdowns in a career since Woodrow Dantzler (three from 1999-2001).

2024 IN REVIEW

Klubnik took a major leap in his second full season as a starter in 2024. As a junior, he completed 308-of-486 passes for 3,639 yards with 36 passing touchdowns and added career highs with 463 yards and seven touchdowns on 119 rushing attempts.

Klubnik combined for 4,100 yards of total offense and 43 total touchdowns while committing only

seven turnovers. Research by ESPN.com's David Hale illustrated that Klubnik became only the eighth quarterback to reach those thresholds in the College Football Playoff era. The other seven all finished in the Top 4 in Heisman voting, including five Heisman winners.

FROM THE SIDELINE TO THE STAGE

Klubnik's national breakout came in the 2022 ACC Championship Game against North Carolina. He entered the game on Clemson's third possession and completed 20-of-24 passes for 279 yards and a passing touchdown and added seven carries for 30 yards and a rushing touchdown. His 83.3 completion percentage set an ACC Championship Game record and led to his selection as the game's Most Valuable Player in Clemson's 39-10 victory. He became the third freshman (and second true freshman) in the game's history to earn the honor.

NEXT UP AT RUNNING BACK

Clemson entered 2025 with a relative rarity in the Dabo Swinney era: public unknowns at running back.

Under Swinney, the Tigers have enjoyed a run of feature backs that has included C.J. Spiller, Andre Ellington, Wayne Gallman, Travis Etienne, Will Shipley and Phil Mafah among a bevy of other substantial contributors

With both members of the Shipley/Mafah duo from Clemson's 2021 recruiting class having matriculated to the NFL, outside observers were curious to see who would helm Clemson's rushing attack in 2025.

Adam Randall seized the role prior to Week 1 and has been a bright spot and an emerging star for Clemson's offense. Randall is in his first season at running back after spending his first three seasons at Clemson at wide receiver. A 41-yard kickoff return as an emergency contributor in the 2024 ACC Championship Game

against SMU sparked the idea of the position switch, and he contributed at running back in a pinch in the 2024 College Football Playoff and ripped off a 41-yard run at Texas before making the full-time transition in the 2025 offseason.

RANDALL'S HOT START

Before being held out of the end zone in Clemson's seventh game of the season, Randall scored at least one touchdown in each of Clemson's first six games in 2025, becoming the first Clemson player to reach the end zone in each of the first six games of a campaign since Travis Etienne in 2018. Randall, Etienne, C.J. Spiller (2009) and Bill Mathis (1959) are the only Clemson players to accomplish the feat in records back to 1938.

Randall's position coach, C.J. Spiller, holds the Clemson record for the most consecutive games with a touchdown to start a season when he scored in all 14 games of Clemson's 2009 campaign.

Randall recorded two touchdown receptions in his first three seasons at Clemson as a wide receiver from 2022-24. Randall then exceeded that total this season in a two-game span with three combined receiving touchdowns against Syracuse and North Carolina.

Randall is two touchdowns shy of the Clemson single-season record for touchdown receptions by a running back since the Tigers transitioned away from the single wing in 1953.

DYNAMIC DUO

There was no shortage of contributing factors to Clemson's leap in passing efficiency and explosiveness from 2023 and 2024, but notable among them was the arrival of T.J. Moore and Bryant Wesco Jr. in 2024. While Moore's late-season surge was a bit too belated to garner national recognition, Wesco collected Freshman All-America honors from 247Sports, PFF, ESPN, The Athletic and the FWAA.

The duo ranked in the top six nationally in receiving yards by freshmen.

Wesco reached the century mark in two of Clemson's first three games this season. He recorded 118 yards against Troy and 126 yards against Georgia Tech, becoming the first Clemson player with consecutive 100-yard receiving games since Cornell Powell against Notre Dame and Pitt in 2020.

Moore added his first 100-yard effort of the season on Oct. 4 with a five-catch, 108-yard performance highlighted by a 75-yard score on the game's opening play from scrimmage. Wesco added a 106-yard performance at Boston College on Oct. 11, and Moore contributed a 124-yard effort vs. SMU on Oct. 18, giving the duo a 100-yard performance in all three of Clemson's October games.

Wide receiver Antonio Williams added his first 100yard game of the season on Nov. 1 against Duke. His performance gave Clemson a 100-yard receiver in four consecutive games for the first time since 2016 when five players reached the mark over a four-game span

against NC State, Florida State, Syracuse and Pitt.

CV'S STARTING DEBUT

Commonly referred to by his initials "CV," redshirt sophomore quarterback Christopher Vizzina was thrust into his starting debut on Oct. 18 against SMU while Cade Klubnik recovered from an ankle injury.

