CLEMSON AWAITS TOP-FIVE TEST SATURDAY VS. NO. 4 MIAMI (FLA.)

Clemson will seek to earn a home victory against an AP Top 5 opponent for the fifth time in Death Valley's illustrious history on Saturday, Oct. 3, when the Tigers welcome the No. 4 Miami (Fla.) Hurricanes in prime time. Kickoff at Memorial Stadium in Clemson, S.C. is set for 7:30 p.m. ET on ABC.

The game will be a matchup of the ACC's only two 2-0 teams in conference play. Eleven of the conference's 17 teams have already drawn a conference loss this year, and of the league's six teams that are undefeated in ACC play, only the Tigers and Hurricanes have played multiple conference games.

Clemson's defense is still rebounding statistically from a tough season-opening performance at LSU. Clemson surrendered 51 points and 644 yards in its opener but allowed an average of 12.3 points (and only 10.0 points when excluding a scoop-and-score by Cal's defense) and 282.0 yards per game in the three games that followed.

Clemson's defensive surge has been powered in part by its revamped secondary, which includes junior Thorpe Award candidate Ashton Hampton and three impact transfers in cornerback Elliot Washington II and safeties Corey Myrick and Jerome Carter III.

Last week, the unit held Cal's then-13th-ranked pass offense to 145 passing yards, including a career-low 119 yards for quarterback Jaron-Keawe Sagapolutele. Hampton is the only player in the country to record multiple games with three or more passes defended this season, and Washington has three interceptions over his last two games, including game-clinchers in

Clemson Head Coach Dabo Swinney is one of two active coaches with double-digit career wins against AP Top 5 opponents. Swinney has been at the helm for 10 of Clemson's 13 all-time wins against AP Top 5 teams.

WHAT TO WATCH FOR THIS WEEK

- Clemson trying to earn its first win against a ranked opponent this season. Clemson entered 2026 having earned at least one win against opponents ranked in the Top 25 of at least one major poll in every full season of Dabo Swinney's head coaching tenure (since 2009).
- Clemson attempting to improve to 40-36-1 all-time in home games against AP Top 25 opponents since Death Valley opened in 1942. A win would also move Clemson to 17-8 at home against AP-ranked opponents under Dabo Swinney.
- Clemson attempting to improve to 13-3 against ranked opponents in Death Valley since 2015.
- Clemson attempting to improve to 42-30 against AP Top 25 teams under Dabo Swinney, which would include a 33-14 mark since 2015 with a victory on Saturday.
- Clemson attempting to defeat an AP Top 10 opponent at Death Valley while unranked for the first time since defeating No. 3 Florida State, 26-10, in 2003.
- Clemson attempting to defeat No. 4 Miami to tie for the ninth-highest-ranked win according to the AP Poll in school history, matching Clemson wins against No. 4 Georgia and No. 4 Nebraska in 1981 and one against No. 4 Oklahoma in 2015. Above that trio of wins, Clemson has eight combined wins all-time against teams in the AP Top 3.
- Clemson attempting to earn its fifth home victory against an AP Top 5 team all-time, joining wins at Death Valley against No. 4 Georgia in 1981, No. 3 Florida State in 2003, No. 5 Georgia in 2013 and No. 3 Louisville in 2016.
- Clemson attempting to break a 7-7 deadlock in its all-time series with Miami and take an 8-7 advantage.
- Clemson attempting to improve to 3-2 all-time against Miami in games played at Memorial Stadium.
- Clemson entering the game with a 198-58 aggregate score in five meetings between the Tigers and Hurricanes in the College Football Playoff era. Clemson is 4-1 in those games with an average margin of 28.0 points in those contests.
- Clemson entering the game having not lost consecutive games to Miami since a three-game Hurricane winning streak in the series from 1951-56.
- Clemson attempting to earn its first victory against a team that was in the previous year's national championship game since the 2018 season when Clemson defeated Alabama, 44-16, after the Crimson Tide had won the 2017 national title. It would be Clemson's first regular season victory against a team coming off a title-game appearance since 2011, when Clemson ended Auburn's 17-game winning streak that had included the BCS National Championship Game for the 2010 season.
- Clemson attempting to improve to 51-14 against former members of the Big East Conference since each program joined the ACC (Miami (Fla.), Boston College, Virginia Tech, Syracuse, Pitt and Louisville).
- Clemson attempting to improve to 76-9 at Death Valley in the College Football Playoff era. Clemson's current 75-9 home record is the fourth-best in the country in that span.
- Clemson attempting to extend its home winning streak to five games.
- Clemson playing a fourth night game in the first five games of a season for the first time since 1951.
- Clemson attempting to improve to 38-11 in night games since the start of the 2018 season and 59-14 in night games since 2015.
- Clemson attempting to improve to 28-5 in home night games under Dabo Swinney. Clemson would improve to 24-2 in prime-time games at Death Valley in the College Football Playoff era.

- Clemson attempting to improve to 86-14 against ACC opponents since the start of the 2015 season.
- Clemson attempting to extend its winning streak against conference opponents to five games, dating to last season.
- Clemson attempting to improve to 114-21 in regular season play since the start of the 2015 season.
- Clemson attempting to improve to 44-23-2 in games prior to regular season open dates since joining the ACC in 1953. Clemson would improve to 17-4 in those games since 2012.
- Head Coach Dabo Swinney (190-54) attempting to tie Nick Saban (191) and Bob Stoops (191) for the second-most wins through the first 20 seasons of a head coaching career in FBS history behind Tom Osborne (195). Swinney would accomplish the feat in his 19th season (and only his 18th full season). Note: Stoops is not credited on the NCAA's official list of most wins through 20 seasons since he did not coach 20 years.
- Swinney (116) attempting to tie Bobby Bowden's conference record for career head coaching wins in ACC regular season play (117). Swinney already holds the conference record for overall wins as an ACC head coach.
- Swinney attempting to improve to 20-15 against AP Top 10 teams all-time. He would join Kirby Smart (25) as the only active coaches with 20 or more career wins against AP Top 10 foes.
- Swinney attempting to improve to 6-3 against AP Top 10 teams at home, including wins against Georgia (2013), Notre Dame (2015), Louisville (2016), Miami (2020) and NC State (2022).
- Swinney attempting to improve to 6-2 against Miami as a head coach.
- Swinney attempting to improve to 4-0 against Miami squads ranked in the AP Top 10. Swinney's previous Top 10 wins against Miami came at No. 8 Miami in 2009, against No. 7 Miami in the 2017 ACC Championship Game and against No. 7 Miami at Death Valley in 2020.
- Clemson attempting to hold back-to-back opponents without an offensive touchdown for the first time since the first three games of the 2021 season.
- Clemson attempting to score in a 312th consecutive game to pass the 1998-2022 Oklahoma Sooners for sole possession of the 10th-longest streak in FBS history without being shut out.
- Clemson attempting to rush for 250 yards in back-to-back games for the first time since 2024 against Appalachian State and NC State.
- Clemson attempting to reach 200 rushing yards in consecutive games for the first time since 2024 against Florida State and Wake Forest.
- Clemson attempting to rush for 150 yards in four consecutive games for the first time since an eight-game streak in 2024.
- Clemson attempting to hold three consecutive opponents to fewer than 150 passing yards for the first time since 2023 against NC State, Notre Dame and Georgia Tech.
- Clemson attempting to snap a five-game streak without winning the turnover margin, dating to last season. In that span, Clemson has finished even in the turnover margin four times and lost the turnover margin once. The Tigers most recently finished with a positive turnover margin with a plus-three performance in the 2025 regular season finale at South Carolina.
- Linebacker Sammy Brown (eight) attempting to record a ninth career game with 10 or more tackles (as awarded by gameday stat crews) to pass his position coach Ben Boulware (eight from 2013-16) and pull

- Brown (11.0) chasing Jeremiah Trotter Jr. (13.0), Barrett Carter (12.5) and Trenton Simpson (12.5) for the most career sacks by a Clemson linebacker under Dabo Swinney.

- Brown (27.0) needing 3.0 tackles for loss to reach 30.0 career tackles for loss. He would join Stephone Anthony (35.0) and Barrett Carter (31.5) to become the third linebacker under Dabo Swinney to reach that mark.

- Wide receiver Tyler Brown (90) needing 10 catches to reach 100 career receptions.

- Brown (864) entering the game 136 receiving yards shy of 1,000 receiving yards for his career.

- Running back Gideon Davidson attempting to

become the first Clemson player to rush for 100 yards in three consecutive games since Travis Etienne's school-record six-game streak in 2019.

- Davidson attempting to become the first Clemson player to rush for 150 yards in consecutive games since Travis Etienne against South Carolina and Pitt in 2018.

- Davidson attempting to become the first Clemson player to rush for a touchdown in three straight games since Adam Randall in each of the first three games of Clemson's 2025 season.

- Davidson attempting to become the first Clemson player to rush for multiple touchdowns in back-to-back games since Phil Mafah did so in three straight games against Wake Forest, Virginia and Louisville in 2024.

- Cornerback Ashton Hampton attempting to become the first Clemson player credited by gameday stat crews with three or more passes defended (pass breakups plus interceptions) in consecutive games since 2012 (Xavier Brewer vs. NC State and South Carolina).

- Hampton entering the week leading the nation in passes defended as awarded by gameday stat crews (eight, one interception with seven pass breakups).

- Kicker Nolan Hauser (45) needing two field goals to tie or three field goals to pass David Treadwell (47) for ninth in career field goals in Clemson history.

- Hauser (238) needing 12 points to become the ninth kicker and 13th player overall in school history to reach 250 career points.

- Hauser (four) attempting to record a fifth career field goal of 50 or more yards to tie Donald Igwebuike (five from 1981-84) and Chris Gardocki (five from 1988-90) for second-most in Clemson history.

- Hauser (103) needing four PATs to tie or five PATs to pass Bob Paulling (107 from 1979-83) for fifth in Clemson history in career PATs.

- Defensive end Will Heldt entering the game as one of four FBS players to post 2.0 sacks in multiple games this season.

- Wide receiver T.J. Moore (31) attempting to extend his streak of consecutive games with a reception to 32 to tie Perry Tuttle (32 from 1979-81) for the eighth-longest streak in Clemson history.

- Moore (five) attempting to record his sixth career 100-yard receiving game to tie Terry Smith, Derrick Hamilton, Artavis Scott and Bryant Wesco Jr. for the ninth-most in Clemson history.

- Quarterback Tait Reynolds attempting to join Deshaun Watson and Trevor Lawrence as the only Clemson true freshman starting quarterbacks to go 3-0 in their first three career starts since the NCAA instituted permanent freshman eligibility in 1972.

- Reynolds attempting to make Clemson 23-15 in games started by true freshman quarterbacks since the NCAA instituted permanent freshman eligibility in 1972.

- Reynolds attempting to earn the third win by a Clemson true freshman starting quarterback against an AP Top 5 team all-time, joining Trevor Lawrence's wins against No. 3 Notre Dame and No. 1 Alabama in the College Football Playoff to end the 2018 season.

- Cornerback Elliot Washington II (three) attempting to add to his single-season career high in interceptions.

- Washington attempting to record an interception in three straight games for the first time in his career.

- Washington attempting to become the first Clemson player with an interception in three consecutive games since 2009, when both DeAndre McDaniel (first three games of the season) and Rashard Hall (four straight contests across games 5-8) accomplished the feat.

- Washington attempting to become the first Clemson player to record multiple interceptions in multiple games in a single season since 2009, when DeAndre

McDaniel recorded two multi-interception games.

- Wide receiver Bryant Wesco Jr. (1,408) needing 92 receiving yards to reach 1,500 for his career.

- Wesco attempting to tie the school record for career punt return touchdowns (two), shared by Shad Bryant (1937-39), Don Kelley (1969-71), Donnell Woolford (1985-88), Justin Miller (2002-04) and Jacoby Ford (2006-09).

- Wesco attempting to join Shad Bryant (two in 1938), Don Kelley (two in 1970) and Donnell Woolford (two in 1987) as the only players in school history to record multiple punt return touchdowns in a single season.

- Wesco attempting to become the first player in school history to return a punt for a touchdown in back-to-back games.

CLEMSON VS. AP TOP 10

Saturday's game will be Clemson's 90th all-time game against a team ranked in the Top 10 of the AP Poll. Clemson has 31 wins against the AP Top 10 all-time.

Dabo Swinney is 19-15 against AP Top 10 teams in his head coaching tenure. His first AP Top 10 win of his tenure came against eighth-ranked Miami in a 40-37 overtime thriller on the road in 2009.

Swinney is 5-3 against AP Top 10 teams at home, including wins against Georgia (2013), Notre Dame (2015), Louisville (2016), Miami (2020) and NC State (2022).

A win would mark the fifth Clemson win against an AP Top 5 opponent in Death Valley history, including:

- **Sept. 19, 1981:** Clemson forced nine turnovers by No. 4 Georgia, the most ever by a Clemson opponent, in a 13-3 win. The Tigers handed Herschel Walker his only regular season loss as a Bulldog.

- **Nov. 8, 2003:** Coming off a 45-17 loss at Wake Forest the previous week, Tommy Bowden's Clemson squad shocked the college football world with a 26-10 victory over Bobby Bowden and No. 3 Florida State, Clemson's highest-ranked victory in school history at the time.

- **Aug. 31, 2013:** No. 8 Clemson defeated No. 5 Georgia, 38-35. Sammy Watkins had a 77-yard receiving touchdown from Tajh Boyd, who accounted for five touchdowns (three passing, two rushing).

- **Oct. 1, 2016:** No. 5 Clemson won a meeting of top five teams in a 42-36 victory over No. 3 Louisville. The game would prove to be a meeting of the top two contenders for the Heisman Trophy in Louisville's Lamar Jackson and Clemson's Deshaun Watson. The game's deciding play proved to be a fourth-down stop by Clemson's Marcus Edmond deep in Clemson territory in the final seconds.

PRIME TIME IN DEATH VALLEY

Saturday's game will be another installment of Clemson After Dark, which has become a theme early in the 2026

season. The game will be Clemson's fourth night game this season, making 2026 Clemson's first time opening a season with four night kickoffs in its first five games of a season since 1951.

If Clemson's game kicks off on time shortly after 7:30 p.m., it will be Clemson's second-earliest kickoff of the season when standardized to Eastern Time. Pregame weather delays pushed Clemson's first two games to roughly 9:30 p.m. ET starts, and Clemson's fourth game was a 10:30 p.m. ET start at Cal. Clemson's only game to kick off before 9:30 p.m. ET this year was a noon ET kickoff against North Carolina, but that game later featured a stadium-record two-hour-and-28-minute weather delay in the fourth quarter and ended just before 6 p.m.

Saturday's contest will be Clemson's 73rd night game since the start of the 2015 season. In that time, Clemson is 58-14 in night games, including a 37-11 mark since the start of the 2018 season.

At home, Clemson is 27-5 under the Death Valley lights in Dabo Swinney's head coaching tenure. That record includes a 23-2 prime-time mark at Memorial Stadium in the College Football Playoff era.

BREAST CANCER AWARENESS GAME

This week's contest has been designated as Clemson's Breast Cancer Awareness game.

Since its inception, breast cancer research and aid has been one of the core focus areas of Dabo's All In Team Foundation. Breast cancer has impacted the Swinney family personally, as Dabo Swinney's wife, Kathleen, lost her sister, Lisa Lamb, to breast cancer at the age of 49 in 2014. Kathleen and her younger sister, Ann, both discovered through genetic testing that they are both carriers of the BRCA gene mutation.

Over the years, the foundation has donated more than \$2.65 million to local hospitals, research teams and organizations focused on breast cancer prevention, research, technology and early detection. Last July, the 2026 Dabo Swinney Ladies Clinic welcomed more than 900 participants and raised \$125,000 for the cause.

Since 2012, Dabo's All In Team Foundation has partnered with the Bon Secours St. Francis Foundation and the Pearlle Harris Center for Breast Health to provide funding for "Big Pink," the St. Francis Mobile Mammography coach that travels through Oconee, Pickens, Anderson, and Greenville counties providing mammograms to the underserved and underinsured in those communities. In both 2018 and 2022, the foundation provided lead gifts of \$250,000 for two new mobile mammography coaches that are equipped with

Additionally, in 2023, the foundation committed to expanding its impact into the Lakelands region of the state, providing the lead gift of \$250,000 to Self Regional Healthcare for their new mobile mammography unit. In August of 2025, the All In Foundation Board of Directors agreed to contribute \$350,000 toward Bon Secours St. Francis Health System's new Comprehensive Breast Health Clinic.

-- ON THE OPPONENT --

SERIES HISTORY VS. MIAMI (FLA.)

Saturday's game will be the 15th all-time meeting between Clemson and Miami. The series is presently dead even at 7-7 and even at every location (2-2 in Clemson, 4-4 in Miami, 1-1 at neutral sites).

Clemson rode a four-game winning streak in the series with wins in 2015, 2017, 2020 and 2022 by a combined score of 178-30. Miami snapped that streak with a 28-20 double-overtime victory in South Florida in 2023.

Prior to 2004, the two schools had not met since the 1956 season, a 21-0 Miami victory. Clemson went on to finish with a 7-2-2 record in 1956, and was ranked 19th in the final AP Poll, while the Hurricanes finished 8-1-1 and were ranked sixth. The Tigers also played in the Orange Bowl that year against Colorado and lost 27-21, and thus, both of Clemson's losses in 1956 came in the same stadium — the Orange Bowl.

From 2004-09, all three meetings between the teams resulted in overtime victories for the road team. The stretch represented just the second time in FBS history that two teams played three straight overtime games in a series.

Four of the teams' 14 all-time meetings have required overtime, Clemson's most against any opponent. The teams have played seven combined overtimes over those four contests.

MEMORABLE SERIES MOMENTS

- **Jan. 1, 1951:** Clemson appeared in the Orange Bowl for the first time and squeaked out a 15-14 win against Miami to complete an undefeated season. Sterling Smith's tackle of Frank Smith in the end zone gave Clemson a safety with under six minutes left in the game and gave the Tigers the victory. Don Wade also had two interceptions in the game. It was Clemson's second undefeated season in the last three years for Frank Howard's Tigers.

- **Nov. 16, 1956:** Vice President Richard Nixon was in attendance for Clemson's game against Miami at the Orange Bowl (then known as Burdine Stadium). Surrounded by security from various agencies, a loud explosion sounded and alarmed the bodyguard along with the Vice President. To everyone's relief, it was discovered that it was just the cannon fired off by a Clemson cheerleader when Clemson kicked off.

- **Nov. 6, 2004:** Clemson scored 21 unanswered points and held No. 10 Miami scoreless in the second half to upset the Hurricanes, 24-17, in overtime at the Orange Bowl. It was Clemson's third win over a top-10 team in two seasons, as running back Reggie Merriweather rushed for 114 yards and three touchdowns including the overtime game-winner.

- **Sept. 17, 2005:** Miami defeated Clemson, 36-30, in

a triple-overtime contest before a sellout crowd at Death Valley. Clemson tied the score with 15 seconds left on a 27-yard field goal by Jad Dean. Clemson tied the score at the end of the first overtime on a fourth-down touchdown pass from Whitehurst to Curtis Baham. Tyrone Moss scored what proved to be the game-winner in the third overtime on a 25-yard run. The official length of the game was 4:10, the longest game in Clemson history.