Vizzina became the 49th different player to start a game at quarterback since Clemson abandoned the single wing in 1953. Despite the performance coming in a defeat, the Alabama native played valiantly in his first career start, completing 29-of-42 passes for 317 yards with three touchdowns and no interceptions for a pass efficiency rating of 156.0.

Clemson is 28-20-1 in starting quarterback debuts since 1953.

Against South Carolina, Jones posted Clemson's first multi-interception game since Andrew Booth Jr.'s two interceptions in the same stadium in a 30-0 win at South Carolina in 2021. OPENING A CAN OF WOODAZ

In each of linebacker Wade Woodaz's first three seasons at Clemson, the Tampa product has watched as one of his linebacker counterparts earned All-America recognition, including honors for Barrett Carter in 2022 and 2024 and for Jeremiah Trotter Jr. in 2022 and 2023. Head Coach Dabo Swinney was quick though to warn observers not to overlook Woodaz.

"He's a baller," Swinney said. "The kid is tough, physical, he can really run. He really understands the game at a high level. He played most of his [prep] career as a quarterback and as a safety, so he has a great understanding of the game. He plays really, really hard; he's a great effort guy, he's a great preparer and he loves it. He's a fun guy to coach and a fun guy to watch play because he plays the way you want everybody to play."

Though Clemson's linebacker corps in 2024 included All-American Barrett Carter and ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year Sammy Brown, it was Woodaz who led the team in tackles, a feat he accomplished despite missing two games with a leg contusion. Coaches credited Woodaz with 89 stops, 10 tackles for loss, 3.0 sacks, six pass breakups, three forced fumbles and an interception.

Woodaz was one of six power conference players to record double-digit tackles for loss, three or more forced fumbles and an interception in 2024 (Texas' Anthony Hill Jr. and Colin Simmons, Indiana's Jailin Walker, UCLA's Kain Medrano and Texas Tech's Jacob Rodriguez). He also became the first Clemson player credited with at least 75 tackles and at least three forced fumbles since Isaiah Simmons in 2018.

-- NO. 47 LB SAMMY BROWN --

SAMMY'S SENSATIONAL START

Linebacker Sammy Brown arrived at Clemson in January 2024 as a consensus Top 30 player in his recruiting class and as the nation's reigning High School Butkus Award winner.

Head Coach Dabo Swinney praised Brown as an "alpha," but spoke frequently about Brown's learning curve at the linebacker position after playing both running back and linebacker at Jefferson High School in Commerce, Ga. The linebacker tabbed as 247Sports' No. 1 "freak athlete" in the 2024 recruiting class proved to be a quick study, appearing in all 14 games for Clemson with six starts.

After Clemson opened its first eight games of 2024 in two-linebacker sets, Brown earned his first start at Virginia Tech in November that year as Clemson opened the game with three linebackers. The former five-star prospect delivered, recording a team-high eight tackles (per the gameday stat crew) with 2.5 tackles for loss and a sack.

"Sammy's been getting better and better and better and it was awesome to see him have that type of game," Swinney said after Brown's performance at Virginia Tech. "He's just a confident young man, and, boy, he's got a bright future ahead of him. He's going to be a great one."

Despite playing only 444 defensive snaps over 14 games in 2024, Brown ranked second in the nation in tackles for loss among freshmen.

MEET THE NEW GUYS

- WR Tristan Smith (signed Dec. 18): Smith joined Clemson after playing the 2024 season at Southeast Missouri State, helping the Redhawks to a first-place finish in the Big South-OVC Football Association and a berth in the Football Championship Subdivision playoffs. The 2024 all-conference honoree played in SEMO's final 11 games of the season, catching 76 passes for 934 yards and six touchdown receptions in addition to rushing for one touchdown.
- **DE Will Heldt (signed Dec. 19):** Heldt signed with Clemson after playing his first two collegiate seasons at Purdue, appearing in all 24 games for the Boilermakers from 2023-24. As a sophomore in 2024, gameday stat crews credited Heldt with 56 tackles (10.0 for loss), 5.0 sacks and a fumble recovery he returned 16 yards for a touchdown. He recorded 2.5 sacks and the 16-yard scoop-and-score in back-to-back games against ranked opponents Illinois and Oregon in October.
- LB Jeremiah Alexander (signed Jan. 8): Alexander played his first three collegiate seasons at Alabama from 2022-24. Following a redshirt year in 2022 in which he appeared in three games, Alexander played in 24 of the Crimson Tide's 27 games across the 2023-24 seasons and was credited with eight tackles in those contests. In high school, he led Alabama's Thompson High School to the 2021 state championship (alongside current Clemson defensive lineman Peter Woods) as a consensus five-star recruit across most major outlets and ranked among the nation's top 50 players in his class

Head Coach Dabo Swinney expounded on Clemson's strategy for the three winter transfer additions:

"As I've always said, we do what's best for Clemson. We'll use the portal whenever we need it and we'll be strategic with it. We needed it four years ago; we needed a backup quarterback and we got one. The next year, we needed a backup quarterback and we got one and he was here for two years.