- **Oct. 24, 2009:** Kyle Parker hit Jacoby Ford on a 26-yard touchdown pass on third-and-11 in overtime to lift Clemson to a 40-37 overtime victory at No. 8 Miami. It was Clemson's first ranked win under Dabo Swinney. C.J. Spiller, playing in front of his father for the first time as a Tiger, gained 310 all-purpose yards to establish a school record. DeAndre McDaniel was named national defensive player of the week for his two interceptions, including one that he returned 23 yards for a score. There were nine lead changes in the game, as neither team scored twice in a row.

- **Oct. 24, 2015:** Clemson tied the program's largest margin of victory against an ACC opponent at the time when it handed Miami its worst defeat in history with a 58-0 rout in Sun Life Stadium. The Tigers rushed for over 400 yards in the victory. Clemson would later eclipse that victory margin mark twice in 2018 with a 61-point win against Louisville and a 60-point win at Wake Forest.

- **Oct. 10, 2020:** Clemson dominated a matchup of AP Top 10 teams at Death Valley in a rain-soaked prime-time game. No. 1 Clemson's swarming defense held the No. 7 Hurricanes to only 210 yards, while Clemson's offense piled up 550 yards, led by Trevor Lawrence's 29-of-41, 292-yard passing performance and Travis Etienne's 222 all-purpose yards.

LAST MEETING

Miami 28, Clemson 20 (2OT)

(Oct. 21, 2023, Miami Gardens, Fla.)

MIAMI GARDENS, Fla. — A goal-line stand by Miami in the second overtime sealed a 28-20 victory for the Hurricanes at Hard Rock Stadium, snapping Clemson's four-game winning streak in the series. Clemson's defense had nine tackles for loss, but Miami was able to string together points on four of its final five possessions to outlast the Tigers.

Sophomore quarterback Cade Klubnik was 18-for-34 for 314 yards. Klubnik connected with tight end Jake Briningstool five times for 126 yards and two touchdowns. Briningstool's 126 yards broke Clemson's school record for single-game receiving yards by a tight end, surpassing Jordan Leggett's 122 yards against

Florida State in 2016.

Linebacker Jeremiah Trotter Jr. led Clemson defensively with 11 tackles, two tackles for loss, two passes broken up and a forced fumble. Barrett Carter, Nate Wiggins and R.J. Mickens also added eight tackles apiece.

On its second drive of the game, Clemson appeared poised to score on a 12-play, 84-yard drive, but running back Will Shipley was stripped on third-and-goal just before crossing the goal line for a fumble Miami recovered in the end zone for a touchback. On the ensuing play, Miami opened the scoring on an 80-yard touchdown. Brashard Smith broke free on a rush up the middle, and though Nate Wiggins chased him down and forced a fumble at the one-yard line, Miami's Jacolby George recovered the fumble in the end zone for a touchdown.

In the second quarter, Klubnik led the Tigers 90 yards on seven plays, culminating with a 32-yard touchdown connection with Jake Briningstool, the tight end's second of the season.

Sheridan Jones recorded his third career interception to end Miami's final drive of the first half, which ended tied at 7-7. Miami did not run a single offensive play in Clemson's half of the field in the first half while Clemson recorded four tackles for loss.

After a stop to open the second half, Klubnik drove the Tigers into Miami territory, hitting on his first three throws for 55 yards. Jonathan Weitz hit a 41-yard field goal to cap the drive and give the Tigers a 10-7 lead with 8:38 to play in the third quarter.

On the ensuing drive, Andrew Mukuba made a critical stop on fourth-and-2 at the Clemson 36-yard line. On the next play, Klubnik hit Briningstool down the seam for a 50-yard gain down to the 14-yard line. On the next snap, Briningstool hauled in a leaping 19-yard reception over a Miami defender and got a knee inbounds for his second touchdown of the game.

Miami responded with a touchdown of its own to pull within three at 17-14 as the Hurricanes went on a 15-play, 75-yard drive that took 9:01 of game clock. The Tigers were forced to punt the ball back to Miami, which then drove to hit a game-tying 38-yard field goal with 1:52 to play.

Jonathan Weitz made a 31-yard field goal to conclude Clemson's first possession in overtime. Miami answered with a 35-yard field goal of its own to tie the game at 20-20 and send the game into double overtime.

Ajay Allen rushed three yards for a Miami touchdown and then again for the two-point conversion to start the

second overtime. On Clemson's second play of its second overtime possession, Klubnik completed a 21-yard pass to Tyler Brown to give Clemson first-and-goal at the Miami two-yard line. Clemson's ensuing four attempts came up short, and Klubnik was run out of bounds on fourth-and-goal to seal the win for Miami.

LAST MEETING IN CLEMSON

Clemson 40, Miami (Fla.) 10

(Nov. 19, 2022, Clemson, S.C.)

CLEMSON, S.C. – A strong defensive showing and a spread-out offensive attack gave No. 9 Clemson a 40-10 Senior Day victory over Miami (Fla.) in Memorial Stadium. The win extended Clemson's nation-leading and ACC-record home winning streak to 40 games, and Clemson became only the third FBS program ever to post 12 consecutive 10-win seasons, joining Florida State (14 from 1987-2000) and Alabama (14 from 2008-21).

The Tiger defense held the Hurricanes to just 98 yards of total offense (68 passing, 30 rushing), Miami's third-lowest offensive output in school history and its fewest since Nov. 27, 1965. Clemson recorded five sacks. Jeremiah Trotter Jr. led Clemson with nine total tackles, one pass breakup and one sack.

Clemson produced a balanced attack on offense with 201 total rushing yards and 246 total passing yards for 447 total yards. DJ Uiagalelei proved to be a dual threat, as he led Clemson in rushing with 89 yards and threw for 234 yards. Clemson spread the ball to 12 different receivers during the game. Clemson tallied 27 first downs to just six for Miami and converted on 14-of-19 third downs.

The Tigers started quickly, scoring touchdowns on their first two possessions and holding Miami without a first down in the first quarter. On the Tigers' first offensive possession, Clemson went 75 yards on a 12-play scoring drive to take a 7-0 lead with 9:26 left in the first quarter as Uiagalelei hit Davis Allen for a seven-yard score. Uiagalelei then finished the next drive with an eight-yard rushing touchdown to give Clemson a 14-0 advantage.

Clemson's defense continued the Tigers' momentum as R.J. Mickens tipped Miami's pass and Jalyn Phillips intercepted the ball to give Clemson the ball on the Miami 27-yard line. Clemson's offense capitalized with

Uiagalelei throwing a three-yard touchdown pass to wide-open senior Luke Price, the first receiving touchdown of his career. B.T. Potter secured another three points for Clemson with a 32-yard field goal, making the score 24-0 at the half. Clemson allowed just eight yards of offense and one first down in the first half and held the Canes to four three-and-outs in five possessions.

A Toriano Pride Jr. sack gave Clemson a 26-3 lead on a safety following a Clemson fumble deep in Miami territory. Miami scored its first touchdown of the night in the fourth quarter, making the score 26-10 with 13:45 left to play in the game.

A 49-yard catch-and-run by Jake Briningstool put Will Shipley in position to then run the ball from three yards out for his 13th rushing touchdown of the season and increase Clemson's lead to 33-10.

On Miami's ensuing possession, Trenton Simpson forced a Miami fumble and Tré Williams' recovery gave Clemson the ball on Miami's 36-yard line. Cade Klubnik then came in at quarterback and led another touchdown drive, with Kobe Pace punching one in to make the score 40-10 after the extra point.

NOTES FROM LAST GAME

- The announced kickoff time of 10:30 p.m. ET (officially 10:35 p.m. ET) was the program's latest kickoff according to its home time zone since Nov. 28, 1982 when the Tigers defeated Wake Forest at National Stadium in Tokyo, Japan. The 1 p.m. local kickoff time for that game equated to 11 p.m. ET.
- Clemson rushed for a season-high 257 yards, its first 200-yard rushing game of the season.
- Clemson has now rushed for 150 yards in three consecutive games for the first time since an eight-game streak in 2024.
- Clemson did not allow Cal to score an offensive touchdown. It was Clemson's first time holding an opposing offense without a touchdown since 2022 at Boston College.
- Cal entered the week ranked 13th in the nation in passing yards per game (321.7). Clemson held Cal to 145 passing yards, including a career-low 119 yards for Cal quarterback Jaron-Keawe Sagapolutele.
- Clemson has now held back-to-back opponents to fewer than 150 passing yards for the first time since a three-game streak in 2023 against NC State, Notre Dame and Georgia Tech.
- Clemson has now held back-to-back ACC opponents under 150 passing yards for the first time since 2020 against Miami (Fla.) and Georgia Tech.
- Running back Gideon Davidson recorded career highs in rushing attempts (22), rushing yards (159) and rushing touchdowns (two).
- Davidson became the first Clemson player to rush for 100 yards in consecutive games since 2024, when Phil Mahaf reached the century mark against both Louisville and Virginia Tech.
- Davidson posted the first 150-yard rushing game by a Clemson player since Phil Mahaf's 171-yard effort vs. Louisville on Nov. 2, 2024.
- Davidson scored on a one-yard plunge in the second quarter, giving him a touchdown in back-to-back games for the first time in his career.
- With the score, Clemson rushed for a touchdown in a 100th different game since the start of the 2018 season. Clemson has rushed for at least one touchdown in 100 of its 113 games in that span.
- Davidson helped ice the game with a career-long 75-yard touchdown run in the fourth quarter.
- The 75-yard run by Davidson was Clemson's longest since Phil Mahaf's 83-yard touchdown run vs. Appalachian State in September 2024.
- The 75-yard run by Davidson capped a 98-yard scoring drive. It was the seventh drive of 98 or more yards in Clemson history and the first since a 99-yard drive against Ohio State in the 2019 Fiesta Bowl.
- Quarterback Tait Reynolds completed 14-of-22 passes for 106 yards and added 28 yards on the ground.
- Reynolds joined Deshaun Watson and Trevor Lawrence as the only Clemson true freshman starting quarterbacks to go 2-0 in their first two career starts since the NCAA instituted permanent freshman eligibility in 1972.
- Clemson is now 22-15 in games started by true freshman quarterbacks since the NCAA instituted permanent freshman eligibility in 1972.
- Wide receiver T.J. Moore extended his streak of consecutive games with a reception to 31 games, tying Jake Briningstool (31 from 2022-24) for the ninth-longest streak in Clemson history.
- Wide receiver Tyler Brown recorded a 27-yard rush in the first quarter. Including a 34-yard rush a week earlier against North Carolina, Brown became the first Clemson receiver with a rush of 25 or more yards in back-to-back

games since Jacoby Ford in the first two games of the 2007 season.

- Running back Jarvis Green rushed seven times for 31 yards, both career highs.
- Cornerback Elliot Washington II recorded two interceptions.
- Washington also became the first Clemson player with multiple interceptions in a game since Ricardo Jones in the 2025 regular season finale at South Carolina.
- Washington has now recorded an interception in back-to-back games for the first time in his career.
- Washington became the first Clemson player with an interception in consecutive games since Ricardo Jones in the final two games of the 2025 regular season.
- Washington recorded his second interception of the season on Cal's first drive. He added his second interception of the game late in the fourth quarter.
- Washington pushed his career interception total to five. The 2026 season marks the first season of his career with multiple interceptions.
- Defensive end London Merritt recorded his first sack as a member of the Tigers on a third-down stop in the second quarter.
- The sack was the second of Merritt's career and his first since Oct. 4, 2025, against TCU as a member of the Colorado Buffaloes.
- Linebacker Jeremiah Alexander and defensive tackle Champ Thompson split a sack in the fourth quarter.
- Cornerback Ashton Hampton tied his season and career high with three pass breakups.
- Bryant Wesco Jr. recorded a 65-yard punt return touchdown in the third quarter.
- The punt return touchdown by Wesco was Clemson's first since Amari Rodgers' 58-yarder at Boston College on Nov. 10, 2018, a span covering 2,876 days.
- On a 30-yard field goal to open the second quarter, placekicker Nolan Hauser (238) passed David Treadwell (233) for ninth in career kick scoring and 13th in overall career scoring in Clemson history.
- With the field goal, Clemson scored in its 311th consecutive game to tie the 1998-2022 Oklahoma Sooners for the 10th-longest streak in FBS history without being shut out.
- Hauser missed a 48-yard attempt in the fourth quarter, ending a streak of 12 consecutive field goals made from 40 yards or more dating to September 2025. According to STATS Perform, the streak finished tied for the second-longest by an ACC kicker in the last 30 years (Miami's Michael Badgley had 14 across the 2015-16 seasons).
- Hauser had opened the season by converting his first 10 field goal attempts, the second-most by a Clemson kicker to start a season since Chandler Catanzaro made his first 12 attempts in 2012.
- Clemson played a conference game on the West Coast for the first time in program history.
- Clemson played its fourth all-time contest in the Golden State, joining road games at Pacific in 1951 and USC in 1966 and Clemson's victory over Alabama in Santa Clara to secure the national championship for the 2018 season.
- Clemson and Cal met for the second time in series history, following their New Year's Day 1992 meeting, when Clemson closed its 1991 season with a Citrus Bowl appearance against the Golden Bears.
- Cal became the 19th different program faced by Clemson in ACC play all-time, joining the conference's 15 other current members plus former members Maryland, South Carolina and Notre Dame.
- Clemson played its first of two Friday games in a single season for the first time since 1947. Clemson played Friday road games that season against Boston

College and Georgia.

- Clemson's captains for the contest were wide receiver Tyler Brown, safety Ronan Hanafin, center Collin Sadler and cornerback Elliot Washington II.

WITH THE WIN...

- Clemson evened its all-time series with Cal at 1-1. Prior to the game, Cal had been one of only three current ACC teams with a winning record against Clemson all-time.
- Clemson earned its first regular-season victory in the state of California in school history and evened its overall record in the state at 2-2.
- Clemson improved to 35-24-5 all-time in Friday games and improved to 28-18-5 in Friday regular season games all-time.
- Clemson improved to 4-1 in Friday regular season games under Dabo Swinney, including wins at Boston College in 2016, at Syracuse in 2021 and at Louisville in 2025.
- Including a Friday win at Louisville last season, Clemson has now won a Friday game in back-to-back seasons for the first time since 1938-39. In those seasons, Clemson defeated Wake Forest on Friday, Oct. 28, 1938, and George Washington on Friday, Nov. 3, 1939.
- Clemson improved to 10-9 all-time in its first meetings with programs as ACC opponents.
- Clemson evened its road record this season at 1-1.
- Clemson improved to 61-19 in games away from home since 2015, including a 45-11 record in true road games in that span.
- Clemson is now 10-2 in its last 12 regular season road games.
- Clemson won its ACC road opener for the 44th time since the conference's inception in 1953. Clemson is now 44-29-1 in its first road game of ACC play all-time.
- Clemson pushed its road winning streak in conference play to four games.
- Clemson improved to 85-14 against ACC opponents since the start of the 2015 season.
- Clemson improved to 113-21 in regular season play since the start of the 2015 season.
- Head Coach Dabo Swinney (190-54) joined Tom Osborne (195), Nick Saban (191) and Bob Stoops (191) as the only FBS coaches ever to win 190 games in the first 20 seasons of a head coaching career. Swinney accomplished the feat in his 19th season (and only his 18th full season). Note: Stoops is not included on the NCAA's official list of most wins through 20 seasons because he did not coach for 20 years.
- Swinney (116) pulled within one victory of Bobby Bowden's conference record for career head coaching wins in ACC regular season play (117). Swinney already holds the conference record for overall wins as an ACC head coach.
- Clemson led 10-7 at halftime. Clemson is now 163-12 under Dabo Swinney when leading at halftime, including a 146-8 mark since the start of the 2011 season.
- Clemson led 17-10 after three quarters and is now 153-7 when leading after three quarters since the start of the 2011 season. Clemson is 169-10 in total in those games in Swinney's tenure.
- Clemson improved to 6-0 under Dabo Swinney in games in which Clemson has returned a punt for a touchdown and 9-2 under his leadership when the Tigers score a special teams touchdown of any kind.
- Clemson is now 145-12 when totaling more first downs than its opponent since 2011.
- Clemson is now 89-4 when rushing for 200+ yards under Dabo Swinney. That includes a 39-1 mark when

reaching 250 rushing yards.

- Clemson is now 46-1 when intercepting multiple passes in a game since the start of the 2015 season.

- Clemson is now 75-6 in games in which it has had a 100-yard rusher since 2011.

- Clemson is now 130-4 in its last 134 games when holding teams to fewer than 23 points, a span that dates to the middle of the 2010 season.

SCORING CHANGES

- A minus-two-yard rush for Juju Preston was changed to a minus-two-yard pass. Totals for Preston and quarterback Tait Reynolds have been updated accordingly, as have rushing and passing totals for Clemson.

- The time on clock for Clemson's final touchdown was fixed (2:59, not 2:58).

ON THIS DATE

- **Oct. 3, 2015:** Clemson defeated sixth-ranked Notre Dame in the first meeting between the two teams since 1979. In a torrential downpour, the Tigers jumped out to a big lead and escaped with a 24-22 win in the final seconds as Carlos Watkins led a host of tacklers that stopped the Fighting Irish's two-point try.

-- POSTSEASON SUCCESS --

COLLEGE FOOTBALL STAPLES

From 2014-23, Clemson cemented itself as one of the College Football Playoff's powerhouses of the tournament's inaugural decade. In the 10-year history of the four-team format prior to 2024, only 15 programs earned at least one College Football Playoff berth, and Clemson ranked second in CFP berths, CFP title game appearances, total CFP wins and CFP titles in that span.

Clemson returned to the College Football Playoff in 2024 in the format's first year of expansion to 12 teams. Clemson is tied for the second-most College Football Playoff berths all-time and ranks third in College Football Playoff wins.

Prior to the streak's conclusion in 2025, Clemson was one of three programs (alongside Alabama and Ohio State) to finish in the CFP Top 25 in each of the system's first 11 years.

Clemson rebounded from a 1-3 start in 2025 to finish the season with seven wins. HISTORIC CONFERENCE REIGN

Including titles from its days as a member of the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association and Southern Conference, Clemson has 28 conference championships overall, also the most of any current ACC school. Duke ranks second among the ACC's current membership with 19 overall conference titles, including 11 Southern Conference titles and eight ACC titles.

The Tigers won the 1900, 1902 and 1903 SIAA Conference championships under John Heisman, then the 1906 SIAA title under Bob Williams. Clemson also won the 1940 and 1948 Southern Conference titles under Frank Howard. Howard won eight total conference titles, including two in the Southern Conference and six in the ACC. Swinney surpassed the legend with a win in the 2024 ACC Championship Game.

NO LOSING SEASONS IN ACC PLAY SINCE '98

For more than a quarter-century, Clemson's ACC success has not been a roller-coaster ride of lofty heights and deep lows. The last time Clemson finished a season below .500 in regular season conference play was in 1998, when Tommy West's 3-8 squad went 1-7 in ACC play.

In 2025, Clemson extended its streak of being .500 or better in conference play to 27 years, tied for the longest active streak in the country and tied for the fourth-longest of any streak since 1966.

POWER OVER POWER CONFERENCE FOES

Early in his head coaching tenure, Dabo Swinney laid out his belief to then-Clemson athletic director Terry Don Phillips that the Tigers needed to add tough non-conference challenges on top of their tests in ACC play to serve as a foundation for the program's growth.