"This year, we didn't anticipate signing a defensive line portal guy. We had two great ones committed and we were taking two. But as y'all know, things can change in recruiting. We had a young man back out and decide to go somewhere else, so there wasn't anybody left to recruit that could fill the need. Now we [had] a gap so we had to go use the portal and we needed a high-level guy and we got the guy I wanted to hit [Heldt].

"From a receiver standpoint, we had two guys go in the portal, and so we had a gap. We needed to go get a guy, and we needed somebody that could come in and help us with our depth and come in and compete and we found a great kid in Tristan out in Southeast Missouri. We were looking for a little length, and high school recruiting was over; there was nobody to get. We needed to go get a guy.

"And then the linebacker situation, honestly, we weren't really going to take a 'backer. We knew we needed another guy. Logan Anderson, our signee, tore his ACL. Kobe [McCloud], his situation [rehabbing from a knee injury]. We knew we probably needed another guy, but we were going to wait until May. And then Jeremiah popped up. We knew all about him, obviously recruited him hard, knew his family. That was a really good situation that worked out for us.

"That's really it. Nothing different. I know everybody likes to write about it, but our process is still the same. We're going to recruit high school kids as long as we can get the best of the best. As long as we can get the Gideon Davidsons of the world and the Sammy Browns of the world and the T.J. Parkers and Peter Woods and Cade Klubniks, that's what we're going to do, and we're going to develop... And then we have to respond if we have a situation and we have a gap in our roster or we have kids that leave. For us, that's how we use the portal, but the process isn't any different. They've still got to be the right fit, they've got to check all the boxes, they can't *just* be a good player. No different than our high school recruiting."

-- DEFENSE --

CFP-ERA DEFENSIVE TRACK RECORD

Clemson has a track record of producing one of the nation's top defenses in most seasons since the advent of the College Football Playoff in 2014.

Clemson ranked in the Top 30 in the country in total defense in each of the first 10 seasons of the CFP era and also ranked among the Top 30 in scoring defense in those 10 campaigns (including five Top 5 finishes in the category).

Clemson's defensive anomaly in 2024 led to a change in leadership, as the Tigers plucked Penn State Defensive Coordinator Tom Allen for Clemson's defensive coordinator position immediately following the Nittany Lions' exit from the College Football Playoff. Allen now leads a Clemson defense that tied for the national lead in Top 10 finishes in average yards allowed per game in the College Football Playoff era.

ALLEN IS ALL IN

Clemson officially announced Tom Allen as its new defensive coordinator on Jan. 14.

"Tom checked every box that I was looking for," Head Coach Dabo Swinney said. "We've got a great football coach — and a great leader of men — coming to Clemson... He brings a ton of experience and was highly recommended by some of the best people in this business. He is obviously coming off of a great year as the defensive coordinator at Penn State, and we're excited to welcome him as our defensive coordinator here at Clemson."

Allen joined the Tigers with more than three decades of coaching experience. In 2024, he helped Penn State to a school-record 13 wins and a College Football Playoff berth. His defense recorded two pick-sixes in Penn State's 38-10 win against SMU in the College Football Playoff First Round, and in the following game, his unit bottled up Heisman runner-up Ashton Jeanty, holding the star running back to a season-low 3.47 yards per carry and no touchdowns in a 31-14 Penn State victory in the CFP Quarterfinal at Fiesta Bowl.

Penn State finished seventh in the nation in total defense (294.8 yards per game) and eighth in the nation in scoring defense (16.5 points per game) under Allen's guidance in 2024.

RESPONDING DOWN THE STRETCH

Prior to Clemson's four-game winning streak to close the regular season, Clemson's defense was maligned after it surrendered 39 of the 46 points scored by eventual ACC champion Duke on Nov. 1. The unit responded by holding four straight opponents below 20 points and ranking 11th in the nation in scoring defense (13.25 points per game) across the final four games of the regular season. Five of the 10 schools ranked ahead of Clemson qualified for the College Football Playoff.

WHO'S YOUR HAUSER?

Placekicker Nolan Hauser arrived at Clemson in January 2024 as the national high school record-holder for career field goals made (66) during his career at Hough High School in Cornelius, N.C.

Hauser (pronounced HOO-zer, not HOW-zer) opened his career with a streak of 25 consecutive made kicks (five field goals & 20 PATs) in 2024 before a blocked PAT against Stanford accounted for his first miss.

A week later at Florida State, Hauser made five field goals and accounted for 17 total points in Clemson's 16-point road win. The five-field-goal performance by Hauser was Clemson's first since Chandler Catanzaro went 5-for-5 on field goal attempts against Boston College in 2011.