"I had a conversation with Terry Don and said, 'Terry Don, I know we are not very good right now, but we need to play people because that is going to help me teach and help me develop the culture and the mindset that you have to have to win at the highest level,'" recounted Swinney. "I didn't think we had that, and that's what we committed to. That's what we've done."

The scheduling philosophy and culture change have resonated in the Clemson program. Since 2011, Clemson ranks among the national leaders in wins against power conference opponents in that time span.

College Football Hall of Famer Frank Howard, known as "The Bashful Baron of Barlow Bend," compiled a 165-118-12 record in 30 seasons at Clemson from 1940-69.

With a 31-23 upset of No. 12 Notre Dame in 2023, Dabo Swinney earned his 166th career victory as Clemson's head coach, surpassing Howard to become Clemson's all-time winningest coach. Swinney accomplished the feat in his 209th career game.

With a 161-39 record at the end of the 2022 season, Swinney amassed the second-most wins through a coach's first 15 seasons in FBS history despite not having the benefit of a full season in his first year, as he went 4-3 on an interim basis in his first season in 2008 after taking over for Tommy Bowden in October. Despite a truncated first season, his 161 wins from

2008-22 represented the second-most wins in the first 15 seasons of an FBS coaching career.

SIX "FINAL FOURS" FOR SWINNEY

While the term "Final Four" may still be the linguistic property of college basketball, since the advent of the four-team College Football Playoff in 2014, Head Coach Dabo Swinney had Clemson among the sport's final four teams six times from 2015-20, becoming the first coach to lead a team to six consecutive College Football Playoffs since the format's institution in 2014.

The NCAA men's college basketball tournament dates to 1939. In the history of that tournament, only John Wooden of UCLA (nine from 1967-75) and Mike Krzyzewski of Duke (five from 1988-92) coached teams to at least five consecutive Final Fours. With his sixth "Final Four" appearance in 2020, Swinney joined basketball's Wooden as the only college football or men's basketball coaches to take teams to six consecutive Final Fours in their respective sports.

Swinney is among only nine coaches in football and men's basketball to record six career Final Four berths. He is one of only six with a winning record in Final Four games.

Swinney's ability to place his team among the nation's elite quartet has also been illustrated by the polls. Clemson finished first in the AP Poll in 2016 and 2018, second in 2015 and 2019, third in 2020 and fourth in 2017. Swinney became just the fourth coach to record at least six consecutive top four finishes since the AP Poll began in 1936, an exclusive list that also includes Florida State's Bobby Bowden (13), USC's Pete Carroll (seven) and Oklahoma's Bud Wilkinson (six).

Clemson's streak represented the fifth time a program has had a run of at least six top four finishes in the AP Poll. Miami (Fla.) had a seven-year run from 1986-92 with two different head coaches leading the program.

With a win against future Pro Football Hall of Famer Bill Belichick in 2025, Swinney joined a list of head coaches across the collegiate and pro levels to defeat both Nick Saban and Bill Belichick that includes Bill Cowher, Gary Kubiak, Eric Mangini, Mike McCarthy, Dick Jauron, Tony Dungy, Herm Edwards, Dick Vermeil, Romeo Crennel, Jim Harbaugh and Steve Spurrier. HEAD COACH CONTINUITY

Over the last decade-and-a-half, Clemson became a beacon of stability in the increasingly unstable environment of college football. Clemson Head Coach Dabo Swinney is in his 24th overall season at Clemson in 2026, including his 18th full season as head coach (and his 19th including an interim stint in 2008).

By date of initial hire (including interim hires), Swinney is the third-longest-tenured head coach in the FBS and the second-longest-tenured among power conference head coaches.

Since the conference's founding in 1953, no program has won more regular season games in Atlantic Coast Conference play than Clemson. In 2020, Clemson earned its 300th official regular season victory over an ACC opponent, becoming the first program to accomplish the feat.

CHAMPIONSHIP LINEAGE

After being named Clemson's full-time coach in December of 2008, Head Coach Dabo Swinney set about securing his first signing class in 2009.

His first class, which he tabbed the "Dandy Dozen," brought home Clemson's first ACC title since 1991 during their junior campaign in 2011. With the exception of Clemson's current freshman and sophomore classes, every prior signing class under Swinney tallied at least one ACC title to their credit in their tenures at Clemson, and every signing class from 2012-24 earned at least one College Football Playoff berth.

DEATH VALLEY ROARS

Frank Howard Field at Memorial Stadium garnered its famous nickname in the 1940s when Presbyterian College Head Coach Lonnie McMillian, after many years of bringing his teams in for drubbings, dubbed the venue as "Death Valley."

The name stuck, and its patrons have done their part to make it live up to its name and its reputation. In the first 12 seasons of the College Football Playoff era from

2014-25, Clemson's home atmosphere helped draw 168 false starts by opponents, the second-most of any home venue in the country and the most by a power conference program.

100-YARD GAMES IN 2025

Wesco reached the century mark in two of Clemson's first three games in 2025. He recorded 118 yards against Troy and 126 yards against Georgia Tech, becoming the first Clemson player with consecutive 100-yard receiving games since Cornell Powell against Notre Dame and Pitt in 2020.

T.J. Moore added his first 100-yard effort of that season at North Carolina that October with a five-catch, 108-yard performance highlighted by a 75-yard score on the game's opening play from scrimmage. Wesco added a 106-yard performance at Boston College a week later, and Moore contributed a 124-yard effort the following week.

Now-departed receiver Antonio Williams added his first 100-yard game of the season against Duke, giving Clemson a 100-yard receiver in four consecutive games for the first time since 2016 when five players reached the mark over a four-game span against NC State, Florida State, Syracuse and Pitt.

FIRST START

After seeing action in reserve in Clemson's first two games of 2026, true freshman quarterback Tait Reynolds made his first career start Sept. 19 against North Carolina. Reynolds helped the Tigers earn a come-from-behind 28-20 victory against the Tar Heels, guiding the Tigers to a 25-3 run over the game's final 31 minutes.

With the victory in Reynolds' first start, Clemson moved to 28-20-1 in starting quarterback debuts since the Tigers abandoned the single wing in 1953.

DAVIDSON EMERGES

Sophomore Gideon Davidson emerged out of fall camp as Clemson's starting running back, and his emergence continued in late September. After carrying 21 times for 82 yards in Clemson's first two games, Davidson was Clemson's closer in wins against North Carolina and Cal.

Davidson rushed 16 times for 105 yards and a touchdown against the Tar Heels, his first career 100-yard game and first career touchdown. The score and 61 of his yards came in the fourth quarter of Clemson's comeback win. A week later against Cal, he posted career highs with 22 carries for 159 yards and two touchdowns. He accounted for all 98 yards of Clemson's 98-yard fourth-quarter drive that put the Tigers up two scores, punctuating Clemson's dagger with a career-long 75-yard rushing touchdown.

Davidson became the first Clemson player to post back-to-back 100-yard rushing games since Phil Mafah in the middle of the 2024 season.

In addition to his on-field performance, Davidson has been in the spotlight for his philanthropy off the field for which he has been named to the AFCA Good Works Team and as a Wuerffel Trophy semifinalist. Born in Ghana, Davidson was adopted at age five and is passionate about the opportunities afforded by adoption. On his 20th birthday on May 16, 2026, he launched "Gid's Fundraiser" for Flourish Adoption Ministries in Greenville, S.C. He raised \$12,375 and donated \$5,000 of his own with the stated goal of reducing financial barriers for waiting families and providing ongoing care and support for birth mothers.

CORNERBACK DUO STANDING OUT

One year after well-noted struggles in pass defense in 2025, Head Coach Dabo Swinney has praised his secondary as one of Clemson's strengths in 2026 and one of the team's bright spots in September.

In the wake of a tough season opener for Clemson's entire squad at LSU, cornerbacks Ashton Hampton and Elliot Washington II were outstanding in Clemson's three remaining games in September when Clemson allowed only 174.7 passing yards per game in three consecutive wins, including a dominant performance against Cal quarterback (and presumed future early-round draft pick) Jaron-Keawe Sagapolutele. The duo combined for two interceptions (both by Washington) and three pass breakups (all by Hampton) in holding Sagapolutele to a career-low 119 yards.

According to official NCAA stats as awarded by gameday stat crews, Hampton leads in the FBS in passed defended (interceptions plus pass breakups) this season and is the only player in the nation to record multiple games with three or more passes defended.

HIGHWAY TO HELDT

Despite the presence of three NFL Draft picks — including two top-35 selections — along Clemson's defensive line in 2025, it was defensive end Will Heldt that led Clemson in sacks and tackles for loss in his first season as a Tiger.

Heldt transferred to Clemson in 2025 following two strong seasons at Purdue from 2023-24. The third-team All-ACC pick finished fourth on Clemson and first among its defensive line in tackles (as credited by the coaching staff) in 2025, tallying 48 tackles and producing 15.5 tackles for loss, 7.5 sacks, four pass breakups and a forced fumble while starting all 13

games.

This season, Heldt recorded a career-high-tying 2.0 sacks against Georgia Southern on Sept. 12, and seven days later, he matched his career high yet again, notching 2.0 sacks in a comeback win against North Carolina. Heldt became the first Clemson player to reach 2.0 sacks in consecutive games since All-American Jeremiah Trotter Jr. did so against South Carolina and North Carolina in 2022.

Heldt is one of four players to reach 2.0 sacks in multiple games this season.

SAMMY'S SENSATIONAL START IN 2024

Linebacker Sammy Brown arrived at Clemson in January 2024 as a consensus Top 30 player in his recruiting class and as the nation's reigning High School Butkus Award winner.

Head Coach Dabo Swinney praised Brown as an "alpha," but spoke frequently about Brown's learning curve at the linebacker position after playing both running back and linebacker at Jefferson High School in Commerce, Ga. The linebacker tabbed as 247Sports' No. 1 "freak athlete" in the 2024 recruiting class proved to be a quick study, appearing in all 14 games for Clemson with six starts.