Hauser's six points against Virginia Tech in November 2024 gave him the school record for points in a true freshman season, breaking the previous mark of 78 set by Sammy Watkins in 2011. In the ACC Championship Game, he reached the century mark to post the first 100-point season by a true freshman in Clemson history.

Hauser's 113-point 2024 season ranked tied for sixth in Clemson history in kicking points scored in a single season and tied for ninth in school history in points scored by any means in a single season.

Hauser is a second-generation Clemson student-athlete. His mother, Sheri Hauser (née Bueter), was an All-American soccer player at Clemson from 1994-97, and his father, Scott, played baseball at Clemson in from 1995-97 and was 6-2 as a pitcher on Clemson's College World Series team of 1996. His sister, Ella, was also a member of Clemson's women's soccer team from 2021-24

HAUSER'S HIGHLIGHT IN 2024

Though the pronunciation of his last name often trips up observers, Hauser made his name much more nationally recognizable with the seminal highlight of the 2024 ACC Championship Game.

In what Clemson Head Coach Dabo Swinney called "the biggest kick in Clemson history," the true freshman booted a 56-yard game winning field goal as time expired to give Clemson its 22nd ACC title, its 10th win of the season and its seventh College Football Playoff berth. Of note:

- Hauser's field goal gave Clemson the first walk-off win in ACC Championship Game history.
- Hauser became the first Clemson player to kick a game-winning walk-off field goal since Chandler Catanzaro hit a 37-yard field goal to beat LSU to end the 2012 Chick-Fil-A Bowl.
- Hauser's 56-yard field goal was the longest gamewinning field goal as time expired in Clemson history.
- Hauser's career-long 56-yard field goal was the fourth-longest field goal in Clemson history but its longest away from Death Valley. It was also the longest field goal in postseason play in Clemson history.
- Hauser became the first FBS player ever to win a conference championship game by kicking a field goal of 50 or more yards as time expired.
- The game-winning field goal came in Hauser's home metro area, as his hometown of Cornelius, N.C. is roughly 20 miles north of Bank of America Stadium in Charlotte.

HAUSER IN 2025

After a shaky start to his sophomore season that included a miss in two of Clemson's first three games (and an additional miss wiped out by a pre-snap timeout), Hauser responded by hitting 11 consecutive field goal attempts from the start of October until his next miss on Nov. 22.

THE OTHER SWINNEY DYNASTY

Like the Colquitt family punting at Tennessee, the Swinney family holding for placekicks at Clemson has become a dynasty of its own.

Head Coach Dabo Swinney's oldest son, Will, arrived at Clemson in 2017 and immediately earned Clemson's starting holder position on placekicks. He played five seasons and a record-tying 69 games at Clemson through 2021. In those five seasons, Clemson scored 565 points on placekicks, including field goals and PATs, and he held for 555 of those 565 points. The only 10 Clemson kicking points not held by Will in his career were instead held by his brother, Drew, who was Clemson's starter at the position in 2022.

Will and Drew were succeeded by the youngest of the three Swinney boys, Clay, a redshirt junior in his third season as Clemson's starting holder in 2025. Clay's presence creates a plausible scenario in which every Clemson placekick in a full 10-year span from 2017-26 could be held by a Swinney.

Clemson's last hold by any player outside the Swinney family was on the final point of Clemson's 2016 national championship, as Seth Ryan, coincidentally also the son of a famous long-time coach (Rex Ryan), held the PAT following Hunter Renfrow's game-winning touchdown with one second remaining.

Clemson's 2024 win against Stanford marked Clemson's 100th consecutive game with a Swinney as holder, a game that ironically resulted in Dabo Swinney's 100th career home win at Memorial Stadium. The family crossed 800 kicking points held for in the contest as well.

Against Furman in November 2025, the Swinney family held its 200th consecutive field goal attempt.

DEFEATS IN REVIEW

Clemson has lost 26 games since 2015, the fourth-fewest in the nation in that span. Eleven of Clemson's 26 losses since 2015-42.3 percent — have come against AP Top 10 teams.

The opponents to whom Clemson has lost since 2015 have a combined final record of 246-92, a winning percentage of .728.

Clemson has not lost to a team with a losing record at the time of the game since losing to 2-5 Boston College in 2010, Dabo Swinney's second full season as head coach.

"We're fully committed to playing guys who deserve to play," Swinney said. "You commit to a guy early in the season, and even if a guy has only played 10 percent of the snaps, when you get to game eight or nine, they've got some good experience."

Clemson has played 100+ players in a game seven times under Dabo Swinney, including playing 105 against Furman in 2025.

FINISH

In 2018, Clemson debuted a new version of its "This is Why We Work" fourth quarter video at Death Valley, a hype video imploring the team to finish and featuring Director of Strength and Conditioning Joey Batson bellowing:

"Let me tell you something right now: they don't put championship rings on smooth hands! You gotta go earn it! You gotta go earn it six seconds at a time! You win championships when the stadium is empty, when the band ain't playing, when the cheerleader, when it's just you and your brothers right beside you. That's when you win championships! In the fourth quarter, that is when we shine!"

The video and the speech became a part of Clemson lore, buoyed by its playing during Clemson's comeback win against Syracuse that year en route to a 15-0 national championship season. Over the years, the video has changed but the speech remains the same, with many Clemson fans yelling it in unison as it plays.

Clemson holds a 167-10 record under Dabo Swinney when leading after three quarters, including a 151-7 mark since 2011.

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

- Through the 2025 fall semester, of the 430 eligible players who completed their athletic eligibility at Clemson and/or graduated early in Dabo Swinney's 17+ full years as head coach, 424 (98.6 percent) have

earned a degree during their time at Clemson.

- Clemson earned the AFCA Academic Achievement Award for 2024. The award was Clemson's fourth in the last seven years, but it was Clemson's fourth in the last five years that the honor was actually awarded, as the organization did not name recipients during a two-year period amid the COVID-19 pandemic.
- Clemson broke program multi-year NCAA Academic Progress Rate (APR) records in three straight years from 2017-19 (987 in 2016-17, 992 in 2017-18 and 993 in 2018-19) before the NCAA suspended APR reporting during the COVID-19 pandemic. Upon reinstatement of APR reporting in June 2022, Clemson shattered its multi-year APR record with a 999 covering the 2017-18 through 2020-21 academic years. Clemson has posted a 995 multi-year APR in each of the last three cycles.
- Most recently, Clemson posted a 995 multi-year APR covering 2020-21 through 2023-24, tied for fifth-best in the FBS. Clemson's lofty academic success in that period coincided with 40 wins in a four-year span and two ACC titles.

- Prior to the suspension of APR Public Recognition Awards following the COVID-19 pandemic, the NCAA recognized Clemson with its annual honor, which is bestowed upon programs ranking in the Top 10 percent of their respective sports, for nine of the award's last 10 reported academic cycles. Only 37 FBS programs

earned at least one APR recognition across the 2009-10 through 2018-19 academic years. Only 30 programs earned it multiple times. Clemson, Duke and Northwestern were the only ones to earn the award 9+ times in that 10-year span.

- With its award for the 2018-19 academic year, Clemson became the only FBS program since the NCAA created the APR metric in 2003 to win a national championship and an APR Public Recognition Award in the same year multiple times. Alabama is the only other school to accomplish the title/APR double in a single year once (2011-12 academic year).
- A program-record 98 individuals earned a 3.0 GPA or better in Fall 2024. That included program-record 20 perfect 4.0s.
- Clemson set a record in Fall 2024 with the highest single-semester GPA in program history with a 3.19 team GPA. Clemson followed that up with a 3.18 spring semester.
- Entering the 2025 fall semester, Clemson has had 75+ individuals earn a 3.0 or better GPA in eight consecutive semesters.

Aided in part by another elite academic performance by Clemson Football, Clemson Athletics tied for second among institutions in Graduation Success Rate (GSR) with a 96 percent mark for the 2015-18 cohort in data released by the NCAA in November 2025.

After posting a 99 percent mark for each of the previous two cohorts, Clemson Football recorded a 98, tied for fifth in Division I and tied for third in the FBS. Clemson and Harvard represent the only two Division I programs to post a 98 percent or better over each of the last three cohorts, and Clemson is the only program in the FBS to accomplish the feat.

- Vic Burley, DT: Cousin of Assistant Head Coach/ Defensive Tackles Coach (and 10-year NFL veteran) Nick Eason.

Additional nuggets on Clemson's recent success in the NEL Draft are included below-

- Clemson has had at least one player selected in 23 consecutive drafts since 2003, representing the second-longest streak in school history behind a 24year streak across the 1951-74 NFL Drafts.
- Clemson is one of only six schools to have produced multiple draft picks in each of the last 23 NFL Drafts (LSU, Michigan, Oklahoma, Ohio State and USC).
- Clemson has had at least three selections in 16 of its 17 drafts since Dabo Swinney was elevated to head coach. Clemson is one of six schools to have produced three or more picks at least 16 times in that span alongside Alabama, LSU, Ohio State, Oklahoma
- Including two defensive picks in the 2025 NFL Draft, Clemson has produced multiple defensive draft

picks in 14 of the 17 drafts of the Dabo Swinney era. Clemson, LSU, Alabama, Ohio State and Georgia are the only programs to produce multiple draft picks from their defenses in at least 14 drafts in that span.