After Clemson opened its first eight games of 2024 in two-linebacker sets, Brown earned his first start at Virginia Tech in November that year as Clemson opened the game with three linebackers. The former five-star prospect delivered, recording a team-high eight tackles (per the gameday stat crew) with 2.5 tackles for loss and a sack. Despite playing only 444 defensive snaps over 14 games in 2024, Brown ranked second in the nation in tackles for loss among freshmen.

HAUSER'S 2024 DEBUT

Hauser opened his career with a streak of 25 consecutive made kicks (five field goals & 20 PATs) in 2024 before a blocked PAT against Stanford accounted for his first miss.

That season, Hauser set the school record for points in a true freshman season with 113, breaking the previous mark of 78 set by Sammy Watkins in 2011 and posting the first 100-point season by a true freshman in Clemson history.

Hauser's 113-point 2024 season ranked tied for sixth in Clemson history in kicking points scored in a single season and tied for ninth in school history in points scored by any means in a single season.

Hauser is a second-generation Clemson student-athlete. His mother, Sheri Hauser (née Bueter), was an All-American soccer player at Clemson from 1994-97, and his father, Scott, played baseball at Clemson from 1995-97 and was 6-2 as a pitcher on Clemson's College World Series team of 1996. His sister, Ella, was also a member of Clemson's women's soccer team from 2021-24.

HAUSER'S HIGHLIGHT IN 2024

Though the pronunciation of his last name often trips up observers, Hauser made his name much more nationally recognizable with the seminal highlight of the 2024 ACC Championship Game.

In what Clemson Head Coach Dabo Swinney called "the biggest kick in Clemson history," the true freshman booted a 56-yard game-winning field goal as time expired to give Clemson its 22nd ACC title, its 10th win of the season and its seventh College Football Playoff berth. Of note:

- Hauser's field goal gave Clemson the first walk-off win in ACC Championship Game history.
- Hauser became the first Clemson player to kick a game-winning walk-off field goal since Chandler Catanzaro hit a 37-yard field goal to beat LSU to end the 2012 Chick-fil-A Bowl.
- Hauser's 56-yard field goal was the longest game-winning field goal as time expired in Clemson history.
- Hauser's career-long 56-yard field goal was the fourth-longest field goal in Clemson history but its longest away from Death Valley. It was also the longest field goal in postseason play in Clemson history.
- Hauser became the first FBS player ever to win a conference championship game by kicking a field goal of 50 or more yards as time expired.
- The game-winning field goal came in Hauser's home metro area, as his hometown of Cornelius, N.C. is roughly 20 miles north of Bank of America Stadium in Charlotte.

THE OTHER SWINNEY DYNASTY

Like the Colquitt family punting at Tennessee, the Swinney family holding for placekicks at Clemson has become a dynasty of its own.

Head Coach Dabo Swinney's oldest son, Will, arrived at Clemson in 2017 and immediately earned Clemson's starting holder position on placekicks. He played five seasons and a record-tying 69 games at Clemson through 2021. In those five seasons, Clemson scored 565 points on placekicks, including field goals and PATs, and he held for 555 of those 565 points. The only 10 Clemson kicking points not held by Will in his career were instead held by his brother, Drew, who was Clemson's starter at the position in 2022.

Will and Drew were succeeded by the youngest of the three Swinney boys, Clay, a redshirt senior in his fourth season as Clemson's starting holder in 2026. If Clay holds every Clemson placekick in 2026, every Clemson placekick in a full 10-season span from 2017-26 would have been held by a Swinney.

Clemson's last hold by any player outside the Swinney family was on the final point of Clemson's 2016 national championship, as Seth Ryan, coincidentally also the son of a famous long-time coach (Rex Ryan), held the PAT following Hunter Renfrow's game-winning touchdown with one second remaining.

Clemson's 2024 win against Stanford marked Clemson's 100th consecutive game with a Swinney as holder, a game that ironically resulted in Dabo Swinney's 100th career home win at Memorial Stadium. Against Furman in November 2025, the Swinney family held its 200th consecutive field goal attempt.

The trio hit 1,000 combined kicking points for which it held on Sept. 19, 2026, on its third field goal of a win against North Carolina. All three holders in the Swinney lineage were in attendance as the family hit quadruple digits. Will is an assistant on Clemson's staff, Drew (currently the wide receivers coach at Samford) was in town amid a Samford bye week, and Clay held the attempt.

STREAK OF ACC HONORS

Nolan Hauser earned ACC Specialist of the Week honors for his performances against Georgia Southern and North Carolina. A week later, punt returner Bryant Wesco Jr. won the honor for his 65-yard punt return against Cal.

With the selections, Clemson earned ACC Specialist of the Week honors in three straight weeks for the first time in school history. The three selections for the 2026 season match the 1990, 2009 and 2014 campaigns (three each) for the second-most ACC Specialist of the Week honors in a season in school history, trailing only the 1997 season (five).

Clemson's special teams are under the guidance of Rich Bisaccia, who returned to Clemson this season after 24 seasons at the NFL level as a special teams coordinator and head coach.

-- NOTES & NUGGETS --**DEFEATS IN REVIEW**

Clemson has lost 28 games since 2015, the fourth-fewest in the nation in that span. Twelve of Clemson's

28 losses since 2015 — more than 42 percent — have come against teams in the top 11 of the AP Poll.

The opponents to whom Clemson has lost since 2015 have a combined final record of 258-101, a winning percentage of .719.

The approach to creating functional depth and rewarding players ready to play has been a key philosophy for Head Coach Dabo Swinney, whose own collegiate playing career was hatched as a walk-on fighting for playing time in Alabama's receiving corps.

"We're fully committed to playing guys who deserve to play," Swinney said. "You commit to a guy early in the season, and even if a guy has only played 10 percent of the snaps, when you get to game eight or nine, they've got some good experience."

Clemson has played 100+ players in a game seven times under Dabo Swinney, including playing 105 against Furman in 2025.

SIGN AND DEVELOP

While proud of his incoming classes, Head Coach Dabo Swinney has long stated that a true ranking of a recruiting class cannot and should not be published until four years later when the group can be evaluated on performance rather than potential.

Much to Swinney's delight, The Athletic annually assumed that role for the classes of 2014-20, re-ranking each recruiting class four years later to account for on-field performance.

For its re-rankings, The Athletic uses the following grading scale: 5 points: All-American, award winner, top-50 NFL Draft pick; 4: Multi-year starter, all-

conference honors; 3: One-year starter or key reserve; 2: Career backup; 0: Minor or no contribution, left the program. The outlet also adds a bonus to each program's class average, derived from its total number of wins from 2017 through 2020 (e.g., for re-ranking the Class of 2017, Clemson won 51 games, so its class average received a bonus of 0.51).

Swinney has pointed out that Clemson often falls in rankings as its retention and its commitment to not oversigning leads to smaller recruiting classes. He also notes that much of Clemson's on-field success is a function of the program's development, citing All-Americans like former three-star Isaiah Simmons or former two-star Nolan Turner. The re-rankings illustrate Clemson's impressive track record of talent identification, culture fit, resource allocation and player development.

On average, Clemson ranked 10.2 in the 247 Composite team rankings across the 2014-20 recruiting cycles. Upon re-ranking those groups, despite having little room for improvement while recruiting at a Top 15 clip in that span, Clemson ranked 4.0 on average in the re-rankings, a ratings bump of roughly six spots. Each of those Clemson classes averaged at least 10 wins a season during their careers.

SENIOR SUCCESS

Every January, Head Coach Dabo Swinney conducts his first official meeting with his new team. The first order of business in the meeting is to "reset the room," reorganizing the seating arrangement with seniors in front and all succeeding classes in order behind them in the team auditorium.

Several of Swinney's senior classes placed themselves among select company in college football history. The 2017, 2018, 2019 and 2020 Clemson seniors account for four of only 16 four-year classes in FBS history to reach 50 career wins. That includes the 2018 and 2019 groups that are tied with the 2018 Alabama seniors for the most wins in FBS history (55 wins in four years).

FINISH

In 2018, Clemson debuted a new version of its "This is Why We Work" fourth quarter video at Death Valley, a hype video imploring the team to finish and featuring now-retired Director of Strength and Conditioning Joey Batson bellowing:

"Let me tell you something right now: they don't put championship rings on smooth hands! You gotta go earn it! You gotta go earn it six seconds at a time! You win championships when the stadium is empty, when the band ain't playing, when the cheerleaders ain't cheering, when it's just you and your brothers right beside you. That's when you win championships! In the fourth quarter, that is when we shine!"

The video and the speech became a part of Clemson lore, buoyed by its playing during Clemson's comeback win against Syracuse that year en route to a 15-0 national championship season. Over the years, the video has changed but the speech remains the same, with many Clemson fans yelling it in unison as it plays.

Clemson holds a 169-10 record under Dabo Swinney when leading after three quarters, including a 153-7 mark since 2011.

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

- Through the 2026 spring semester, of the 442 eligible players who completed their athletic eligibility at Clemson and/or graduated early since Dabo Swinney's first full season as head coach, 436 (98.6 percent) have earned a degree during their time at Clemson.

- A program-record 98 individuals earned a 3.0 GPA or better in Fall 2024. That included a program-record 20 perfect 4.0s. Clemson then produced 87 such student-athletes in Fall 2025.

- Clemson set a record in Fall 2024 with the highest single-semester GPA in program history with a 3.19 team GPA. Clemson then matched that mark with a 3.19 in Fall 2025.

- Entering the 2026 fall semester, Clemson has had 75+ individuals earn a 3.0 or better GPA in 10 consecutive semesters.

- Clemson earned the AFCA Academic Achievement Award for 2024. The award was Clemson's fourth in a seven-year span, but it was Clemson's fourth in the five most recent years in which the honor was actually awarded, as the organization did not name recipients during a two-year period amid the COVID-19 pandemic.