- Clemson has had at least one player chosen by 30 of the 32 NFL franchises since 2003. The lone exceptions in that time frame are the Patriots, who last selected a Tiger in 1991, and the Panthers, who have never selected a Clemson player despite playing their first season in franchise history in Death Valley.
- Head Coach Dabo Swinney has produced a draft pick for 28 of the 32 NFL teams in his head coaching tenure; the only NFL teams not to select a Clemson player in Swinney's head coaching tenure are the Chicago Bears, Denver Broncos, New England Patriots and Carolina Panthers.
- Though Clemson did not have a player selected in the first round of the 2025 NFL Draft, Clemson has had at least one first-round draft choice in 10 of the last 13 years, standing alongside Alabama, Florida, Georgia and Ohio State as the only programs to produce a firstround pick in at least 10 of the last 13 years.
- Since 2013. Clemson has produced first-round picks from the QB, RB, WR, DE, DT, LB and DB position groups. The only other school with at least one firstrounder at all those positions in that span is Alabama.
- Linebacker Barrett Carter's selection in the 2025 NFL Draft represented the fourth consecutive draft in which Clemson had a linebacker selected. Clemson and Alabama are the only programs in the nation to produce at least one linebacker in each of the last four NFL
- Safety R.J. Mickens' selection in the 2025 NFL Draft gave Clemson at least one drafted defensive back in 13 of Clemson's 17 drafts in the Dabo Swinney era.

GEORGE BENNETT PASSES AWAY

The Pinstripe Bowl will be the first game played by Clemson since the passing of former Executive Director of IPTAY George Bennett, who passed away on Saturday. Dec. 13 at the age of 92. He served the school in various capacities from the time he was a freshman in 1951 until his passing.

He was freshman class president in 1951 and held other class offices as a student. He was also a varsity cheerleader for three years, including 1953-54 when Clemson joined the ACC.

As a student, he persuaded his father to buy a small cannon that would be fired after the Tigers scored a touchdown. That tradition celebrated its 70th anniversary this past season, and Bennett was on the field when the cannon was fired as the team ran down the Hill.

After graduating in 1955, Bennett served two years in the U.S. Army at Fort Knox, Ky. In 1957, he started a nine-year career with the ESSO corporation. He returned to Clemson in 1967 as the first alumni field representative in the history of the Clemson Alumni Association.

Four years later, Bennett moved to the athletic department as an assistant athletic director. In that capacity, he became involved in fund-raising. In 1977. he became executive director of IPTAY. Over the next two years, IPTAY exceeded the \$2.3 million mark in fundraising for student-athlete scholarships for the first time, and IPTAY members grew from 9,800 to over 15.000.

Though Yankee Stadium is a cashless venue, don't be surprised to see Bennett's legacy floating around New York City in the form of Clemson's famous \$2

bills. During his first year as executive secretary of IPTAY, he developed the idea to have Clemson fans use \$2 bills when they traveled to the 1977 Georgia Tech game in Atlanta. Georgia Tech wanted to end the series with Clemson to play a lesser opponent, and the use of \$2 bills tangibly demonstrated the economic impact Atlanta would miss if Georgia Tech did not play Clemson.

Bennett was inducted into the Clemson Athletic Hall of Fame in 1986 and received the Clemson Alumni Association Distinguished Service Award in 1999. In 2001, Bennett received the Order of the Palmetto, South Carolina's highest civilian honor. In 2024, he was recognized with the prestigious Bobby Richardson Sportsmanship Award by the South Carolina Athletic Hall of Fame.

"No one epitomized 'A Clemson Man' more than George Bennett," Director of Athletics Graham Neff said. "His fingerprints have been all over Clemson and Clemson Athletics for decades and he will be forever remembered."

LSU 17 GAME **CLEMSON** 10 AUG. 30, 2025 MEMORIAL STADIUM • CLEMSON, S.C.

CLEMSON, S.C. - Trailing by seven late in the game, Clemson drove to the LSU 15-yard line but was stopped on downs as No. 9 LSU defeated No. 4 Clemson, 17-10.

Quarterback Cade Klubnik finished 19-of-38 for 230 passing yards. Defensively, Clemson had eight tackles for loss, forced two takeaways and held LSU to 354 yards of total offense. In his first career start, safety Ronan Hanafin led Clemson with 12 tackles, followed by linebacker Sammy Brown with 11 tackles.

Ricardo Jones returned a fumble forced by Avieon Terrell 24 yards to the LSU 24 to set up Clemson's first score, a Nolan Hauser 42-yard field goal with 8:57 to play in the first quarter. LSU later knotted the score at 3-3 on a 52-yard field goal by Damian Ramos 4:07 into the second quarter.

Klubnik then led Clemson on a 13-play, 75-yard drive capped by one-yard touchdown by Adam Randall, giving Clemson a 10-3 lead with 4:36 to play in the half.

After Clemson missed a 48-yard field goal early in the third quarter, LSU evened the score at 10-10 on a two-yard touchdown run by Caden Dunham. LSU took its first lead of the game with 12:18 remaining in the fourth quarter when LSU quarterback Garrett Nussmeier completed an 11-play, 73-yard drive with an eightyard touchdown pass to Trey'Dez Green to give LSU a 17-10 lead

After trading several scoreless fourth-quarter possessions. Clemson forced an LSU punt after the two-minute timeout to give Clemson one final drive. After a 16yard punt return by Bryant Wesco Jr. set up Clemson at its own 43, Clemson drove 42 yards but was ultimately stopped in the LSU red zone with 59 seconds to play.

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. - Clemson scored a touchdown on its first offensive play and on each of its first four possessions as the Tigers rode a 28-3 first-quarter lead to a 38-10 victory at Kenan Stadium.

The contest was the 300th overall game for Dabo Swinney at Clemson, including 68 games as an assistant coach and 232 as head coach. His matchup with Bill Belichick was the second time in college football history a coach with multiple FBS national championships as a head coach faced one with multiple Super Bowl titles as a head coach.

Quarterback Cade Klubnik finished 22-of-24 for 254 passing yards and four touchdowns through the air. Wide receiver T.J. Moore hauled in five passes for 108 yards and a touchdown, and running back Adam Randall and tight end Christian Bentancur each added two receiving touchdowns.

Moore scored on the game's first play from scrimmage, converting a double pass from Antonio Williams for a 75-yard touchdown. North Carolina cut the lead to 7-3 on its opening possession, but Clemson added touchdowns on its next three possessions — a 35-yard pass to Randall, a 45-yard pass to Bentancur and another 23-yard pass to Randall — for a 28-3 edge.

Clemson pushed its halftime advantage to 35-3 in front of an emptying crowd with an eight-yard pass to Bentancur with 2:02 to play in the half.

Clemson's reserves pushed the score to 38-3 early in the fourth quarter. North Carolina found the end zone for the first time on an 11-yard touchdown run by Benjamin Hall with 10:25 to play, but Clemson ultimately earned its seventh straight win against the Tar Heels.

CHESTNUT HILL, Mass. - Clemson scored on all six of its first-half drives to earn a 41-10 win over Boston College at Alumni Stadium. The win pushed the Tigers' winning streak against Boston College to 13 games.

The Boston College Gridiron Club presented the Leather Helmet Award to quarterback Cade Klubnik as the game's MVP. Klubnik finished 22-for-30 for 280 yards passing and a 38-yard touchdown pass to Bryant Wesco Jr. and also ran for 48 yards and a touchdown on nine carries. Klubnik scampered for a six-yard touchdown on Clemson's next possession, and the Tigers tacked on 10 more points before halftime on Klubnik's shot to Wesco and an end-of-half 50-yard field goal by Hauser to give the Tigers a 34-10 halftime advantage.

Clemson pushed the final score to 41-10 on a 10-play, 60-yard drive that resulted in a one-yard touch-down run by Keith Adams Jr. in the final minute.

CLEMSON, S.C. — Clemson stormed back from a 21-7 first-quarter deficit to take a lead into the fourth quarter, but a touchdown and two-point conversion in the final minute gave Duke a 46-45 win, its first victory at Death Valley since 1980.

Clemson recorded season highs to date with 45 points and 560 yards. The Tigers dropped to 134-1 all-time when scoring 45 points in a game and 61-3 all-time when recording 550 or more yards in a game.

Quarterback Cade Klubnik went 27-for-36 passing for a career-high 385 yards and two touchdown passes. Antonio Williams led Clemson with 142 receiving yards on 10 catches and scored two touchdowns - one receiving and one rushing.

Interrupted only by Williams' second career rushing touchdown, Duke scored touchdowns on each of its first three possessions for a 21-7 edge after one quarter. Clemson surged in the second quarter, scoring 21 consecutive points on a touchdown reception by Williams and two Adam Randall touchdown runs. But Duke tied the game at halftime with a 43-yard pass with 11 seconds remaining in the second quarter.

The teams traded scores in the third, as a Peter Woods touchdown run was immediately answered by a 100-vard kickoff return (102 unofficially) by Duke's

CLEMSON, S.C. — Clemson opened up an 18-0 first-half lead and held the nation's No. 1 offense at bay to earn a 24-10 victory over Florida State in Memo-

Clemson held Florida State to a season-low 360 yards of offense, 150 yards below the Seminoles' 510yard average entering the game. The Tigers also held the Seminoles 30 points below their season average of 40.0 points per game entering the contest.