HISTORIC GRADUATION SUCCESS RATE

Aided in part by another elite academic performance by Clemson Football, Clemson Athletics tied for second among institutions in Graduation Success Rate (GSR) with a 96 percent mark for the 2015-18 cohort in data released by the NCAA in November 2025.

After posting a 99 percent mark for each of the previous two cohorts, Clemson Football recorded a 98, tied for fifth in Division I and tied for third in the FBS. Clemson and Harvard represent the only two Division I programs to post a 98 percent or better over each of the last three cohorts, and Clemson is the only program in the FBS to accomplish the feat.

ACADEMIC PROGRESS RATE

- Clemson broke program multi-year NCAA Academic Progress Rate (APR) records in three straight years from 2017-19 (987 in 2016-17, 992 in 2017-18 and 993 in 2018-19) before the NCAA suspended APR reporting during the COVID-19 pandemic. Upon reinstatement of APR reporting in June 2022, Clemson shattered its multi-year APR record with a 999 covering the 2017-18 through 2020-21 academic years. Clemson has posted a 995 or better multi-year APR in each of the last five cycles.

- Across the 2011-25 academic years, Clemson was the only program in the country to finish among the Top 25 in APR among FBS schools and the AP Top 25 in every reported APR cycle.

- Clemson and Northwestern are the only power conference programs to produce a 990+ multi-year APR in each of the last seven reported cycles.

- Prior to the suspension of APR Public Recognition Awards following the COVID-19 pandemic, the NCAA recognized Clemson with its annual honor, which is bestowed upon programs ranking in the Top 10 percent of their respective sports, for nine of the award's last 10 reported academic cycles. Only 37 FBS programs earned at least one APR recognition across the 2009-10 through 2018-19 academic years. Only 30 programs earned it multiple times. Clemson, Duke and Northwestern were the only ones to earn the award 9+ times in that 10-year span.

- With its award for the 2018-19 academic year, Clemson became the only FBS program since the NCAA created the APR metric in 2003 to win a national championship and an APR Public Recognition Award in the same year multiple times. 2025 ALL-ACC SELECTIONS

Seven Clemson players earned recognition on the ACC's annual squads recognizing the conference's best in 2025. Clemson has produced at least seven selections in each of the last 11 years and in 14 of the last 15 years.

Four Clemson players earned their first career selections: linebacker Sammy Brown, defensive tackle Peter Woods, defensive end Will Heldt and safety Ricardo Jones.

Two Clemson players collected their second career All-ACC nods, as both cornerback Avieon Terrell and wide receiver Antonio Williams earned repeat selections from 2024 to 2025.

Offensive tackle Blake Miller earned his third career All-ACC selection, becoming the 25th player in Clemson history to collect three All-ACC honors.

- Nolan Hauser, PK: Son of two former Clemson athletes, including his mother, Sheri Hauser (née Bueter), an All-American soccer player at Clemson from 1994-97, and his father, Scott, who played baseball at Clemson from 1995-97 and was 6-2 as a pitcher on Clemson's College World Series team of 1996. He is the brother of recent Clemson women's soccer player Ella Hauser.
- Will Heldt, DE: Brother of Jack Heldt, who wrestled at Wabash College.
- Brayden Jacobs, OL: Son of nine-year NFL running back Brandon Jacobs, a two-time Super Bowl champion with the New York Giants who accrued more than 9,000 career rushing yards.
- Charlie Johnson, TE: Son of Ellis Johnson, a long-time college football coach who served as Clemson's defensive coordinator from 1994-96.
- Chris Johnson Jr., RB: Son of former Oregon State

wide receiver Chris Johnson. Despite online reports to the contrary, he is *not* related to the former Tennessee Titans running back of the same name.

- Tucker Kattus, OL: Son of Eric Kattus, who played tight end at Michigan from 1982-85 and caught 66 career passes in seven NFL seasons. Also the brother of Kentucky tight ends Josh and Justin Kattus, the former of whom entered the NFL with the Bengals in 2026.
- C.J. Kubah-Taylor, LB: Nephew of former Chicago Bears cornerback Jerry Azumah.
- Jahiem Lawson, DE: Brother of Shaq Lawson, a 2015 consensus All-American at Clemson and 2016 first-round pick.
- Armon Mason, DE: Son of late NBA veteran Anthony Mason, whose career included stints with the New Jersey Nets, Denver Nuggets, New York Knicks, Charlotte Hornets, Milwaukee Bucks and Miami Heat. Also the cousin of NFL defensive tackle and former Clemson standout Grady Jarrett.
- Darien Mayo, DE: Nephew of former St. Johns basketball player Devin Mayo.
- Kobe McCloud, LB: Brother of NFL wide receiver and former Clemson wide receiver Ray-Ray McCloud; also brother of former USF/Arizona/James Madison/Texas State quarterback Jordan McCloud.

- Tait Reynolds, QB: Son of Paul Reynolds, who played football and baseball at Arizona State and later played professional baseball in the Colorado Rockies organization and professional football with the Arena Football League's Arizona Rattlers. Also the brother of Utah linebacker Trey Reynolds and Northern Arizona/UT Martin linebacker Porter Reynolds.
- Joseph Roberto II, LB: Son of former Alabama and UAB linebacker Joey Roberto; also the grandson of Phil Roberto, a pro hockey player who played forward for the NHL's Montreal Canadiens, St. Louis Blues, Detroit Red Wings, Kansas City Scouts, Colorado Rockies and Cleveland Barons.
- Collin Sadler, OL: Grandson of John Schroeder, a former All-America wide receiver at North Carolina who went on to play for the CFL's Hamilton Tiger-Cats.
- Connor Salmin, WR: Son of former Virginia Tech men's soccer player Alex Salmin.
- Clark Sanderson, WR: Son of former Alabama wide receiver Craig Sanderson (1988-90).

- Makhi Williams Lee, DT: Cousin of former NFL defensive lineman Jumpy Geathers, who played 13 seasons with the New Orleans Saints, Washington Redskins, Atlanta Falcons and Denver Broncos.
- Tayveon Wilson, TE: Son of former Marshall linebacker Dionte Wilson.
- Grant Wise, OL: Son of Ty Wise, who was a starting center at Miami (Fla.) and blocked for running backs Edgerrin James and Clinton Portis in his playing career spanning 1996-99.

CHURNING OUT NFL TALENT

Since assuming the head role midseason in 2008, Head Coach Dabo Swinney has produced 95 NFL draft picks (plus an additional Supplemental Draft selection) during his head coaching tenure. His 95 draft picks produced are the most by any active coach in the nation since the 2009 NFL Draft, and he is one of only two active coaches that can boast at least 20 career first-round picks as a head coach.

Clemson produced one of its most prolific draft classes in school history in 2026, tying a school record for a seven-round draft with nine selections.

Notes and nuggets on Clemson's recent success in the NFL Draft are included below:

- Clemson's nine selections tied the 2016 NFL Draft for the most in the Dabo Swinney era and its most in a seven-round draft in school history. The nine picks were one off the school record of 10, set during a 12-round draft in 1983.

- Clemson's nine selections in the 2026 NFL Draft tied for the most in the ACC and tied for fourth nationally.

- Clemson had at least one player selected in each of the first five rounds of a single draft for the first time in program history.

- All nine of Clemson's selections came in the first five rounds. Clemson's nine selections tied Ohio State for the most across Rounds 1-5.

- Clemson, 2025 national champion Indiana and Florida were the only programs to produce a pick in each of the first five rounds.

- Clemson's nine picks through five rounds shattered the school record for picks in the first five rounds, surpassing the program's six in the first five rounds of the 1991, 2016, 2017, 2019, 2020 and 2023 drafts.

- Clemson has now had at least one player selected in 24 consecutive drafts since 2003, tying the school record set across the 1951-74 NFL Drafts. Every year in the current streak has come during a seven-round

format; the streak from 1951-74 featured between 17 and 30 rounds.

- The 2026 NFL Draft marked the ninth time that Clemson has produced multiple first-round picks in a single draft. The school record of three was set in 2019, and the 2026 haul tied the 1979, 1982, 2015, 2017, 2020, 2021 and 2023 drafts (two each) for second in school annals.

- Clemson was one of nine schools to produce multiple first-round picks in the 2026 NFL Draft, alongside Alabama, Arizona State, Indiana, Miami (Fla.), Notre Dame, Ohio State, Oregon and Utah.

- Clemson has now had at least one first-round draft choice in 11 of the last 14 years, standing alongside Alabama, Florida, Georgia and Ohio State as the only programs to produce a first-round pick in at least 11 of the last 14 years.

- Since 2013, Clemson has produced at least one first-round pick from each of the QB, RB, WR, OL, DE, DT, LB and DB position groups. The only other schools with at least one first-rounder at all those positions in that span are Alabama and Ohio State.

- Clemson is one of only six schools to have produced multiple draft picks in each of the last 24 NFL Drafts (LSU, Michigan, Oklahoma, Ohio State and USC).

- With two picks in Round 1 on Day 1 and three picks in Rounds 2-3 on Day 2, Clemson set a school record with five picks through the first three rounds of a draft. Clemson's previous record of four was accomplished five times in 1991, 2016, 2019, 2020 and 2021.

- With the selections of Peter Woods in Round 1 and T.J. Parker in Round 2, Clemson had multiple defensive linemen selected in the first two rounds of a draft for the fifth time since the institution of the Common Draft in 1967 (2011, 2016, 2019, 2023 and 2026).

- Clemson produced three top-50 picks from its defense in a single draft for the first time since 2019, when Clelin Ferrell, Christian Wilkins, Dexter Lawrence and Trayvon Mullen were all selected in the first 40 picks. Clemson, Ohio State and Texas Tech were the only defenses to accomplish the feat in 2026.