Quarterback Cade Klubnik went 20-for-27 for 221 passing yards with a passing touchdown and a rushing touchdown. Clemson sacked Florida State six times, led by cornerback Avieon Terrell, who recorded 2.0. Right tackle Blake Miller earned his 50th consecutive start, breaking Dalton Freeman's school record for consecutive starts by a non-specialist.

Clemson drove 75 yards in 13 plays on the game's opening possession, punctuated by a four-yard Klubnik touchdown run and a two-point conversion on a fake PAT by Clay Swinney for an 8-0 lead. Clemson added to its lead in the second quarter, as two plays after Florida State dropped a potential fourth-down conversion, Klubnik hit Antonio Williams on a flea flicker for a 34-vard touchdown.

Clemson tacked on a Nolan Hauser field goal late in the second quarter, and Florida State scored its only touchdown of the game on a seven-yard pass with 33 seconds remaining in the half, bringing the halftime score to 18-7.

Two Hauser field goals pushed Clemson's lead to 24-7 early in the fourth quarter. Florida State added a fourth-quarter field goal but wouldn't score again, as Clemson produced all six of its sacks in the second half to help stifle the Seminole offense.

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — After running back Adam Randall scored his second touchdown of the game on fourth-and-goal with 7:16 to play, Clemson held Louisville to two missed field goals and a turnover on downs to earn a 20-19 road win at No. 19/21 Louisville.

Randall rushed for 105 yards and two touchdowns on 15 carries. Linebacker Sammy Brown led Clemson with 11 tackles (2.0 for loss) and a sack, and cornerback Avieon Terrell forced and recovered a fumble. which gave him sole possession of the Clemson record for career forced fumbles by a defensive back (seven).

Clemson struck first, finishing a 12-play, 65-yard opening drive with a 27-yard Nolan Hauser field goal. Louisville leveled the score at 3-3 late in the first quarter with a 51-yard field goal by Cooper Ranvier.

Louisville quarterback Miller Moss scored a one-yard rushing touchdown to give Louisville its first lead of the game. The Cardinals held a 9-3 lead following a missed extra point by Ranvier. After a Clemson punt, Terrell's strip gave Clemson the ball in Louisville territory at the 25-yard line. On the next play, Randall rushed for a 25vard touchdown to give Clemson a 10-9 halftime lead.

Louisville received the ball to start the second half and capped a seven-play, 75-yard drive with a two-yard touchdown pass from wide receiver Caullin Lacy to Nate Kurisky. Clemson cut the deficit to 16-13 on the ensuing possession on a 48-yard Hauser field goal and Louisville responded with a 39-yard field goal.

A wild fourth quarter included Louisville stopping Clemson on fourth-and-goal at the Louisville 1, but the Tigers got the ball back and took the lead on Randall's one-yard touchdown. Louisville had opportunities for go-ahead field goals from 50 and 46 yards in the final 4:06 but converted neither before Clemson forced a final turnover on downs to earn the Friday night win.

CLEMSON, S.C. —Clemson raced out to a 31-0 second-quarter lead and honored its seniors in style with a 45-10 win over Furman. With the victory, Clemson earned bowl eligibility for a 27th consecutive season, including the 2004 season in which Clemson opted against postseason participation.

Clemson used a balanced offensive attack to tally 456 total yards. Nine players recorded a carry for 219 rushing yards, while 17 Tigers caught a pass for 237 receiving yards. Antonio Williams scored two touchdowns including one on his 200th career reception, and quarterback Chris Denson ran for a team-high 106 yards on six carries in leading two late touchdown drives.

Clemson scored on each of its first three possessions. After Nolan Hauser's 45-yard field goal on the game's opening drive, Williams scored his 20th career touchdown reception on his 200th career catch on a pass from Cade Klubnik. Wide receiver Tyler Brown made it 17-0 on a 21-yard reverse.

Clemson increased the lead to 24-0 in the second quarter on Williams' second touchdown of the contest. A teary-eyed Klubnik would receive a curtain call in his final game in Death Valley on Clemson's next drive.

A Christian Bentancur touchdown from Christopher Vizzina and an Ian Williams field goal for Furman made the halftime score 31-3.

Furman cut the lead to 31-10 in the third quarter before Denson's dazzling two fourth-quarter drives began. A 50-yard Denson run helped set up his first career touchdown pass to Logan Brooking, and Denson added the first touchdown run of his career on a 10-yard score to push him over the century mark on the evening.

A Jack Smith punt pinned South Carolina at its own five-vard line with 3:29 to play and the Gamecocks trailing 20-14. But Clemson ended any comeback attempt on the drive's first play when Ashton Hampton deflected a Sellers pass that Jones intercepted and returned 12 yards for a touchdown. An ensuing two-point conversion from Klubnik to Randall pushed the final score to 28-14.