- Clemson produced four offensive draft picks and five defensive draft picks. The 2026 NFL Draft marked the second time in school history (and first time in a seven-round format) that Clemson has had at least four selections on each side of the ball in a single draft. Clemson had six offensive players and four defensive players selected in a 12-round draft in 1983.

- Nine different teams selected a Clemson player, surpassing the previous single-draft school record of eight. Eight different teams accounted for Clemson's 10 picks in 1983 and its nine picks in 2016. The nine teams that selected Clemson players in 2026 spanned seven of the NFL's eight divisions.

- Clemson has had at least one player chosen by 30 of the 32 NFL franchises since 2003. The lone exceptions in that time frame are the Patriots, who last selected a Tiger in 1991, and the Panthers, who have never selected a Clemson player despite playing their first season in franchise history in Death Valley.

- Dabo Swinney has produced a draft pick for 28 of the 32 NFL teams in his head coaching tenure; the only NFL teams not to select a Clemson player in his head coaching tenure are the Chicago Bears, Denver Broncos, New England Patriots and Carolina Panthers.

- Blake Miller became the highest-selected Clemson offensive lineman in the Common Draft era (since 1967), surpassing guard Dave Thompson's selection by the Detroit Lions with the No. 30 overall selection of the 1971 NFL Draft, a slot that would be in the first round in current day but represented the fourth pick of the second round during that 26-team era.

- Miller became the highest-selected Clemson offensive lineman of any era since 1960 when Lou Cordileone was selected by the New York Giants with the No. 12 overall pick and Harold Olson was selected by the St. Louis Cardinals with the No. 13 overall pick. A two-way player at Clemson, Cordileone would later spend the bulk of his NFL career as a defensive tackle.

- Avieon Terrell became the second member of his family to be drafted out of Clemson, joining his brother A.J. Terrell, whom the Atlanta Falcons selected with the No. 16 overall pick in 2020. The Terrell brothers joined the McSwain brothers (Chuck and Rod) and the Perry brothers (William and Michael Dean) as the third set of brothers to be selected out of Clemson in the last 50 years.

- The Terrell brothers joined William Perry (No. 22 in 1985) and Michael Dean Perry (No. 50 in 1988) as the second set of brothers in Clemson history to both be selected among the first 50 picks of their respective drafts.

- Antonio Williams became the 13th wide receiver in Dabo Swinney's head coaching tenure to be drafted into the NFL, the most of any active head coach — and tied for the most of any coach active or inactive — since the 2009 NFL Draft.

- Cade Klubnik became the fourth Clemson quarterback drafted in the Dabo Swinney era. According to records maintained by SportSource Analytics, Swinney tied Lincoln Riley and Lane Kiffin (four each) for the most quarterbacks drafted among active head coaches.

- Wade Woodaz's selection represented the fifth consecutive draft in which Clemson had a linebacker selected. Clemson and Alabama are the only programs in the nation to produce at least one linebacker in each of the last five NFL Drafts. Clemson's current streak of five consecutive drafts with an off-ball linebacker selected dating to 2022 is the longest in program history.

- With the selection of Adam Randall, Clemson had a running back selected in three consecutive drafts for the first time since 2009-11 (James Davis, C.J. Spiller and Jamie Harper). Clemson was the only program in the nation with a running back selected in each of the last three NFL Drafts.

BATON ROUGE, La. — After a two-hour pregame lightning delay, Clemson fell to No. 11/13 LSU, 51-10, in front of the second-largest crowd in Clemson history (102,321).

Ashton Hampton intercepted Sam Leavitt on the contest's second play from scrimmage, giving Clemson possession at the LSU 33-yard line. Kicker Nolan Hauser put Clemson in front, 3-0, with a 49-yard field goal with 13:28 remaining in the opening stanza.

LSU began the ensuing possession from its own 10-yard line and finished a 10-play, 59-yard drive with an equalizing 49-yard field goal by Scott Starzyk with 10:16 remaining in the first quarter. On its next drive, LSU capped a 12-play, 89-yard march with a one-yard rushing touchdown by Dilin Jones, giving LSU a 10-3 lead with 3:36 remaining in the first quarter.

On the third play of Clemson's ensuing drive, Jordan Ross intercepted Vizzina and returned it 30 yards for a touchdown, giving LSU a 17-3 lead with 2:07 remaining in the first quarter.

LSU extended its lead to 24-3 with 7:54 remaining in the first half on an eight-yard rushing touchdown by Leavitt. Leavitt added his second rushing touchdown of the game later in the quarter, a 13-yard scamper to give LSU a 31-3 lead.

LSU's Winston Watkins Jr. and Jones added third-quarters scores to extend the LSU advantage to 44-3 entering the final frame.

Phillip Wright III scored in the fourth quarter, pushing LSU's lead to 51-3. Late in the contest, Clemson added an eight-play, 71-yard drive capped by David Eziumume's first career touchdown, an 11-yard score that brought the final score to 51-10.

CLEMSON, S.C. — Placekicker Nolan Hauser converted a career-high-tying five field goals and Clemson's defense forced eight three-and-outs as the Tigers outlasted Georgia Southern, 22-7, in a weather-delayed game at Memorial Stadium that concluded at 1:07 a.m. A nearly two-hour pregame lightning delay resulted in the latest home kickoff time in program history just after 9:30 p.m. ET.

Junior T.J. Moore led the offense with 103 receiving yards on seven receptions with a touchdown. Freshman quarterback Tait Reynolds entered in the first quarter and threw for 178 yards on 16-of-27 passing. Clemson's defense held Georgia Southern to 22 rushing yards and forced eight three-and-outs.

Clemson struck first, scoring on a 10-yard touchdown pass from Christopher Vizzina to Moore. The touchdown was set up by a muffed punt fumble recovery by long snapper Jackson Reach.

The second quarter belonged to Hauser, who converted field goal attempts of 20, 34 and 38 yards, accounting for all nine Clemson points in the second frame. Georgia Southern's lone points of the game came in the quarter when Max Johnson completed a 42-yard touchdown pass to Ashton Hollins, but the third of Hauser's three second-quarter field goals pushed Clemson's halftime edge to 16-7.

The teams traded possessions in a scoreless third quarter. The Tigers resumed the scoring with a 50-yard field goal by Hauser with 6:26 remaining. Hauser later added a 49-yarder that put the Tigers ahead 22-7 with 3:10 to play.

Georgia Southern drove 72 yards on 11 plays on its final drive, but Clemson stopped the Eagles on downs from its own three-yard line, giving the Tigers possession and the ability to kneel out the clock.

CLEMSON, S.C. — Gideon Davidson rushed for 105 yards and a touchdown and freshman Tait Reynolds threw for 215 yards in his first career start as Clemson surged past North Carolina in the fourth quarter to earn a 28-20 win at Memorial Stadium.

The game was Clemson's third consecutive contest to incur a weather delay. The game was delayed a stadium-record two hours and 28 minutes by lightning in the fourth quarter with the Tigers trailing 17-15.

Clemson trailed by as many as 14 points before an 18-play, 88-yard field goal drive going into halftime. A 21-yard Hauser field goal as the half expired cut the North Carolina advantage to 17-6 after two quarters.

The teams traded turnovers early in the third quarter, and a Clemson fumble recovery gave the Tigers the ball on the North Carolina 12-yard line. Hauser added his third field goal of the game to shrink the deficit to eight with 10:43 left in the third. Clemson scored its first touchdown of the game on a 27-yard pass from Reynolds to Christian Bentancur in the third quarter but could not convert a two-point conversion attempt.

With North Carolina leading 17-15 inside the Clemson 10-yard line, the game entered a lightning delay with 8:11 remaining. After the delay, the Tigers held North Carolina to a field goal and regained possession with 6:26 to play. Clemson stormed 68 yards in four plays to score a touchdown on an eight-yard Davidson run.

Clemson forced a turnover on downs and scored on a 34-yard rushing touchdown by Tyler Brown to extend the lead to 28-20 with one minute remaining. North Carolina's final push was thwarted by Elliot Washington II, whose first interception as a Tiger with 37 seconds to play secured the 28-20 Clemson victory.

BERKELEY, Calif. — Gideon Davidson rushed for 159 yards and two touchdowns on 22 carries as Clemson powered past Cal on a Friday night.

Led by cornerback Elliot Washington II's two interceptions, Clemson's defense held Cal to just three offensive points. Clemson held the Bears to 145 passing yards, including a career-low 119 yards for Cal quarterback Jaron-Keawe Sagapolutele.

Cal opened the scoring on a scoop-and-score by Kamar Mothudi to give the Golden Bears a 7-0 lead with 5:15 remaining in the first quarter. Clemson responded with a 30-yard Nolan Hauser field goal on the opening play of the second quarter to cut the score to 7-3.

Following a third-down London Merritt sack that forced a Cal punt, Clemson embarked upon a 66-yard, 17-play touchdown drive that included two fourth-down conversions. Davidson capped the drive with a one-yard rushing touchdown for a 10-7 halftime lead.

Cal received the opening kickoff of the second half and drove into Clemson territory, but a third-and-2 pass breakup by Andy Burburija forced the Golden Bears to settle for a 30-yard field goal, which tied the game at 10-10. Clemson regained the lead, 17-10, on a 65-yard punt return touchdown by Bryant Wesco Jr. The score marked Clemson's first on a punt return since Nov. 10, 2018, when Amari Rodgers returned a punt 58 yards for a touchdown at Boston College.

Clemson took over at its own two-yard line with 5:30 remaining but embarked on a 98-yard scoring drive, the seventh drive of 98 or more yards in Clemson history. Davidson accounted for all 98 yards and exploded for a 75-yard score to give the Tigers a commanding 24-10 lead a few plays later.

Washington recorded his second interception of the night on Cal's ensuing possession, and one Clemson first down allowed Clemson to kneel out the clock.
